## PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the Annual Meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 10th. May. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Many items are discussed at great length and there is insufficient space in Trio to report these discussions fully. If you want to know everything that is discussed please note that you are allowed to attend and listen to all Parish Council meetings.

Apologies were received from Cllr. Dawe, David Philp, and Rohan Carey.

David Bolton was re-elected Chairman and the rest of the officers re-elected en-bloc.

#### **Public Discussion**

Peggy Richards said that the postman had complained about the overgrowth on the path from Church Hill to Port Isaac Mill. It is, however, forbidden to clear any footpaths until July. Peggy also expressed disappointment at the poor turn-out for the Annual Public Meeting and said it looked as if we didn't care very much about the parish.

#### Finance

David Welton, Hon. Treasurer reported that  $\pounds 6,163.28$  ( $\pounds 5,312$  of this in a high interest account) had been transferred to Midland Bank from Barclays who charged  $\pounds 18.54$  for closing the account.

It was decided, on a vote of 4 - 2 against, not to pay a £50 minimum membership fee to the 'Clean Seas for Cornwall' Campaign based in St. Ives. Mark Provis said he thought South West Water should be paying, not the Parish Council, instead of 'pumping money into a local TV station'.

#### **Main Road into Port Isaac**

David Phelps reminded the Council that, although tree planting had taken place, work on improving the corner from Coldstanton to Poltreworgey was still urgently needed. Heavy goods vehicles have to stop at the corner before turning when traffic is coming in the opposite direction.

The Highway Authority are to be asked to put a 'Please drive slowly through the village' sign where the B3267 comes into Port Isaac.

#### Twinning with Kolka

The dancers from Kolka in Latvia, had hoped to visit Cornwall this month, but are unable to come because the cost is out of their reach. They hope, however, that the link with Port Isaac will continue. A twinning sub-committee may be set up after Henry Symons has studied the documentation involved and presented a summary next month. In any event, a public meeting would be held to discover if Port Isaac wants to twin with Kolka.

#### Footpath Sign at Millpool

The County Council are to be asked to find out who installed the splendid sign at the northern end of Port Isaac millpool and to point out 'Home Park' on one finger is both spelt incorrectly and misleading as there is no direct path from there to Homer Park.

#### **Refuse Collection**

It was thought a notice could be sent to all cottage owners with times and location of refuse collection points in the village and explaining the use of the new litter bins at the slipway. It was thought, however, that it would be difficult to determine which of them were 'official'. Mark Provis complained that because the contractors had no machine to empty the 'wheelie bins' in the new litter bins, they were only removing black plastic bags, despite instructions from North Cornwall District Council that all refuse was to be removed. He suggested that the 'wheelie bins' were removed and the wooden interior coated with fibreglass to prevent seepage of fluids, the refuse could then be removed by hand. This recommendation will be passed to the District Council. David Phelps asked if at the same time, the high wall at one end could be lowered and painted black to blend in better with its surroundings.

#### **Memorial Seats**

David Phelps asked for it to be a condition on donated teak memorial seats, in future, that they would be maintained by the Parish Council for the normal life of the seat only.

#### Sign at Port Gaverne Beach

In response to complaints about the sign asking people to control their dogs, or face a possible ban, the National Trust asked the Parish Council to establish whether there actually was a problem with dogs on the beach, if the sign was necessary, or whether the wording should be amended. A letter from Port Isaac and District Tourism Association said the threat of a ban might be thought unfriendly by visitors, but the Parish Council thought this would not be a serious problem and recommend that the sign is left as it is.

#### **Paper Bank**

David Phelps said that the aluminium bank should first be put back where it was before it was moved during the car park resurfacing. It is full to overflowing and doesn't get emptied where it is. It was thought a paper bank might not be a practical proposition but apparently a local person has successfully been collecting as much paper as she can get for the last two years so it was decided to ask the District Council about the possibility.

#### The Seat Committee Report

Eric Stokes disagreed strongly with the letter from Charlie David, North Coast Heritage Service Officer, in last month's Trio. 'We are glad of seats that are donated', he said, 'the more the better. They provide somewhere for old people to stop and rest'.

#### The Playing Field Committee Report

Mark Provis said the goal posts are in a dangerous condition and should be taken down immediately. This might also give the grass a chance to grow back again. Tenders are to be sought for the renovation of the posts and it was suggested that perhaps the position of the pitch should be moved slightly next year.

David Phelps pointed out that the car park gates are very hard to close. Apparently children riding on the gates has strained the hinges. Councillors are to meet at the playing field, and discuss the problem at a future meeting.

Mark Provis suggested a 'Tarmac and

Chippings' committee to report on the condition of the roads in the village.

#### Footbridge on the Main

Bill Norris reported that soil washing down on to the bridge was accumulating and compacting on top of the wood and could be causing damage. David Bolton will ask Robert Ford, who works for him, to remove the soil.

