

The Clerk to the Council is Mrs. B. Willmott, 11 New Road. The following report was compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting at Trelights Chapel Hall, Monday 2nd. October.

Jet-Ski Race, Port Gaverne

In a reply to the Parish Council's letter. The National Trust said they had not made any change to the agreed arrangements and did not ask for the race to be cancelled. However it is thought the activity might not be compatible with quiet places like Port Gaverne, and The Trust will consider the matter, with relation to the whole of Devon and Cornwall, at their annual meeting.

Finance

To cover present expenditure, much of it for Port Gaverne toilets, a precept of £1000 is to be raised from N.C.D.C. This will leave about £2.000 'in the kitty'.

St. Endellion Lane

Mr. Dawe said the road (from Trelights to the B.3314, near the church) is in a bad state of repair. Mr. Chapman, who worked for the Council for thirty years, was invited to speak and said that to his knowledge the road had not been cleared for the last four or five years. The County Council acknowledge that it is an adopted road but may not want to open it up because of the dangerous entrance at the B.3314 main road.

Beach Cleaning

The Parish Council share of the first clean up is £100, but the whole cost of the second clean up in Bank Holiday week will be borne by the Harbour Commissioners. Cllr. Symons said that N.C.D.C. are hoping to find that they can legally take over beach cleaning and pay for it. It is for residents and visitors only, so why should the Harbour Commissioners pay? Most of the rubbish comes in from the sea. Perhaps money for beach cleaning could be obtained from the Tourist

Association? N.C.D.C. spends much money on publicity, but dirty beaches are a bad advertisement. With the Lowermoor incident, dirty beaches, the water shortage, and bad parking, it was a poor situation this year. S.W.W.A. have spent £200,000 on publicity but they send out a list of accommodation which only has names and telephone numbers - no descriptions. They are now, however, making a video about the North Cornwall area.

Footpath 35

A letter from Mr. Penna was read. asking for the path, along Port Isaac valley and through the mill, to be left where it is. Mr. Norris reported that there are feelings of resentment about the proposed diversion. Mr. Welton said the matter was with the legal department at County Hall, and they might not be prepared to accept a diversion. A Parish Council site meeting was arranged. and the landowner would be invited to attend.

St. Endellion Churchyard

The future of the graveyard is a matter for the Glebe Committee and specific comments by the Parish Council would be considered. No further resources are available from church funds for extension or maintenance. The Parish Council is worried about the provision of a new cemetery and the maintenance of the existing one. If N.C.D.C. take over, however, they ought not to be able to move the gravestones to simplify grass cutting because, as Mr. Norris pointed out, it is a churchyard 'listed' as of historic importance by the Dept. of the Environment. Clerk's Correspondence

a. The Parish Council will write to County Highways to support the Playgroup's attempt to get 'Slow, children crossing' signs in Trewetha Lane, near the Village Hall where they meet. There is danger to the children when they leave from fast traffic passing the hall. b. A letter to say 'Thank you for your co-operation during the water shortage' was received from S.W.W.A. c. Most Parish Councils activated their emergency committees during the drought, and how to fill in a form about the local emergency committee is to be considered at the next meeting.

The Bodmin Railway Preservation Society suggested, in 1984, the retention of the old line from Bodmin Road (Parkway) to Wenfordbridge, closed by British Rail following the end of clay traffic.

In 1985 a public company, the Bodmin and Wenford Railway plc, was formed to raise funds to buy the line from Bodmin Parkway to Boscarne Junction. Sadly, for safety reasons, however, the original 1834 line to Wenfordbridge could not be included.

The Company succeeded in buying the line - with a large overdraft and in August the Light Railway Order, enabling passenger transport along the line, was granted by the Department of Transport.

The Company and Society are now developing the Railway and hope to create, as nearly as possible, an authentic representation of a


PORT ISAAC VALLEY PATH


