PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 11th. February. For official information refer to the Parish Council minutes not this report.

Procedure and Venue

Mr. Provis proposed that in future the councillors should stand while speaking and that the Vice-Chairman should sit next to the Chairman. These propositions were carried. Mr. Provis also requested that minutes of the meetings should record how items were carried i.e. the number of votes cast, or 'unanimous'. He then raised the possibility of using the Village Hall as a venue for the monthly meetings. He was under the impression that there would be no charge as the Parish Council were the 'custodians' of and made grants to the Hall. As there were no benefits in moving from the present premises the idea was not accepted.

Street Cleaning and Litter

The Parish Council expressed concern at learning that the litter collection point to be constructed over the leat beside the fish cellars was to be a small building but were assured this would have to go through the usual planning procedures, especially as it would be adjoining a listed building.

Poop-Scoop Pilot Scheme

The Parish Council has not yet received official confirmation that Port Isaac will be used for a pilot 'poop-scoop' scheme but Mr. Bolton said it would be a good thing. Mr. Phelps asked for Mr. Lee to be thanked for the excellent job he has done getting all the facts together. He was afraid, however, that too much publicity over the scheme could be a bad thing.

Dog Warden

Mr. Philp asked why nothing seemed to have been done about arranging a public meeting with the Dog Warden present where details of the new regulations about dog control could be presented. Mrs. Powell replied that she had tried many times to contact the warden but without success. She had also been advised that it might be better to wait until the 'poop-scoop' scheme started so that the two things could be combined. Mr. Phelps pointed out that they were two quite



SIMPLY -JUST BETTER DINING Telephone (0208) 880244 different aspects of the situation and perhaps the Dog Warden could be invited to speak at the Annual Public Meeting in April.

Paper Bank

A suggestion from a member of the public that a paper collection point should be considered, in the car park near the existing bottle bank perhaps, in the light of keeping the streets clean and conservation generally. It was pointed out, however, that one person in the village is already collecting paper and that this needs a great deal of storage space which would not be available in the car park, also it could cause a lot of loose paper to blow around.

Information for Tourists

Mr. Philp presented an idea from a member of the public that notices could be displayed on the parish boards giving details of refuse collection arrangements, etc. The idea was accepted and four notices are to be prepared.

Fish Cellars Roof

The renovation of a flat roof inside the cellars is apparently a matter of concern as the cellars are a listed building. Mr. Provis said that the roof has been finished in resin mixed with Delabole slate powder, however, and is 'a good job' and can probably only be seen from Roscarrock Hill anyway. He suggested that it would be a good thing to write to the owners, North Cornwall District Council and ask them to tidy up the outside, remove weeds, etc. 'It is the worst looking building down there'. Mr. Norris wanted to know if the inside of the building was listed and was told that this seemed likely as the tenants were required to do maintenance work. Mr. Symons said that he didn't consider it a good idea to start writing to owners of listed buildings, this was a matter for the District Council and that to do so would be setting a precedent. It was the pointed out that the shed which was considered for conversion into a lifeboat house was in a bad state of dilapidation and that the cellars under the Pentus wall were also getting very shabby. This will be discussed next month.

Port Gaverne Toilets

Mr. Perry is prepared to carry on again with the cleaning this year and as his price was pretty near to one tendered by Taylor Plan Ltd. it was decided to give him the contract, especially as he was in the village and would be able to open and close the toilets at the times required.

Coastal Path - Wheelchair Access

Mr. Bolton pointed out that the possibility of providing a ramp beside the steps had been discussed before and rejected as impracticable and possibly dangerous. Mr. Symons stressed that this is not just a coastal path but the path from the car park to the village and used by nearly all visitors. Mr. Provis suggested that an alternative route passing up near to the Coast Guard lookout could be signposted. Mr. Phelps said that he had been there and made measurements, the path was steep and very narrow in places but that there was room to move the steps to one side and provide a wide enough ramp alongside them. There is a magnificent view from this path, he said, and it should be available to all visitors. There is plenty of width, it is a Class 1 footpath, and it is not so dangerous. The Clerk was asked to write to Mrs. Doney the Footpath Officer to ask her to investigate the possibility of a ramp. Mrs. Doney is currently looking into the possibility of a directional sign indicating the route to the village from the car park requested by the Parish Council.

Heritage Coast Guided Walks

Mr. Penna has accepted the request to lead some walks and this offer will be passed on to the Heritage Coast Service.

Footpath Public Enquiry

Mr. Phelps said that to hold a full-blown enquiry over a footpath diversion seemed a waste of public money but he urged as many councillors as possible to attend to give their support to the application.

Seat at Castle Rock

The seat on the Main, opposite Castle Rock, is in need of repair. Mr. Bolton asked whether anyone know anything about a small plate bearing the words 'John's Seat' that had been neatly screwed to the seat. The Seat Committee would arrange repairs and inspect the plate at the same time.

Yellow Lines - New Road

The regulations don't allow yellow lines within a 'zone' area so it is not possible to reinstate the yellow lines along New Road where cars park and make the road virtually a single carriage way. Mr. Phelps said, 'We can't have the same situation as last year, why not revise the zone? The corner especially is very dangerous.' The dangerous parking was, however, considered a matter for the police.

