On the 12th. July there was a search for a canoeist in the surf off Tristram, who got ashore unaided but suffering from hypothermia.

The Lifeboat was launched on the 13th. July to search for a missing person on the cliffs between Port Gaverne and Trebarwith.

On the 15th. July, the Lifeboat was launched to evacuate a casualty from Bossiney Cove. On arrival the man was found to have died and he was brought back to Port Isaac.

The Lifeboat was launched on the 20th. July after receiving a report of a red flare from a fishing boat off Tintagel Head. The local boat Mako II was found with engine failure and was towed back to Port Isaac.

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
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PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 13th. June. For precise information, refer to the Parish Council minutes. As David Bolton was away, the meeting was taken by the Vice Chairman, Henry Symons.

Public Discussion

Mrs. Evelyn Brown said that, with reference to her letter to be read later in the meeting, she had nothing against the family who had erected a memorial stone in Trelights.

Mr. Lobb asked if there had been planning permission and who owned the land.

Henry Symons replied that the stone had not been discussed by the Parish Council and that it was on council land.

Peggy Richards spoke about the proposed poop-scoop' scheme for keeping the village clean from dog mess. '£6,000 is available for this,' she said, 'but £2,000 is not available for Port Gaverne toilets.' North Cornwall District Council didn't want to join the scheme but other districts already had. There would be 21 bright red bins in the village with a special collection as the contents had to be incinerated.

Cllr. Bill Dawe said he was not aware that the bins would be bright red and would move to have them changed to green.

Mr. Lee said that he had been pressing for the 'poop-scoop' scheme. The dog mess has to be cleared up and facilities must be supplied. Only 25% of the cost had to be borne by the community. North Cornwall District Council already spends £1½m cleaning the streets.

Peggy Richards also pointed out that the hedges on the B.3267 had still not been cut.

Mrs. Steele said that the gates to the playing field had been taken off their hinges and laid on the ground and that children on bicycles were riding up and down the mound and out on to the main road.

Finance

With £134 in the current account and £3,894 on deposit, £1,000 has to be transferred to cover the monthly expenditure.

The annual audit is complete and approved. A £100 donation for the Trio newsletter.

Playing Field Committee Report

The gates will be modified to prevent them from being lifted off. They can't be locked at all times as this would prevent people from using the car space. Parents should look after their children and not allow them to ride bicycles on to the main road.

Ragwort

This is a regular item at this time of year. David Phelps said that the weed only needs to be cleared from grazing land. Cllr. Bill Dawe replied that he spent much time clearing his land and everybody who had it on their land should pull it up, especially on public land like the Main, and incinerate it before it seeds. Henry Symons and Bill Dawe are to look at the extent of the problem and report to the next meeting.

Annual Painting of Seats

The seats committee will make a list of the seats that will need painting in September to enable the Clerk to prepare a tender.

Rates, Port Gaverne Toilets

MP Paul Tyler has written to the District Valuer to say the huge increase in the rates for the toilets must be a mistake.

Playing Fields

Permission was given for the use of the field by the Rowing Club on Tuesday 4th. August and Port Isaac Carnival on Wednesday 19th. August.

Coldstanton Corner

David Phelps said that the men who had cleared the growth from the corner should be thanked for doing the job so quickly. Bill Norris queried whether proposed trees would impair the visibility but David Phelps said that obviously they would only be planted on the hedgeline.

Mayfield Green

The grass will be cut and the uneven ground reinstated at the end of the summer. It is possible the Parish Council will do this work in future and receive reimbursement. David Phelps said he was astonished to discover that two curbstones at the foot of the steps covered an otherwise open drain.

Trelights Green

A letter from Mrs. Evelyn Brown expressed her astonishment that a memorial stone had been allowed on the green.' If everybody does this the village will soon look like a churchyard.' Mr. Barriball had said that he thought permission had been given some time ago.

Cllr. Dawe said that he had no knowledge of permission being given by the Parish Council nor by the Village Green Committee.

Henry Symons said he would look at the memorial and have a word with the villagers concerned. A seat with a plaque on it might be a better solution, or a specially planted tree.

Salt Bins at Trelights

In a copy of a letter to County Councillor Harvey Lander, Mr. A'Court pointed out that the bins were still at Longcross and a long way from where they would be needed in the event of icy roads. In 1991 the streets and pavements in St. Minver had been cleared while those in Trelights had not. County Highways will be asked for three more bins in Trelights.

David Philp asked why so many bins were needed in Trelights; what about Port Isaac? It was agreed that one on Poltreworgey Hill should also be asked for.

New Telephone Kiosk

British Telecom are to install an additional, modern, kiosk on the grass at the bottom of Tintagel Terrace by the Bay Newsagents.

