PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report from notes taken during the meeting held at the Chapel Rooms, Trelights, on Monday 9th. March. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Poop Scoop Pilot Scheme

Cllr. Dawe asked whether Trelights would be included in the 'poop scoop' scheme. Mr. Barriball said there was a dog problem in Trelights, so it was agreed the village should be included.

Procedure and Public Discussion

It was decided that in future the public should be given an opportunity to address the Council at the beginning of the meeting instead of at the end, but the time for this should be limited to ten minutes which could be extended, if necessary, at the chairman's discretion. Members of the public can always contact parish councillors directly about local matters.

Financial Statement

Mr. Welton said there was £264 in the current account and, after the month's expenses, there would be a balance of £52. There was £1100 on deposit.

Seat at Minepit Corner

Cllr. Dawe expressed anxiety about a new stone seat beside the old pump. Mr. Norris assured him that a wooden seat and back had been installed earlier in the day.

Land Purchase Fund

Mr. Phelps proposed that a sum of £800 be put in a fund towards the future cost of the land for the new St. Endellion graveyard. He felt it was dangerous, at the present time, to keep surplus funds in the general account. Having a fund for a specific purpose would also satisfy the demands of the annual audit. The proposal was carried.

Year 2000

A letter from Mrs. Jane Rowe suggested that it would be a good idea to start thinking, now, how to celebrate the new century - perhaps with a big village party. It was felt, however, that although the idea was a good one, there would be several changes of Parish Council in the interim, and that eight years was too long.

Signing - Port Isaac

The documents lost by the County Council have at last been found and plans to improve signing in the village are now to be expedited.

Coastal Path

The County Surveyor feels that it would be impracticable to provide a wheelchair ramp beside the steps - the site is not wide enough and is too steep, a ramp would encourage illegal cyclists and skateboarders. Cllr. Dawe said that the Parish Council should provide the ramp themselves. Fears were, however, expressed that this could just possibly he seen as going against

expert advice and that should an accident occur the Parish Council would be responsible. Mr. Phelps felt that invalids were being discriminated against and that the road into Port Isaac was more dangerous for wheelchairs. He proposed that the Parish Council should 'badger away at it till we get it done'. Experts have told us that 'rumble strips' can't be installed but they are still putting them in, he said. Mr. Welton suggested that a letter should be sent to MP Gerry Neale expressing the Parish Council's dissatisfaction with the answer from County Council. Mr. Provis was sure that, if the part of the coast path via the coastguard lookout were cut out there would be plenty of width for wheelchairs to use that route. Mr. Phelps pointed out that this would involve a steep gradient up and down again - the other route was more level. The proposal was carried by a vote of eight in favour, three against.

A seat on the path has been damaged by lorries and is to be repaired.

Members of the seat committee have been to inspect the metal plate that a member of the public has fixed to the seat on the Main and reported that it has been done with care and that they find nothing wrong with it but would not like to see metal plates being fixed to every seat in the parish.

The County Council have filled in the potholes in the path, and done some minor drainage work but as funds are not available from the Countryside Commission, they are not prepared to do any more improvements unless money is provided by other parties. Mr. Phelps pointed out that this is a grade 1 path and is supposed to be kept up by the County Council footpaths department. Mr. Norris confirmed that the path has been left in a bad condition. The Parish Council will write to Mrs. Doney, the local County Footpath Officer.

Royal Garden Party

Mr. Provis said he was prepared to withdraw his application for a place in the ballot for a ticket (from the total of four allocated to the whole of Cornwall) in favour of Cllr. Dawe and his wife.

Car Parking

The department dealing with zoning and yellow lines receives so many requests that it is impossible to deal with them all quickly except where there are repeated accidents or other emergencies but the Parish Council's request for the return of the yellow lines in New Road is being considered.

Paper Bank

The authorities are not prepared to install a paper bank in Port Isaac or anywhere else because 'the bottom has dropped out of the market'.

Rumble Strips

Mr. Norris pointed out that sleeping policemen had been installed in two streets in Truro to slow traffic down. Mr. Phelps urged that the Parish Council should write to County Council again asking for rumble strips in the B3267 on the Trewetha side of Hillson Close. Mr. Welton said they would be no good for reducing speed 'rumble strips don't work'. Mr. Phelps said that children on bicycles come straight out on to the road from Hillson Close. Mr. Provis said, 'I don't know what Parish Councillors have been drinking before the meeting, but I'd like two pints of it!' The Parish Council will write to the County Council again about this dangerous stretch of road.

Sign to Doctors' Surgery

Mr. Symons is still in consultation with the doctors about this but the best solution seems for them to erect a sign on the hedge of the playing fields.

Pavement by Telephone Exchange The narrow section of the pavement is going to be widened.

St. Endellion Lane

Mr. A'Court's letter, previously discussed at last November's meeting, detailing the dangers if the lane was used by motor cars, was read out. Mr. Barriball also read out the minute of the meeting. Cllr. Dawe was in favour of leaving the lane as it is and not encouraging its use by cars. Mr. Provis felt that either the bad junction with the B3314 should be improved or the lane should be closed. Mr. Welton asked how the road was classified and received the answer that it is an unclassified County road and may be used by cars. The gate at the B3314 is to prevent animals straying on the main road and is the responsibility of the landowner. Mrs. Pethick, granted permission to speak, said that she felt there was no intention to close the road but it was necessary to point out the dangers. Mr. Phelps said, 'It is nice to have roads like this and it ought to be left as it is - not like the road into Port Isaac'. Mr. A'Court's letter and photographs are to be sent to County Highways with a request for guidance.

