PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 10th. April. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Mr. Barriball, Mr. Bolton (Chairman), Cllr. Dawe, Mr. Norris, Mr. Phelps, Mr. Philp, Mr. Provis, Mr. Stokes, and Mr. Symons.

Public Discussion

Elsie Mewton complained about the disgusting state of the Playing Field – she had picked up two bags full of rubbish – one full of tins – the hedges were being pulled down and even the wire fencing cut through.

Peggy Richards corroborated these remarks and added that the trees were being ripped down and rubbish was being thrown into a neighbour's garden. She was now worried that the purchase of extra land might lead to development at the Field and hoped that the public would be consulted before hedges were pulled down, etc. Any necessary car space would have to have its entrance on our most dangerous piece of road. There was 'an accident waiting to happen' but the gates were left wide open after the recent C.A.R.S. meeting,

Robin Penna noted that Longcross Stone was on the agenda and said that this ancient monument deserved a lot more reverence.

George Oxley speaking for the Village Hall committee reported that the hall was doing very well and tabled a copy of the accounts. He spoke of the magnificent response to the project being run in conjunction with P.I.D.T.A. He thanked David Bolton for chairing Village Hall meetings for the past 3-4 years.

Malcolm Lee added that he hoped the Parish Council would support the Village Hall scheme with a donation.

Finance

The high-interest account stood at £952 and the current account at £199. Expendi-

The first half of the £8,000 precept was due in a week's time so it was decided to defer payment of the main item – the £425 donation to St. Endellion Church and then transfer £3,000 to the high-interest account.

Friends of the School Notice Board

A letter from Mrs. Carney requested help with a board to be installed at the Post Office to display school notices and some samples of the children's work. It was suggested that the school might be allowed to use part of the Parish Council boards but the meeting felt that this would 'open the floodgates' for everyone else to use it. Mr. Barriball said that the Parish Council board at Trelights was small and was locked. Mark Provis said it was a shame that schools were in a position where they had to ask for money to do things. The Friends are to be advised of the necessity (and cost) of obtaining planning permission and asked to provide a costing for the Council to consider a suitable donation.

Long Cross Stone

Cllr. Dawe said the people of Trelights were concerned that tractor wheels were cutting into the island so the Stone is getting nearer the road. The old milk stand has already been knocked down. Mr. Barriball said the Stone was in 'the line of fire' and protection was needed for the old sign post as well. Henry Symons thought organisations such as the Old Cornwall Society should be consulted. David Phelps said it was not a Parish Council matter but should be referred to the County Heritage Department. Mr. Robert Sloman was present and asked to speak. He said, in reply to a question, that the Stone was not on his land. He pointed out that nobody else had done anything to restore the milk stand when it was knocked down and had put the top back himself. He thought granite kerb stones would be best. He also pointed out that the County Highways sign should be moved from the site. The Council are to ask Charlie David, Heritage Coast Service Officer, if he can give any advice.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

District Councillor: Cllr. Dawe reported that bollards had been re-installed at the Pentus in Fore Street, and a new one outside the Liberal Club. The Hartland Road footpaths had only been clay-sanded and he hoped for an improvement. The path from New Road to Tintagel Terrace was to be tidied up. He suggested a second refuse bin for the Playing Field.

Chairman: David Bolton announced officially that the land had been purchased for extending the graveyard at St. Endellion.

DENNIS KNIGHT

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Henry Symons asked for the matter of sub-letting the ground to be put on the next agenda.

Seat Committee: The one in the gully on the Main is broken and will be replaced by one from the coast path at Port Isaac when the new one arrives. The removal of seats from the Platt was hindered by a lack of transport. One of them has been painted by Chris Scott.

Hospital Car Service: Eric Stokes said he was not standing for the next session of Council and would therefore resign his position. Cllr. Dawe said thanks were due to him for his work in connection with the Christmas lights, etc.

