, VILLAGE HALL

The Village Hall is for the use of everyone in the parish – including you! and the Annual General Meeting is the time when everyone can say what they want to about the running of the hall, also the management committee for the year is chosen and anyone living in the village may offer to join. If you are interested in your hall, this year's meeting will be in the hall at 7.30pm., Wednesday 15th. March.

BIRDCAGE COTTAGE

Surely the most unusual cottage in the village must be the 3-storey high cottage called The Birdcage. Stuck high above the main heart of what is arguably one of the most picturesque villages in Cornwall, this pentagonal building, with its slate hung elevations, draws the eye as one negotiates the steep hills to the harbour. It is not known exactly how old the Birdcage is but it would appear to be between 150 and 200 years old. It was built by a man called Valentine Powell Richards and, appropriately, was occupied by a Mr. John Lark in the middle years of the 1900s when it was used as a cobbler's shop. The National Trust acquired the cottage in 1980 under the will of Mrs. Alec Gorton and for some years it was let. However, in recent years it has become increasingly difficult to find a suitable tenant for the Birdcage due to its tiny proportions and therefore it was decided that the most appropriate use would be to make it into a holiday cottage so that others might enjoy its wonderful character. The National Trust has put a large amount of work into restoring the building to its original character. The slate peggy roof and hangings were removed and replaced in the traditional manner using chestnut laths and wooden pegs. Lime plaster has been used inside and the exterior has been painted with white limewash in the traditional manner. Unsightly electricity cables have been removed and the chimney rebuilt using old bricks in the original design. The stairs are only 12" wide in places and the ceilings only 6' high, making it very difficult to put furniture into the cottage. However, trap doors, or 'coffin hatches', came in very useful when installing the double bed. It is obviously not going to be a cottage suitable for those with a wide girth or indeed much above average height! It is hoped that the cottage will be let from the middle of February 1995 and we believe it will be exceptionally popular with its wonderful position, superb views and idiosyncratic character. The first 'tenants' have already taken occupancy in advance of the official opening - a pair of herring gulls on the roof! PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 6th. February.

For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Public Discussion

Robin Penna presented proofs of a proposed map-guide to a Port Isaac—Trewetha—Port Gaverne circular walk which he hopes to publish this year when improvements may have been made to the footpaths.

Malcolm Lee referred to the Parish Council survey, completed in October 1991 which had shown over 100 significant problems with waymarking, stiles, etc. These problems still remain, or have worsened, due to a lack of any action. The County Council would not have been able to get away with this for over three years if the Parish Council had kept the item under regular review. A lot of hard work was put in by the many volunteers involved and this work must not be allowed to be thrown aside lest any future volunteers think their efforts will be wasted.

Peggy Richards was interested to hear that the Council wanted to extend the playing fields but said that at present they were in a filthy condition, with graffiti all over the playground equipment, and the litter bin was full of domestic rubbish. She described problems with the new refuse collection service which had proved extremely unreliable to start with, and advised people to ring 79128 if they had any difficulties. She also asked if the Council had any plans to celebrate VE and VJ days.

Olive Strout reminded the Council that she had complained about bushes overgrowing Back Lane a few months ago and that the problem was still as bad because no action had yet been taken to remedy the problem.

Gwen Hambly asked if would be possible to replace some of the difficult-to-climb stiles on the footpaths with kissing gates.

Finance

With only £735 in the current account and expenditure of over £2,000, including the price of the glebe land which has finally been purchased, it was necessary to transfer £1,500 from the interest account.

It was learned that the business rates for the toilets at Port Gaverne are to be held at the same level as last year.

A set of new steel goal posts for the playing fields would cost between £495 and £600. The Playing Field Committee are to check to situation of the existing goal posts and examine the state of the grounds.

Trewetha Lane Speed Tests

The police have added the B3267 road into Port Isaac to their list of roads where random speed tests will be carried out. These tests could be at any time as the Council could not recommend any times when the problem was particularly bad.

Footpath Tender Notices

The annual notices requesting tenders for trimming the footpaths are to be displayed on the notice boards.

Date for Annual Public Meeting

The Annual Meeting will be at 7.30pm., in the Church Rooms, Thursday 27th. April.

Directive from N.C.D.C. on Signs

Each Councillor was presented with a copy of the North Cornwall District Cuncil Directive which could be referred to when planning matters relating to directional signs were discussed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

District Councillor

Cllr. Bill Dawe reported that there would be a site meeting to discuss the proposed new dwelling in Trewetha Lane. He also said that he was pursuing the matter of the charge which may have been made incorrectly to Mrs. Trickett for planning permission for her porch.

Parish Council Chairman

David Bolton said he had nothing to report except that a seat on the Main was badly broken and that the wooden seats had not yet been removed from the Platt.

Port Isaac School

Bill Norris reported on a successful 6-hour seminar to discuss the National Curriculum and the amount of work it caused. Another meeting of 4-hrs had discussed the school budget cuts.

Christmas Lights

Eric Stokes reported that the responsibility for these had now been handed over to Mr. Mike Edkins, landlord of the Golden Lion.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

- a. Mr. Round is to appeal against the planning enforcement order on his dwelling at St. Illicks, Port Gaverne.
- **b.** Hartland Road has been put on the list for re-surfacing.
- c. A letter from Trelights Village Green Committee conveyed sincere thanks to the Parish Council for the generous donation, and to Mr. and Mrs. Bolton for officiating at the switch-on. A complete account of the funds was also included.
- c. Genry O'Connor, on behalf of Port Isaac Cricket Club, had written to express an interest in the extension of the Playing Fields and asked whether a cricket pitch would be included.


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ROSE HILL

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

15. His wife you know and child so dear, He ought to love and cherish; He said they might die, or else apply For subsistence to the Parish.

16. I ask this gang their real name, They say invisible: Now they must turn, or else they'll burn, Down in the deepest heli.
