It was with deep regret that we heard of the deaths on August 21st. of two brothers, Mr. Arthur Moss Blake of the 'The Willows', Trewiston Road, St. Minver, and Mr. Wesley Cranstoun Blake of 'Cranstoun', Mayfield Road, Port Isaac. He is much missed and we extend our deep sympathy to his widow, Nell.

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## PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 14th. September. For accurate information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

### Public Discussion

Malcolm Lee said that Port Isaac and District Tourism Association had monitored street cleaning in the village and found that 90% of the streets were not being swept and the contractors were being paid for work not being done. Cllr. Dawe said he would bring the matter up at a meeting the next evening.

Olive Strout complained that the little boat installed at the Playing Field had been removed from her property without permission. She also said that she didn't like the comment that appeared in Trio.

Robin Penna asked if the Parish Council found it satisfactory that street lights at the bottom of the village were out all summer.

### Finance

There was £159.73 in the current account and £2394.35 in the deposit account so it was moved that £1,000 be transferred from the deposit account to the current account to cover expenditure. There is still another £3,000 of precept to come from the District Council.

### Clerk's Expenses

A letter was received from the Chairman of the Cornwall Association of Town and Country Parishes which stated the difficulty in deciding the precise amount to pay a Clerk for the use of a room, heating, etc., for Parish Council work. After much discussion it was decided to pay £9.50 per week, backdated to the beginning of this financial year.

### Grant for Village Hall

The Hall is once again faced with heavy outlay to comply with new fire regulations and it is estimated that the work necessary will cost £2,000. The Hall's income is about £500 per annum. An intense discussion on the need for the Village Hall followed. Finally it was decided, however, to make a grant of £350.

### Councillors Interests

Contrary to the statement last month, a Parish Councillor in arrears with Poll Tax may *speak* on subjects of precept or budget but may not *vote* on them.

### Playing Fields Committee Report

Chairman David Bolton explained that the little boat was bought by the Gundrys about 25 years ago and kept in Gullrock

car park during the winter. When they no longer wanted the boat they said he could do what he liked with it. It was put in Rashleigh Cellars at Port Gaverne for four or five years until it was decided that it would make a useful item for the children to play with at the Playing Fields.

David Phelps commended the grass cutting and said that it had looked nice all summer and that the Playing Fields were well used by locals and visitors but amazingly there was no abuse. The Circus was also to be commended for leaving no sign after they left in spite of the weather conditions. He then added that the majority of the committee didn't like the little boat finding it tatty and the cause of animosity.

### Seats Committee

Eric Stokes spoke of a proposal to divide the Parish into three zones, Port Isaac, Port Gaverne, and Trelights. The seats would be repaired and repainted in Port Isaac now, and the others at the beginning of next year. Any urgent repairs in the other two zones would also be dealt with immediately. It was proposed that the Parish Council should buy three more of the black plastic type of seat at a cost of about £280.

### Port Isaac School

Bill Norris was asked to speak on the matter of school uniforms and said that it was not possible to enforce the wearing of uniforms - this was the responsibility of parents. He then spoke of the 'Adopt a Path' scheme under the County Highways management and development of public rights of way. The most suitable paths for this purpose were in Port Gaverne Valley, and from Port Gaverne to Port Isaac via Trewetha and Port Isaac Valley.

### Parish Council Records

Non-current records may be transferred to the County Council where special strong rooms have been built. At present the County holds no records for St. Endellion parish. Suitable items are minutes, accounts, selected correspondence, village hall deeds, etc. The Clerk has much archival material at her home - not the best place - some of it 100 years old. She was asked to transfer it straight away unless there was a cost involved in which case to report it to the next meeting. The records are available for public inspection but those less than 30 years old must have the owners' permission first.

### Slow Signs in Trelights

Mr. Barriball asked if the old faded 'slow' signs on the road between Long Cross and the council houses could be repainted. The Parish Council agreed that this should be

done and will ask the County Highways department to do the work.

### Rates on Port Gaverne Toilets

The reassessment of the business rate may take a long time. Cllr Bill Dawe said that the North Cornwall District Council will continue to support Parish Council appeals.

### Proposed Telephone Kiosk

Mr. McDonald, the owner of Bay Newsagents claims that the grass space beside his shop, where British telecom proposes to

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put a modern telephone box, belongs to him. David Phelps denied this saying that it had always been Council property, confirmed by South West Electricity Board when they were placing a pole there, opposite his Cornish Cafe. It was an open piece of land and the grass was cut by the District Council. Nobody complained about the fire hydrant signs being placed there. The Clerk is to ring S.W.E.B.'S legal department and make enquiries.

