Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting on Wednesday evening 6th. December, at the Penhaligon Room, was opened by Branch President, Surg. Capt. Baskerville who welcomed the guests. Hon. Sec. David Castle announced that over £15,000 had been raised by the Branch this year. There is now a crew list of fifteen. Harry Pavitt retired during the year, and Clive Hester was appointed Boathouse Keeper.

The total Lifeboat services during the operational year were 22, and 11 persons were rescued. Services: 5 boats, 4 searches, 1 swimmer, 6 windsurfers, 3 cliff incidents, 3

cut off by tide. Since Port Isaac Lifeboat Station was re-established in 1957, 308 services have been carried out and 157 persons rescued [7.14 per year]. David Castle expressed concern about windsurfers at Daymer Bay, lacking experience, who go surfing in unsuitable conditions.

The RNLI has taken up with HM Coastguard, poor VHF radio coverage on the North Coast. An improved link has been set up which should be beneficial.

Surg. Capt. Baskerville conducted the election of Chairman, Officers, and Members of the Branch Committee, who were re-elected unanimously.

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Guest speaker, Capt. T. S. Taylor, RN, Officer Commanding, R.N.A.S. Culdrose, spoke about the Search and Rescue Squadron at Culdrose, and emphasised the importance of good liaison between all involved. He described the rescue of 40 crew from a Pakistani freighter off Start Point, and the Cecil Japan incident earlier in a year in which his men have flown 189 rescue missions. The RNLI is totally dependent on donations but the advantage is they can spend money as it is needed and do not have to persuade a government department to grant funds. Mr. Rowe, Chairman, North Cornwall Branch, Gideons International, des-cribed their work then gave bibles to crew members John Collins, Chris Scott, and Steve Hudspith. After six years service at Southendon-Sea, crew member Harry Pavitt moved to Port Isaac, and has been a crew member here for sixteen years. RNLI Deputy Divisional Inspector of Lifeboats, Mr. Peter Bradley, spoke of his excellent service, and Capt. Taylor presented him with the RNLI Certificate.
