PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 10th. August. For accurate information, refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards said that she thought the 'Public Discussion' was better at the end of the meeting when the public could comment on items that had been discussed.

She pointed out that ragwort is lethal. A farmer fed some hay which, unknown to him, had ragwort in it and three of his cows died.

She complained that 'Mayfield Green' is not the correct name for the grassed area around the Mayfield telephone box, and that the two steps 'discovered' have been there for twenty years.

Having finally got fed up with waiting for the hedges to be trimmed, alongside the B3267 from Short Lane to Gwelva Dip, she organised the work herself by ringing the Highways Dept. She also got them to check the water tables as the low places collect water and freeze in the winter making the road very slippery.

She had also learned that only 3 of the 21 dog litter bins are to be supplied this year, and a few more every year. This is an utter waste of money, she said, the money would have been far better spent on Port Gaverne toilets.

Doris Hambly asked when the sign 'Please drive slowly through the village' would be put up.

Mrs. Evelyn Brown said she didn't like the memorial stone in Trelights and felt that the plaque on it was upsetting people.

Elsie Ferguson said that visitors were complaining that there were too many signs in Port Isaac, the prices of teas and coffees were too high, the doggy bins looked terrible in a conservation area, and the whole village was becoming just a gift shop centre.

Finance

a. Approval of Accounts

There is £159.73 in the current account after the month's expenditure was met, and

£2,394.35 in the high-interest account. A £35 tender for clearing ragwort was queried by Eric Stokes. It was explained that Bill Dawe and Henry Symons had received authority at the last meeting to deal with the problem as they thought best.

b. Clerk's Expenses

Henry Symons apologised for not having contacted the Association of Local Councils to discover the correct rates. The Clerk had a new booklet, however, explaining how she should be reimbursed for the use of a room or part of a room used for Council purposes. David Phelps said when he first heard the sum could be £500 a year he was aghast, but on further reflection realised that if the Council didn't have the use of the Clerk's room, office machinery, etc., these would have to be provided, so £500 was not very much. The Clerk's expenses will, if necessary, be adjusted retrospectively next month after the advice of the Association of Local Councils had been sought.

c. Training Weekend

Cindy Powell said she realised, unfortunately, that she would not be in a position to attend a Clerk's training course at Weston-super-Mare as it would involve finding people to look after her children while she was away, but she would like to attend another course in the future.

Reports from Committees

a. Seat Committee

Eric Stokes reported that he had repaired one seat near the Post Office but the other one was very dangerous and needed new timbers. Quotations were being sought. Money hoped for from the BBC film unit had not been received. Painting was in progress including the seat in the park at Trelights. It was felt that another black seat would be useful to bring the numbers up, and so there was one to juggle around if it was needed.

b. Playing Field Committee

David Bolton reported that the see-saw was as good as new after its expert repairs. He had put an old blue dinghy for the children, in the playing field.

c. School Governors

Bill Norris said two new lady teachers had been appointed. Mark Provis expressed worries about the lack of school uniforms being worn and asked the Parish Council representative, Bill Norris to pass on the general feeling that head teacher, Mrs. Scown, should encourage uniforms. Bill

Norris thought she wasn't interested and that uniforms are not compulsory. The Parish Council asked him, nevertheless, to pass on what they felt were the wishes of the village people, whom they represented.

Questions to District Councillor

Henry Symons asked if Councillor Bill Dawe would repeat what he said with reference to Mrs. Pickens' outline planning application for Trehaverock, St. Endellion.

Bill Dawe replied that he thought it was a great shame. The church and its surroundings were free of new buildings. He had moved that there be no planning there whatever and had received the support of the full Planning Committee.

Henry Symons then asked what made him change his mind. The church hall was a new, ugly building, with strange windows

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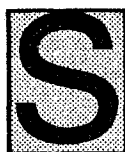
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and an asbestos roof; there was a factory making ice cream with tankers delivering milk; and it was difficult to say there was no development.

Bill Dawe pointed out that the old church hall was not very glamorous and had also had an asbestos roof. He agreed about the windows but felt that the building was better sited as the church did not look straight at it as it had the old one. He admitted that Mr. Carey was making more use of his farm and said that Mr. Symons should have declared an interest as he had a farm shop over the way.

Henry Symons said he had been a strong supporter of Mr. Carey and was not against what he was doing. The 'St. Endellion' sign which Bill Dawe averred had been moved, so that it was now in St. Kew Parish, always was in St. Kew Parish. When Mr. Dawe spoke at the site meeting, shouldn't he have declared an interest as his daughter was an employee of the applicant?

David Phelps recalled that the Parish Council had voted unanimously against Trehaberock.

Mark Provis said it was right that Councillors should be able to question each other.

Neighbourhood Watch

Another meeting is to be organised for Tuesday 13th. October.

