JET-SKIS: NOT AGAIN!

As a Port Gaverne resident whose livelihood depends on the tourist trade, I am pleased that the National Trust has reaffirmed its ban on jet skis. Port Isaac may be less pleased with the suggestion to transfer their August bank holiday meeting to its harbour.

In the harsh business world, local opposition can play little part in a commercial decision. For those in business who believe the jet skiers will benefit the tourist trade, I ask you to consider if the trade will add to, or be at the expense

of, existing trade.

My research into tourism in Port Isaac and district, shows that we have some 800 beds altogether. In August, these will generate around £10,000 a night in accommodation income alone. I would hope our efforts in peak season are successful enough to fill 90% of these. The maximum increase from jet skiers is thus likely to be around 80 persons or £1,000 a night. Add a reasonable estimate for their spending on shopping, meals, drinks, etc. and our income can increase by a further £1,600. A five-night stay by the jet skiers and their followers could generate a maximum of around £13,000. Of course, this may not all be spent in Port Isaac. Our annual gross turnover from tourism is likely to exceed £2 million. The jet skiers maximum trade can only represent less than 1% of this. Is this £2 million generated by people with no objections to jet skis in the harbour? To me, Port Isaac is a village whose tourist attraction is peace, tranquillity, and sheer natural beauty. I cannot believe our visitors would be without objections.

In the end, my opinion, or that of others in the tourist trade, is irrelevant. Only the opinions of our visitors, on whom our livelihoods depend, is important. So for all those who truly support the longterm interests of tourist trade here, I ask you to consider all the implications of welcoming jet skiers. If you really believe their trade will not be at the expense of existing trade, then your commercial decision must be to support the suggestion to use the harbour. Perhaps you are right, but if you are wrong, what might it cost to recover what has been lost.



PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, Monday 12th. February.

The meeting was chaired by Vicechairman Bill Norris.

Cllr. Symons spoke a few words about the sad loss of two relatively young men from the village, Brian Orchard and John Cann. The Council are to send letters of condolence to their widows, Joan and Margaret.

Financial Statement

Having precepted high last year as a provision against the Community Charge, the Council has £331 in the current account and £3,282 deposit. The District Council Treasurer will in future pay precepts in two equal instalments. St. Endellion is to receive £2,375 in April and £2,375 in September. The total, £4,750, represents approximately a 6p rate, much higher than before, to overcome the loss of local business rates to central government.

Port Isaac Cricket Club

The £50 donation promised last May is now to be paid to the club.

Christmas Illuminations

Mr. Stokes thanked the Council for the donation towards the lights in Port Isaac. He also congratulated Mr. Phelps on his individual display at Trewetha. Mr. Barriball apologised on behalf of Trelights, and said that bad weather and high winds had caused them to abandon most of their planned display.

Annual Parish Meeting

This is to be held at The Church Hall at 7.30pm. on Thursday 26th. April. Gerry Neale MP., representatives of the Highways, Footpaths, Beach Cleaning and Car Parking Departments, and the Police are to be invited. County Councillor Harvey Lander and District Councillor Henry Symons will also attend.

St. Endellion Lane

Mr. Dawe said the lane is in a terrible condition. Because it is not in Rock, Padstow, or Wadebridge it is neglected by the Highways Dept. Mr. Phelps agreed that something should be done, references to the dangerous exit on to the B.3314 are only excuses not to do it. Mr. Barriball said it was difficult for

ladies walking through to the church to tend graves, etc. Cllr. Symons pointed out that the field had been ploughed up quite a while ago. Cownty Cllr. Harvey Lander is to be invited to inspect the lane with the Parish Council.

South West Water Authority

Mr. Dunworth of the Authority had said that after heavy rain, water from Restormel fed into the St. Endellion supply may have caused an earthy taste but it was safe to drink. Several members of the Council averred that he didn't know what he was talking about and that all our water comes from De Lank.

Jet-Ski Racing

The National Trust have drawn up a presumption against Jet-Ski Racing in Devon and Cornwall. Mr. Longworth-Krafft has suggested that the annual venue should be transferred from Port Gaverne to Port Isaac.

Playing Fields, Roundabout

It was decided better to spend money having the roundabout repaired as this would last longer than a cheap new one costing £980 plus VAT. The contractor is to be asked for a quote. The clerk is to investigate the new type of 'soft ground' now required around playground items. The present arrangement of the items is due to earlier plans for a fullsize football pitch which were never realised. Space also has to be left between them to allow the gang-mower to get through.

Clerk's Correspondence

- a. The County Council is to assess the New Road car-parking situation. b. Notification was received of the diversion of footpaths 7 & 8. c. Information was received about the Prohibition of Waiting order. d. The footbridge on the Main at Port Gaverne is to be made safer at a cost of £195.
- e. It was decided to make no donation in response to the County Playing Fields Association appeal. f. The Chairman read a copy of a letter from Dr. Sainsbury to County Highways about the bad condition of the footpath at the millpool. Mr. Welton reported that the County Solicitor had written to the Watsons asking them to reinstate the path.

Planning Applications

a. Erection of split level bungalow and private garage, 38 New Road,

Harvest Combe Ltd: It was felt the development would be too big. b. Hoppet House (Lantern Restaurant) change of use of garage to kitchen: No observations providing off-street car parking is still provided. c. Formation of new access, Trewetha Lane, Mr. J. Chapman: The Council were against this. It is on a blind bend, and would be 'murderous', and 'suicidal'.

 d. Erection of dormer extension, Tregole, Trelights, Mr. and Mrs. Bridges: No observations.

e. Erection of dwelling, Archer Farm Hotel, Mr. and Mrs. Welton: (Mr. Welton declared an interest) These were simply revised plans of the earlier application and received the Council's approval.

Public Discussion

Mr. Penna, in reply to an earlier comment by Mr. Phelps pointed out that while the gradient of the path from Port Gaverne to Trewetha might be greater than that of the proposed diversion at the millpool, that path was already there while the diversion would be a new one and could be obviated. Also, during the gales he had rescued the sign 'Margaret's Lane! which was now in his shed awaiting collection.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 12th. March at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Room, Trelights.




