Caring About Road Safety

On Tuesday 7th. March there was a meeting at Port Isaac school to gauge the strength of public feeling about a safe form of crossing on Trewetha Lane. This meeting was very well attended by District Councillor Bill Dawe, Parish Councillor David Phelps, and many concerned residents. It was agreed to draw up a petition and contact as many villagers as possible, also to write to M.P. Paul Tyler, County Councillor Harvey Lander, and Cornwall County Highways.

The consequence was that Paul Tyler contacted C.A.R.S. and arranged a meeting on Saturday 18th. March. From this meeting it was decided that the best course of action would be to hold a demonstration in Trewetha Lane at the entrance to the village on Saturday 25th. March. This decision resulted in the wonderfully supported demonstration. Paul Tyler, Harvey Lander, Bill Dawe, and David Phelps also attended and offered their firm support. We were afterwards advised that the next stage would be a site meeting between C.A.R.S. and County Highways.

After such a strong start, it is important that we keep the momentum going and if anyone feels they want to add their support to the campaign, one of the best ways is to write a letter to County Highways, Castle Canyke Road, Bodnin, Cornwall. PL31 1DZ, asking them for a safe crossing.

The well organised demonstration by the newly-formed organisation, C.A.R.S. (Caring About Road Safety), was very successful in making a case for a safe crossing in Trewetha Lane on Saturday 25th. March. About five times more people turned up than had been expected and it was encouraging to see so many people from the village. Congratulations are due to Marion Andrews, Liz Brown, Caroline Cleave, Jill McDonnell, Jane Rowe, and to all the helpers who went around with the petitions.

PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Chapel Rooms, Trelights, on Mon-day 13th. March. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Henry Symons chaired the meeting in the ab-sence of David Bolton.

Public Discussion

Wally Aldridge asked what the plans were for the playing fields and Henry Symons explained that the Parish Council were at the enquiry stage only of plans for expanding the grounds to provide a full-size football pitch and cricket pitch. Gerry O'Connor, speaking on behalf of the Cricket Club, said that it was a great idea.

Finance

With £79.08 in the current account and £1633.37 on deposit, it was decided to transfer £750 to the current account to cover expenses of £580.04.

A request from the Village Hall Committee for a donation of £250 to help cover costs of the Port Isaac Holiday Promotion was discussed. Eric Stokes felt that such a promotion should be handled by Port Isaac and District Tourism Association, not by the Village Hall. The Hall committee is to be asked for more details so the matter can be decided at the next meeting.

The donation towards the cost of the upkeep of St. Endellion Churchyard is to stay at the 1991 level of £425 in spite of a plea for an increase from the Church. The total cost of keeping the churchyard clear runs into £1000's. David Phelps said that the new land for the extension of the graveyard was costing enough already, the church had a wealthy congregation, and costs had not increased since 1991.

St. Endellion Lane

The lane from Trelights village to St. Endellion Church has got into a disgusting state due to the lack of progress on the part of building de-velopers. This makes it unpleasant for people walking their dogs or going to tend graves, and Cornwall County Highways are to be asked to meet the Parish Council at the site and discover whether there has been a breach of the planning regulations.

Tender Notices, Port Gaverne Toilets

The Clerk is to post notices inviting tenders for the cleaning of the toilets which will be opened at Easter.

Football Posts

Mark Provis had asked Jon Rowe to give a price for making new posts out of glass reinforced plastic. The new posts would cost £350 plus £120 if extension pieces to create rugby posts were required. The posts would last for a minimum of 25 years. Bill Norris pointed out that if the posts were to last, the method of erection was as important as the posts them-selves. Eric Stokes suggested that the National Playing Fields Association should be asked for advice. This suggestion was carried.

Climbing Frame

The Chairman (David Bolton) had condemned the climbing frame at the Playing Fields as some of the metal parts had become badly corroded. It was thought this was due to salt air corrosion as it occurred on one side of the frame only. Bill Norris reckoned the repair could be done for about £50 plus cost of materials and David Phelps is to arrange for the frame to be transported to Bill Norris' workshop. Bill Norris was to give a quotation if the cost was likely to be more than expected. Eric Stokes asked if it was right for the Chairman to make decisions on his own and why the Playing Field Committee, of which he is a member, was not consulted. David Philp thought that any Councillor should be able to make a quick decision where public liability was at question.

Purchase of Playing Field Land

Mr. Maskell acting for Mr. Norman, agents had said that Dr. Lendon, landowner, was prepared to sell land adjacent to the Playing Fields and fixed a price of £7,500 for 11/2 acres or £12,000 for five acres. David Philp said it would be regretted for evermore if the opportunity was allowed to slip. Bill Dawe wondered if a new footpath down to Port Gaverne could be created. David Phelps said time should not be wasted with a public referendum but that the purchase should go ahead and that grants from different associations and organisations should be explored. It was decided to proceed 'in principle' subject to being able to raise the money most of which would have to come from outside the parish.

