PORT ISAAC W.I.

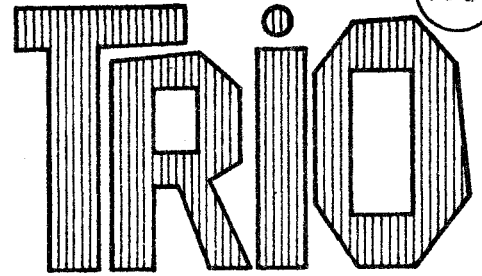

PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Chapel Room, Trelights, on Monday 14th. October.

Footpath Diversion

Mr. Symons deprecated the new system where a farmer has to pay £400 if he wants to dedicate land for use as a public footpath.

Council House Applications

These sometimes seem to be pre-determined by the District Council.

Finance

From the precept received, £1250 will be transferred to the high interest deposit account leaving more than enough for this month's expenses of £1509.44.

Donation to Poppy Appeal

The same as last year - £30.

St. Endellion Lane

A letter accompanied by photographs from Mr. A'Court of Trelights, argued that advertising the status of the lane as a highway could encourage use by cars and danger of a serious accident at the B.3314 as there are no warning signs or halt lines. Mr. Barriball urged that the lane be kept open as the only link out of the village in the event of bad weather. Mr. Symons said that the lane is used by agricultural vehicles. Mr. Phelps said, if left alone it will quickly grow over. It was decided to leave it as it is.

St. Endellion Cemetery Path

Mrs. Doney, County Council Footpath Officer is to be asked to include this path on the definitive map.

Glebe Land

Mr. Symons is to pursue the written confirmation by S.W.E.B. that they will move the electricity pole, before advising the agents that the land is to be purchased.

Planting of Trees

The County Council will plant trees at Bodannon Bends when the work is complete. Mr. Phelps said removal of trees had lost the character of the road at other places where the road had been widened. Mrs. Powell, Clerk, produced literature about National Tree Week - 28th. November to 8th. December - when volunteer tree wardens would be sought and given training. Trio is to be asked to print the full information.

Overhanging Trees at Homer Park

Following damage to a passing car, Mr. Taylor is to be asked to cut back two firs at the roadside.

Fish Cellars

Deferred a month as Mr. Provis, who introduced this item, was absent.

Seat at Port Gaverne Gully

The burnt seat on The Main will be replaced by one from the Playing Fields where a new black plastic seat will be installed. Mrs.

Tucker's advice will be sought about The Tommy Tucker memorial seat on the Platt which needs replacing.

Dogs on Port Gaverne Beach

Mr. Bolton, Chairman, reported a mighty furore about the proposal to ask The National Trust for permission to erect a sign 'dogs to be kept on a lead'. Three complaint letters were read and a petition with fifty signatures produced.

Mr. Philp mentioned new plans for dog wardens under the Protection of the Environment Act 1990 and thought a sign would now be unnecessary. He

suggested a public meeting with the local warden. Mr. Symons proposed deferring any decision for six months when all the facts would be available. Meanwhile, the public meeting is to be held.

Dogs Fouling Coastal Path

A visitor's letter complained about the excessive amount of dog dirt on the path. This will be discussed at the public meeting.

Visit from Circus

It was decided to give permission for the use of the Playing Fields for two or three days in June or July 1992, 1993, but to point out that there is only a small car park. The children's playing equipment would still be available during the time the circus was present.

Gun and Surrounding Area

A letter from the Planning Officer said the gun outside the Golden Lion was not a 'development' and therefore outside his control. He made no mention of the rest of the area where a listed building had been altered, so another letter is to be sent pointing this out.

Port Gaverne Toilets

The West Country Tourist Board offer no financial help due to the withdrawal of the grant schemes in 1989. Mr. Welton, Treasurer, promised to review the costs for the last three years, comparing the increases with the precept available each year. Mr. Bolton called for the high water rates to be questioned also.

Listing of Telephone Boxes

The boxes by the Coastguard Station and at Trelights will not be listed as they are not near listed buildings but British Telecom might keep the old boxes if there were local volunteers who would maintain them.

Lighting - Rear of Trewetha Lane

The N.C.D.C. have a large number of similar housing estates and to light them all would cause an unbearable cost to the ratepayer.

Speeding at Trewetha

Mr. Gallagher, County Highways, will inspect the road and see if warning signs, or the word 'slow' painted on the road, will help the problem.

Car Parking, Port Isaac

Mr. Gallagher has passed the matter over to the County Transportation Engineer for his investigation.

Signs to Doctors' Surgery

County Highways only provide signs to surgeries which have large casualty facilities. The Parish Council still feel the sign is imperative as the surgery is an accident reception area. It also needs to be found easily by visitors.

Reimbursement for Footpaths

A letter from Mr. Hill, County Hall, said work done on the coastal paths

by the Parish Council would be reimbursed this year but should not be included in future tenders. He was also dissatisfied with some of the work on other paths. The survey now being carried out may result in the need to trim more of the paths and asked for a new tender. He was pleased by the enthusiastic response shown by the Parish at the recent public meeting.

Mr. Bolton said that when Mr. Hill inspected the paths, the work may not have been finished.

Clerk's Report and Correspondence

a. A letter from Mr. R. Baker gave objections to the recent plans for a new Lifeboat house.

b. The light at Lundy Road cannot be re-angled without affecting the spread of light on the main road.

c. S.W.W.A announced plans to re-line water mains during November. It was pointed out that some streets are being done already.*

d. No shares, at £1,200 each, will be bought to support a Cornish

Lugger Association £70,000 project.

e. The Clerk announced a new book of 15 walks around St. Endellion Parish.

