The usual gales delayed erection, and continued after they were up, but the only gremlins were the tree, and the new string at the top. Better luck next year.



PARISH COUNCIL

The December meeting is not going to be reported. You are recommended to consult the official minutes for any information.

This report was compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 14th. January.

Finance

To meet this month's expenditure, £500 is to be transferred from the deposit account.

A donation of £25 is to be made to Youth Clubs Cornwall Ltd.

Road Signs, Port Isaac

Roger Warrillow and Malcolm Lee of Port Isaac and District Tourism Association presented a report with proposals for improving the direction signs into the village for the benefit of visitors. Mr. Stokes proposed thanks to P.I.D.T.A. and urged the parish council to give the scheme full support. This was carried. Mr. Dawe then proposed a meeting of the parish council, P.I.D.T.A., and N.C.D.C. with Cornwall County Highways. This was also carried.

Hillsons Close

Mrs. Richards reported theft and vandalism at the building site over the Christmas holiday. The council deplored this and feared that, as the cost would be borne by the Housing Association's insurance, it could therefore eventually be reflected in increased rents. Mrs. Richards detailed the accommodation and facilities to be provided and said that it was hoped that the tenants would be able to move in the week before Easter.

A letter from Councillor Facks-Martin said that there was little point in a meeting to discuss the method of allocation as this was the responsiblity of the West Country Housing Association with recommendations from the N.C.D.C. and the relevant committee of which Cllr. Symons is a member and taking care of the interests of applicants from this parish. There is a ruling that deserving local applicants must be considered - local being defined in the agreement as the parishes of St. Endellion, St. Minver, St. Kew, and St. Teath.

Condition of Road into Port Isaac

Mr. Phelps complained that the road from the school down to the car park had been dug up, was about to be dug up again, and was in a terible condition. He hoped that it was going to be properly resurfaced. The section from the top of Back Hill to the car park was supposed to have been done within the last two years but had not been. Complaints were then raised about other roads around the village and it was proposed, and

carried, that a letter be sent to Cornwall Highways asking them to survey, and renovate, all the roads in Port Isaac. The road leading into Port Gaverne has been done.

Glebe Land, St. Endellion

It was decided to accept the new valuation of £80 - £900 for the land and to ask the District Valuer to start proceedings.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. Information was received from OFWAT about possible future methods of charging for water by metering, flat rate charges, or property 'banding'.

b. Some residents of Port Isaac recently connected to the new water main were being advised to boil their water due to a 'high bacteria count'. The parish council was concerned about this and the clerk is to telephone for details. c. A letter from N.C.D.C. planning department explained that there is no local plan, as such, for the future development of Port Isaac although guidelines are being prepared for Wadebridge, Camelford, Bodmin, and Launceston. There is, however, the 'Conservation Area' quideline document issued in 1986. d. A letter from South West Water explained that the Fire Brigade were responsible for the siting of the new hydrants on the green patch at the bottom of Tintagel Terrace. Mr. Phelps suggested that immediate contact be made so that the hydrants could be resited before their positions were 'coded'.

- e. N.C.D.C. have no objection to the siting of the proposed bottle bank at the car park.
- f. The District Council and Parish Council elections will take place on Thursday 2nd. May. The Clerk has nomination papers.
- g. Trewornan Bridge is to be closed from 16th. to 24th. February, but no alternative route will be offered as there is none of suitable quality. h. A letter from Mr. A'Court of Trelights thanked the council for the donation of £100 towards playground equipment. This had made possible a further donation of £150 from the Cornwall Rural Community Council. They would have to find the final £76 themselves. He also thanked the council for the £50 donation for the Christmas lights. i. A sample of re-cycled plastic as used instead of wood on the new seat
- used instead of wood on the new seat at Trewetha was examined. More seats of this type may be ordered from Supawood Seats.
- j. A planning appeal by Mr. Cleave, regarding a dwelling and garage at Brooklands Farm, will be heard on Tuesday 12th. February at 10am. Everybody with an interest is invited to attend.

Public Discussion

a. Mrs. Carol Richards asked if yellow lines would be painted at the entrance to Lundy Road but was told this would not be possible as the road was unadopted.

b. Mrs. Melanie Dingle asked who would pay compensation if a child was injured on the building equipment being kept in the playing fields car space.

c. Mr. Robin Penna complained that nobody seems to be interested in the state of the old village. The road at the Platt and Roscarrock Hill, were as bad as any but were not specifically mentioned during the discussion. It had finally needed a long personal telephone call to County Highways to get something done about the flooding in Temple Bar. Street lights at the bottom of Fore Street, malfunctioning since the autumn, were still not working. Cllr. Symons was trying to get this corrected but apparently N.C.D.C. are charged £50 every time the engineers fail to find a fault.

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