Rates for Port Gaverne Toilets

An involved letter from the District Valuer apparently gave the reason for the new very high rates, which were 'assessed on an estimated cost of replacement'. He advised the Parish Council to appeal, which is already being done. A letter from Paul Tyler M.P. said he would support the Parish Council appeal against the absurdity, and North Cornwall District Council is also making representation.

Memorial Stone, Trelights

In a letter, Mrs. Armstrong said that her daughter had inherited money from Mrs. Blake and, as there were already enough seats in Trelights, thought a flower trough with a plaque on it would be an agreeable way to spend it. Having been told that permission for this was granted, she went ahead. Henry Symons said that the matter had been brought up at a Council meeting but was not minuted. The family are concerned that there may be ill feeling and will make the memorial less obtrusive. Henry Barribal was disappointed that the Council decision had not been recorded and had felt like resigning. He said he was no liar and that people should be careful what they said. It was agreed that the case should rest.

Tintagel Terrace to Co-op Footpath

The path is no longer a District Council responsibility. Unlike Doctor's Meadow, it is not a definitive footpath, and would not receive 75% reimbursement from County Highways if cut by the Parish Council. Bill Dawe will ask Environmental Services to sort the problem out.

Bill Norris said the part of the Coast Path behind the Old Coastguard Cottages had not been cut.

CLERK'S REPORT

a. The Clerk produced some plans by the County architect for tree-planting in the playing fields, and off the road at Trewetha and Coldstanton corners. They received favourable comments and David Phelps, tree warden, said he was delighted but surprised at the level they had gone to. Planting should take place next winter.

b. A licence application for John Howard Baker of the Lawns Hotel was recorded.

c. Notice was given of N.S.P.C.C. centenary celebrations to be held at Truro cathedral.

d. Notice was received of new planning requirements to make information more easily available for public inspection. Eric Stokes suggested that plans could be displayed on the wall of the church room kitchen 15 minutes before the start of Parish Council meetings. This would obviate the purchase of copies of the plans and would not involve the Clerk in interruptions at her office. The scheme was agreed. Members of the public could inspect the plans then make comments during 'Public Discussion' at the beginning of the meeting.

e. Notice was received of South West Electricity's intention to cut off the supply at Port Gaverne on Thursday 27th. August, for high voltage work.

f. The application to replace the yellow lines in New Road has not been selected for consideration.

g. Trelights Green Committee were granted the use of the village green for a barbecue on Thursday 27th. August.

h. Notice was received that South West Water are to start installing water meters in non-domestic properties fairly shortly and will do the same for domestic properties by the year 2000.

i. The Slipway Hotel would make an application at Bodmin for a full licence on Monday 24th. August.

j. Quotations are to be sought to provide a stay for the front, and a panel to receive drawing pins, for the notice board at the car park. Also some method of making the notice board on the Fish Cellars easier to pin notices to.

k. The street lighting in Silvershell Road was working again, and it was thought that the lights in the old village had been repaired.

l. A directive from the Association of Local Councils explained that any councillor who had not paid his poll tax should not speak on matters of finance and must declare that he is so restricted under 'section 106'. Failure to observe this would make the Council liable to prosecution by the Director of Public Prosecutions.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

a. Mr. Gill, Old Barn, Poltreworgey. Revised plans for conversion of barn and extension. (The application was intended for St. Kew Parish.)

b. Mr. and Mrs. Carey, Glebe Farm, St. Endellion. Retention of car park, and continued display of advertisement signs, previously undertaken without consent.

c. Mr. and Mrs. Andrews, Hathaway, Roscarrock Hill. Erection of entrance porch & dormer.

d. Mr. and Mrs. N. Cleave, Brooklands Farm, Port Gaverne. Erection of dwelling and garage.

e. Mr. Sloman, Roscarrock, listed building consent for, and conversion of agricultural building to residential dwelling, including demolition of lean-to structure.

All the above applications (except the first) received the support of the Parish Council.

Notice was received that work at Maylands, Port Gaverne, in progress under building regulations but with no planning application, should stop. Two RSJs that have been installed require structural calculations to be made.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 14th. September at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

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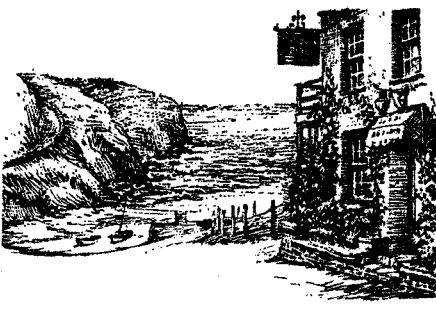


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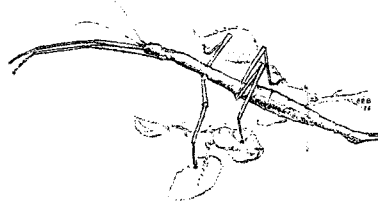
