On 5th. May the Lifeboat was launched to assist the local fishing vessel 'Bethany May' which was taking in water about one mile off Port Isaac. The Lifeboat stood by the vessel and escorted it back to the harbour. Crewmembers were Andy Wilson, Mark Provis and Jon Rowe.

The Service of Dedication of the new Lifeboat House will take place on Sunday 26th. June at 12.15pm. Station Chaplain, Revd. M. Bartlett will conduct the Service, and Group Captain Simon Coy, OBE, Commanding Officer, RAF St. Mawgan, will officially open the Lifeboat House. St. Breward Silver Band will play before and during the Service.

Everyone is welcome to attend this occasion which is also the 27th. Anniversary of the establishment of Port Isaac Inshore Lifeboat. Since 1967 the Lifeboat has been launched 414 times on service and rescued 213 persons.

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PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the Annual Meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 9th. May. For authoritative information, please see Parish Council minutes.

Apologies for absence were received from David Philp and Mark Provis

Election of Officers

The Chairman stood down but said he was prepared to serve another year if that was the wish of the Council. He left the room during the vote. The Clerk called for nominations and David Bolton was re-elected unanimously.

Henry Symons and Mark Provis were nominated for Vice Chairman. Bill Norris pointed out that Mark's attendance record was not good. A ballot showed 5 councillors in favour of Henry Symons and 4 for Mark Provis.

David Welton expressed willingness to continue as Treasurer and was unanimously re-elected.

The Playing Field and Seats Committees were re-elected en bloc.

Public Discussion

Elsie Ferguson asked for the monthly agendas to be displayed on the notice board near the Primary School.

Peggy Richards passed on comments made by acquaintances about the Annual Public Meeting – one of the best in the last three or four years but it was a pity that so few members of the public showed up. She said there had been difficulty hearing the speakers. Barbara Willmott replied that it wasn't worth the trouble of inviting speakers, it was also embarrassing, and a waste of their valuable time.

Peggy said she was horrified at £5,500, being spent by the District Council on emptying 18 dog mess bins, nearly equal to the total annual Parish Council expenditure – has anyone seen them being emptied? David Welton explained that there was a 300% 'overhead' charge on all services provided by the District Council to cover the cost of bureaucracy.

Peggy also complained about the cost of Port Gaverne toilets – £2,000 for the year. David Bolton had just returned from a holiday in France and said that people ought to see the state of the toilets over there.

Finance

With £483 in the current account, and monthly outgoings of £442, it was decided to leave the £5516 deposit account intact at this stage.

Purchase of Glebe Land

Sproulls have agreed to act as solicitors and point out that the planning use of the land as a cemetery would expire in five years from the 25th. April and a 364-day agricultural licence should be granted annually. To obtain access from the old graveyard would mean applying for a 'faculty' from the diocesan authorities. The cost of the land is £900 with vacant possession. After legal and statutory fees, however, the total sum is likely to be around £2,000, not including the cost of fencing, etc. David Phelps said that he thought the Clerk had made a good job of a very time-consuming task, and then asked why, if the Parish Council were the landowners, would the payments for burial land still go to the church, and why did they have to apply to the church to obtain a 'faculty' before being allowed to make an access.

It was explained that the Parish would be required to give the land to the church after the purchase had been completed.

David Welton said that as a payment of £352 had to be made to Sproulls it would now be necessary to transfer £400 from the deposit account. This was agreed.

David Phelps introduced the next two items on behalf of Mark Provis.

Road Sweeper

Mark wanted it put on record that John Riddeck was doing a very good job

Pump in Middle Street

This was in need of re-furbishment and it was agreed that John Sweet should be asked to do the work.

Hedges in Trewetha Lane

David Phelps said that some of the hedges in the lower part of the lane were overhanging and asked that the County Highways Department be requested to contact the landowners involved.

Planning Meeting Agendas

David Phelps asked that only matters pertaining to planning applications be included in agendas for planning meetings unless the Chairman and Clerk thought an item was too urgent to be left until the next monthly meeting. David Bolton said that the District Council had confirmed that it was in order to include items in this way.

Flooding at Coronation Park

A letter from Mr. Hancock, District Council, proposed a solution not agreed by the Parish Council due to a misunderstanding arising from an informal meeting held at the Park, so a full meeting is to be arranged with Mr. Hancock and all members of the Parish Council.

