PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 10th. January. For authoritative information, please see Parish Council minutes.

Finance

To cover the month's expenditure, £1,000 is to be transferred from the high-interest deposit account to the current account. It was also decided to purchase a copy of the Lees Report on North Cornwall's Planning Procedures.

David Welton, Hon. Treasurer, in considering next year's expenditure, announced that plans to make parish councils pay for public toilets have been dropped so it should now be possible to keep to the same precept, $\pounds7,500$, as this year. There is still about $\pounds3,500$ on the high-interest account but much of this is being held for use in purchasing the graveyard at St. Endellion. The electricity pole and water services have now been removed from the site and it is just a matter of waiting until the District Valuer decides the price.

Reports of Committees

a. Seats: David Phelps asked for tenders to be obtained for the concrete base for a seat by the telephone box near Mayfield Road, and for a seat to be purchased.

b. Chippings and Tarmac: Mark Provis said that if the problem of the pool of water in the road near the Co-op wasn't solved soon, people would be sending in their laundry bills. A letter is to be sent to the Highways Dept. He also referred to the missing manhole cover between Mayfield Road and Silvershell and said that somebody could break their leg there. He asked when the bottom of Port Isaac was going to be re-surfaced – the 'cobbles' are all coming up.

c. **Project '2000':** David Phelps announced that a preliminary meeting had been held to discuss the possibility of building a new village hall. A committee will be formed of parish councillors and members from the existing village hall committee and a meeting held.

d. Village Hall: David Bolton said he had nothing to report.

e. Chairman: David Bolton introduced this 'committee' because otherwise he had no chance to make a report. He said there had been further rock falls onto the old quay at Port Gaverne, and was concerned that the present two warning signs do not serve to advise people approaching via the wooden footbridge. The signs are to be resited, one at each end of the affected section.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

1. A letter from Carol Richards stressing the importance of representatives from the Parish Council attending the Port Isaac Playing Fields Action Group public meeting on Tuesday 1st. February. There is £580 left in the account, some of which is Parish Council money, and some is public, and a decision has to be reached on what to do with it. Not all Parish Councillors would be able to attend and vote, so it was decided to send a letter, signed by each councillor, suggesting that the money could be held in trust by the Parish Council solely for purchasing new playground equipment and/or upkeep of the existing equipment.

2. Official information was received that some trees alleged to have been planted too near a stone wall are of a species not likely to grow very large.

3. A letter by Paul Tyler to British Telecom pointing out that Port Isaac was a very long way from Bodmin, even for Cornwall, and surely modern technology was supposed to bring improvements. To the Parish Council, he said

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he was hoping for a better result than hitherto but found the huge organisations often insensitive to local feeling.

4. Due to the huge demand it will not be possible to include St. Endellion Parish in the Footpaths Partnership scheme this year, but there is a possibility for next year.

5. Mr. Crawley of the Chatterbus had written and apologised for the long stay of his bus in the playing fields car park and seeming to take it for granted but he had not been aware of the existing agreement. He would like to continue using the car park and it was felt that in view of the fact that he had written to the Parish Council that this would now be in order.

6. Mr. Buse of North Cornwall District Council had written to say that due to the low price of waste paper, no further paper banks would be installed until the market improves. The aluminium can bank will be re-sited.

7. Thanks to the Parish Council for the support for Trelights Christmas Lights and to David Bolton for attending the switch-on were received from Peter Adams, Hon. Treasurer.

8. David Phelps said that it was bad luck that three weeks gales had played such havoc with the Christmas lights in Port Isaac. He said that thanks were due and he hoped that Eric was not disheartened. Eric Stokes replied that he would present a full report at the next meeting.

9. A copy of a letter from Mrs. Scown at Port Isaac school to the Highways Dept. expressed the fear of her staff that they would be responsible for a crossing that had originally been proposed by the Parish Council. Mark Provis said that the crossing offered by County Council was not good enough and that we must have something better. 'Summer is around the corner,' he said, 'and Easter is on the first of April. Send a history of events to Mr. Tyler.' This proposal was accepted.

10. David Phelps said that as there had been no reply to the Council's recent letter, from Macmillans, solicitors, a further lettershould be sent, recorded delivery, to the effect that 'as we have had no reply to our letter, can we consider the matter to be closed?' This is to be done.

