Many people depend on the Voluntary Hospital Car Service to get them to and from appointments for hospital treatment. Due to a lack of drivers, however, the organisation is now experiencing great difficulty - and the load is falling on ever fewer volunteers. It is an invaluable service, available to any one without, or unable to use, their own transport, and if it disappears these people will experience problems because ambulances are not available for this kind of thing and buses are few and far between.

### There is a real need for more drivers.

If the Service is not to collapse, we must first have more drivers and someone else, who need not necessarily be a Parish Councillor, to run the administration. ### HOW TRIO WAS BORN

People sometimes ask if Trio was born because of the 'Delabole Slate'. Actually it was earlier, inspired by a visit to Crantock which had a Community Newsletter. The idea was put to the Village Hall Committee who approved it, but did not have the money. Robin therefore produced and paid for the first issue, the money being refunded by Cornwall Community Council afterwards. A few months later Mrs. Gwen Billing won a competition for the name with Trio' which won the Village Hall Committee's backing.

The 'Delabole Slate' arrived over a year later and Robin helped the Committee in Delabole with the general layout, and duplicated one issue. Trio has now reached issue no. 126 and the 'Slate' issue no. 115.

The Village Hall Committee later decided that they did not have time to be involved so, since then, it has been published by Robin, with myself in charge of raising revenue from advertising and sales.

A copy of the yearly accounts (originally audited by George Moth and now by Gordon Dovey) is sent to the Parish Council from whom we receive a donation. The 15p price does not all go to Trio. Newsagents who sell 100 or more copies receive 7p per copy, those selling less receive 5p per copy.

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### PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 13th. September. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

David Bolton, Chairman, said he thought congratulations were in order for the Port Isaac Ladies' gig team who had come third in the county finals behind Newquay and Fowey, both much larger places.

The Clerk, Barbara Willmott, asked for an amendment to the July minutes including an omitted item to donate £100 to Trio.

Mr. Barriball reported that he had seen Mr. Melhuish in Trelights who was happy to hear that Highways would do the necessary work in Marshall's Way.

#### Public Discussion

Mrs. Mewton complained about the growth of weeds creating bad visibility at Coldstanton Corner and Port Isaac turn at the top of Poltreworgey Hill.

Peggy Richards spoke about the need for grass cutting in Trewetha Lane and the state of some fields and hedges, and a particular gate, adjacent to it near the entrance to the village. She also announced Neighbourhood Watch and Crimestoppers telephone numbers. (See article.)

Olive Strout agreed about the state of some hedges and added that those in Back Lane badly needed trimming. She also mentioned a trench that had been dug by the pump in Middle Street where a dip in the road had been left.

Robin Penna said was it not the case that, since government introduction of 'privatisation' and 'accountability', the County Highways Department no longer had their own teams of road workers who formerly would have seen to hedges and minor repairs.

#### **Finance**

With the precept due this month, only £500 needs to be transferred from the high-interest account to cover present and forthcoming expenditure.

A donation of £40 was made to the British Legion, and £20 to the Samaritans.

### **Exposed British Telecom Cables**

Cables along the surface since works were carried out in Port Gaverne Hill many years ago had been pulled out and exposed and John Sweett had been instructed to 'peg them back' as a temporary measure. British Telecom have said the cables will be put underground as soon as all the necessary official steps have been taken.

### St. Breward Band

Mark Provis thought a letter of appreciation should be sent to the band who do such a good job in spite of bad weather and other difficulties, and bring so many people into the village. Eric Stokes echoed this and proposed a donation of £50 to be made.

### Village Walls

Eric Stokes said that many old walls were being knocked down and urged that action be taken to have those reinstated that were knocked down without planning permission. The Planning Department will be consulted about this.

#### Highway Verges

David Phelps raised the question of an alleged culvert under the road at Shortlane End, said he thought that there never had been one, and that in any case it would be better to leave the newly laid road as it is rather than dig it up again. He agreed that the field near the village entrance was a disgrace and suggested that a letter be sent to the land agents. He had cut the verges at Trewetha for the last few years but warned that he was finding it increasingly difficult to find the time to do this and if he was unable to do the work they would soon get in a very bad condition. He felt that County Highways should take this work on.

