PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, Monday 9th. September. Finance

With the next part of the precept due soon, it was thought feasable to transfer $\pounds200$ from the high interest deposit account for this month's expenditure. £45 is to be paid for pulling up and

burning ragwort on the Main and the item is to be placed in the diary for discussion in July in future. Parking in Port Isaac

As the situation will only get worse, serious thought is to be given to the problem and the County given to the problem and the County Highways Department is to be asked to do a feasibility study to be discussed with the Parish Council. **Speeding at Trewetha** The Parish Council is to endeavour to find a solution to this problem.

All suggestions to County Highways so far have met a negative response. R.N.L.I. Boat House

A letter from the R.N.L.I. said they had no wish to go ahead with a development that was against the wishes of the village. If more room could be found at the present site plus a direct launch to the beach, they would negotiate with N.C.D.C. for better leasing terms. The lean-to shed is listed so no development will take place until full investigations are complete. A letter from the County Architect stressed that the loss of the shed would be unfortunate as it formed an integral part of the scene. Mr. Stokes moved that no more dis-cussion of the subject should take place until further planning applications were received.

Notice Board - Port Isaac Area Map Tenders are to be sought for up-dating the map to include Hillson Close, the Doctors' Surgery, etc. Dogs on Port Gaverne Beach

There are sometimes many dogs running loose on the beach where children are playing and the National Trust is to be asked for permission to erect a sign during the summer months: 'Dogs welcome but must be kept on a lead ' or words to that effect.

Possible Planning Violations A letter from Mr. Castle said that a Portacabin at the Coastguard Cottages, a caravan at the rear of 8 Tintagel Terrace, and a sign 'Archer Farm' on the B3267 appeared to violate planning rules. Although each case was thought to be in order, the Planning Department is to

be asked to verify. Damage to Car Park Notice Board

A local person is thought to have been responsible for the damage but the witness could not be absolutely sure. Tenders for the repair are to be sought, including a plywood sheet inserted at the back to increase the strength. Mr. Stokes said notices for functions outside the village should not be allowed.

Mill Path Clearance

Following complaints from the postman, Mark Dawe is to be asked to clear the path again, there would be no time to ask for tenders. Gun and Surrounding Area at Harbour Mr. Stokes said the gun is a good

memorial but other councillors said 'not in that corner'. The planning situation is that Mr. N. Andrews should supply full details to the Planning Department who would seek advice on the necessity for planning permission. Mr. Phelps said that the adjoining shed was more important, where cut Delabole slate, a modern door, and white plastic guttering were not in keeping with a listed building. Mr. Dawe said it was yet another example of erosion of the appearance of the Conserva-tion Area. Mr. Provis asked why less fuss was being made about the gun than about the lifeboat house. It was decided to ask the Planning Department to send an inspector to look at the whole area, including the gun.

Clerk's Report and Correspondence Mrs. Powell pointed out that a lot of items were included under this heading as they arrived after the cut-off date for the agenda - the Monday prior to the meeting. a. Mr. Phelps pointed out that no trees had been re-planted where many had been removed at the new lay-by verges on the B3267. b. The November meeting will be on the third Monday due to the absence of the Clerk on the usual date. c. A serious water problem had occurred at the weekend resulting in burnt mouths but, although S.W.W.A. were aware of this 24 hours earlier, no warning was issued. The problem is said to be caused by rotting vegetation at Lower Moor creating phenol mixing with chlorine to form something like TCP. S.W.W.A. said the quality of the water was within 'acceptable limits'.Mr. Phelps said the water was undrinkable. What would be considered 'unacceptable'? To be discussed next month. d. The John Lawson small Family Circus, whose big top seating 200 people only occupies the space of half a football pitch, and with no caged animals, are seeking a site in the Parish for two or three days in 1992-93. The application will be discussed next month. e. A notice of a Seminar on Planning was received, but some Councillors felt it would be a waste of time while the present Chairman of the Planning Committe, Harvey Lander, was in favour of en bloc decisions in line with Planning Officers recommendations. Mr. Philp will attend, however, as the information could be useful in the future. f. Mrs. Powell has a list of sub Post Offices capable of handling motor vehicle taxation. g. A letter from St. Endellion Parochial Church Council thanked the Parish Council for participating in their Flower Festival. h. Mr. Harper, of 30 New Road, felt that neighbours of no 38 had been taken in by the Planning Department and didn't realise the size of the new building. Was this to be the standard of new development in Port Isaac? Mr. Stokes said it was an absolute monstrosity of an eyesore and dominated the village. The Planning Department are to be asked for reassurance that the development is in accordance with the plans. i. Mr. A'Court of Trelights has

supplied photographic evidence

relating to St. Endellion Lane. This will be discussed next month. j. County Highways are to fill in the pot-holes in the coast path at Port Isaac, and a grant-aided scheme will be used to improve the area at the granite steps. They stressed that they are prepared to do remedial work to the footpath only. k. The hand rail on the steps off Rose Hill will be repaired. 1. Work in front of the telephone exchange has been completed but a letter is to be sent requesting the narrow section of footway is widened to enable push chairs and invalid chairs to use it. The road is also to be resurfaced.

