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PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 12th. September. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

David Bolton, Chairman, congratulated Port Isaac Ladies Rowing Team for gaining 3rd. place overall in the county gig races.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards said that the County Highways Department had done a good job in Trewetha Lane but other drains had not been done so well 'I could do a better job with half-a-dozen O.A.P's', she said. The path and steps to Mayfield Drive were overgrown with brambles, especially the hand rails which were unusable.

She had seen youths jumping from a seat, over the playing fields hedge into the road and thought the seat should therefore be removed before an accident occurred, especially as younger children might try and imitate the youths.

Finance

High-interest account: £2581.92, current account: £395.84. Expenses for the month £326.07, footpath clearance £625.00. The footpath payment was agreed so it was necessary to transfer £1,000 from the high-interest account. An anonymous donation of £20 towards the cost of running Port Gaverne toilets was received.

Glebe Land, St. Endellion

David Bolton and Henry Symons had examined the draft contract and details of gates, fencing, repositioning a water pipe, and provision of access were discussed. The solicitors will now be asked to proceed with the purchase and completion is hoped for by 29th. December. Bill Norris asked if the situation regarding actual ownership of the land and receipt of burial fees had been verified but this apparently is still not clear. Bill Dawe said that St. Minver new burial ground had been created by their Parish Council some years ago and was running smoothly. Mark Provis asked for the possibility of improving the safety of St. Endellion church lay-by to be included in next month's agenda.

Dog Bins

Mr. and Mrs. Larkin had requested that the bin on the Terrace should be emptied more frequently and that it should be placed outside the roadside barrier. Mark Provis suggested that a survey of the bins should be made, carried out by Port Isaac and District Tourism Association who had suggested the bins in the first place, to see which were used most and if any were not being used perhaps they could be removed. Bill Dawe said he had already asked North Cornwall District Council to consider re-siting and removing some bins.

Car Parking

Mark Provis spoke of the traffic congestion in the village during the peak season and said, with more people spending less money, it was essential to provide for as many as possible. Perhaps a landowner could be encouraged to provide a temporary car park just outside the village during

this time each year. It was pointed out that the walk into the village was long and unsafe but Mark said it took 15-20 minutes to walk into Looe from the car park, and the way into Sennen was like walking down Church Hill, but people still did it. David Phelps suggested the District Council be asked if, when the playing field was extended for a full-size football pitch, extra land could be acquired for a car park at the same time. There was also the possibility of some land being offered by Eric Donnithorne. Letters were received from Mr. Keats of the Anti-Car Lobby at Okehampton who advocated a Clovelly-style 'shuttle-bus' and Keith Willmott, Penreal Estates, who pointed out that street parking proliferated when the official car park was full so that extra parking was obviously needed and perhaps this could be provided on the land next to the South West Water treatment plant in the valley which would be easy parking with easy access to the village. Mark Provis said if nothing was done Port Isaac would get known as 'the place with nowhere to park'. Until now the Parish Council had not tried to accommodate the needs of tourism which was vital to the existence of the village. It was decided to ask the County Council and District Council to advise on the problem.

Play Equipment, Mayfield Drive

Mr. Buse of the District Council had authorised the removal of the equipment which was unsafe and on Council land. Eric Stokes said no play equipment should be put there as the noise of the children would only cause complaints from the elderly living close to the site.

Permanent Post, Rose Hill

As the present removable post regularly goes missing, Mr. and Mrs. Dawson, 17 Rose Hill, have requested a permanent one, but only with the full approval of all parties concerned. Eric Stokes praised the idea and said there ought to be a permanent post below the South West Water gates with the rest of Rose Hill pedestrianised 'It is too narrow for cars', he said. David Phelps pointed out that residents have had the usage of the road for some time and Bill Dawe raised the question of the small coal lorries delivering. The motion was, however, defeated by six votes to two.

Committee Reports

a. District Councillor: Bill Dawe said he had been successful in persuading the planning committee to refuse the demolition of 3 metres of wall at Higher Barn. Henry Symons pointed out that the decision, contrary to the planning officers' recommendation, could incur the councillors on the planning committee in costs should an appeal be successful. Bill Dawe said that a stand had to be made so the risk had to be taken. It was time an Article IV order was introduced. Barbara Willmott, clerk, said there was a considerable amount of literature to be read before such a decision was taken and copies of this will be sent to all councillors. The proposal is to be discussed at the November meeting.

Bill Dawe went on to report that the toilet seats at Roscarrock Hill had been vandalised again late one night when, due to a misunderstanding, the toilets had not been locked up. Ken Webster is now in charge of locking up. The three posts opposite the Piskey Shop in Fore Street are to be replaced and David Phelps asked whether a stone pier wouldn't be better.

- b. Seats: The Trefreock and Homer Park seats have been repaired, and the one at St. Endellion church removed. The 'John Scott' seat is on the Platt and the 'BBC' seat is at Trewetha Farm awaiting installation. Eric Stokes will repair the seat at Little Hill. Bill Dawe urged for a replacement for the seat at St. Endellion Church but this is awaiting a possible decision by the Festival committee to donate a seat. Eric Stokes has repaired the car park notice board. He also reported that the refuse bins at the Platt, not being emptied often enough during the peak season, were often full to overflowing and stinking.
- c. Chippings and Tarmac: Mark Provis pointed out that there was still water flowing across the B3267 in spite of remedial work by the Highways Department. He asked why there was a Parish Council if the authorities did what they saw fit without considering its views.
- d. Playing Fields: While looking at the possibility of providing another litter bin, the committee will examine the situation concerning the seat used by youths to jump over the hedge into the road mentioned in 'public discussion' above.

CLERK'S REPORT

The telephone kiosks opposite St. Endellion church, and at Church Hill, Port Isaac, are to be included in the listing programme as grade 2 listed buildings but those at Trelights, Trewetha Lane, and New Road, not being in proximity to other listed buildings, are not considered eligible. David Phelps thought the New Road box (next to the Pea Pod shop) should be included as it was next to buildings while the one at St. Endellion was in a lay-by and against a hawthorn hedge. His proposal was defeated by five votes to four.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Display of an advanced directional sign advertisement, land east of entrance to Little Treswarrow/Plain Street, Trelights, for Mr. and Mrs. H. Symons and Mr. M. Symons: David Phelps was totally opposed to this sign and questioned its legality, and said that signs are making the village look like a rubbish tip - 'We are killing the goose that lays the golden eggs'. Eric Stokes said there are signs everywhere and was against it. Bill Dawe was opposed to a sign at the position but would agree to one nearer to Mr. Symons premises. Mark Provis asked why everyone was against the sign. The application was recommended for refusal by a vote of six votes to one on the grounds of an abhorrence of the proliferation of signs in the parish. David Phelps said everybody with a business should be more responsible and think of the good of the village. He asked for the matter to be discussed at the next meeting but meanwhile ask the County Council to advise on which signs are legal and which are not.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 10th. October at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Rooms, at Trelights.

Congratulations to Martin and Jo on the birth of a daughter. Well done – another supporter for us.