### Reports of Committees

- 1. Village Hall: David Bolton announced a meeting to be held.
- 2. Seats: David Phelps said the seat by the telephone box in Trewetha Lane was broken and that another black plastic seat was needed in the playing fields. A letter from Robin Penna said he had met Ralph Tucker who was sure his mother, Eve Tucker, would be prepared to pay for repairs to the 'Tommy Tucker' seat on the Platt. Eric Stokes reported that this seat was, however, beyond repair and a new one was needed. David Phelps will try and contact Ralph Tucker about this.
- 3. Chippings and Tarmac: Mark Provis pointed out that all the streets in the bottom of the village were to be re-surfaced and said the pool in front of the Co-op was to be dealt with. He said he thought the 'patching' of the pavements in Mayfield Road was totally ridiculous as large lumps of asphalt had been left behind. A stopcock on the steps between Silvershell View and Mayfield Road had been left without its cover and was a potential danger to children.
- 4. Trees: David Phelps, Tree Warden, announced a plan which would provide up to £500 worth of trees and allow a copse to be planted inside the gates at the playing fields, plus some trees beyond the telephone kiosk in Trewetha Lane.

Eric Stokes asked why there was once again no report from the District Councillor, Bill Dawe, who rarely attended Parish Council meetings. Had he resigned or not after his statement to that effect on BBC Radio Cornwall? David Bolton said that no written statement had been received. Henry Symons pointed out that it was often impossible for the District Councillor to attend as there were usually important 'district' meetings on Monday evenings.

### Pedestrian Crossing, Trewetha Lane

A letter from County Council announced plans for a crossing during school hours with flashing amber lights operated by the school, subject to their agreement, but no provision for out-of-school hours as the site does not meet the necessary criteria. A traffic-calming 'gateway' scheme with roads narrowed by pavements to make drivers realise they are entering an urban area might be possible. Mark Provis said he was glad to see that they are getting somewhere and that to get action after only four months was probably due to the hammering they were giving the County Council. He queried criteria which recognised the need for a crossing during school hours but which apparently were different when it came to a full-time crossing. Henry Symons thought it would be better to hold fire until it was known whether the school would agree to operate the crossing. He doubted that the road would be wide enough to incorporate a 'gateway' scheme. David Phelps wanted to know more about the scheme and urged that the matter be kept on the hoil.

### Work Party to Clear the Main

The North Cornwall Heritage Coast and Countryside Service are happy to co-operate with clearing undergrowth from the Main and will organise a working party there on Sunday 19th. September from 10.00am until the work is finished. Volunteers will be welcomed. Members of the Parish Council will get there as early as possible to make sure the work is carried out as required.

### Footpath Committee

David Phelps read out a letter from Robin Penna suggesting that a Parish Council committee be formed to report on the state of footpaths. David agreed that the idea was 90% right but that footpath problems should be dealt with by the Council itself, not a committee. Henry Symons felt that it would eventually be necessary to employ someone to do the work and that the Parish Council might have to act as an agency of the County Council and take on contracts, etc. when the paths would come under closer scrutiny. He felt that the County Council were not assisting in the matter by charging landowners extortionate sums of money to make slight changes to improve existing paths. David Phelps asked that Mr. Drover, County Footpath Officer, be asked to walk some of the paths with Councillors.

The Clerk announced that the 'Parish Path Partnership' scheme would proceed as soon as a Parish Footpath Officer was appointed.

### Hospital Car Service

Eric Stokes announced that his task of organising the service was getting increasingly difficult, with drivers refusing to take patients on long journeys, etc. He was involved in doing all the running of the service and would like to resign. He said he could do no more, and the service was collapsing as, apart from six good ones, there were too few drivers. Mr. Barriball said that people who were on the list should make themselves available when needed. David Phelps said that he felt he should be helping, but couldn't possibly do so, and urged Eric Stokes to hold on for one more month while an urgent appeal for more drivers was made through Trio.

### CORRESPONDENCE

1. A letter from a holiday maker, complaining about Port Isaac's dirty beach and comparing it

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with Trevone where the sand is raked all the time, will be passed on to the Port Isaac Harbour Commissioners.