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Port Isaac Cellars

Mr. Phelps and Mr. Provis have spoken to Mr. Andrews about the renovated shed at the Pentus. 'Mr. Penna is wrong in saying there was no guttering, there are old down pipes there still,' said Mr. Phelps, 'but Mr. Andrews has said he will paint the gutter and fascia board black, improve the appearance of the modern-looking door and paint the stonework with yoghurt.'. The Parish Council will discuss the matter again next month after seeing how it looks.

Annual Public Meeting

Mr. Pyeman will not be present, neither will the dog warden [Who is this dog warden? Ed.]. There will be a representative of the police who will be asked to speak about 'New Age Travellers' and 'Traffic Control'. Also present will be County Councillor Harvey Lander, District Councillor Bill Dawe, and Chief Planning Officer Tony Philp.

Clerk's Correspondence:

a. Mr. Sweet is prepared to repair the seats on the Platt. This will be organised by the seat committee.

b. T. J. Brent, water contractors, thanked the Parish Council for their kind remarks and said that the remaining clearing up will be done soon. c. Transfers of licence were notified for the Co-op and Slipway Hotel (Bishop). d. Notification that the planning application appeal for The Moorings, Port Gaverne, had been turned down. e. In spite of low attendances, there will be a meeting of the Wadebridge and District Road Safety Committee on Friday 27th. March at 7.30pm in the Town Hall. Nobody from the Parish Council would be free to attend. f. The A.G.M. of the Council for the Preservation of Rural England will be at Newquay on Saturday 28th. March. g. Mrs. McDonell, secretary of the Playgroup, wrote that there was seldom a Parish Council representative at Village Hall meetings. The representative, Mr. Philp, was not present but the letter will be passed to him. h. A letter from the Chairman of the Village Hall committee announced the intention of the present officers to resign at the A.G.M., pointing out that the Parish Council are the official custodians of the Hall. Mr. Bolton, chairman, said that in the event of a new committee not being elected, the Parish Council would have to co-opt a committee of management. j. Information was received about the Wadebridge Environment Plan exhibition and public meeting.

There were no Planning Applications.

Cllr. Dawe said there would be a site meeting to discuss the change of use of the Roscarrock Hill Chapel, at a date to be announced, and that a site meeting to discuss the siting of refuse bins at the Fish Cellars would be held the same day. Mr. Symons said that with a capacity of 6.6 cubic litres, the bins would not be anywhere like big enough and that the lids, 4ft 6in from ground level would be too high for people with bags of rubbish in their hands to operate so much of the rubbish would end up on the slipway instead.

A letter from Chief Planning Officer Tony Philp complained about the recent 'biassed' TV programme 'Cream Teas and Concrete' and said formal complaints were being made. He also explained the 'delegated decision' process. Mr. Phelps asked how the Planning Department could claim that the programme was biassed yet still alter their procedures as a result of it. He also asked Mr. Symons whether he would have expected a 'delegated decision' to be made about such a major project as a deer park. Mr. Symons replied, 'No.'

Public Discussion

Robin Penna said, Port Isaac Conservation Area is supposed to protect the village and stop unsuitable changes. Our great asset must be looked after. The area to the horizon is only included as a backdrop and I find it hard to understand why so much effort has been taken here by the Planners over plastic window frames for Sam Shield's new house, hidden behind the church anyway, a slight change in roof slope on George Steer's fairly modern bungalow a re-built garden shed behind it, and now, Trevor Grills has to apply for Conservation Area permission for a small extension, also behind his house. Meanwhile, in the heart of the Conservation Area a building, listed for Historic or Architectural Interest, has been completely altered, apparently without any need for planning permission'.

GARDEN SOCIETY



Or if you would like a talk to be given to any group, the Samaritans are happy to do that too.

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VILLAGE HALL A.G.M.

A cold and blustery night, very few people attended!

Chairman, John Powell said the Hall was used about eight times a week by Rainbows, Guides, Aerobics, Kingdom Kids, Badminton, and private parties.

It was a good year with 'lots of income'. The new heating was running and loft insulation was complete. Double glazing, for which there would be grants, was not done due to lack of time. There was little fund raising in the year but, apart from a loss on a badly attended horse racing event, it had been successful.

This was his last speech as Chairman but he was proud to have been associated. Every committee had been a good one and easy to work with. They had managed to keep abreast of the ever-changing fire regulations. The new committee would start with a clean sheet and 'a lot in the kitty'.

Ann Collins, for the Playgroup, expressed a worry about no regular cleaner but Geoff Morrell could do it for £15 a week. Once a month would be enough and organisations could give £2 each. Otherwise they were happy. They had just bought some small tables and chairs from Lanivet Primary School

George Oxley thought it unreasonable for a small committee to be burdened with heavy capital expenditure, and felt this should be put at the door of the Parish Council.

Cllr. Bill Dawe said the Parish Council was obligated to make a contribution and should do so each year.

Mr. Oxley said, thanks, they do, but it doesn't increase pro rata with expenses.

Cllr. Dawe said increases in Parish Council payments result in increases in the Community Charge.

Bess Coates said £1000 needed for fire regulation work would be at least 25% grant aidable. Interior walls to be clad, doors to have wired glass panes, and five more emergency lights. This is for the entertainments licence, it doesn't affect other users.

Bill Norris, St. Peter's Church Hall, asked about the affect of new food regulations. Mrs. Coates said they didn't prepare food in the Hall.

When asked how the Church Hall had been affected. Mr. Norris said they were trying to find out the regulations. Mrs. Collins said a leaflet was available at Wadebridge Council offices.

John Powell said the committee was retiring simply because they had done as much as they could and felt a new committee should be formed from hall users. He had served eight years.