Barriers at Steps, Trewetha Lane

David Phelps said the iron barriers are not in keeping, and spoil the appearance of the entrance to Port Isaac. Bill Norris said that it was a mistake allowing the steps to be cut in the first place. David Phelps agreed and said that a common path inside the hedge leading to the old steps would have been better. The railings, he said, look like Truro cattle market. Eric Stokes pointed out that there were already iron railings at the playing fields and at the bottom of Rose Hill.

Reports of Committees

District Councillor: Bill Dawe said that he had spoken to Chief Planning Officer Tony Philp who had assured him that there is a 28-day enforcement order to demolish 'Maylands' at Port Gaverne unless amended plans are received. David Bolton said he would put £5 in the Lifeboat box if it ever happens.

Seats: David Phelps said Eric Stokes and himself had put two seats on the Platt and many thanks to Kenny Webster for his time and help. The seat at Lower Trefreock could be repaired but it was cheaper to replace this with one of the black plastic ones. The seat at Coronation Park is not considered unsafe at present.

Chippings and Tarmac: David Phelps, again speaking on behalf of Mark Provis, pointed out that the old electricity pole had been left in front of the new one at the bottom of Tintagel Terrace and partly blocked the street light.

The need for traffic control, and a pedestrian crossing, had been highlighted by the nearest thing so far to a fatal accident involving a child on a bicycle on Trewetha Lane near the playing fields. Bill Dawe said that if they could waste so much money on so-called traffic calming schemes in Egloshayle Road and Gonvena Hill at Wadebridge, they could easily pay for one crossing in Port Isaac. David Phelps said that the car park gates at the playing fields should be kept closed at all times to encourage children to use the exit with a barrier lower down.

Cornwall Association for Town and Parish Councils: Henry Symons said that the result of the ballot of all parish councils on local government re-organisation had shown 52% in favour of maintaining the status quo with another 38% in favour of a single unitary authority.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

a. Estimates for the new sign at the playing field were discussed and it was decided to settle for a WBP plywood board which would withstand the weather. ('WBP' means 'water and boiling point proof plywood' – almost as good as marine plywood but not so expensive, Eric Stokes.) The wording will be decided by the Playing Field Committee.

b. The raised drain cover at Trelights has been attended to.

c. After sanction from the County Council, who will allow 'topping' to be done before June, John Dawe has removed the growth alongside the path from Church Hill to the mill.

d. The Council for the Preservation of Rural England hope to form a branch in North Cornwall and are looking for response from interested parties.

e. The telephone box at Trelights has got to be replaced – there will either be a new box, or the service will be discontinued. British Telecom are prepared to give the Parish Council one of the old model, in good condition, to be sited wherever required in the village. The Parish Council wouldn't know what to do with a donated box, however, or who would look after it – perhaps it would be put somewhere and filled with flowers. Bill Dawe asked why British Telecom couldn't use an old type box in good condition to replace the present one and asked for a petition, with villagers' signatures, requesting that the old box be listed, be sent to John Gummer and Paul Tyler MP. Henry Symons didn't think it stood much chance as the box was in front of the most modern bungalow in the village and British Telecom was quite in order to remove the service as most people had telephones so its use was minimal.

A re-application for the listing of two of the boxes in Port Isaac village will be considered at the next monthly meeting.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

a. Plans for the erection of a garage at 27 New Road for Mr. J. Traythum received the support of the Parish Council.

b. Plans for a bungalow next to Guineamore at Trelights for Courtley Properties were refused on the grounds of bad access and that if one bungalow were allowed there was room for nine more in the field beyond.

c. A renewal of permission to convert a barn at Trewethick Fann for Mrs. N. Littleton received approval from the Parish Council.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 13th. June at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.



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PARISH COUNCIL, continued

Planning Meeting, Monday 23rd, May

Plans were discussed for the retention of alterations and extensions to existing dwelling to form enlarged dwelling unit previously carried out without planning permission together with the erection of a porch and garage at Maylands, Port Gaverne. The Parish Council felt that there was nothing wrong with the amendment to lower the roof lines but re-iterated the previous request to demolish the building; the Council is being asked to approve amendment to plans which were never passed. The building was not built with traditional materials. The Council asked whether this is going to be the new method for obtaining planning permission in North Cornwall - for everyone to build first and seek permission afterwards.

An application by Mr. C. Champness to erect a dwelling in the space between nos. 16 and 17 Trewetha Lane (opposite 'First and Last') was discussed and supported, providing the roof aligned with adjacent buildings. A query was raised concerning apparent dormer windows in the roof which did not seem to have a room behind them on the plan.

