PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Chapel Room, Trelights, on Monday 11th. October. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Apologies for absence were received from Cllr, Bill Dawe.

Public Discussion

Mr. Adams pointed out that the tree planting in Coronation Park, Trelights, could not go ahead until the drainage problem was solved. Peter Lobb felt that an uncovered drain in the park was dangerous for children. Mrs. Brown said that the trees stopped the park from drying out. David Bolton reminded us that the park was once a pond.

Finance

The £3,000 precept from North Cornwall District Council allowed £2,000 to be paid into the Parish Councils' high interest account in spite of fairly heavy expenditure for the month.

A decision on whether to pay a donation to Special Olympics South West was deferred until more information was available.

A donation of £50 will be made towards the cost of this year's fireworks display on Port Gaverne beach.

School Governor

Henry Symons proposed that Bill Norris should continue as MLA Representative on the Primary School Board of Governors, and felt that, as the school was currently being made responsible for its own finances for the first time, it was important to maintain continuity. Bill Norris was happy to accept although he had expected that someone else would have taken his place.

Trees in Coronation Park

David Phelps, the Parish Council Tree Warden, spoke bitterly of a tree being felled at Coronation Park in error because a low estimate contract had been accepted, tendered by a person who was not fully qualified. The work should have been done by a tree surgeon even if it had cost more. An apology to Trelights should be minuted. Eric Stokes felt that the person who made the error should apologise. Mr. Barriball interceded by saying the full facts of the matter were well known to the village and the Parish Council need discuss the matter no further but that any complaints should be addressed to the Village Green Committee.

Eric Stokes said that the easiest way to solve the drainage problem would be to lay four metres of perforated pipe underground which could then run into the drain where the water would run away quickly and easily. Henry Symons said that perforated pipes would be full of tree roots within one year. He also said that whereas trees may rob an area of sunlight, rather than stop it from drying out, they actually tend to drain it. He felt, however, that the responsibility lay with adjoining landowners. A decision to write to the adjoining two landowners, asking them to suggest solutions to the problem, was deferred until next month.

Legal Information Regarding Letter from Cllr. Dawe

Acknowledgement of the Parish Council's request for legal advice had been received. Eric Stokes said that all Mr. Dawe wanted was an apology but Chairman, David Bolton said it would be folly to do anything until proper legal advice had been received.

Crossing at Trewetha Lane

A copy of a letter to the traffic authority from Mrs. Scown, Port Isaac Primary School, was read out in which she said that no member of staff would be prepared to operate a flashing amber light crossing where it was necessary to leave a party of children on one side of the road and cross over to operate the lights from the other side. Mark Provis congratulated Mrs. Scown for sticking out for something better than was being offered and urged the Council to push on for something that would be in operation for seven days a week not just during school hours.

Committee Reports

Seats: David Phelps reported that a new seat is needed to go alongside the telephone kiosk near Mayfield. The seat will also require a concrete plinth. This was agreed.

Tarmac and Chippings: Mark Provis expressed disappointment that there was still a great pool of water in front of the Co-op. he also reported on the debris being brought down Church hill when there is heavy rain. He was also asked to point out that the manhole cover was still missing from the water appliance between Mayfield Road and Silvershell View.

Hospital Car Service: Eric Stokes said that there had been some response to the item in Trio and that he now had a few new drivers. David Bolton inquired whether it was necessary for Eric Stokes to act as a 'pivot' but Eric replied that he was happy to continue for the present although he thought some way was needed to let people have details of which drivers were available at any time, apart from the notices in the surgery and on Parish Council notice boards.

School: Bill Norris reported that everybody was happy with the renovations and the new playground layout.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

a. The verge at Trewetha will be added to the grass-cutting schedule for the village. David Phelps was thanked for the work he had done.

- b. The owner of fields in Trewetha Lane has agreed to make the fences stockproof and to provide a new gate.
- c. An acknowledgement of the Parish Council's letter asking for reinstatement of old walls that were knocked down without permission, was received from the Planning Department.
- d. A letter from the Latvian representative to say she was sorry no contact had been received from the Kolka Parish Council but that she would keep in touch.
- e. Notification that David Blake is not to proceed with proposed Golf Lodges or Water Treatment Plant.
- f. A letter from a holidaymaker describing Port Isaac as her idea of heaven but finding the Spar sign ugly and the array of lights around Old School Hotel too commercial.
- g. Advance notice from North Cornwall District Council that Parish Councils may in future be responsible for the upkeep and the costs of running their public toilets. This will be discussed at next month's meeting.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

- a. Erection of a replacement telephone kiosk at Trewetha Lane. The need for a more modern type of kiosk was questioned but the application was supported.
- b. Formation of four pedestrian accesses at 18, 19, 23, and 24, Trewetha Lane. A letter from Melanie Dingle pointed out the lack of privacy caused by the present communal path running directly past people's windows. She also thought the paths would give easier access to the grass bank on the road which could then be kept tidier. David Welton hoped that safety barriers would be installed to prevent children from running out into the road. David Phelps deplored the need to make holes in the old wall, counter to Parish Council policy, and said that it should only be necessary to move the communal path away from the windows. Mark Provis spoke from his own experience of living in the houses and said that he thought everybody had a right to their own private access. The application was supported.
- c. Change of use from Doctors' Surgery to Dwelling, previously commenced without planning permission. No observations were made but Mark Provis pointed out that it

d. A letter from Janet Townsend, who had objected to proposals to develop land at the junction of Rose Hill and Trewetha Lane, to advise the Parish Council that the application had been turned down by the Planning Department.