#### Hospital Car Service

Eric Stokes said that unless more volunteer drivers could be found, the service was in danger of dying. David Bolton suggested that each Councillor should ask someone they know. Eric Stokes said there was 'no chance' as he had already asked everybody. Nevertheless each councillor would try to find more drivers. Bill Norris said that if there had been no car service, the National Health Service would have had to provide one as before, meanwhile patients should use taxis and ask for reimbursement.

#### The Main

Doctor Baird wrote to deplore the change from smooth grass to weeds and blackthorn on the Main and suggested the Heritage Coast Service might be asked to help clear it or, that the land could be offered to The National Trust who would probably manage it. Henry Symons said that sheep could probably be grazed there, confined by an electric fence. The Heritage Coast Service, with local volunteers, however, is prepared to help with the work in September.

#### Notice Boards

The board at Trelights is in good condition but those at the Co-op and the Liberal Club need repairing and renovating. Eric Stokes said he found no difficulty with the board at the main car park which some people had found hard to open.

#### Clerks' Correspondence

a. The request for some method of traffic calming on the main road into Port Isaac has been added to the County Council list of schemes for consideration. An engineer is to consult the Headmistress about a crossing near the school, but no parish councillor was invited. Mark Provis said a letter should now be written to the Highway Authority, with a copy to Harvey Lander, asking directly what kind of crossing we can have.

**b.** St. Kew Parish Council has passed all the papers concerning the Pendoggett - Port Gaverne Valley footpath to the Wadebridge Ramblers' Association. They added that more effective action might have been taken if St. Endellion Parish Council had sent someone to the original meeting.

c. A letter from Paul Tyler MP said that the chances had been considerably widened for people to make representation about the proposed new school hours at Sir James Smith School, Camelford.

**d.** Notice was received that planning permission had been granted for a link between 'Morwenna' in Fore Street and the adjacent building.

e. Notice was received of a hearing, at Launceston on 8th. June, concerning the Parish Council's 1992 appeal against the business rate on Port Gaverne toilets. The chairman and, if possible the Hon. Treasurer, will attend. f. Correspondence from Mr. Melhuish of Trelights was considered, about the parking problem outside Trelights Farmhouse, during Music Festivals or when canoe parties are staying there, also about the bad condition of Trewithick Hill. These items will be raised next month when it is hoped Cllr. Dawe will be able to say if he is already dealing with them.

g. It was decided to ask St. Minver Highlands Parish Council whether they would appreciate support in deciding the issue of allowing Polzeath Surf Life Saving Club to retain their Portakabin on the beach.

#### **Planning Applications**

Lifting of Condition 4 on Trewetha Farm, David Phelps. David declared an interest and left the room. The Council voted in favour of supporting the application.

Erection of a lounge extension at 4 Furze Park, Trelights, Mr and Mrs H. G. Haynes. Mr Barriball pointed out that it was only about a ten foot extension and the Council supported the application.

Erection of detached garage at Carn Awn, Port Gaverne, for Mr. E. J. May. Eric Stokes said that any extra buildings at Port Gaverne were undesirable, nevertheless the Council supported the application.

Permission to demolish 3m of garden wall at Higher Barn, Rose Hill, Mrs. A. Yorke. The Council said it was a shame that all the old stone walls are going and the application was unanimously opposed.

The public were then asked to leave while the Council considered tenders.

#### Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 14th. June at 7.30pm, in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Dear Trio, May we, the undersigned, take Charlie David to task on his letter re seats on the Coastal Path?

Seats are a very tangible reminder of where a loved one has rested, and enjoyed the view. Donated seats are invariably of a higher quality than the concrete ones, and a small 4" x 2" plaque does not detract from their appearance (note the two new ones on the Platt). They are greatly appreciated by us because they obviate the need to use ratepayers' money to replace broken seats.

'Reinstate Cornish hedges,' he says. The average donation of £200 would be sufficient for about 2 metres! (with plaque). Imagine 2,000 plaques from here to Port Quin! Now that would be a Memorial Trail! Finally, of all the 38 seats in St. Endellion Parish, not one is galvanised steel and wood, and we can only hope that Charlie David's ill-conceived letter does not deter future donors giving memorial seats.

Later that day a windsurfer was reported in difficulties at Daymer bay. The boat launched but was recalled when the surfer was picked up by another vessel.

As many of you will have seen, the lifeboat has now been re-housed in the building that used to be the garage of the Slipway Hotel. Apart from the operational benefits of the new location, it is very satisfying to be in the building originally built by the R.N.L.I. to house the 'Ernest Dresden', Port Isaac's 4th. lifeboat. The station closed in 1933, exactly 60 years ago. The boat was installed by the crew during the first week in May. Although it may look a bit rough and ready at the moment, the facilities are already miles better for the crew than at the old boathouse and launching will be much easier. The crew and committee are pleased with and proud of the new boathouse as we are sure the rest of the village will be. Next winter it will be completely re-furbished (plans are available for inspection in the new boathouse) to include a crew room and permanent souvenir sales area for band nights and appropriate occasions.
