PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 10th. September.

Matters Arising

Mr. Norris asked for several matters to be raised concerning items in the minutes. Dr. Barron pointed out that they were all matters being dealt with by the Clerk and asked if he was questioning her efficiency. Mr. Norris replied that this was not his intention, he merely wanted to ensure that the items were not being forgotten.

Footbridge at Parish Boundary

It was decided to repair the sleeper bridge at the top of Port Gaverne Valley, and at the same time to ask St. Kew Parish Council to consider the creation of an official diversion of the path from this point, through to Pendoggett, and including a new route at Pendoggett Farm. Fire Brigade

Fire Brigade

It has not been possible to make arrangements for the visit to the Delabole Brigade and the evenings will now be too dark for the demonstrations. However a member of the Brigade will be invited to speak at the Annual Parish Meeting next April.

Donation of Seat

Three seats are being donated to the Parish, one at Minepit Corner by Mrs. Cann, one at the top of the Pinehaven steps by Mrs. W. Sproull, and a 'picnic' table at the Playing Fields, by an anonymous donor. The seat at Trewetha Farm is to be repaired. Mr. Phelps asked if it could be temporarily re-sited, as it is on his land, during work on his barn. This was agreed to and a position on the grass verge across the main road from the farm was recommended.

Port Isaac Village Hall

A letter from Mrs. Coates pointed out that the Hall had not recently received any money, as reported last month, and that an extensive programme of work to make the hall more comfortable is foreseen. If no promise of a grant is forthcoming from the Parish Council then money which would have been available from North Cornwall District Council, the County Council, and the Rural Development Council will not be granted. The Parish Council therefore decided to send a letter to the Village Hall Committee with a definite promise of an unspecified amount of grant to be donated in February.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. The N.C.D.C. Waste Management Officer says that the quarry on Church Hill, where tipping has been taking place, is overgrown so the rubbish can't be seen. He will, however, come out to inspect the site if any more tipping is reported to him by the Parish Council.
b. To save the heavy cost, minutes of N.C.D.C. meetings will no longer be sent out to Parish Councils every month, but specific copies will be sent on request.

c. Mr. Coulson does not want the commemorative seat to Mrs. Pam Coulson moved to a new site but asks if the Parish Council could monitor the situation to see that it does not get damaged by cars, etc.

d. A letter from Fred Thompson, Hon. Treasurer of Trio Newsletter thanked the Parish Council for the donation towards the cost of producing the newsletter, and said that it was a great encouragement. e. Now is the time to apply for a bottle bank so, hoping that broken glass doesn't accumulate around it, one is to be asked for, to be sited behind the notice board, in the District Council car park. f. South West Water are taking the new water main through the Playing Field so Mr. Peter Norman has been appointed on behalf of the Parish Council to ensure that adequate compensation is paid. Meanwhile the siting of the new playground equipment had to be deferred until the site was cleared.

Planning Applications

NB. The Parish Council are merely asked for an opinion on planning applications. The Planning Committee of North Cornwall District Council. make the final decisions. Plans are sometimes amended after they have been seen by the Parish Council and the Planning Department are therefore to be asked if the Parish Council can be notified of all amendments in future. a. Erection of Kitchen Extension at rear of No. 12 Dolphin Street, Mr. A. Moreton: The Parish Council approved the plans, provided that suitable materials were used. b. Erection of a Bungalow and



re-siting of the Kennels, Little Treswarrow, Miss J. Fanstone: Approved by the Parish Council. c. Formation of New Access on the main road near Valley View Cottage, Trelights, Mr. D. V. Blake: Approved by the Parish Council.

d. Established Use Certificate for use of lower part of premises as single dwelling unit, Northcliffe, Roscarrock Hill, Mr. R. R. Elsholz: This was a 'regularising' application and no observations were made by the Parish Council.