### CLERK'S REPORT

a. Barclays are to close the sub-branch in Port Isaac due to greater competition from building societies. Also with the new by-pass, there will be no traffic problem in getting in to Wadebridge next year. Mark Provis said there are usually people queuing to get into the sub-branch and he wanted to know if Barclays would be willing to sell the premises to another bank that would be able to provide the service. It was pointed out that the Midland Bank provide a mobile branch but Barclays bank were taking a very cavalier attitude. Eric Stokes said that the absence of the branch will cause great inconvenience and that once again people were being penalised because they lived in a small village. He proposed that a very strong letter be sent.

b. Reference was made to correspondence about street sweeping between Port Isaac and District Tourism Association and the District Council but the Parish Council had not received any complaints. Cllr. Bill Dawe said that it was a very serious matter - people's poll tax money being paid out. Mark Provis said that the streets were not being swept every day as required by the contract and that it was a misuse of taxpayers' money if the contractors were being paid £1,000s for work that was not being done. David Phelps pointed out that the original meeting was not set up by the Parish Council and until they were sure of the facts it would be better not to press the matter. Meanwhile he admired Mr. Lee and the Port Isaac and District Tourism Association and said they should 'go for it'. The Parish Council expressed worries that it was impossible for a single street cleaner to do the work required.

c. A letter from John Lawsons Circus, Tonbridge, Kent: May we take this opportunity in thanking you and your colleagues regarding our visit to Port Isaac. Although the weather was not on our side and we had to cancel one show due to the strong winds, we enjoyed our stay (and the view was magnificent!) We would like to express our thanks to your local residents who braved the wind and rain to visit us and hope that they enjoyed themselves.

d. The salt bins at Trelights are to be moved into the village and a new one is to be installed at Poltreworgey hill.

e. A letter from St. Peter's Church thanked the Parish Council for their contribution to the Flower Festival.

f. Information is to be obtained from the Department of the Environment about Article IV Conservation Orders.

g. Submissions are being invited for the annual award for developments of special architectural merit.

h. The County Council Re-cycling office at Truro point out that there are now facilities for re-cycling clothing left over from jumble sales. David Phelps said that the use of the 'green' bottle bank had increased since business premises had been required to bag all their refuse.

There were no planning applications, but Cllr. Bill Dawe said that an enforcement order was to be sought, at the next planning meeting, against the building being erected by Mr. and Mrs. Cox at 'Maylands' Port Gaverne where there were several irregularities.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 12th. October at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Rooms, Trelights.

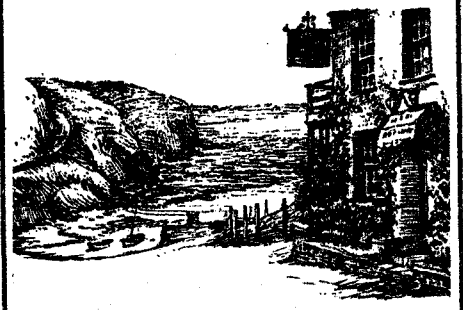
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## The Day the World Missed the News

## ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION ACT 1990

All dogs must wear a collar and clearly-displayed tag bearing the owner's name and address. Dogs must be kept under control at all times - on a lead anywhere near a road or where there are other animals. Dogs should be trained not to foul in public places. Dogs should never be taken into food shops - tie their leads to a post. Someone should care for dogs if owners go away and should know the local dog warden's telephone number. Dogs may be considered strays if no person seems to

be in charge of them and a policeman or dog warden may seize and detain them. If they are not claimed within seven days the authority has the right to find them a new home or destroy them. Finders of strays should return them to their owners or take them to the local authority or nearest police station. Failure to do this is liable to a fine of £500. It is an offence to let any dog be dangerously out of control in a public place and the police have the power to seize any such dog. Local authorities must keep certain areas clear of dog faeces because of duty to keep roads clear. In certain circumstances barking can constitute a statutory nuisance. Dogs must never worry livestock and farmers are entitled to kill such dogs. Even letting a dog walk in the same field as farm animals may be considered as 'worrying'.

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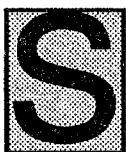
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
