# P.I.P.F.A.G.'S

The first meeting of the Port Isaac Playing Field Action Group took place on 29th. May 1990. The reason for formation of the Group was to better equip the Village Playing Field. With the help of grants, donations and lots of fund-raising, the first piece of equipment was installed for use in October 1990. A total of £4,500 has been spent to date on the Playing Field, and when the Action Group decided to disband, it was thought that a public meeting should be held to discuss what should happen to the £518.62 remaining in the account. This meeting was held on Tuesday 1st. February, chaired by Carol Richards, who gave a short account, to the members of the public who had braved the weather to attend. Three suggestions for the use of the money were put forward:

- 1. A letter from the Parish Council suggesting the money be left in their trust for the replacement, maintenance, and possible provision of new equipment for the Playing Field.
- 2. Used for 'Project 2000'.
- 3. Given to the school for the purchase of equipment for the school.

After a short discussion it was decided that as the money had been raised by the community as a whole, for the Playing Field, it should be used accordingly, and remain in an account held by the Parish Council for use within the Playing Field.

The original Committee has now disbanded, but there is no reason why a new group can't be formed and raise some money for new swings, for that is what seems uppermost in everyone's thoughts.

## PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 14th. February. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

There were several members of the public present but no points were raised for public discussion.

#### Finance

Expenditure for the month exceeded the £324 in the current account, so £500 is to be transferred from the £3,545 in the high interest account.

A cheque for £518.89 had been received from P.I.P.F.A.G. to be held in trust on a high interest account and used for new playground equipment or maintenance of the existing equipment. The possibility of providing a netball practice post will be discussed next month.

#### Parish Paths Partnership

Having failed to join the scheme this year, the application for next year will be sent in straight away.

#### Local Plan Consultation Meeting

David Bolton, David Phelps, and Mark Provis will attend a meeting for local councillors to be held in Wadebridge on Thursday 17th. March, the day after the public meeting.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

Paul Tyler MP is to be invited to speak at the meeting which this year will be held on Thursday 21st. March in the Church Rooms. Council and District Councillors, representatives of Police, County Council Highways Department, South West Water, plus the Dog Warden, and Betty Doney (footpaths officer) will also be invited. Cllr. Bill Dawe asked for the issue of an Article IV Order for Port Isaac to be raised.

### **Port Gaverne Toilets**

Tenders are being advertised for, for the operation and cleaning of the toilets from 31st. March to 30th. September.

#### Coldstanton Corner

David Phelps reported that two cars had gone over the edge and that 'Highways' should be asked to either reduce the severity of the corner or provide a crash barrier. He said there will be a bad accident there. The Highways Department will be asked to look at the problem.

# Signs at Port Isaac Turn (B3314)

David Phelps said the conglomeration of small signs should be replaced with larger single signs where 'Poltreworgey' was removed and 'Trewetha' added. 'Highways' will be asked to do this.

## Port Isaac Illuminations

Eric Stokes reported that vandalism and the weather combined had caused many losses and other problems for the Christmas Lights. The Playgroup train display had blown across the road with the danger that a claim for damage might have been made against him. As he would not be in a position to pay such a claim, he asked the Parish Council to act as an 'umbrella' for the lights and so be able to insure them. Cllr. Bill Dawe said the scheme should be

supported in any way possible. The Council are going to look into the possibility of adding both the Port Isaac and Trelights Christmas illuminations to their existing insurance schemes.

#### St. Endellion Graveyard

The agents acting on behalf of the Parish Council will proceed with the transfer of the piece of land, to provide an extension to the churchyard, providing all parties are still in agreement with the valuation and conditions of sale drawn up in 1991 but shelved pending the resiting of an electricity pole - now completed. There will be a meeting attended by a member of the Parish Council, the Parochial Church Council, and the tenant. Bill Norris expressed fears that meeting the stringent fencing requirements could well cost more than the land but, as the Council was committed to the purchase, the costs would have to be met somehow when the time came. This could easily be a year or more hence as the land was not immediately required by the church.

#### Reports of Committees

District Council: Cllr. Bill Dawe repeated his request for an Article IV Order on Port Isaac village. He went on to point out that there was to be a site meeting of all interested parties at 'Maylands' Port Gaverne. David Phelps urged all Councillors to attend the site meeting because if the owner were to get away with the things he had done in defiance of planning regulations, it would clear the way for anybody else to do the same.

