#### PORT ISAAC METHODIST CHURCH

The present chapel was built in 1869, some 50 years after the building (now known as the Sunday School), which was the original Methodist Church. It is sad as well as challenging to think that the original chapel had proved too small and so the bigger chapel was built, and now, nearly 200 years later the reverse is happening and the building is having to close as a place of worship because there are too few to cope with its upkeep.

The buildings are in the course of being sold to a 'local boy', which pleases everyone, but we are still left with the saddening and sobering thought that there are now virtually no Methodists left in Port Isaac to continue the simple non-conformist services of worship to which Methodists are accustomed.

The population of Port Isaac is approximately 1,000. Is there any other village of this size which has such a small percentage of worshippers?

What has happened to the young people of today that the Church (irrespective of denomination) has no appeal for them? How have we of the older generation failed them? I think the answer lies in something Wesley Blake said at least twenty years ago. 'The next generation of young people is growing up without knowledge of Christ or His claim on their lives. Watch out! – you will see the churches closed before long'.

He expected that to happen in his lifetime and he wasn't far out in his judgement. I just hope and pray that the Church (not the building or the denomination, but the people) will wake up to its calling and inspire today's youth to a new commitment, otherwise I can see a day coming when there will be no worshipping people, and therefore no Church at all in Port Isaac.

#### THOSE BARRIERS

After reading the 'unofficial' report of the meeting last month, in which Mr. Bill Norris was quoted as saying it was a mistake allowing the steps to be cut in the first place - agreed with by Mr. David Phelps, I wondered if it would not be advisable for the Council to have two planning meetings. The first to discuss planning applications, and the second to check that all present at the first meeting had been paying attention and no mistake had been made when an application was supported. This would waste less time than raising an issue months after permission is granted and work completed.

#### **PARISH COUNCIL**

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 13th. June. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

The meeting was chaired by Henry Symons as David Bolton was away.

#### **Public Discussion**

Peggy Richards pointed out that the toilets, locked at seven o'clock in the evening, cause serious difficulties on band night for people who have travelled a long way. Mark Provis has a key but he is not always in the village. Given District Council permission, Eric Stokes offered to open and close the toilets on busy nights. Bill Dawe said this was an urgent matter – they should never be closed before nine o'clock.

Peggy reported trouble with children at sheltered housing in Mayfield – serious enough for the police to be notified. The District Council and wardens had also been notified. Mark Provis interrupted and asked the chairman to request the public to keep to matters relating to Parish Council affairs.

Peggy then reported brambles obstructing steps to the old peoples' houses at Mayfield, and thought that the hedge at the Playing Field should be cut so children could see the road was clear without having to go out into the middle of it.

Finally she warned people to lock their doors and windows and not to open doors without putting the chain on first as there had been another burglary in Mayfield.

Mark Provis again protested that a lot of time was being taken up on matters not actually the business of the Parish Council. The chairman said Peggy Richards had merely made short statements, it was the discussion these sparked off amongst councillors that had wasted time.

#### Finance

With only £91 in the current account, it was necessary to transfer £650 from the interest account to cover this month's expenses of nearly £650.

#### Seats

The seats committee had found it better perhaps to provide a new seat on a concrete plinth at Coronation Park and move the existing seat to Trefreock, instead of buying

a plastic seat, to replace the old one there. This would cost 300 instead of 200 and was unanimously approved.

#### Guidance on Planning

David Phelps asked if planning officers' recommendations for approval or otherwise could be indicated on planning applications sent to the Parish Council for discussion. The clerk replied to this by reading a letter from the Planning Department which stated that as a result of the Lees Report in future Parish Council views will be included in memoranda to the Planning Committee and Parish Councils will be informed of reasons for decisions reached contrary to those views. David Phelps said that this still didn't mean they would need to take any notice of Parish Council decisions.

#### Listed Telephone Boxes

BT had said that the Trelights box would have been replaced with the same type if it had been listed. It is important to try and have those in Church Hill and outside the Church rooms listed as soon as possible – if they were badly damaged, they would be replaced with the new type immediately. The Clerk reported that photographs and listing requests were submitted April 1991 but there had been no response. She was asked to re-submit these as soon as possible. Henry Symons reported that the box opposite St. Endellion church is now listed.

#### Tonnage Limit for Delivery Lorries

Mark Provis asked for this matter to be deferred a month as he did not yet have all the necessary information.