Litter in Playing Fields

David Phelps said that members of the Playing Field Committee had been around the ground with a plastic sack which was only partly full after picking up every item of litter. The problem was not nearly as bad as had been reported. However arrangements are to be made to drag the litter bin to a more visible position.

Cost to School of Playing Field Upkeep

Bill Norris announced that the school budget was to be cut by something like £25,000. Also, Cornwall Education Department will now no longer pay for the upkeep of the Playing Field which represents about £900 per annum. If the school is unsuccessful in fighting this decision it will not be prepared to find the money which would be better spent on education and would do without the Playing Field if necessary, in which case the cost of upkeep would fall on the Parish Council – i.e. the Council Tax payers. Bill Dawe said the school is already having to raise money for books, trips, etc. Now this. Soon it would be teachers. Mark Provis was in favour of a 1/2p per head increase in the Council Tax. David Phelps felt that private tenders might give a cheaper solution. He also thought that the County Education Department would be in breach of the 1977 Joint-User Agreement and should be asked what they are about. Bill Norris pointed out that the announcement was for information only and that no action should be taken until an official approach is made.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

District Councillor

Bill Dawe reported that the dog litter bins on the Terrace are to be shifted out of the way of cars parking there and that the posts opposite the Lucky Piskey Shop in Fore Street should be done before Easter. The result of a meeting with Paul Tyler MP. and the School concerning the lack of a crossing is to be announced.

Seats

David Phelps, after a complaint was made by Bill Norris, said the seats are still to be removed from the Platt but that perhaps the fishermen should be asked to treat them with more respect and not put fishing gear on them.

a. Cornwall County Council has plans to improve Coldstanton Corner on the B3267.

b. The wall at 58 New Road is the responsibility of the owner as it was created when the garden was levelled.

c. The directional sign for the Tea Pot Cafe at the car park has been refused planning permission. David Phelps asked for it to be put on record that he had said nothing.

d. Mr. Donnithome is to appeal against the planning enforcement order.

e. The Police apologised for not attending the monthly meetings. This has proved impossible, but they will make every effort to attend the Annual Public Meeting.

f. The result of the Local Government Reorganisation Review is that in Cornwall the status quo is to be retained.

g. The plans for a dwelling in Trewetha Lane for Mr. and Mrs. Cleave has received approval.

h. Liz Brown, writing on behalf of C.A.R.S. (Caring About Road Safety) expressed concern about the speed of traffic in Trewetha Lane where there was no safe place to cross and the aim of C.A.R.S. to get something done before an accident happened. The Parish Council indicated support for the scheme.

i. Details of a Tree warden Scheme were passed to David Phelps.

j. Details of problems with funding the Camelford Citizens' Advice Bureau will be discussed at the next meeting.

k. A 'User Survey' for the South West Coast Path was accepted.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Plans for the change of use of a barn to holiday cottage – full planning, redundant bam, Trewetha – for trustees of C. M. Lendon, deceased, were accepted without objection although an opinion was voiced that it would be better if it were a dwelling for someone to live in instead of another holiday cottage.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 10th. April at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

North Cornwall Tourism Officer


Steve Kessell has been connected with tourism since coming to live in Padstow 20 years ago, and applied for his present position in 1993/94 when the Department was started.


PORT ISAAC CHORALE

PORT ISAAC PROJECT

Developed by the Village Hall and endorsed by P.I.D.T.A. the Project is to promote Port Isaac as a good place for holidays - and a place to love. To establish a vision to benefit all who live here and hope different community groups will benefit by pooling efforts to make the venture a success.

It will generate finance - true - but not exclusively for the Village Hall. No group will prosper unless the business community is successful so we must promote Port Isaac as a tourist resort. The positive response of the hoteliers has been heartening. Thirteen, plus The National Trust, have supported the project by donating holidays.

So we have the makings of a very big enterprise. The proceeds of the lottery will be used for local associations. We shall give 10% of the income to the sellers – the business or asso-ciation they represent. We shall retain one third of the net proceeds for the Village Hall, while two thirds will be given to local associations.

What does this really mean? We shall print 5,000 tickets, to sell at £1 each, generating £5,000. Running costs are estimated at £920, including the 10% to ticket sellers, leaving $\pounds 4,080$. The promoters will take one third (£1,360), and two thirds (£2,720) will be given away.

Malcolm Lee's 'Port Isaac Holiday Survey' finds that we have 16,000 residential guests in Port Isaac annually and another 250,000 day visitors. It should not be difficult, therefore, to attain that target of 5,000 tickets – perhaps several times over if we pull together.

The Playgroup - Gig - Friends of the School could probably make many suggestions about how they would like the money spent but first we need to produce the cake before we can cut it up. How big will it be – that's down to each of us, and how much we want Port Isaac to prosper socially and in terms of business.

The draw will take place Saturday 14th. October 1995 and may be incorporated into a social function like a 'Fancy Dress Dance'.

It is a large venture and could benefit many people. The Village Hall Committee and hoteliers have grasped the vision – I hope that tradesmen and villagers will follow - to beat the recession and build a spirited and prosperous community. George Oxley.
