Horace, whose grandparents lived in a cottage opposite the Port Gaverne Hotel, had known Lilla since childhood. At first he worked as a locksmith in St. Austell but later followed Lilla to Woking. The couple returned to Port Isaac for their wedding (in terrible weather) at St. Peters in 1941 when Horace was serving in the Royal Navy where he eventually rose to the rank of Petty Officer. After the war he established a locksmiths in Chertsey and the very successful business is now run by his son Christopher. Horace is kept busy producing the internationally distributed newsletter for the Association of Master Locksmiths.

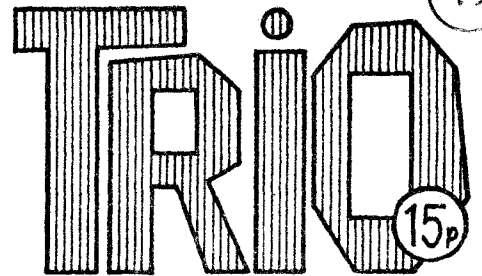

PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Chapel Room, Trelights, on Monday 11th. March.

Change of Day for Monthly Meeting

The second Wednesday in the month was suggested but a firm proposal will be called for next month.

Matters arising from the minutes:

Hillsons Close: Peggy Richards said she felt that although the varied colour scheme looked nice inside the area, it will be better if the houses along the road were all the same colour.

Rubble in Lay-bys: Cleaning-up needs to be done at the lay-bys at the top of Poltreworgey Hill and at the top of Church Hill. It will be discussed at the next meeting whether Highways could be asked to clear them.

30mph. Signs: Mr. Phelps complained that there was no consultation or public notice about the re-siting of the signs which were now about to be moved again. This will be discussed next month.

Finance

The Trelights share of the cost of the 'Assault Course' in Coronation Park was duly received.

There was no balance sheet with the application for a donation for the upkeep of St. Endellion Churchyard but Mr. Dawe successfully proposed that the donation should be £425. Tenders for the erection of a notice board at Port Isaac car park would be considered after the meeting. The cost of the board (£208) and its erection will be 50% supported by funds from Port Isaac and District Tourism Association.

Annual Parish Meeting

It was decided to invite Environmental Health Officer, Mr. Evans, to the meeting to talk about the new food safety regulations.

Telephone Boxes

English Heritage had been contacted about preserving the red boxes in 1988. The reply was that there had been 4,000 applications for the 1,000 boxes that were to be 'listed'. St. Endellion's case was under consideration. A follow-up letter is to be sent asking for all five of the boxes to be considered.

Hillson's Close

Mrs. Richards said she had found the houses very nice and convenient, easy to clean, with large kitchens and lots of cupboard space. The money available was insufficient, however, to provide carpets as had been originally intended. The houses looked a lot better now especially since the landscaping.

Port Gaverne Toilets

The Council will try an appeal against the business charge levied on the conveniences which are funded from the community charge.

Light for Lundy Road

This is an unadopted road and the cost of a new light would have to be borne by the parish. Cllr. Symons suggested that perhaps the light at the bottom of the road could be moved nearer to the other one. The cost of installing a new light is to be discovered meanwhile councillors were asked to go and look at the situation.

Doctor's Meadow

A complaint was received that the path had not been cut out. As a public footpath, it could be included in the Parish Council annual trimming tender. Mr. Dawe has been in contact with County Highways and as an officer is coming to inspect the footpaths soon his verdict will be awaited.

Mr. Norris pointed out the danger caused by vegetation overhanging the pavement opposite the Doctors' surgery in Tintagel Terrace.

Alcohol Free Zones

The imposition of a ban on drinking in specific zones would be like using a 'sledge-hammer to crack a nut' as the problem in Port Isaac is not so great.

Clerk's Correspondence

1. Lane at St. Endellion: Surprise was expressed that the lane had been metalled right through to the main road. It had been understood that Highways were in opposition to people being able to drive out on to the B.3314 at a very dangerous spot and that the lane only needed clearing. However, the road had been returned to 'its original condition' of metalling throughout. Mrs. Haygreen asked permission to say that it was now 90% better than before and said that the asphalt was old material from Trewornan Bridge which had just been resurfaced.

2: Mr. Trudgian had written to explain that the street lights in Fore Street could not have been out at any time as they incorporate a special cell to prevent this happening. Nevertheless no charge would be made for the call-out in response to Mr. Penna's complaint.

3: Department of Transport criteria to ensure that a crossing is well used would probably preclude one near the school and playing fields. However, the Parish Council will submit an application for one near the junction with Mayfield Road.

4: The application for yellow lines at the junction with Lundy Road is under consideration by the Department of Transport.

