LIFEBOAT

The Lifeboat was launched on 24th. July to help two swimmers that had got into difficulty at Port Gaverne, and became stuck on the cliff. The crew assisted the cliff team to take them ashore. Janice Haunt and Kerry Ann Warren were landed unhurt. The crew were A. Walton, R. Hambly, and C. Scott.

A Tragic Accident

On 30th. July, the Lifeboat was called out to a person that had fallen 200ft. over the cliff near Pentire Point. The casualty was suffering from multiple injuries and crewman Chris Scott attempted resuscitation but could not get any response. The casualty, Adam Boyd aged 26 from Australia, was taken on board the Lifeboat and transferred to the Rescue Helicopter. He was pronounced dead at Treliske Hospital. Crew were A. Walton, C. Scott, and J. Rowe.

Delay in landing

On 6th. August, the Lifeboat went to the aid of 17ft. Dory that had engine failure off Bossiney. The lifeboat towed the boat back to Port Gaverne. Due to sea conditions it took the Lifeboat an hour and a quarter to get to port. The two people on board were Martin Edwards from the Wind Farm, Deli, Delabole, and his friend Guy Williams from Yeolmbridge. The same boat was towed in on 29th. August last year. Crew were A. Walton, J. Collins, and M. Edkins.

On 8th. August, the Lifeboat was called out to a report of two people cut off by the tide at Bossiney. On arrival, it was found that the people had managed to get to safety unaided. Crew were J. Brown, C. Scott, and P. Worden.

On 16th. August the Lifeboat was launched to a 17ft. inflatable, with five people on board, that had engine failure one mile north of Port Isaac. The Lifeboat towed the inflatable to Port Gaverne. Crew were M. Provis, N. Andrews, and M. Edkins.

PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 8th. August. Please refer to the Parish Council minutes for authoritative information,.

A small meeting consisting of David Bolton (Chairman), Henry Symons (Vice Chairman), Henry Barriball, District Cllr. Bill Dawe, David Phelps, and Eric Stokes.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards asked for a litter bin near the picnic area at the Playing Fields. She also spoke about necessary improvements to the road drainage along Trewetha Lane from The Gwelva into the village. She was concerned that brambles hanging out into the road from the hedges could be dangerous for children riding bicycles along there.

Mrs. Ferguson asked for the dog litter bins to be emptied more frequently as the stench in the hot weather is unbearable, also, because people use them for ordinary litter as well, they quickly get full.

Robin Penna asked who was responsible for the small lay-by at the top of Church Hill – the seat is broken, the surface is uneven with many manholes, the litter bin is full and there are about five plastic bags full of rubbish lying around. He was told that the seat is to be repaired by the Parish Council but the rest of the responsibility lies with the Highways Department.

Finance

With about £80 in the current bank account and some £3,500 on deposit, the month's expenses would make the Council £600 overdrawn, so it was decided to transfer £1,000 from deposit to the current account.

Project 2000

David Phelps asked for this matter to be deferred to next month as the item was not yet ready for presentation.

County Information/Advice Centres

Sites are needed in shops, libraries, etc., for stand-alone computer centres to provide the information service for the public, and volunteers are being sought in suitable communities for this service. David Bolton thought the doctors' surgery might be suitable. The Council, however, asked for somebody to come and give a presentation.

New Burial Ground

The documents have been received and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman are to go through them, and present them at next month's meeting. Cllr. Dawe said he had been informed at a recent meeting of the Parochial Church Council that the land was to remain the property of the Parish Council who would receive the burial fees as is, apparently, the practice at St. Minver. Details such as this will be clarified at the September meeting, however, before final action is taken.

