PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken during the meeting at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, Monday 8th. June. For accurate information, refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards asked about the signs to the surgery and was told that they will be installed - paid for by an anonymous donor. She also said overhanging hedges on the road between Port Isaac and Trewetha make it dangerous for walkers.

Doris Hambly mentioned long grass causing poor visibility at the B3314.

Footpath Tenders

The public were asked to leave the room while the tenders were discussed. Finance

After this month's expenses: £269.28 in the account, £3894.35 on deposit.

An insurance premium increase of £35 to cover libel and slander damages, no longer provided by the Council for Town and Parish Councils.

£25 was donated to the Soldiers, Sailors, and Airmen's Families Association.

An appeal against Port Gaverne toilets rateable value increase from £500 to $\pounds1,000$ and a letter to MP Paul Tyler. The District Valuer is also investigating.

Seat Committee Report

A new plastic seat is to replace a memorial seat on the Platt and the plaque transferred to it.

Playing Fields Committee report

Fish packers have left the car park gates open the last two times so the Fishermen will receive a letter reminding them of their obligations.

Council for Town and Parish Councils

Henry Symons said the Association would retain Parish Councils but the politically motivated Association of District Councils would remove County Councils in new moves to change local government.

He hoped Cornwall would become a 'Region in Europe' and that the Parish will participate in 'Beacons of Friendship', later this year, with a beacon at 'Becon Park' at St. Endellion.

Playing Field Equipment

An offer was accepted from the makers to refurbish the see saw for £110 plus vat. They would also replace corroded eyebolts in the Maribu Walk free, and later, check the landing-mat wear.

Roadside Trimming and Grass Cutting

While not criticising the workman, doing the best possible job under the circumstances, David Phelps complained that the road into the village was in a disgusting state and showed Port Isaac in a poor light. Also why Coldstanton Corner has been left in a dangerous condition, should be the subject of an inquiry. The grass area by the Mayfield telephone box should be reinstated, it has been dug up numerous times and there are no longer any trees, he added.

(A suggestion to call this area 'Port Isaac Village Green' was rejected.) Cllr. Dawe said that it was 'all indians and no workers' at the Council.

Mark Provis said if there was no manpower couldn't they make money available for the Parish Council to get the work done.

David Welton said, all around the county, trimming was only being done where necessary for safety.

Henry Symons pointed out that Highways were responsible for the verges but that landowners were supposed to cut their hedges.

The Clerk confirmed that trimming should take place from June to September and November to March.

St. Endellion Sign

Cllr. Dawe said that the village sign was now in St. Kew Parish. and ought to be moved back nearer to St. Endellion. **Tree Warden Scheme**

David Phelps said meetings will be held and, as warden for St. Endellion, he would be kept informed.

Inspection of Footpaths

Paths were allocated for inspection after trimming to check the work had been done properly before payments are made.

Church Flower Festival

At St. Peter's Church, from 6th. - 9th. August (not St. Endellion as the agenda). David Philp will be asked to supply the Parish Council display for up to £25. An idea by Eric Stokes was accepted offering to pay £1 towards this if each councillor did the same.

Village Security

A letter from the Chief Constable expressed sympathy with disquiet about incidents in the village but said most were only slight. Special constables are needed and suitable persons should be recruited when possible. An evening Neighbourhood Watch Schemes meeting will be arranged with a police representative. David Phelps would notify the members of the existing group.

CLERK'S REPORT

a. The Parish Council have no objections to the BBC filming 'Inspector Alain' in the village at the end of the month.
b. Notice of change of Long Cross Hotel licence to George Dunkin, from De Lank.

c. Highways provided notice of intention to do work around the telephone kiosk, Trelights, and on the blocks in Fore Street before the summer season. Work on other narrow streets, will have to wait until after the season as road closures will be necessary. Mr. Ian Purn is designing Port Isaac direction signs along lines suggested by P.I.D.T.A.

d. The Playing Field will be entered in a 'Best Kept Playing Field' competition with prizes of £500, £300, and £200. e. A letter from Mrs. Joan Murray said St. Endellion churchyard was getting overgrown. Cllr. Dawe agreed it was time it was cut and suggested a letter to the P.C.C. before they met on the 18th. f. The balance sheet for Trio Newsletter was presented but no donation offered.

g. Dog control signs to go up at Port Gaverne beach have been delayed because of wording that dogs will be banned from the beach if not controlled. The issue was raised by Malcolm Lee, a National Trust member but thought by them to be a Parish Councillor. Henry Symons pointed out that Malcolm was acting with P.I.D.T.A. support after discussion at a recent meeting. The sign might undo work to encourage good dog owners. David Phelps replied that the sign was for irresponsible owners and something must be done - only that day two children had been bitten at Trewetha and became infected - one was hospitalised. Mr. Lee was congratulated on the work he had done for the 'Poop Scoop' scheme.

(Mrs. Strout was allowed to speak, and claimed she had a map showing that The National Trust only owned the foreshore down to mean high water level.)

h. The Clerk asked for anomalies in her expenses to go on the next agenda. She receives nothing for the use of a room in her house, heating, or telephone rental and suggested perhaps £500p.a. could cover such items. The Chairman is also entitled to recoup his expenditure. David Phelps asked about committee members' expenses.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Support was given to revised plans for an owners-use bungalow, at Archer Farm.

THE DISTRICT PLAN AND PARISH COUNCIL LIAISON COMMITTEE

At a District Council meeting, on 27th. May, with all chief officers and many representatives from parish councils present, a parish council liaison committee was formed which will meet in September. A consultation Draft will be made public in the summer of 1993. The tenyear Plan will be completed in 1995.

All Councillors had received questionnaires about 'settlements' in the Parish. To see how these might be answered, one was tried and answers found relating to physical and social change over the last ten years, important changes, need for extra housing, car parking, conservation, and what the Parish ought to be like in ten years. As the questionnaire is of paramount importance, a special meeting was arranged for the following Monday.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 13th. June at 7.30pm.

Members of the public may attend the meetings and are allowed to speak during the 'public discussion'.






Thanksgiving Service