Public Discussion

Miss Doris Hambly asked if a handrail could be installed alongside the steps on the cliff path, as a ramp for disabled people could not be provided, people would not then have to grasp the chain link fencing for support.

b. Carol Richards showed the Council some pictures of the playground equipment being provided at the Playing Field and said that the suppliers, Taylor Made Ltd., would wait to install it until the work by South West water was completed. The equipment will be sited clear of the new excavations, between the existing Wendy House and the see-saw, providing room for the grass cutter to get through. The total cost will be £3,246 plus VAT. The Parish Council has promised to donate £500 towards this and will buy the equipment so that they can claim back the VAT. The Playing Field Action Group will provide the balance of the payment, and any maintenance of the equipment which may become necessary will also be paid for from their funds. Tenders

The public were then asked to leave while the Parish Council discussed tenders received for painting or oiling all the seats in the parish. Next Meeting

VILLAGE HALL

The Village Hall Committee would like to correct the impression given in Trio in respect of the second phase of the Hall's refurbishment: central heating, roof insulation and secondary glazing.

There is a promise of £950 from the Community Fund of the Cornwall Rural Community Council towards the cost. with the proviso that this grant be taken up by May, 1991. This won't be paid until the work is completed. It was hoped to start work at the end of October, but no further help would have been forthcoming from N.C.D.C., Cornwall County Council, or the Rural Development Commission without the promise of a contribution from the Parish Council. The Hall is presently the meeting place of the Pre-School Playgroup, the Brownies, Badminton Club, and the Port Isaac Players. A Girl Guide Company, Keep Fit Club, and a Short Mat Bowls Club are to start in the Autumn.

Booking charges cover day-to-day running costs. Major building works, however, cannot be financed this way without making the charges prohibitive.

The present heating system is inadequate, particularly for the under-five age group (who use the Hall three times a week), Brownies, Guides, or a seated audience, and the committee deem it desirable to have the roof insulated, secondary glazing fitted, and central heating organised this winter.

On behalf of the Parish Council (Custodian Trustees), the committee have been working since 1986 to improve the Hall to give the people of Port Isaac a meeting place of which they can be proud.

The committee are grateful for the help already given by the Parish Council but requested them to reconsider their earlier decision in order that applications for grants may be made to allow the final phase of the work to be completed as soon as possible.

LIFEBOAT

Our Harvest Festival was held at The Cornish Arms, Pendoggett on Friday 14th. September. Mr. Ray Crossley held a short service and spoke of his long association with Port Isaac's Lifeboat when he was chairman of Tintagel Surf Lifesaving Club. Neville Andrews held a lively auction which raised over £340. One of two Harvest loaves bought by the crew, and donated for sale, this time with butter and cheese, at The Golden Lion Inn on Sunday 16th. September by kind permission of Jack and Muriel, raised a further £65. The lifeboat has been launched five times since last Trio, including: On Friday 24th. August, Mr. Kent Hill of Redditch fell trying to recover his dog on cliffs near Tintagel Head. Trevor Beare, Bob Young and Steve Hudspith took them off the rocks to land at Castle Cove. Boscastle Coastquard Team took over and drove Mr. Kent Hill to the local surgery for a medical check. On Sunday 9th. September, an empty boat trailer was seen at Port Gaverne, and enquiries suggested that the owner and boat were overdue. A search was begun by crew members Andy Walton, Mike Daly and Steve Hudspith, but it was called off when the owner and his boat were found to be safe at Rock. On Wednesday 5th. September, the lifeboat was launched with crew members Andy Walton, John McDonnell and Richard Hambly. In failing light and rough sea they went to Trevone Bay where a person/s were reported to have been washed off rocks into the sea. The search was later called off when it was understood that some anglers had thrown a bag into the water. Due to the poor weather conditions, the lifeboat was escorted back to Port Isaac harbour by the RNAS helicopter which had been participating in the search, together with Coastguard teams. Late on Thursday 13th. September, the police asked for a search for two persons who might have gone over the cliffs at Port Isaac. Together with Port Isaac Coastguard team and a helicopter from RNAS Culdrose, lifeboat crew members Neville Andrews, Mike Daly and John Coshall searched the area for two hours, but nothing was found.