CLERK'S REPORT

a. The application for a licence for the Tea Pot Cafe was recorded, and notice given that the licence had been granted.

b. The Clerk asked if she should attend a training session at Weston-Super-Mare in November, at a cost of £138 + vat. This will be discussed at the next meeting.

c. A complaint was received from a holiday maker in Bristol who had visited Port Isaac during the week when the BBC were filming and had not been allowed to walk through the village. It was their first holiday in Cornwall and they would now probably not come again. They would have liked to buy gifts to take home but eventually did all their shopping in Dartmouth instead. The BBC should not have been given permission to take over. It seemed as if it was more important to Port Isaac to appear on the television than cater for the visitors.

Bill Norris felt that the BBC had been high-handed in their behaviour and virtually commandeered the village.

Henry Symons said they had come at a particularly bad time of the year and should in any case have given more notice. Some benefitted financially, others had not and these had felt the most inconvenience.

David Phelps said that his Cafe had not taken any extra money during the filming but he had received a small amount from providing parking facilities. He felt that there should have been more liaison between the BBC and the parish.

Eric Stokes complained that the BBC had not said that they intended to close any roads.

David Philp said that he found them very obliging and co-operative whenever he made deliveries in the village.

d Notice was received that the water mains in Rose Hill, Dolphin Street, Temple Bar, etc. were to be relaid after the summer season. David Phelps reminded the Council that the streets were due for re-surfacing and Henry Symons pointed out that the storm drains were also due to be renewed. The Council is therefore to press for liaison between the various authorities to avoid the streets being dug up again immediately after they have been relaid. e. Notice was received of a hearing to be held in September regarding an application by the doctors in Wadebridge to dispense medicines at the surgery. David Phelps pointed out that we should take an interest because the outcome could affect the two chemists we all use.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

There were so many applications that it was decided to defer some of them until a meeting one week later.

Support was given to an application by Mrs. J. Lee for regularisation of flat no. 4 at 2 Tintagel Terrace, which previously had no permission.

Article IV Order

David Philp reported that the owners of Morwenna, Fore Street, were to appeal against a compulsory order to replace a wall they had knocked down without permission. He felt this made a mockery of any planning regulations. He thought it was time another attempt was made to obtain an Article IV order for the old village. 'I've nothing against alterations being made,' he said, 'but knocking walls down is scarring the village. We should try and keep the village the way it is. We fought like mad against the proposed lifeboat house. The village is not made for cars and everything is now giving way to them. We are ruining what we have got.'

He gave out some copies of information about Article IV orders where it could be seen that they are not so drastic as sometimes thought and that the residents of the village would be consulted about the details in any case before the order was imposed.

Cllr. Bill Dawe said, 'They are going to rip the village to pieces. Car spaces everywhere. I don't want to see the village spoilt for personal gain.' The Department of the Environment, British Heritage, and MP Paul Tyler are to be asked for advice and the matter will be discussed at the next meeting with the up-to-date information.

'Planning in North Cornwall'

A questionnaire from Tony Philp, Chief Planning Officer at Bodmin, on feelings about the revised delegation system introduced since the 'Cream Teas and Concrete' programme on television. David Phelps said it had taken the programme to get the Planning Department to revise their system. They had also been fined £500. 'But,' he said 'who pays? – we do!'

Cllr. Bill Dawe produced a letter he had received from the N.C.D.C. Legal Department explaining that planning consent had not been given for 'Maylands', Port Gaverne, the new building opposite Tartar Farm, pending a signed declaration that existing caravans would no longer be used. As it was thought this might never be signed, the situation once again made a mockery of the so-called 'tightening-up' of procedures for chasing up irregularities.

The Council expressed unhappiness with the general inconsistency of planning decisions appertaining to Port Isaac at the moment.

'Travellers' a Planning Policy

The Clerk has a County Council document which proposes, among other things, the setting up of special sites for travellers in the county.

The public were asked to leave for the rest of the meeting while the matter of the Clerk's expenses and reimbursement of the Chairman's expenses were discussed.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 10th. August at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

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HAVE YOU SEEN ONE OF THESE?



Stick insects can be found outdoors in the UK in only a handful of locations, all in the extreme SW. A colony has recently been identified in our village, the first recorded on the North Coast. UK insects originated from New Zealand, having arrived on imported plants. Their life cycle is unusual. In many species there are no males, but each female lays around 300 fertile eggs each year. The eggs drop onto the soil to hatch into mini adults in spring. Adults can be found from August right into winter. They are eaily overlooked, being about 4" long and either green or brown in colour. I am trying to find out more about our colony, so if you have ever seen any in previous years, or see any this year, please give me a ring on 880106.