Playing Field: Mark Provis was in favour of buying the land and, understanding Peggy Richard's concern, stressed that nothing should take place at the field, other than necessary levelling and landscaping, without consulting the village. Henry Symons pointed out that the Playing Field was bought for the children so care should be taken with football pitches, etc.

School: Bill Norris reported that funding strictures meant that expenses were being met from available reserves and teaching hours had to be cut. The infants teacher now taught four days a week instead of five. A request that Mr. Norris be allowed to complete his term as Parish Council Representative on the Board of Governors although not continuing as Parish Councillor was carried.

County Steering Group: David Phelps had attended the meeting which he said all Councillors should attend as it gave the opportunity to speak direct to County Councillors and he had been able to get promises about the road calming/crossing for Trewetha Lane and work on Hartland Road that was needed.

Gypsy Sites

A draft plan from the County Council arising from new laws for the provision of adequate sites – comments to be submitted by 15th. May. Olive Strout interpolated that Gypsy Lane, St. Endellion, was the traditional site. The meeting decided that as there were never any gypsies in the Parish, the plan did not apply.

CLERK'S REPORT

David Bolton asked the Clerk to contact the Fire Department to see if they would hose down Cartway Cove which was full of rubbish again.

Tall strawberry picking signs at St. Endellion were not accepted by the Planning Department as this is an Area of Great Landscape Value.

An appeal to allow the removal of the stone wall in Trewetha Lane behind Higher Barn had been refused. Cllr. Bill Dawe said, 'For God's Sake let's keep Port Isaac as it is!'

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

A building to replace a garage at The Boathouse, Trelights, was considered far too big for the site and not smaller than the previous application. The meeting was horrified to see this full-planning application was stamped 'delegation possible'.

An application for listed building consent to re-form opening and part-glaze front door at the former chapel, Roscarrock Hill, for Mr. and Mrs. Hawkins received support.

Support was also given for an application to add a sun room and family room at 'Silvershell', 12 New Road, and to another application to provide slate-hanging on the south, east, and west elevations of Tartar Farm, Port Gaverne.

Village Hall - Donation

This item had been held over until the end of the meeting to give councillors time to study the copy of the accounts tabled. Cllr. Dawe was in favour but declared an interest as he serves on the Village Hall management committee. Bill Norris pointed out that if it were not from a money-raising activity by Jon Cleave and proceeds from the Raft Race the Hall would have a deficit. 'As a Village Hall it is a complete wash out' he said. David Phelps said this was irrelevant to the present subject which was the funding of a money-raising project. If the Hall got in the red and the Committee was disbanded, the Parish Council have to take over. The money will help the repair fabric of the building. Bill Norris thought the scheme to be a commercial project.

Mr. Barriball called for a costing to show how the money would be used. David Philp said the meeting was not getting the point – that a lot of village people had already donated – and the project will also provide money for the Playgroup, school, etc. Henry Symóns said that the project was going ahead and the idea is to help Port Isaac and to bring visitors. 'Without visitors we would be in a very poor way.' It was decided on a vote that the matter should be considered fully at the next meeting.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 15th. May at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

A GREAT SUCCESS

Thanks to Responsible Dog Owners

Walking around Port Isaac has now become more enjoyable thanks to the provision by North Cornwall District Council of 21 dog litter bins, and the co-operation of the public.

The Council's spokesman said, 'Since the scheme was introduced in January 1995 there has been a significant drop in dog fouling in the Port Isaac area. This is due entirely to the co-operation of the dog owners and we hope that the success so far achieved will continue. There are still a few dog owners who are not using the facilities and we hope that they will start to do so in the future, which can only add to the benefit of looking after their area.

Councillor Ken White, the Chairman of the Council said, 'I do hope that this scheme will continue to be successful and with the tourist season about to start I am sure that it will make Port Isaac a cleaner and healthier place to both live and visit. We also hope that the success achieved in Port Isaac can be repeated in other areas of the district where similar problems occur'.



B. B. C. Radio Cornwall






LOCAL HISTORY GROUP
