LIFEBOAT

Saturday 8th. October

The lifeboat was launched to go to the aid of two surfers that were being swept out to sea at Bossiney, but was recalled after ten minutes. The surfers were rescued by other surfers. Crewmembers were A. Walton, J. Collins and P. Worden.

Sunday 23rd. October

The lifeboat was called out to swimmers that got stranded on Castle Rock. After landing Crewmember Phil Aldridge on the Rock, the lifeboat attempted to take off one of the swimmers but was caught up by a huge swell and the other two members, Richard Hambly and Chris Scott were unable to hold onto the craft. The lifeboat drifted towards Port Gaverne beach and was recovered undamaged by Jon Rowe, Ken Webster, and myself. In the meantime a further swimmer had landed on Castle Rock, and these three, together with the three crewmembers, were lifted by a helicopter from R.N.A.S. Culdrose and landed safely at the Playing Fields.

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PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 11th. October. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

David Bolton, Chairman, apologised that the meeting could not be held at Trelights where the room was not available.

Public Discussion

Elsie Ferguson reported that it was still not possible to close the gate at the playing fields and Cllr. Dawe asked permission to speak and inform her that the work, delayed by urgent corn-sowing, etc., was now due to be done.

Peggy Richards reported that the dog warden had been in the village checking the dog bins. She also remarked that, in the past, it had never been possible to get consent from the North Cornwall District Council to use a field as a temporary car park. She suggested that the litter bin at the entrance to the playing fields would get more use if it had the word 'litter' painted on it. People were taking their dogs across the playing fields and through a gap in the hedge to the adjacent field which meant the gap was getting larger. The roadside hedge of an 'absent landowner' field in Trewetha Lane was not cut and posing a hazard for walkers. She ended by saying that signs outside businesses were only undesirable if they blocked the pavement.

Robin Penna asked for a misleading footpath sign at the millpool to be altered.

Malcolm Lee made a long statement questioning the integrity of certain councillors in the matter of signs. He alleged that a vendetta was being waged and that parties involved should declare any interest before making statements concerning planning decisions. He asseverated that it was of the utmost importance for councillors to be above any suspicion of incorrect behaviour. It was also hypocritical of the council to object to some matters while seemingly acquiescing in others of the same nature, especially when the latter concerned fellow councillors. Signs were important for business in the village, these are difficult years and he had sympathy for the businesses who needed the signs. The Parish Council, however, appeared to want to hide the village.

Olive Strout pointed out that Back Lane is getting very overgrown.

Finance

David Welton, Treasurer, presented the financial statement and said there was now £1620 in the high-interest account but, although £750 precept money had been received, it would be necessary to transfer £1500 to the cheque account to cover £1346 outgoing which included a number of items for Port Gaverne toilets.

Eric Stokes proposed donating £100 towards the fireworks fund, double last year's donation, seconded by Bill Dawe and passed unopposed.

The donations for Port Isaac, and Trelights Christmas lights will be the same as last year and ratified next month from figures included in the financial report.

Planning Query

Eric Stokes complained about the 'hideous building' behind Mayfield and Silvershell - a petition would be sent to MP Paul Tyler. No plans had ever been passed by the Parish

Council or District Council because, as explained in a letter from Sproull's, solicitors, work was started on the agricultural building by Mr. E. Donnithorne before changes in the planning laws. Sproull's also asked for comments by the public to be addressed to them. Eric Stokes added that the public generally have no faith in Parish Council planning decisions.

Article IV

Barbara Willmott, Clerk to the Council, had done a lot of work trying to get details of Article IV planning restrictions. The District Council could offer no information other than a Stationery Office publication costing between £30 and £40. She added that in the opinion of the planning department the village had gone too far for an order, which would be too restrictive in any case. Cllr. Dawe said the village is unique and we mustn't spoil it any more, 'How much has happened since the last application - how far is it going to go?' Mark Provis said it was a major decision and proposed that the publication be purchased '£30 - £40 won't hurt the Parish Council,' he said. David Welton suggested asking the Cornwall Association of Town and Parish Councils which other places in the county had Article IV orders and the effect of this. David Phelps was totally in favour of the idea 'When you see what some people do.' Eric Stokes said he noticed that it was only those outside the conservation area, and won't be affected, who were in favour. It was finally decided to try and borrow a copy of the book or, if necessary, purchase one.

Signs

The Clerk reported that there are different regulations for signs on buildings, and the, mostly illegal, signs on verges, but that the authorities have just been ignoring the problem, the Tea Pot is possibly the first ever planning application. David Welton asked what possible action could be taken. Henry Symons declared an interest and said the Council should wait until new policies had been decided on by the District Council. Mark Provis declared an interest. David Philp said most Councillors had signs and shouldn't therefore discuss the matter. David Phelps said he had no interest to declare as he had no direction signs but asked for a copy of Malcolm Lee's complaint to be sent to Mr. Westwell, North Cornwall District Council, as it made allegations against parish councillors. Henry Symons said this was out of order as it did not form part of the discussion and Mr. Phelps should ask Mr. Lee for a copy and present it to the Chairman for discussion at another meeting. Cllr. Dawe said 'We want tourism and need signs.' He suggested grouping signs together instead of many separate ones. 'Let's do something ourselves. If we go to 'big brother' county council they'll just come and take 'em all down.' After a stormy debate, it was finally decided to ask North Cornwall District Council when some information clarifying the situation would be made available.

