These signs are obstructing footpaths, making it difficult for pedestrians to walk on pavements and having to step into the roadway. The village of Port Isaac is renowned for its unspoilt appearance and the Parish Council would ask traders not to display so many signs and feel it unnecessary to cover every available window with advertising material. PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, Monday 10th. July.

Mr. Norris, vice-chairman, took the chair in the absence of Mrs. Cann.

Treasurer's Report

a. It had cost £16.50 to replace the broken glass in the car park notice board. The glass is now broken again and the cost of replacing it with perspex is to be investigated. b. A letter from Fred Thompson, Hon. Treasurer of Trio, thanked the Council for past donations, but knowing that the Parish Council has little funds available for donations, help would not be asked for this year. Trio has sufficient cash at present from increased sales and from private donations.

Planning and Conservation Area Correspondence between Mr. Whiting, N.C.D.C. and Gerry Neale, M.P. has discussed the so-called 'permitted development' and the needs of the 'Conservation Area'. It was questioned whether the 'auidelines' issued by the Planning Department three years ago had any effect and consideration might be given once again, to applying for an Article IV order for the area. This would effectively prevent any development taking place without planning consent and the Council would first conduct a referendum to consult every ratepayer. The matter is to be fully discussed at next month's meeting.

Parish Council Insurance

To meet the possibility of large claims, the cover for Parish Council money in transit may have to be increased to £2,000, and for public liability claims from £1,000,000 to £2,000,000. The clerk is to discover the increase in premiums entailed. Donkey Derbys

All councillors were in favour of permission being granted for the Donkey Derbys at the playing fields on 25th. July and 15th. August. St. Endellion Graveyard

A letter from St. Endellion P.C.C. said the existing graveyard will not be extended when it is full in ten to fifteen years time but will be closed due to escalating maintenance costs, and no further glebe land will be used for burial grounds. The Parish Council will then become responsible for burials for a period of six months until the N.C.D.C. takes over.

This raised the question of where would a new burial ground be - it ought to be adjacent to the present one, also, if the Parish Council had to pay for it the money would have to be raised from the ratepayers. It was suggested that a committee be formed, with members of both the P.C.C. and the Parish Council, to discuss the problem.

Playing Field Equipment

The roundabout is now dangerous and the contractor is to be asked to remove it, and leave the site in a safe condition. Meanwhile he will be asked to provide a quotation for the necessary repairs.

Port Gaverne Toilets, Disabled Users It was found, after tests with a wheel chair, that the door of the cubicle can be closed. A disabled user has said also that they have found the facilities to be perfectly acceptable.

School Governors' Report

The clerk gave a verbal report from Mrs. Cann announcing that Headmaster Ian Bruce is leaving and that Mrs. Prescott will be acting head for the time being. Interviews will be held, in July to find a replacement teacher for Mr. Bruce's class, and in September for a new head teacher. Signs Outside Commercial Properties It was reported that one business had 27 signs outside and another had 13, but, said Cllr. Symons, there are no planning infringements. The Parish Council is to ask that the number of signs is kept down. Road Safety

The Wadebridge and District Road Safety Committee wants to attract more people from outside Wadebridge itself and the Parish Council is invited to send representatives to the next meeting in September. Beach Cleaning

Under the new Direct Labour scheme, the District Council will no longer clean Port Isaac beach. This is the responsibility of the Harbour Commissioners. If it becomes unhealthy, the District Council can instruct someone to clean it and send the bill to the Harbour Commissioners. Port Gaverne beach, where there is no harbourmaster, is the responsiblity of Delabole cleansing depot. While discussing this matter, it was mentioned that Mr. Pyman, N.C.D.C. will meet Mr. Dodgeon, Highways, in Port Isaac. The regulations stipulate that Councils must now be able to 'account' for all work done so first someone comes to inspect the problem, then the foreman comes to see what needs to be done, the men come and do the work, and then someone else comes to see that it has been done properly, and so on . . . a system which means more

money is spent on 'accountability' than getting the work done. Contract for Fishermen

A draft contract giving permission for the fishermen to use the 'coach park' at the playing field to load fish on to lorries was presented by the Clerk. After discussion it was decided that the document should be checked through by a solicitor.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. A letter from Mr. Penna suggesting that a decision to support the footpath diversion in Port Isaac valley should not have been taken during 'Clerk's Correspondence'.
b. A definition of 'Heritage Coast Interpretation Centre' was read.
c. A letter from Mr. Warrillow, Port Isaac and District Tourism Association, asking the Parish Council to keep under review the possibility of adding the words 'Historic Fishing Village' to the village nameplate .

d. Next time he is in Port Isaac, Mr. Dodgeon, Highways, will observe the parking problem in The Terrace for himself.

e. A letter from Mr. Penna [published in last month's Trio] spoke about the lack of street sweeping, Public Discussion

a. Mrs. Brown, Trelights, said the graveyard would be full in five years, not ten or fifteen. She said the front of the church is kept immaculate but the long grass and a heap of stones in one corner are a disgrace. She also wanted to know what had happened to the money collected for flowering shrubs which have never been planted. She then complained about the low-flying jets which make children scream with fright. Mr. Shields pointed out that the pilots must practice low-flying. b. Mrs. Strout spoke of letters she had seen at the time of the sale of the Old School, which referred to covenants forbidding the change in the appearance of the building. Next Meeting

The anglers were found and said they were not in danger: further searching failed to reveal anyone in difficulties, and the lifeboat was recalled. Crew: Neville Andrews, Andy Walton, and John Collins. On the 4th July, two people were reported cut off by the tide at The Greenaway, Polzeath. The lifeboat was launched and crew members John Coshall, Nigel Andrews, and Andy Walton took the two men off cliffs near Tristram car park. Both were unhurt and were put safely ashore. On 18th July, the lifeboat was launched to assist a child, injured on rocks at Polzeath. Crew members Neville Andrews, Mike Daly, and Andy Walton picked up Or. Sainsbury from steps near the scene, and took him to the casualty. Henry Dingle, aged 12, from London, was found to have broken a bone in his foot, and had cuts to his face.