Playing Fields Gates

David Bolton complained that he had found himself unable to get the gates closed without a great deal of difficulty and that they ought to be made so that women and children could shut them. Bill Dawe said he would get his son Mark to get the job done. David Phelps said the Council should be reticent about spending too much at this stage as proper new, farm-type gates were needed which would not be so heavy and would look more appropriate. Eric Stokes said the gates were perfectly all right, if they were hung properly a child would be able to close them.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

District Councillor: Bill Dawe said the result of the appeal by Mr. Champness concerning the planning application for 'First and Last' had been a directive from the Department for the Environment to say that the building could not be demolished unless replaced by a suitable alternative. He thought the village wanted the building protected and suggested money could be raised by donations from the public for the purpose. Garages or parking spaces would not be a suitable alternative. Henry Symons thought this a dangerous suggestion as it was private property and the owner would have to be approached first. Eric Stokes said he had been in charge of ancient monuments in London and that old buildings like this can neither be replaced or renovated. David Phelps said there were better things to raise public money for unless the building was given to the Parish.

Chairman: David Bolton reported that during site meetings held in the village to check work done by County Highways recently, it was discovered that the wall of the house at the junction of Trewetha Lane and New Road was in danger of falling down. Traffic calming measures at Hillson Close were discussed, and work is to be done at Coldstanton Corner. The proliferation of official and non-official signs would be fully discussed at the September meeting. (Henry Symons added the information that all sign applications were being deferred until new policies had been formulated.) Robert Sloman is planting trees to prevent further land slipping on Church Hill

Seats: David Phelps said a new seat for the Platt was to be donated to the Parish so one of the seats there at present could be used, on a plinth, to replace a black plastic one [location not stated]. Seats at the top of Church Hill and at Lower Trefreock tuming will be repaired as soon as quotations are received. The St. Endellion Festival Committee may donate a new seat for the church. The present one is in a dangerous condition, as is the one at Lower Trefreock and they are to be removed immediately. Eric Stokes said he will shortly be removing the car park notice board for repairs.

Playing Fields: The only matter reported was sheep on the field that evening although nobody knew who they belonged to.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

Permission was requested for a barbecue in Coronation Park, Trelights, on Wednesday 24th. August. The use of a field used as car park during the Music Festivals had already been offered but it was preferred to hold the function in the centre of the village if possible. The Clerk to the Council, Barbara Willmott, had been advised by Cornhill Insurance that the provision of a barbecue area for use by the public was in order providing that statutory requirements were observed and that all reasonable precautions were taken. It would also be advisable for those intending to hold a barbecue to have their own insurance and they should be asked to sign an indemnity to this effect when seeking permission.

A letter from Fred Thompson thanked the Parish Council and, through the Council, all members of the public, for their support of Trio Newsletter.

The District Council has denied ownership of the swings at Mayfield Drive but Peggy Richards said she remembered the swings being installed by the Council, who had ensured that a small piece of land should be left for this purpose. Bill Dawe, who was supposed to have been informed about this, will get on to the Council about it again.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Erection of a dwelling, 34 Trewetha Lane, Mrs. H. D. Fletcher. Adjacent to the Playing Fields and occupying a space between Garrick' and 'Lower Garrick'. Eric Stokes said every bit of land was being snatched up and more and more houses were being crowded into the tiny village we were supposed to be proud of, while there were dozens of houses for sale. Permission had been granted for the large bungalow at the back of New Road which has lain empty for three years. It is over-building. David Bolton said the Parish Council could do nothing about the situation, it followed Planning Regulations. David Phelps proposed recommendation for approval so long as County Structure Plan and building regulations were observed, though he was scandalised to see plans - for a full-sized house, not a small development - rubber stamped 'Delegation Possible'

Erection of a dwelling adjacent to No. 17 Trewetha Lane, Mr. C. Champness. Revised plans for the house to be built in a space next to 'Higher Perch' showing lower floor levels and a hipped roof. A letter from Mr. Phillips, whose bungalow is on adjoining land at the rear of the site, stated fears that the stability of his bungalow could be affected by the proximity of the new building. Also that placing of the new house at the back of the site would result in the destruction of trees, etc., turning the area into a concrete suburbia detrimental to the Conservation Area. The Parish Council, although not basically opposed to the plans felt that the building was too big for the site - David Phelps thought a double garage was ridiculous - and in any event should be lower down and in alignment with the present buildings.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 12th. September at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.