Mr. Symons said the author should be thanked for a book which would benefit the tourist business.

Planning Applications

Mr. D. Knight, Dwelling and Double Garage, Port Gaverne. The Parish Council opposed the application because a building, behind Valley Cottage, would be detrimental to amenities, ribbon development, and create a precedent.

Public Discussion

Mr. A'Court said he was surprised at the Parish Council's attitude to his

letter which he had gone to considerable trouble to prepare. His

concern was the possible use of St. Endellion Lane by cars and the

very, very dangerous exit at the B.3314. Farmers were used to it. If

the lane were allowed to grow over there would be letters asking for it

to be cleared. The proper answer

would be to ask to have it re-designated as a bridleway. If he

took the matter to County Highways, they might have it stopped up.

Mrs. Haygreen said it was only used by cars during the sewerage work.

Mrs. Brown remembered motorcyclists using the lane in the last 46 years

but was more worried about speeding on other roads in the village.

Mrs. Haygreen said drivers were at fault not the roads.

Mrs. Pethick supported Mr. A'Court and said that there used to be a

gate halfway along the lane which is now a 'clearway'.

Mr. Penna said that if the lane was

closed to traffic, it would still be available for emergency use. Mr. Bolton said the matter would be re-considered in six months time when any pressure from the public could be taken into account. Mr. A'Court pointed out that the salt bins had not been moved. Mrs. Brown hoped that one of them would be left where it is. Miss Hambly spoke of a number of accidents at Trewetha and one case where, if a car had not been outside 'Roseleigh' there would have been a collision with the house itself and somebody could have been killed. [We have to apologise to Miss Doris Hambly again because last month we printed 'speeding at Trelights' instead of 'speeding at Trewetha'.] Mrs. Bell said her wall, alongside the Port Isaac cliff path, was being damaged by people wanting to walk across her property. If this continued she would erect a fence.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held one week later than usual on Monday 18th. November at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

*S.W.W.A. will be relining the Port Isaac mains in November. The work carried out recently was a preliminary stage. Residents will be told when the water is to be turned off and bowsers will be available. For those unable to carry water a S.W.W.A. workforce will be available on request from the site manager. There may be road closures in Church Hill from 4th., and the Platt from 11th. November. They hope to be able to work quickly.

FOOTPATHS

The gang of helpers has been out beavering away at the footpath surveys and most of the 40 parish paths have been examined and reports drawn for scrutiny by the County Highways Department to see how much work needs to be done and allocate money available. County Footpath Officer, Mrs. Doney, has been very helpful and has decided that some work can start straight away if a few people would like to volunteer to give a hand with stile repairing, etc. Please contact me: telephone (daytime) 880292 or (evenings till 9.00pm. - no later please) 880474.

LETTER TO TRIO

Dear Sir, On our approach roads there are signs 'Port Isaac, Historic Fishing Village', descriptive signs conveying an image of what to expect and presumably hoping to encourage a type of visitor who will enjoy Port Isaac and contribute to its economy. It appears therefore a tragedy that the Parish Council seems to be striving to destroy the reality of this image; the latest steps being the request that dogs should be kept on a lead on beaches. If visitors want dog free beaches, controlled parking and life guards, there are plenty of this type within a short distance. There are further attractions that have recently been neglected or negated in the parish. My wife and I have walked many footpaths from Land's End to the Tamar, north and south, coastal and inland and nowhere have we found such neglect of a useful and pleasant amenity. Similarly the orange blaze of all night lighting which makes the village look like a motorway junction, obliterates the stars and destroys the feeling of peace. Finally, going back to the signs, from what I read of the Parish Council reports in the Trio, the Historical Fishermen are now looked on as nasty, dirty, and untidy; who at the moment are tolerated, but better watch out or they will find that they are forbidden to unload their fish at Port Isaac as has already happened at Port Gaverne. It does appear that many of the decisions of the Council have the effect of denying the residents and visitors alike the freedom that country people have always enjoyed. Yours, Dr. W.M. Baird.

PORT ISAAC METHODIST CHURCH

The church, with the help and co-operation of St. Peter's, is making small Christmas gifts to send to Romania early in November - draw-string toilet bags filled with flannel, soap, toothbrush, tooth-paste and talcum for the ladies, and disposable razors and shaving cream for the gentlemen. These are for 60 inmates at an old people's home, and ordinary to us but like gold dust to them and will give them great pleasure. For the children we are filling bags with colouring-in books, drawing paper, pencils, crayons, rubbers, etc. One school had only one drawing book, a piece of chalk and some crayons. 2. The main need in foodstuffs are: tinned meat, milk powder, coffee, sugar, oil, flour, cheese, and marge (winter only - it melts in summer).
3. Vitamins are still very necessary and basic medicines i.e. paracetamol, aspirin, throat sweets, cough mixture, antiseptic creams, and plasters.

4. Electric kettles, toasters, sewing machines, paper, pencils, biros, and felt pens.
- The reference above to children's shoes follows a recent remark from one of the party just returned, who said he thought he had more shoes in his cupboard at home than there were in the shoe shop he'd visited in Romania such is the scarcity of supplies of all kinds in that country.

The stones look like the base of a stone wall when examined carefully and I am pretty sure that they are remnants of a breakwater which may have been reached by a path down from Lobber, rather like the old Rowland's Way that led up from Silvershell Gwg. 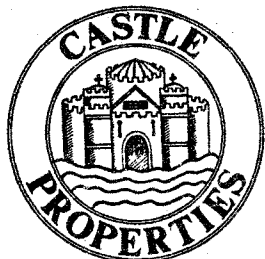
