He was also closely associated with village activities.

St. Peter's Church was crowded for the funeral service on December 16th. Preb. Revd. M. Bartlett, in a very moving address, spoke of Dominic's life where he always had a smile, a kind word, and a helping hand for those with whom he came into contact. Two of his favourite hymns were sung 'Morning Has Broken' and 'Jerusalem', with Janet Townsend at the organ. The collection at the door of the church, for the Padstow Fisherman's Disaster Fund in lieu of flowers, totalled £280. Following the service the cortège left for the Glynn Valley Crematorium where again there was a large attendance by many of his friends.

We express our profound sympathy to Jenny and Roy, Dominic's parents, and to the whole family in the sad loss of a much loved son and brother.

MOTORWAY STANDARDS?



SHELLFISH CONSERVATION

Recently, when introducing proposals to increase the minimum lobster carapace size to 90mm, Cornwall Sea Fisheries Committee invited some non-councillor skippers to comment. John, Jeremy, and Julian Brown used the opportunity to argue that to raise the size in one year would be too fast. They suggested a rise to 87mm in the first year and 90mm in the second year. This suggestion received a committee vote of 15 to 2 in favour, and will form part of the new by-laws.

PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 11th. January. For accurate information, please refer to Parish Council minutes.

Public Discussion

Robert Sloman explained that the 'v' of the road island at the entrance to the drive down to Roscarrock Farm had been removed to help vehicles to turn when they took the wrong road. The old stones would not be touched and he apologised for any concern caused.

Alastair Wreford of the Cornish Guardian announced that he is now living in Trelights and said that the removal of the wall in front of his house had not required planning permission and that the end result will be a great improvement.

Doris Hambly was assured that work would soon be done to alleviate the flooding problem in the road at Coldstanton.

Banking Arrangements

Hon. Treasurer, David Welton, said that he was still looking for alternative banking facilities to try and avoid the charges being introduced next June. It seemed that the use of a building society might not be appropriate where public funds were involved.

BBC Donation

It was decided that a good use for the $\pounds 200$ donation from the BBC for being allowed to film in the village last year, would be to provide a strong new seat for the Platt. It was further decided that perhaps the Colonel Tucker seat should either be repaired or replaced, as well, and quotations are to be sought.

Corner Cap

The County Highways department are to put up chevrons and signs on both the bends within two weeks and will also do a lot of work. The corner has been given special priority.

Road Resurfacing

The original scheme for 1992-93 has been cancelled due to a 25% reduction in the County Highways budget. Cllr. Bill Dawe said this the result of deferring the resurfacing until public utility work was completed. Work has been done on the B 3314 because it carries a lot of heavy traffic and was deteriorating. The conractors will, however, be asked to do more patching work at the slipway area in the village. David Phelps pointed out that the area is dangerous for people on foot. Mark Provis asked for the area to be paved with cobbles rather than tarmac.

BT Telephone Numbers

David Phelps said that while St. Mabyn and Trebetherick had retained their names in the telephone book, Port Isaac was listed as 'Bodmin'. Nine years ago we were believing hoodwinked into that all exchanges would be treated the same. The same thing happened at St. Ives who were to be listed as 'Penzance' but the parish fought against it and won. It is very important to tourism that Port Isaac is listed under its own name and he asked for a strongly worded letter to British Telecom, which is now a private business and should

therefore take more notice of what their customers want

Rumble Strips, Trewetha Lane

Mark Provis suggested that heavy painted stripes, similar to those at the approach to the Tamar Bridge, might be the best way to slow drivers down as they approached the village. David Phelps gave some examples of other places where this had been done and said that the situation was getting more serious and with housing development there were more kids on bikes making it lethal. It would be useful to know about other methods of 'traffic calming' and someone should be invited to a site meeting or to the Annual Public Meeting.

Proposed Telephone Kiosk

In response to a BT enquiry, the council suggested that a good site for a new box was in a corner of the N.C.D.C. car park.

Trelights Village Green

The Parish Council will grant an easement to the County Highways Department to allow them to improve the drainage at the Village Green and remove the flooding.

CLERK'S REPORT

1. Notice was received that an economically viable solution to the dangerous turning off the A30 at Kennards House will take the form of an over bridge and would be completed in a few years time. It was heard that there have now been seven deaths at this junction.

2. Cllr. Bill Dawe is trying to get something done about the cardboard boxes left by people taking bottles, etc. to the recycling banks.

3. Chairman David Bolton and David Phelps agreed to attend a meeting arranged by Miss Audrey Lees to try and find ways of improving the handling of planning matters.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

R.N.L.I. - Slipway Garage - The council supported the change of use from former garage/boathouse to Lifeboat station.

Mr. Goodright - 5 Marshalls Way, Trelights - The council supported the application to erect a garden shed and lean-to greenhouse provided that this did not involve felling any trees.

Mr. and Mrs. Kirkman - Trehaverock Cottage, St. Endellion - erection of first floor extension and new pitched roof to front lean to. This application was presented last month but it was thought the old building might be listed. The clerk has now received the information that it is not a listed building but the plans had not been returned for re-consideration. Cllr, Bill Dawe said he was under the impression that Mr. Lee of the Planning Department was reviewing the situation. The clerk is to make further enquiries.

Mark Provis called for a strongly worded letter to be sent to the Chairman of the Planning Committee, requesting that more attention be given to Parish Council opinion on planning matters, and asking for it to be read out at a meeting so that it would be recorded in the minutes. This suggestion was carried by a vote of 5 - 3 in favour.

Clerk's Resignation

The clerk is to join her husband in Bahrain at the end of the month so a new clerk has to be appointed before the next meeting. The position has been advertised and interviews were to be arranged. As the matter might involve people living in the parish, the public were asked to leave.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday 8th. February, 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

A Port Isaac fishing tragedy was averted recently when Jeremy Brown's boat sank with himself and Johnny Rowe on board. Luckily, while the lifeboat was still on its way, another boat fairly nearby came to the rescue in the nick of time.

Along with my mother and brother. I was evacuated to Port Isaac, to the Bide-a-while Hotel, as it was known then, and made many, many friends. It is a beautiful village and one of the best views around, and of course a lot more is happening now to what it was years ago, which is a good thing. The only bugbear is the parking for visitors on day-trips and when the village puts on a carnival, etc. This always crops up in the Trio and, until the District Council comes up with an idea, I suppose it will remain the same. Man rules the air, and conquers space, Splits atoms, bridges gulfs; the race


For power, more power, his constant need. And yet the smallest, humblest seed


Visiting Choir