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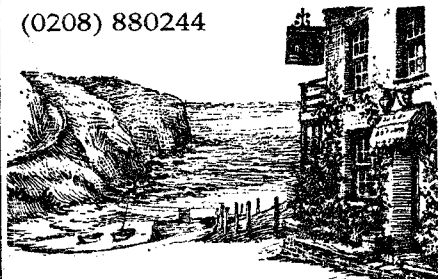
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ST. ENDELLION CHURCH

A healing service was held on Wednesday 18th. May. The Reverend Michael Bartlett was the celebrant.

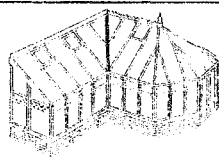
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TELL YOUR GUESTS

There is no need to travel to distant parts of the county, we have plenty of attractions in this district: Tintagel and Launceston Castles, Cardinham Woods, Bodmin & Wenford Steam Railway, and the Launceston Steam Railway, Padstow Shipwreck Museum, Tamar Otter Sanctuary at North Petherwin, Lanhydrock House. Even nearer at hand are Longcross Victorian Gardens at Trelights, and Porteath Bee Centre on the way to Polzeath.

North Cornwall Museum 'The best small museum in England' run by Sally Holden, The Clease, Camelford. Telephone (0840) 212954 Open from 1st. April to 30th. September 10am - 5.00pm. Admission: adults £1.25, pensioners £1.00, children 75p. A privately-owned museum opened in 1974 in an old building once used for coach and wagon building. It covers aspects of life in North Cornwall from 100 years ago - farming, dairy, cidermaking, etc. and there are the tools of a carpenter, cooper, blacksmith, saddler, cobbler, tailor, printer, doctor, granite, and slate quarryman. The Gallery holds exhibitions of crafts and paintings which are changed throughout the season. The Museum also houses Camelford Tourist Information Centre.

Museum of Historic Cycling 'The nation's foremost museum of cycling history.' Run by John and Sue Middleton at the Old Station, Camelford. Telephone (0840) 212811 Open all year from Sundays to Thursdays, 10am - 5pm. Admission: adults £2.00, Juniors (6-17) £1.50, senior citizens £1.75. It was opened in April

1992 and is a full, private collection of cycling history from 1818 to today, with over 180 bicycles, tricycles, and a quadracycle. There are examples of enamel advertising signs, puncture repairing displays, chain wheels, model cycles, oil-carbide-candle-battery- and dynamo cycle lighting, cycling maps, inflators, cycling beer-pop- and wine bottles, and a facsimile of cycle repair workshop.

The Cornwall Donkey & Pony Sanctuary at Lower Maidenland between St. Kew and St. Kew Highway. Telephone 841710 Open from Easter to October 30th. 10am to 5pm. There is no charge for entry to the coffee shop, gift shop, and bike hire, but if you want to visit the donkeys in their stables or in the ten acres, you must become a 'Friend of the Sanctuary' at an annual fee (giving unlimited visits till the end of the season): adults £3.25, children £2.25, pensioners and disabled persons £2.75, or family membership £10.75. The Sanctuary is devoted to saving donkeys that have been cruelly treated or whose lives are in threat, some are rescued by the R.S.P.C.A. and brought to the Sanctuary for shelter. The 'Friendship' scheme raises the necessary money to provide the donkeys with a safe, warm home, and allows members to meet the baby animals and feed the lambs. There is also an Adventure Swamp, and an Eeyore Club for small children.

He has always been anxious to separate his home village from his Police work and I apologise to him and his family for any embarrassment my comment may have caused.

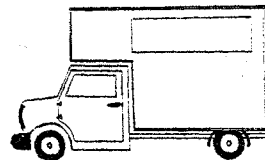

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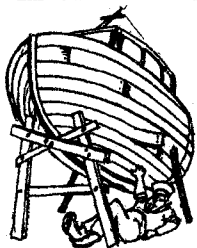
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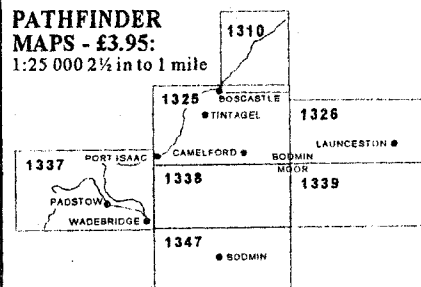