Tarmac and Chippings: Mark Provis was glad to see that the new entrances at Trewetha Lane council houses were under way. The bottom of the village, however, was a terrific mess and in a disgusting state, and he hoped that the re-surfacing work would not be carried out during the Easter two-week holiday period.

School: Bill Norris complained that a reply to a Parish Council letter had been sent to the headmistress and caused some ill-feeling with the Education Department. Mark Provis said the Council should write to the Education Office and take the buck. This will be discussed next month.

Seats: David Phelps said that a new black seat had arrived but was being kept in a barn at Trewetha until the weather improved. Eric Stokes said that the two seats on the Platt were to be removed, given a coat of preservative, and kept in store for the winter.

Council for Parish and Town Councils: Henry Symons said there was to be a special meeting of C.A.P.T.C. to discuss the plans for proposed changes in local government. The new authorities would be installed in 1997.

#### **CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE**

a. Good news was received that due to an increase in the Revenue Support Grant, North Comwall District Council are now able to continue with the maintenance of the public toilets.

b. A letter from Malcolm Price, Planning Officer, explained that if the Parish Council raised an objection to a plan then that plan could not be considered for 'delegation'.

- c. A letter from Mrs. Rander, Cornwall County Council, said that previous owners of Burrow Park Farm could only think of one couple, a Mr. and Mrs. Spry, who had walked the path through the farmyard with any regularity so that it would be necessary to find other people who could validly claim they had used the path before it could be included on the Definitive Map. It was felt that this would be a hopeless task and that footpath 32 might as well be considered as extinguished.
- d. A further meeting had been held to discuss the flooding at Coronation Park, Trelights, and a further approach was to be made to Mr. Harris, neighbouring land-owner. As Mr. Barriball was not present he was not able to report to the Parish Council on this meeting.
- e. A letter from Cllr Dawe's solicitors, involved with allegations against the Parish Council relating to the manner in which it was purported to have discussed a 'rave' party in the parish, indicated that the matter was now closed. Cllr. Bill Dawe said that he wanted an apology from the Parish Council for being called a liar. Mark Provis said that he had visited the solicitors who had backed up everything Cllr. Dawe had said. Cllr. Dawe then said, 'Lies is no good; Truth will stand'. Henry Symons pointed out that since the solicitors had made the allegations against the Parish Council then it was Cllr. Dawe who ought to apologise. Cllr. Dawe said if anyone goes to the solicitor they will hear the same if they hear different, then I'll apologise'. David Phelps proposed that the matter should be closed and this was accepted.
- f. A letter from Paul Tyler M.P. to say he had been informed by British Telecom that, at this late stage when 'all number dialling' was soon to be introduced, it would cause even more confusion if names of small exchanges were put back in the Phone Book. The next edition would show all numbers with their national dialling codes.
- g. The Royal Association for the Prevention of Accidents (ROSPA) are offering to examine playground equipment and issue certificates of safety standards acceptable to insurance companies. It was decided to accept the offer of an inspection which would cost £37.50 plus VAT.
- h. A letter from the Planning Department said that, after a site meeting, it was

decided that listed building consent would no longer be necessary for the new dormer windows on Castle Cottage, Rose Hill.

i. Information from C.A.P.T.C. about the inclusion of Cornwall in the Rural Development Area which meant extra help for village halls, etc. David Phelps is looking at this 'They've got money', he said.

j. On the 8th March and 19th May, there are to be seminars of the Local Members Steering Group where there will be an opportunity to talk to County Councillors. These will be advertised on Parish Council notice boards

k. On behalf of the Playing Field Committee, David Phelps is to attend a meeting of the Comwall Playing Field Association at Probus on 25th. March.

I. C.A.P.T.C. are inviting nominations from Parish Council chairmen for the four tickets they have for the Royal Garden Party in July but David Bolton would be unable to attend, so no nomination was made.

#### **PLANS**

a. Continued use of dairy for the manufacture of ice cream, previously undertaken without consent, Glebe Farm, St. Endellion, Mr. R. H. and L. M. Carey: Henry Symons questioned the need for planning consent. The building and a cream making plant were already there, how did ice cream differ? The application was accepted.

b. Plans for a dwelling at 17 Trewetha Lane. Eric Stokes said he would oppose the plan for yet another building but, as the rest of the Council had previously accepted plans for three other buildings within 100 yards they could not oppose this one. It was suggested that the development should be restricted to a bungalow type dwelling but Mark Provis said that a bungalow was hardly in keeping in an area covered by a conservation order. David Phelps said this was absolutely right. The application finally received 'support' but recommended for a cottage type dwelling only.