PLANS

Mark Provis asked to be allowed to speak about Planning Decisions and said that the North Cornwall District Council takes no notice of Parish Council recommendations on planning applications and that the Ward Members now also have no vote on matters within their own Wards. 'Why do we waste time?' he asked, 'In spite of the Lees Report they are still disregarding Parish Councils'. Bill Norris proposed that a letter should be sent to say that the Parish Council is totally aghast at the situation. Henry Symons said that he wasn't sure that the District Council is obliged to send plans to Parish Councils. If the rules haven't been changed there is no point in registering a protest. Eric Stokes complained that the matter being discussed was not on the agenda, and it was therefore referred to the next meeting.

1. Conservation area consent to remove timber structure from roof of store, and change of use of shop to flat, Stanley House, Fore Street, for Gold Chevron Ltd. The Parish Council voted to support this application.

2. Retention of alterations and extensions to existing dwelling to form enlarged dwelling unit previously carried out without planning permission together with the erection of a porch and garage, Maylands, Port Gaverne, for Mr. J. Round. Two letters from residents of adjacent properties were read out detailing the shabby history behind this application, pointing out that the applicant was a tax-exile living in America who was apparently determined to take

advantage of weaknesses in the planning procedures. The original building had been derelict and the work carried out so far had been done illegally, and asking how the Authority could even consider an application to enlarge the offending building which was an eyesore in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and which, if the applicant had not thrown away official enforcement notices, was supposed to have been demolished. The Council voted to voice total opposition to the application on the grounds covered in the letters.

3. Listed Building consent and plans for the erection of rear 1st floor extension to provide additional seating area to restaurant, The Wheelhouse, Fore Street, for Mr. P. Hudson. The Parish Council was opposed to the plans, which they had turned down previously, in the interests of preserving the village character

4. Change of use of bungalow to three flats together with small extension, no 9 New Road (Locarno), for Venact Ltd. Although, as the Chairman put it, the bungalow with its balcony would look better on the outskirts of Calcutta, it was decided to support this application.

5. Amendments to conversion of agricultural building to residential (holiday unit) and construction of stone boundary wall and Listed Building consent, namely additional window to first floor south-west elevation to serve landing, at Roscarrock, for Mr. R. A Sloman. David Phelps said that the application had already gone through and this was just an amendment. The Council voted to support the application.

The press and public were then excluded from the meeting for the following item of business on the grounds that it involved the likely disclosure of 'exempt information' (Local Government Act 1972):

Tenders received for the redecoration of Port Gaverne toilets.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 14th. February at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

PROJECT '2000'

David Phelps had reported at December's Parish Council meeting his belief that many people in the village would like a new community hall. The present Village Hall is not suitable for some functions as it has no parking faoilities and is not adapted for use by the disabled. He proposed a scheme to be known as 'Project 2000' and to form a committee to investigate the possibility of building a new hall somewhere near the playing fields or by the doctors' surgery. He said the present hall could be sold to fund the project and that grants are available. The steering committee comprises David Phelps, David Welton, Mark Provis, and Eric Stokes and a meeting has been held with an official from Comwall Rural Community Council and members of the village hall management committee.

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FIRST AND LAST

A surprisingly large number of people assembled at a 'site meeting' in the old building known as 'First and Last' at the junction of Rose Hill and Trewetha Lane. The new owner was claiming that the building was unsafe and wanted to re-build it as a dwelling. Realising that such a scheme is unlikely to produce a building of the same character, local people had attended to voice their disquiet at the danger of this piece of Port Isaac's history being demolished. One or two workmen with experience of other old buildings in the village were sure this one would stand for a lot longer yet. It only needed the removal of poor attempts at re-inforcement and the roof slates relaying. The owner claimed to have deeds describing the building as a cottage and Bill Steer said there was originally a room for a lad above a stable but the floor collapsed and the stable part on Rose Hill was filled in. It was last occupied around 1905. The Planning Officer in atten-dance said it was currently classified as a garage. After considering the matter carefully, the site committee decided to recommend the application for refusal and we have since heard that the full Planning Committee of the District Council has also turned the application down.

Much excitement was caused by proposals to alter the appearance of 'First and Last'. Will as much excitement be caused now by proposed alterations in the centre of the village?

TAKE A BREAK