5: A letter from Mr. A'Court, Chairman of Trelights Village Green Committee, reported the installation of the 'Assault Net 200'.

6: The manufacturers will give Port Isaac Playing Field equipment one free service, then a twice-yearly service on a contract basis.

7: The bottle bank is in position at the car park.

8: The contractors are to clear the Playing Fields car park they have been using, fill in the soft spots, and dress the surface with blinded granular material. They will also provide curb stones at the entrance. No mention was made of a donation to the Parish Council for the free use of the area.

9: Notice was given that Port Gaverne Hill would be closed for one day while manhole covers were raised prior to the re-surfacing.

10: Notices of the Planning Application connected with the purchase of Glebe Land at St. Endellion to form an extension to the graveyard are to be displayed, and an advertisement will be appear in the Cornish Guardian. The £46 fee has been paid to North Cornwall District Council.

11: A Watchdog 'Child Safety' video on loan from the Playgroup will be circulated among the Parish Councillors.

Planning Applications

Before the plans were discussed, Mr. Bolton explained that, contrary to rumour, the work being done for Mr. and Mrs. Ratcliffe at Silverspray, Port Gaverne, was absolutely within North Cornwall District Councils planning regulations.

1: Change of Use of Agricultural Buildings to Residential Use, Treore Farm, Mr and Mrs Pennington: The old buildings are to be converted for guest sportsmen during shoots. The application was considered 'o.k.'

2: Flat above Pea Pod Shop for Mr. Philp: The application received support.

3: Robert Hunter Trust, demolish existing garage and rebuild, 61 Fore Street (Springside): This received the Parish Council's approval.

There were no members of the public present so no discussion was possible.

The Council then went into private session to discuss tenders for the caretaking of Port Gaverne toilets and for the erection of the notice board at Port Isaac Car Park.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 8th. April, at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

BOTTLE BANK

The bottle bank is now in place at the Port Isaac Car Park so there is no longer any need to drive into Wadebridge to dispose of old bottles. The three bins are coded according to the colour of the glass they should be used for. The bins will be emptied monthly, or more often if necessary. The Parish Council will monitor the site for any boxes or other rubbish.

I learnt recently from the lady in charge of British Telecom payphones in Cornwall, that Port Isaac's red public telephone boxes are on the 'hit list' for replacement by the uglier, colder contemporary models. The only way they can be saved is by their being listed by English Heritage as worthy of preservation. This has happened in several areas of special beauty where conservation is seen as a priority. Traditional red telephones are, I believe, a visual asset to the village, so I hope that the Parish Council will see their survival - particularly the one in Church Hill - as a priority for action.

PORT ISAAC AND DISTRICT TOURISM ASSOCIATION.

Annual General Meeting 14th March:

Roger Warrillow, Chairman, welcomed all those who attended, and reported on the last twelve months activities. PIDTA has advertised in TV Times, English Tourist Board, West Country Tourist Board and Cornwall Tourist Board Guides, as well as the North Cornwall Guide. There is also advertising in 'Coast Lines' and the North Cornwall and West Devon Tourist Attraction Guide, to encourage day visitors and benefit all our businesses. Almost 800 brochure requests were made in the first 10 weeks of advertising.

PIDTA has agreed to meet half the cost of replacing the parish council's car park notice board but it is understood they are not prepared to pay for erecting it. New signs are proposed to encourage the use of footpaths from the car park to the harbour.

PIDTA has 18 new members, mainly in self-catering.

1990 Visitor Survey. Malcolm Lee gave a talk on the Survey, and reported that 405 forms, representing 1185 visitors, had been returned. There were some surprises: over half the visitors had never stayed here before. More than 80% come from the South and Midlands. Three times as many visitors want a boat trip as want to go fishing. Outside the school holidays, there are virtually no children in serviced accommodation, 90% of parties then being adult couples. The full report runs to 60 pages and is available for £7 to members and £10 to non-members. Ring Malcolm on 880106 for your copy.

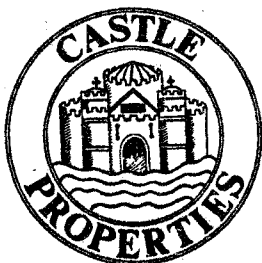
The March Julian Meeting for con-

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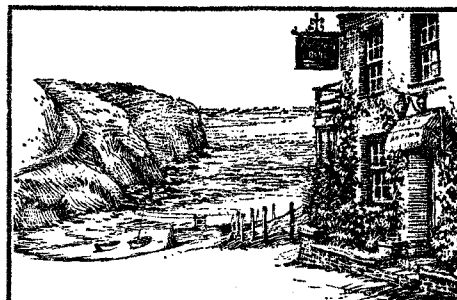