Coldstanton Corner

The County Landscape Officer has expressed dissatisfaction with the new section of the road which will now be landscaped with trees, etc. There are no plans for the future redevelopment of this road.

Hydrant Marker Posts

Single posts with specially manufactured plates will replace some of the groups of markers, but the fire hydrant markers have, of course, to remain. There are still too many posts at the top of Back Hill (in front of the dairy), by the Slipway Hotel, and at Homer Park corner at the top of Church Hill.

Water Main Relining

The only part of the village not to have received this service is Dolphin Street due to

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difficult access. New mains will be laid, however, at a future date. The Parish Council expressed thanks to T. J. Brent and their good and helpful workers for the efficient way the work had been done and especially the 'making good' afterwards.

Annual Public Meeting

This will take place on Wednesday 8th April at 7.30pm. in St. Peter's Church Hall. Various officials are to be invited to speak at the meeting as usual.

Clerk's Report and Correspondence

a: The District Commissioner says the Guides need £3,000 to replace tents that have seen fifteen years service. Unfortunately the Parish Council is not in a position to make donations and have had to refuse other requests already.

b: The Council is invited to nominate a Councillor with long service or outstanding service to the Parish for inclusion in a ballot for two invitations to the Royal Garden Party in July. A decision will be made at the next meeting.

c: The First Air Ambulance will be celebrating its fifth anniversary on Sunday 29th. March at Wadebridge.

d: A draft planning proposal for gypsies was presented but not discussed as it does not apply to St. Endellion Parish.

e: Mr. Stokes and Mr. Philp offered to attend a meeting, on Tuesday 10th. March at the Golden Lion, to discuss this yeat's Port Isaac Week. Mr. Phelps said that last year's Week was 'a very good job'.

f: A request for a donation to the Council for the Preservation of Rural England was not considered.

g: The Association of Town and Parish Councils complained of poor attendances at their meetings. Mr. Symons, however, does attend regularly on behalf of St. Endellion.

h: The direction sign for the doctors' surgery has been obscured by a new fence and Mr. Symons offered to discuss with the doctors the possibility of putting a sign on the Playing Field hedge.

Planning Applications

a: Mr. Browning - erection of extension of dwellinghouse to provide link to existing building - Morwenna Cottage, Fore Street. Mr. Provis pointed out that the house was in the heart of the Conservation Area and the roof alteration would make a big impact and should be stopped. The old wash room is still as it was when it was built and is important to Port Isaac. The application should not only be turned down but the Parish Council should get the building listed as of historic or architectural importance.. 'It is what heritage is all about', he said. The idea of holding a site meeting was abandoned as the owners are not present and their permission could not be sought. The Clerk was asked to obtain full details and submit an application for listing to English Heritage. Mr. Symons said he felt that there were too many listed buildings already and that by listing a building you are condemning the owners to running a museum.

b: Trehaverock Cottage, St. Endellion: Mr. Phelps voiced his opinion that at the last monthly meeting the Council had requested that an application be turned down if no outline permission had already been granted. Then at an interim meeting the plans had been approved. It was explained, however, that this was a misunderstanding, the clerk had only been asked to discover the status of the previous application.

Public Discussion

Mr. Penna mentioned a possibly dangerous broken stop cock cover in Doctor's Meadow. He also asked for the area by the bottle bank to be kept free of broken glass. He ended by hoping there would be as much discussion about the Pentus as about Morwenna Cottage, 'It is right at the core of the Conservation Area, and already listed as of historic and architectural interest.

Mr. Lee advised the Parish Council that although he did not consider Port Isaac any worse than anywhere else, his survey of our streets and paths revealed 1,400 deposits of dog-mess. The Coast Path, Trewetha Lane, and the Lower Village were the worst areas.

The Secretary of Port Isaac and District Tourism Association asked what action had been taken to elicit a response from County Highways to the Parish Council's request some 13 months earlier, in January 1991, regarding signing in the village. He reminded the Council that this had been raised two months previously and the Parish Council were still being ignored by County Highways. He also reiterated P.I.D.T.A.'s concern regarding the proposed litter store by the fish cellars. Rubbish should be collected, not stored, particulary in the heart of the Conservation Area.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 9th. March at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Room, Trelights.

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'POOP SCOOP' FOR PORT ISAAC

As many of you will be aware, I have been campaigning for some months to persuade Cornish District Councils to clear up the dog-mess in our streets and public places. On 28th. January, North Cornwall District Council agreed to carry out a pilot scheme and has chosen Port Isaac as the first area to receive the benefits of a cleaner environment. Port Isaac is unlikely to be any worse for dog-mess than any other part of the Duchy, but our narrow streets and paths make it more visible and less avoidable,

Under the scheme, dog owners will be required to clear up after their pets. Most responsible owners already do so. N.C.D.C. will be providing special bins which will be cleared daily for the safe disposal of the dog-mess.

On 31st. January I surveyed every street and footpath in Port Isaac and found almost 1,400 deposits of dog-mess.