Footpath No. 36

The section of this path between Church Hill and the Mill gets very overgrown and needs cutting at least twice a year. It was cut shortly before the meeting but may grow again in the winter and a third cut will be made. This will cost about £80, 75% of which will be reimbursed by the County Council. David Phelps said that everybody else had to cut their own hedges at their own expense.

Cornwall Draft Structure Plan

The booklet is to be circulated around all the parish councillors.

Crossing at Trewetha Lane

Mark Provis said we had to keep pursuing this matter even though the response from higher authorities is not encouraging. David Phelps requested Cllr. Dawe to ask County Councillor Harvey Lander when the proposal had been discussed at County level. Eric Stokes added that if what had been done in Wadebridge is anything to go by 'then heaven help us!'

REPORTS

District Councillor: Bill Dawe reported weeds between the paving stones at Mayfield; that the Council were not eager to cut the hedges right back in Primrose Lane; and that the drainage problem in Middle Street was sorted out. He announced a meeting to discuss car parking, between the Parish Council and the District Council, to be held in Port Isaac at 2.00pm. on Wednesday 19th. October.

Seats: David Phelps said a black plastic one had been placed at St. Endellion, 'but we are hoping for better things'. Two of the seats on the Main needed repairs - tenders would be sought. The 'BBC' seat was now sited on a concrete plinth at the top of Port Gaverne Hill. Seats along the cliff path would be repaired or replaced.

School: Bill Norris announced the Open Day, and said it was hoped to set up a 'Friends of the School'. He also expressed concern at the cost of swimming. Eric Stokes pointed out that he was the only Parish Council representative of the Camelford Sports Centre, but Bill Norris said the school uses Wadebridge facilities.

Playing Field: David Phelps suggested a meeting at the field to discuss what to do with a broken swing and look at the litter bin. Cllr. Dawe offered to repair the gap in the hedge free of any charge.

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CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

Dog Bins: The problems around the village are being investigated and action will be taken.

Removable Post, Rose Hill: Advice from the District Council said that this might cause legal problems and should be left as it is or a Traffic Regulation Order prohibiting vehicular traffic would be needed. This decision was, however, already reached at the last meeting.

Telephone Kiosks: The site near the top of Back Hill is not considered sufficiently important by British Heritage for the kiosk to be listed, but a vote was taken and five were in favour of asking again.

Park and Ride: A letter from Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher described their scheme at Rock, supported by St. Minver Lowlands Parish, and how it had relieved traffic problems. They had been asked to do it again but would rather run a scheme in Port Isaac with a supplementary car park made accessible by a short bus ride. The suggestion will be put on next month's agenda, after the meeting on car parking. The Fletchers may be invited, to answer any questions.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

a: Listed building consent to reslate roof and walls. renewal of front door with stable door and provision of fireplace to existing flue to sitting room. The Birdcage, 11 Rose Hill. The National Trust: There were no objections and the application received Parish Council support.

b: Erection of a dwelling, Trewetha Lane. Mr. and Mrs. L. Cleave: Cllr. Dawe supported the application provided the building wasn't like the other one further up the lane. Bill Norris asked how they could say anything against this one if they passed that one. David Phelps said he was aghast to see that this major development had been stamped 'delegation possible'. Eric Stokes, opposing the application, said we mustn't abide by the bureaucratic 'Structure Plan' but make our own minds up and not allow building on every bit of grass. Mark Provis said a stone finish should be used, not tiles as shown on the plan. Henry Symons proposed a site meeting to allow everybody to voice their opinions - agreed on a vote of five, nem con.

Church Hall in October.



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

THE BIRDS OF PORT GAVERNE

Whilst litter picking and checking up on possible odd jobs at Port Gaverne, I looked out into the bay and saw what I thought was a large duck floating in the sea. Getting as close as I could, I saw it had a pointed beak like a dart. Making a mental note of characteristics and plumage, I headed back to the office. After consulting various bird books, I concluded that the bird was a Great Northern Diver, a bird I had seen once before on a loch on the Isle of Raasay in the Inner Hebrides. It is a common visitor to the Cornish coast in the winter months.



Great Northern Diver

Birds such as divers take advantage of the shelter provided by the small bays at Port Isaac, Port Gaverne, and Port Quin. In recent years several other birds, winter visitors to the area or maybe blown off course, have been seen sheltering at Port Gaverne. In November 1993, a Great Crested Grebe with winter plumage was seen just off the beach there. This bird is commonly found on the coast during the winter but for the rest of the year is more likely to be found on inland waterways.

A month later in December 1993 a single Little Egret was seen at Port Gaverne. Once a rare vagrant to Great Britain, the Little Egret is becoming increasingly common - many having been spotted in recent years, in fact, the same day that I saw the Great Northern Diver I saw one stalking prey in Port Quin harbour. Other winter visitors to Port Gaverne include the Black Redstart and the Eider Duck. It is also worth looking out for Red Kites and Ospreys which have in the past been seen at Port Quin and Tregardock.

Other birds which are resident all year round include Rock Pipits, Feral Pigeons, Fulmars, and Herring Gulls, while at Bounds Cliff, a Kittiwake colony of around 300 pairs exists.