- 2. A crime prevention organisation 'Security by Former Police Officers' offers foot patrol officers for individual communities. It was thought Port Isaac would not be able to afford this but the letter is to be kept on file. David Phelps said, touch wood, our problems of recent times have not been too bad.
- 3. The St. Endellion Parochial Church Council are to discuss the idea of a chain across the lay-by in front of the church.
- 4. Mr. Drover had written to say that cattle 'poaching' the footpath in Port Gaverne Valley was the same problem as on many low-lying paths which were in a similar condition owing to the inclement weather. The Highway Authority had some responsibility to maintain such paths but had no money to do the work.
- 5. A letter from Malcolm Lee, Hon. Secretary of Port Isaac and District Tourism Association, expressed surprise that there had been complaints the sign did not contain wording warning people the path was unsuitable for pushchairs and wheelchairs as it had been stolen one day after it was put up and had therefore only been there for one day. A sign to be erected by the Council near the old vicarage will be discussed at the next meeting.
- 6. A letter from Councillor Dawe's solicitors was read out containing allegations of wrong practices on the part of the Parish Council in connection with 'an outdoor musical event'. In view of these allegations, legal advice is to be sought and the matter put on the agenda for the next meeting.

### **PLANNING**

An outline application by Mr. J. Chapman, for residential development next to the doctors' surgery contained too little information about the density of the proposed development but Henry Symons pointed out that this would be dealt with at the next stage and that this area had been subject to development for many, many years. David Phelps said that the developer will go ahead whatever the Parish Council says but should be seen to be trying to stop it. Eric Stokes said Hillson Close is a ghastly approach to the village. Also, there is a large field attached to the proposed site. It was 'the thin end of the wedge' - there could be 40 more houses built. The village is already becoming filled with people not from Port Isaac, Final observations were: 'Too soon after the last development and detrimental to the environment'.

No observations were made regarding a planning matter concerning the type of glass used in a kitchen extension by Jack Rowe.

### **Next Meeting**

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 11th. October at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Room, Trelights.

The twin-engined dory was found, with engine failure, and towed back to Port Gaverne. Crew – Andy Walton, Phil Aldridge, and Richard Hambly.

Wednesday 1st. September: to search for people reported to have been cut off by the tide in a cave at Bossinney but nothing found.

Saturday 4th. September: at the request of the Police, to search for a missing person between Tintagel and Boscastle. The body of a Bodinin man was found in the water at the foot of the cliff below the look out, it was recovered and landed at Port Isaac. Crew—Richard Hambly, Phil Aldridge, and Andy Walton.

Thursday 9th. September: to a windsurfer in trouble off Greenaway but recalled in ten minutes when he got ashore unaided. Crew — Andy Walton, Phil Aldridge, and Chris Scott.

The Station has been supplied with a Honda ATV vehicle for recovering the Lifeboat.

A Motorola Keynote Pager has been lost between Doctor's Meadow, Margaret's Lane, and the Lifeboat House. A reward is offered to the finder. Contact me on 880383.

### FOOTPATHS & CATTLE

We heard at last month's Parish Council meeting that it was thought that damage to a footpath by cattle, apparently called 'poaching', could be considered a 'natural result of farming activities'.

A similar problem arose with the pigs being kept on the footpath in Port Isaac valley. In correspondence with the Department of the Environment on the matter, I complained that while farmers were not allowed to plough footpaths, they could, apparently, allow animals to have a similar damaging effect on a path.

In a reply, Mrs. Virginia Bottomley wrote that, "Whilst it is not an offence to keep livestock. with the exception of bulls, in fields crossed by public rights of way, farmers should not conduct their operation without regard to the existence of the right of way, nor in a manner which effectively prevents the public from exercising those rights. The highway authority for the area have a duty, under section 130 of the Highways Act 1980, to assert and protect the rights of the public to use and enjoy rights of way. Furthermore, interference with the public's enjoyment of a right of way may constitute a nuisance at common law, for which an injunction may be sought, or the offender may be prosecuted and sued for damages.'


