PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meetings held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 28th. February, and at the Chapel Room, Trelights, on Monday 14th. March. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

MONDAY 28TH. FEBRUARY

Purchasing of Glebe Land

It was suggested that, since there appeared to be no immediate need to extend St. Endellion graveyard, it would be a good idea to purchase the land, as soon as the price was known, simply stake out the boundary, and allow the tenant to continue to use it for a 364-day peppercorn rent. This would defer the cost of fencing, etc. until a later date.

Local Government Review

Of the four options:

- 1. single unitary authority for the whole of Cornwall
- 2. two unitary authorities Penwith/Kerrier/Carrick and Restormel/North Cornwall/Caradon
- 3. three unitary authorities Penwith/Kerrier Carrick/Restormel and Caradon/North Cornwall
- 4. status quo to remain

the Parish Council voted in favour of 4.

Planning Applications

a. Provision of replacement Telephone Kiosk at Trelights, by B.T. The Parish Council felt the present kiosk to be o.k. and were against the application.

b. Erection of two cottage style Dwellings, Trelights, W. J. Dawe. The Parish Council were in opposition to this application but would support single-storey dwellings.

c. An application to enclose the porch of one of the pair of new houses at St. Illicks received support.

d. An application for alterations to internal arrangements at 9 New Road received support.

MONDAY 14TH. MARCH

Four members of the public were present but no matters were raised during the 'Public Discussion'.

Donation for St. Endellion Churchyard

It was decided by a majority of one to keep the donation the same as last year $- \pounds 425$.

Trust Account for Playing Fields Fund

The money from the former Port Isaac Playing Field Action Group will be kept in a special account with the Woolwich Building Society. Cheque signatories will be members of the Parish Council Playing Field Committee: David Bolton (chairman), and Mark Provis.

Footpath Tenders

The Clerk, Mrs. Willmott, was asked to put up the notices asking for tenders for cutting the footpaths this year.

Mrs. Watson of the Mill had reported that, among others, the postman experienced difficulty getting through the path to the Mill in the period just before it was cut and had asked if the cutting could be done earlier. The Parish Council are not, however, allowed to cut the paths before 9th. June, in the interests of preserving birds nests and wild flowers, but this path will be cut twice during the year.

Trewetha Lane Crossing

A copy of a letter from Cornwall County Council to MP Paul Tyler, outlining the action taken so far, was read out. Mention was also made that a 'gateway' scheme and extension of the 30m.p.h. restriction were being considered.

In his letter, Paul Tyler said that he was disappointed that Cornwall County Council had not been more forthcoming but at least they were taking the matter seriously.

David Phelps said he thought that they were still playing the school against the Parish Council.

Bill Norris said that the staff of the school, with their unions, were unhappy about the deployment of teachers in a difficult role and that the County Council were not responding to their worries.

Mark Provis wanted a letter written to Paul Tyler explaining the position that was being created and that if there was an accident the County Council could say they had offered something but it had not been taken up.

Henry Symons felt no further action should be taken until the feelings of the school were known.

Annual Parish Meeting

Apart from Councy Councillor Harvey Lander, District Councillor Bill Dawe, and a representative of the Police, County Official Mr. Brian Stringer will be at the meeting to talk to us about footpaths, on Thursday 21st. April.

We have since been informed that the full list of speakers will be: Cllr. Lander, Representatives from the Police, Mr. James King of South West water Authority, Mr. R. Downing the Dog Warden, Councillor J. Lugg, and District Councillor W. Dawe.

Committee Reports

a. District Councillor: Bill Dawe reported that the owner of Maylands had put in new plans with no flat roof and lowering the height by 2ft. David Phelps expressed disgust at the 'U turn' by the District Planning Committee. Bill Dawe said the recommendation came from the Department of the Environment and was not a 'U turn' by the Planning Committee, at which Mr. Phelps apologised and said that he was not criticising Mr. Dawe.

Bill Dawe then reported on the total destruction by vandals of the toilets at Roscarrock Hill and that, when repaired, they would have to be closed in the evenings and at night. David Phelps said that the culprits were not criminals – they were mentally sick. Mark Provis said the cost was estimated at nigh on £2,000 and went on to describe how local people had got together to raise £100 reward for information leading to a conviction.

b. Cornwall Association of Town and Country Parishes: Henry Symons spoke about what they had learned from a talk by a local Fire Officer and the need for carrying fire extinguishers in cars. The best type, unfortunately, was now banned on environmental grounds so it was best to ask the local fire brigade for advice on which kind to install. There had also been discussion about capping old mine shafts as there had been a number of incidents where animals had fallen down one, and a county survey was hoped for. He finally said that the Association was in a good position to give financial help with new village halls.

Mark Provis said that before a new village hall scheme was instigated, the feeling of the people of the village should be determined, and he asked whether the Parish Council would be prepared to finance a questionnaire – a public meeting would be a waste of time because no one ever turns up at them. This will be put on the agenda for next month.

c. Seats: David Phelps said the seat to go next to the telephone kiosk in Trewetha Lane had arrived and would be installed as soon as the weather got better and it was possible to prepare the base for it.

Bill Norris pointed out that the Parish Council bench seat at First and Last had been removed but as there were only a few weeks left before the lease expires it wasn't worth doing anything about it – the telephone pole at the same position has also been resited.

Public Toilets at the Playing Fields

Mark Provis pointed out that ours was one of few playing fields in Cornwall that had no toilets and perhaps the County Council could be asked to provide some.

David Bolton said it would be better if the toilets could be incorporated in the Project 2000 scheme for a new village hall.

David Phelps said that they would have to be vandal-proof and that, incidentally, the toilets at Roscarrock Hill should also be restored in vandal-proof form.

Bill Dawe was asked to suggest this at the District Council.

Up-Dating the Information Map

There had been a request to up-date some of the information on the map at the main car park but the Clerk has discovered that this was done only a couple of years ago so no action would be advisable at present.

Harbour Direction Signs

There are still no signs directing traffic to the harbour and the County Council are to be asked to provide some. The brown

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

a. Coldstanton Bend: The chevrons are considered quite adequate to warn motorists of the severity of the bend but Cornwall Highways are to arrange for a bend warning signs to be placed and 'slow' markings painted on the road.

Henry Symons asked if anyone knew who had requested bend signs either side of the bridge at the parish boundary in Vathan Lane, to his knowledge they had not been requested by St. Kew Parish. 'It seems that you get signs when you don't ask for them,' he said, 'but you don't get them when you do ask for them.'

b. Signs at Port Isaac Turn: Where the B3267 leaves the B3314, new direction signs will be installed to replace the existing assortment of signs.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

a: Alterations and extension to dwelling, no. 15 Tintagel Terrace. Mr. P. Chappa. The building in question is the former doctors' surgery where the applicant would like to replace the existing flat roof with a hipped one. This, the Parish Council feel, will be an improvement, and therefore supported the application.

b: To demolish existing shed and replace it with a conservatory, 73 Fore Street, Mr. Long. Bill Norris declared an interest as the development adjoined his property. The Parish Council supported the application.

The public and press were asked to leave at this point as the Parish Council were to discuss tenders.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 11th. September at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.


FRANK HERBERT




