PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 14th. September. For accurate information, please refer to Parish Council minutes.

David Welton reported that there were two trees down across the path between Trewetha and Port Isaac Mill. The Parish Council will write to the owner of the land at the mill pool while David offered to deal with one in the 'bridle lane' up to Trewetha where it could be difficult to find out who the owns the land.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards said that a police officer will attend Parish Council meetings and that he sent 'apologies for absence' to the present one.

Doris Hambly asked about the 'slow' signs for Trewetha and was told they are in hand, but there is no news about proposed tree planting. Robin Penna pointed out that the street lights at the bottom of Fore Street were still out and the Clerk explained the difficulties S.W.E.B. were facing in organising the necessary street closure.

Olive Strout complained about David Phelps standing up to speak while she was exercising her right to address the Council during 'Public Discussion' last month. David denied this and asked for the complaint not to be recorded.

Report from the 'Seats' Committee:

A tender for repainting had been accepted and the work is in progress. Only one of three new seats which were ordered was available as the factory in Ireland had been blown up. Unless the order can eventually be fulfilled, other suppliers are to be sought.

Report from the Playing Field Committee:

David Phelps said that permission had been granted for continued use of the car park by the Chatterbus. The Committee had decided that the boat provided for the children to play in would stay where it is.

Report from the School Representative:

Bill Norris reported that, owing to ill health, Cathy Carney had stood down from her position at the school kitchen. He also reported that Mr. Hudspith was the new auxiliary assistant for the junior class.

Report from the representative to Cornwall Association of Town and Parish Councils:

Henry Symons expressed concern about increased fly-tipping since charges have been introduced for collecting business refuse. The tip at St. Erth must be kept open, for example, as the nearest one otherwise is 40 - 50 miles away, too far for most business people. Mark Provis said North Cornwall had the longest hauls of any district - from St. Agnes to Bude. The

transport costs were horrific and would be borne by ratepayers. St. Austell gets subsidised because, although it is a shorter distance, they have to go outside their area. Henry Symons proposed that a letter should be sent from St. Endellion Parish to support the campaign.

Report from the representative to the Local Road Safety Committee:

Henry Symons said now that road safety is a Parish Council duty, the Committee had been wound up as they would no longer be taken any notice of and could therefore do nothing useful apart from educating people,

Procedure

David Philp asked whether during 'Committee Reports' the Parish Council should take action on matters arising as these were not actually specified on the agenda.

Hand Rail for Footpath from Tintagel Terrace to New Road

Eric Stokes had heard from Mrs. Julian that steps to the path are hard to climb as there is no handrail. He offered to provide one for the price of the materials. Henry Symons pointed out that a handrail not of an approved type, could render the Council liable in the case of an accident the Council liable in the case of an accident the council liable in the case of an accident was more likely while there was no hand rail at all. His offer was accepted.

Trimming the Co-Op Footpath

Mr. Barriball speaking on behalf of Cllr. Bill Dawe, who was absent, said that hedges along-side the path were growing out and blocking the path. David Phelps said the hedges all belonged to private individuals who should be made to trim them as elsewhere. The Highway Authority to be asked to contact landowners.

Hillson Close

The road was fully adopted on 12th. June and is now a public highway.

Proposed Telephone Box, Tintagel Terrace

Responding to Mr. McDonald's claim that the land adjacent to Bay Newsagents belongs to him, Cornwall County Council state that the 1907 Ordnance Survey plan shows the land open to public use and forming part of the public highway and can be dealt with accordingly. British Telecom have received a letter from Mr. McDonald's solicitor, however, and the plan will be postponed while the matter is settled.

CLERK'S REPORT

a. A complaint that the position of a dog litter bin on the Terrace was reducing parking space. North Cornwall District Council will be asked if the bin can be placed outside the railing.

b. Eric Stokes was nominated as Parish Council representative on the St. James Smith School Sport Centre Management Committee.

c. Barclays Bank expressed sympathy about the closure of their Port Isaac sub-branch and said that the building will be put up for public sale and perhaps the Council might know somebody who would like to purchase it.

d. A letter from North Cornwall District Council said that apart from a letter from Malcolm Lee, they had received no other direct complaint about street cleaning in Port Isaac. The streets were being 'scavenged' rather than swept as 'sweeping' was not defined in the contract. Bill Norris said that he remembered no mention of the word 'scavenge' when the Parish Council was originally approached on the matter. Mark Provis said that the streets have been clean this year, and the lad who does the work walks as far as he can in the time allocated, but what had happened to the promised refuse collection point over the leat?. To be discussed next month.

e. The Golden Lion licence transfer was noted.

f. A letter of thanks from North Cornwall Heritage Coast Service for the Parish Council's co-operation with the season's well-attended 'Parish Walks'. David Bolton said thanks are really due to Robin Penna who did most of it. g. Slow signs for Trelights are on schedule.

h. David Phelps asked for action to be taken about the Kennards House road junction.