m. Notice was given of the Public Footpath Meeting on September 18th. Planning Applications Revised plans for the change of use of Carpenter's Workshop to Dwelling, Ian Honey, received support.

An application to erect a garage for Mr. and Mrs. Maberly at Trefreock Farm also received support. No objections were made to an application by Dr. Hewitt and Partners, Wadebridge, to dispense medicines at their surgery.

Public Discussion

Mr. Bell of 3 Coastguard cottages, a chartered surveyor and town planning consultant, said the Portacabin was an approved development and requested that Mr. Castle withdraw any allegations. It was decided, however, that none had been made. Miss Doris Hambly was surprised that no reference to various incidents had been made at a site meeting to discuss speeding at Trelights and said she would write a letter to the Parish Council.

[We apologise for an error in last month's 'Public Discussion' - it was Miss Doris Hambly of Trewetha Cottage who reported episodes of damage to property by speeding traffic at Trewetha Corner, not Mrs. Gwen Hambly of Roseleigh.] Mr. Corrigan said that a temporary one-way system was used at Dobwalls. Perhaps such a scheme could be used in Port Isaac in the summer only.

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RNLI

A windsurfer was rescued on the evening of Wed. 21st. August. Crew members A. Walton, R. Hambly and S. Hudspith picked up Paul Jeffries, a Bodmin man, near the Doom Bar and took him ashore at Daymer Bay. On Monday 26th. August, crew members A. Walton, C. Scott, and S. Taylor rescued two holidaymakers who were in difficulties in a small infla-table craft off Polzeath. Late on Thursday night, 29th. August, the lifeboat was launched to assist in the search for a woman reported missing near Boscastle. N. Andrews, J. Coshall and J. Collins searched for some two and a half hours, but nothing was found. On Friday 30th. August, while nearby on exercise, crew members A. Walton, R. Hambly and G. Hingley were called to Penhallic Point, where an angler was reported to have fallen into the sea. A long search, made in conjunction with HM Coastguard and a helicopter from RNAS Culdrose, was unsuccessful. A further search took place at first light, and more searches were made later, but with-out result. It was later reported that the body of the missing man was recovered from the sea north of Boscastle. On Saturday 31st. August three swimmers, reported overdue while attempting to swim from Trebarwith to Tintagel, were found and rescued by crew members N. Andrews, A. Walton and J. Collins. On Monday night 9th. September the lifeboat was launched to stand by while Port Isaac Coastguard Cliff Rescue team took a casualty up the cliff face at Barrett's Zawn. Crew members M. Daly, J. Coshall and C. Scott were able to assist by lighting the scene.

THE NEW LIFEBOAT HOUSE

Controversy surrounds the proposed provision of the above. May I make a few observations regarding this matter. Since 1967 the lifeboat has been housed in rented sub-standard accommodation, unworthy of those who accommodation, unworthy of those who risk their lives and respond so willingly to the 'call of the maroons'. The RNLI, having purchased the proposed site, contrary to some reports, have conceded that the proposed building should blend as far as possible, with its surroundings even to the extent of surroundings, even to the extent of obtaining a second unbiased architect's opinion, and intending to utilise Delabole slate to 'blend'. The pitch of the roof has to be 35 degrees to ensure weatherproofing. Given a purpose built 'station', this can only enhance the efficiency of the dedicated crew members, and after a winter or two of storms, the new building will weather into its' surroundings, and improve the appearance of the harbour, replacing the present ugly building. I am certain that the support given to the RNLI locally will be maintained. None of the local supporters is so petty-minded as to allow this issue to affect their generous support. I believe that the first time the inshore boat rendered assistance, was to Charlie Rowe, who was drifting out to sea, having suffered engine failure, added to broken rowlocks, in his punt. Since then, unstintingly, the crew and supporters have rendered sterling service. They deserve a purpose built 'house' and continued support. Arthur Jordan.