#### Coldstanton Corner

David Phelps reported that yet another car had gone off the road at the bend, made a three-point turn, and come back on again, damaging 25 young trees in the process. 'It is only a matter of time before somebody gets killed there, he said. David Welton warned that the Highways Department might put up unsightly crash barriers if improvements were requested. Eric Stokes asked about the result of the previous site meeting. The clerk said that a 'bend' sign had been promised for the approach from Poltreworgey. It was suggested that 'slow' be painted on the road at the same time. Henry Symons found it difficult to understand why 'slow' and 'bend' signs, which were not asked for, had appeared beyond the bridge in Trevathan Lane, while signs, which were needed and had been asked for, didn't materialise.

#### Siting of 'To The Harbour' Signs

The County Surveyor has approved the signs and felt that 'narrow streets' was acceptable but that 'tidal car park' was inappropriate. One sign, indicating the direction to the harbour and showing the one-way system, will span the footway by the old stone shed in New Road, and the other will be on the grass plot by the former newsagents, sited not to obscure the vision of drivers emerging from Tintagel Terrace.

#### Attendance at Meetings

Mark Provis complained that it had been reported in Trio (accurately) that he was supposed to have been a poor attender at meetings. He said he had checked the attendance record and found that out of 37 meetings, he had attended 31; people who make such statements should be sure they are correct. David Phelps said that it was a

pity Bill Norris was absent as he could have been asked to withdraw his statement and apologise to Mark Provis. It was suggested that the attendance records should be published of Parish Councillors putting up for election. Bill Dawe pointed out that the District Councillor was sometimes obliged to miss meetings due to District Council meetings scheduled for the same time.

#### Reports of Committees

#### a. Seats

A letter from Graham Tayar, 17 Middle Street, enquired of the whereabouts of the 'Tommy Tucker' and 'Archie Thomas' seats from the Platt. Eric Stokes replied that as far as he was aware the 'Archie Thomas' seat was in position but that the 'Tommy Tucker' one had become irreparable. An attempt had been made to contact Mrs. Tucker last September. Harold Barriball suggested a plaque could be returned to the family when a seat was taken out of use. David Phelps thought this might be seen as insensitive. Mark Provis seconded the motion, however, which was carried.

#### b. Tarmac and Chippings

Mark Provis had received assurances from the County Surveyor that the level of the streets in Port Isaac after tarmaccing would be the same as before but in fact the contractors had not removed the old layers of tarmac so that manhole covers had had to be raised. There are fears that rainwater could enter houses - by Mrs. Baker's house in Middle Street they had cut a way through new new tarmac for water to run into the drain. In some places down pipes were buried - others had been cut off above the new level. He felt that the job had not been done correctly and that a meeting with the County Surveyor should be requested. Councillors decided to go down into the village after the meeting to inspect the way the work had been done.

#### c. Playing Pields

Because the gates are still being left open after fish-packing has taken place, Port Isaac Fishermen would receive a second letter asking them to comply with regulations. It had not yet been possible to contact the landowner of the adjoining field regarding the possible purchase of land to extend the football pitch to full size. The road hedge will have to be cut — around the entrance it should be cut twice a year.

#### CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

The Clerk reported that information just received said that in future landowners will be responsible for cutting the growth at the sides of paths – this the last year the Parish Council will have to cut the paths.

A letter from the Ramblers' Association asked if original survey material was available relating to Footpath No. 32 through Burrow Park. The Parish Council, however, has no knowledge whatsoever of any such material and will advise the Ramblers' Association to contact Cornwall County Highways Department.

A covenant will be introduced into the deeds for the purchase of land at St. Endellion saying that a fence need not be erected across the field until the land is actually used as a burial ground.

David Welton, Treasurer, reported that during the Annual Audit, the District Auditor had said that it was not necessary for the Parish Council to tender for work involving less than £200. He felt this was perhaps a bit high for a small Parish like St. Endellion and suggested that judgement be exercised on this matter. He presented a number of bills for small amounts and recommended them for immediate approval instead of waiting until the public and press had been excluded. This was accepted.

#### PLANNING APPLICATIONS

a. Provision of room in roof and erection of a conservatory at Jessamine Cottage, Rose Hill, for Mr. and Mrs. R. Bulgin – amendment: enlarged conservatory.

b. Renewal of permission for the conversion of workshop to form dwelling, Trelights. Mr. B. Blake.

The above two applications received full Parish Council approval recommendation.

c. Concerning an application for an Advanced direction sign for Tea Pot Cafe opposite main car park entrance, Eric Stokes said the Parish Council had protested on previous occasions about the proliferation of signs and should oppose this application. This found no seconder. Harold Barriball thought one more sign wouldn't make any difference and proposed recommending approval. This was seconded by Mark Provis and carried by two votes, with one against. Councillors Phelps, Philp, and Welton asked to be minuted as abstaining due to the difficulty with impartiality.

#### Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 11th. July at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.