There were no planning applications.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 9th. November at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

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
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PORT ISAAC STICK INSECTS

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

A 'Steering Group' was elected at the public meeting on 13th. October, under the temporary chairmanship of Parish Councillor David Phelps, who explained that the meeting was nothing to do with the Parish Council. A 'co-ordinator' will be appointed and registered with Detective Constable Ray Sykes who is responsible for Neighbourhood Watch schemes in this area. There will be a need for 'sub-coordinators' to cover about every twenty houses and report anything suspicious they may notice to the coordinator. Signs will be purchased, for which some fund-raising will be necessary, and put up to create an awareness that people are

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keeping their eyes open. Some insurance companies offer reductions in their premiums where schemes like this operate.

Nobody came to represent Trelights, but it was thought better for the whole of the parish to be included in the scheme and volunteers will be sought for all areas. Peggy Richards already runs a scheme of her own with helpers prepared to let her know if they notice anything wrong but who prefer their names not to be publicised, fearing they might become targets for attack from misguided members of the community. The present scheme intends to publicise the names of the sub-coordinators but the two schemes can operate side by side to pool information. Peggy Richards agreed to be a member of the Steering Group. Other volunteers were Eric Stokes, Melanie Dingle, and 'Ros' Roskilly. The main aim is to 'nail' professional crime. The sub-coordinators will not be interested in snooping around checking on car licences, etc. but will be vigilant for evidence of criminals many of whom come from outside the village intent on clearing somebody's home out.

Steering Group Meeting

All members of the Group were present at a meeting in the Cornish Cafe on Monday 19th. October, and two members of the local police, Sgt. Peter Richards and P.C. Peter Strong, attended to give help and advice on how to setup and work a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme.

Melanie Dingle was asked to be Hon. Secretary and Ros Roskilly Hon. Treasurer. Fund-raising was discussed and it was thought it might be a good idea to visit another local group and see how they managed.

The Scheme is not there to detect crime but, with the aid of the residents of Port Isaac, to act as a deterrent to would-be criminals. Will anybody who wishes to participate in the Scheme please contact David Phelps

Should you see or hear anything you feel unsure about you can, if you so wish, contact David or one of the sub-coordinators, whose names will be published at a later date. We must stress that if you think a crime is being committed, you should still dial 999 for immediate attention.

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FULMAR IN FLIGHT

When I arrived here, as the new Student Warden at National Trust Lundy Bay properties, I walked around Com Head to Pengirt Cove where I noticed the Fulmar. At first I thought it was a gull but its flight showed it was far superior. I sat and watched the birds appearing to make false attempts at landing on the cliff edge. There were five, playing follow-the-leader, all preparing to land, then wheeling away. Their feet would extend and touch, then push away using the wind deflected from the cliff to gain height, then, with a precise turn coming around to repeat the movement. When bored with one area they moved to another.

The Fulmar Petrel, an Arctic colonizer from the Antarctic, is one of the world's most northerly breeding birds, closely related to the Albatross and Petrels, although, unlike other Petrels, they nest above ground free from threat. Their interesting defence is to regurgitate oil and spit it at their prey.

A tube on the top of the beak allows the bird to excrete the salt from sea water enabling it to drink. The bird's habits continually change and keep it mysteriously interesting.

Their only breeding site was once St. Kilda, Scotland, but they are now established here, their most southerly site.

The Fulmar was slower to prospect the south coast, probably because lower less isolated cliffs did not provide enough security. They first bred in the County in 1944 and now colonise the entire coast.

They were first sighted over Pentire Point in April 1936 and then more frequently between Tintagel and Pentire until 1948, when the first egg was found at Port Quin. In 1949 a pair bred at Bossiney Cove. They continued to breed here successfully until 1954 although in 1955 no pairs were sighted. There was a sudden increase the following year to about 50 pairs, and to 60 in 1957.

The area between Pentire and Port Quin seemed to be an ideal site as there were 41 possible nests in 1969, with the most recent report in 1989. The results show that Tintagel had become a less popular breeding place with the birds moving towards Pentire. The best present site appears to be Port Gaverne.

The birds arrive at their breeding sites in late December and January. The chicks hatch in mid-July and are flying six-and-a-half weeks later, spending the next three or five years of their lives at sea. Adult birds leave the cliffs at this time, rarely making an appearance again until the end of the year.



Villagers have asked why the RNLI has ceased to use maroons as a call-out method for the crew. I give below an extract from the Chief of Operations RNLI, dated 9th April 1992. 'Use of Hand Maroons': 'Recently there have been two potentially fatal incidents involving hand maroons fired in support of service call outs. One incident involved a hand maroon which, although correctly fired, had deviated from its intended track and had gone through a Guest House bedroom window. It continued upwards through the ceiling and into the roof space finally detonating close to the gutter. Severe damage was caused to the roof and dormer window and a large length of cast iron guttering was displaced and fell onto cars parked below. Fortunately nobody was injured in either of these incidents. It was made clear in my previous circular that hand maroons, as with all pyrotechnics, are potentially dangerous and are only to be used as a back-up to the paging system as a last resort'.

The Lifeboat was called out twice since the last report in Trio:

17th. September - a call to a windsurfer in trouble in the Camel Estuary. The Lifeboat was recalled as the casualty had been picked up by a passing fishing boat.

19th. September - a call to search for a missing child in the sea at Polzeath. Lifeboat searched the area, but child had been re-united with her father, safe and well - a false alarm call with good intent.
