PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 8th. February. For accurate information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

The Council welcomed back Mrs. Barbara Willmott as Clerk to the Council.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards spoke about dogs fouling the footpaths and the area round the telephone box. She said that it has got worse since the dog bins were installed. It is particularly hazardous when the lights are on low power and there are shadows everywhere. Also there are a lot of stray dogs roaming around. The Council will contact the Dog Warden.

Peggy continued with a report of the number of house break-ins that are occurring and advised people to ring the police at Launceston (0566) 774211 when they see anything suspicious - like the stranger seen recently, taking photographs of houses. A bad time was between five and eight in the evening, when house holders are less vigilant, with burglaries taking place even while houses are occupied. Other burglaries happen while house owners are away for as little as 48 hours so someone may be acting as an informer.

Malcolm Lee asked if there had been any progress with the promised footpath improvement work. It is now 15 months since volunteers carried out a detailed survey and there had been no sign of the '1992 Work Party'. The Council will raise this matter next month. Mr. Lee also reported that the footpath sign was missing where footpath no. 3 leaves the road at Tregaverne.

Finance

As the month's expenditure would use most of the money in the current account, £500 is to be transferred from deposit, leaving about £2,730. The Clerk announced that the first £3,750 of the precept would be received in April and the rest in September.

Donations, etc.

In spite of a request from the P.C.C. for a larger donation towards the cost of maintaining St. Endellion churchyard, it was felt that only an increase of £25 would be possible, making this year's donation £450.

The annual subscription of £15 was paid for membership of the Council for the Preservation of Rural England.

A third item, a donation towards the Cornwall Disabled People's Service who need money for a small, specially equipped coach, will be discussed next month.

Last year, the Council had paid £15 to St. Peter's P.C.C. towards grass-cutting but had since learned that the contractor had left the district before being paid. It was suggested, therefore, that the money be used towards this year's costs.

Report from the Seats Committee

Eric Stokes reported that the first part of the repair and repainting schedule was complete and that the seats in the village now looked better than they had ever done. The Port Gaverne and Trelights schedules would now be started. A new seat on the coastal footpath at the top of the steps up from Pinehaven valley might be welcomed. Having expressed an interest in a similar project a few years ago, the Sproull family might be interested in making a donation towards the cost. Eric also reported that he had installed the handrail at the beginning of the footpath from New Road to Tintagel Terrace, and would make no charge for this. Users say they are pleased with it.

Report from the Tree Warden

David Phelps is attending a five-Saturday training scheme which he finds both useful and interesting. He asked the Council to chase up the Highways Department's promised tree-planting scheme.

Local Dialling Codes

In a letter, British Telecom reiterated their original reasons for replacing 'Port Isaac' code in the Phone Book with 'Bodmin' and said that as 'all figure dialling' was due to be introduced soon, it was unlikely that they could take retrospective action now.

Meanwhile M.P. Paul Tyler had written to the chief of B.T. expressing the anxiety caused to a relatively large residential area in a rural part of the country and questioned the 'rationale' of the decision.

Traffic Calming

The Area Surveyor had written to explain that there were over 200 requests for similar schemes in North Cornwall and that Port Isaac's need for some means of calming the traffic entering the village would be added to the list. Rumble strips, however, did not prove successful.

Mark Provis said that we must keep on trying and that our County Councillor, Harvey Lander, should be asked to help. There is also still a need for a zebra crossing at the school which is on the perimeter of the village near the dangerous corner in question where there is no pedestrian refuge at all. The Council decided to arrange a meeting at the site with Harvey Lander.

Proposed B.T. Telephone Kiosk

British Telecom will investigate the feasibility of the Parish Council's suggestion to install the new kiosk at the car park.

The progress on listing the old boxes in the village is to be investigated.

Heritage Coast Walks

The Clerk will liaise with Robin Penna and Charlie David of the Heritage Coast service to arrange some 'Parish Walks'.

Flooding at Coldstanton Corner

Cornwall Highways are investigating the cause of the flooding and any necessary

work will be done when the road is resurfaced in the first quarter of the financial year. David Phelps said that they had got their priorities wrong and that the roads at the bottom of the village were like those in a shanty town. This matter is to be discussed at the next meeting.

Hospital Car Service

Eric Stokes reported that through illness and other reasons the Service was running out of drivers. He pointed out that it is only a voluntary service. A letter will be put in Trio to ask for more drivers.

Annual Parish Meeting

This will be held on Thursday 22nd. April, and it is hoped to invite our M.P. and other speakers to the meeting.

Planning Applications

a. Erection of dwelling, Trewetha Lane, Mr. J. Saundry. This outline application for a second house had been rubber stamped 'delegation possible' which totally surprised the Council as the development was far from insignificant and in the Conservation Area. Consequently the vote of 3/2 went against it, objections being raised about increasing traffic in Trewetha Lane and overdevelopment of a Conservation Area.

b. Erection of first floor extension and new pitched roof to front lean-to at Trehaverock Cottage, St. Endellion, Mr. and Mrs. Kirkman. There was a vote of 5/1 in support of this application.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday 8th. March at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Hall, Trelights.

We live in a remote, under-populated area with the benefits of a unique lifestyle not shared by town-dwellers. But there are drawbacks as we all know. The long distance to any of the urban centres and the absence of serviceable public transport for example. Normally, with a car, this is not too great a problem, except in the summer when the roads are crowded. When a visit to hospital, or a number of visits, or regular appointments have to be made, it can be very difficult indeed. Even people who

Where a relative or friend is on hand to do the driving, assuming they have spare time, it is only a matter of relying on their kindness but where there is nobody else able to drive, an official organisation is necessary. The Voluntary Car Service was formed in this Parish some years ago as a temporary measure until the government came up with an alternative scheme to the regular service which had just been closed down, largely because of people abusing the free service even when they were fit enough to drive their own cars. Some said at the time that it was a mistake to provide a stop-gap service because if we were able to help ourselves the government would do nothing. Many of the volunteers were retired people - they had the spare time, but now some of them have had to stop providing the service and this is part of the reason for the shortage of drivers. 
