Nobody seems to go to Newquay for instance. The Heritage Coast Service, however, is very helpful getting stuff to Bude for us.

New Accommodation Guide

We eventually hope to produce a proper Guide to accommodation plus all the other services that are available. Robin Penna is working on it currently, trying to produce something effective but not too expensive! Weight is also important, as many of the Guides are sent out with other people's literature e.g. The North Cornwall Guide. We intend to include advertisements by local shops and services who have not had this opportunity so far. The layout will be better and again if funds allow - it may even have a colour cover. We are funded by the local businesses so the more co-operation we get, the more we can do.

What's On Guide

This was produced - with difficulty - it is impossible to find out what is going to happen especially as so many events are organised at the last moment. 2,000 were printed but we shan't be able produce it next year as it involves too much hard work just when the busy season starts and nobody has enough time to spare.

Next Year?

For obvious reasons, the Committee doesn't meet during the summer. This is being written by 'midnight oil'. The first meeting will be after we have all had a break - in November, when decisions about next year will be made.

PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 14th. August. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Richard Hambly, Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, Jill O,Connor, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Apologies were received from: Harold Barriball, and Mark Provis.

(Those of us who arrived before 7.30 found the room cluttered up with some large, heavy table tops which had to be carried out.)

Public Discussion

A number of the public were present including Mrs. Carole Lee who had come with her mother in a wheel chair to plead for the retention of the steps on the cliff path. She said that a ramp would simply be too steep.

Peggy Richards spoke about Neighbourhood Watch and also said there had been some thefts, from cars, of uniforms subsequently used for unlawful purposes.

She also asked about the conservation aspect of the intended extension to the Playing Field and hoped that the children's play equipment would not be moved to a site where it could be seen less easily.

Eric Stokes suggested an ex-gratia payment to Eddie Fletcher and Kenny Webster for the free services they provide for the St. Breward Band. Elsie Ferguson, while working at an exhibition in Port Isaac, had learned that many former visitors no longer stayed in the village because 'it isn't the Port Isaac they knew'.

Robin Penna asked when the street light in Margaret's Lane was going to be cleared, and whether anything could be done to tidy up 'Minepit Corner' (Back Hill/Trewetha Lane).

Finance

With the Treasurer (Current) Account standing at £29.59, Malcolm Lee asked for £1,000 to be transferred from the High Interest Account to cover monthly expenditure of £908.80. This was approved.

It was agreed to donate £100 to the Rowing Club to help with the purchase of the gig.

The decision was taken not to get involved with donations in connection with St. Breward Band.

Ambulance Response Times

Bryan Nicholls called for an investigation into the length of time it takes an ambulance to arrive here. In three cases it had taken at least 40 minutes, not the official 19 minutes. The Ambulance Service is to be asked for details which will be passed on to MP Paul Tyler.

Planning Meetings

Bryan Nicholls said the District Councillor should attend all Parish Council planning meetings and that the meeting day should be arranged to make this possible if necessary.

Wheel Chair Ramp

Bryan Nicholls claimed that he could not have pulled his mother up the steps on the coast path and said a ramp was needed. He received support in the form of a letter from Mr. Neild whose wife uses a wheelchair and lives nearby. The matter is to be referred to County Highways.

Standing Orders and Procedure

New Standing Orders for the Council were examined and approved.

Fish Loading at Night

People at Hillson Close had complained about noise cause by fish loading at eleven o'clock one night in July. While this late loading is sometimes unavoidable, those involved are to be asked to make as little noise as possible.

Undergrounding of Cables

South West Electricity have suggested that the Parish Council contact British Telecom and the District Council to include telephone and street lighting lines in any future scheme to put cables underground. Streets considered most eligible for this are Roscarrock Hill, Church Hill, Dolphin Street, and Rose Hill.

Dress Damaged by Wet Paint

A letter from a Mrs. Broad complained that when she was on the Main her pink dress had been damaged by wet paint on a seat with no 'wet paint' sign on it. However, John Sweet had been seen putting signs on, and removing them next day, so it was decided Mrs. Broad should take the matter up herself with Cornhill Insurance, the Council's insurers.

Parish Survey

Malcolm Lee produced a specimen of a survey form used recently by St. Kew Parish Council and pointed out the useful information it gleaned from the electorate – who was willing to help with the Hospital Car Service for example and generally what people felt about housing needs, transport, employment, etc. Bryan Nicholls feared that most opinions would be voiced by second home owners and that local people didn't want a survey. David Philp said the Council should think about whole parish – Trelights and some of the remoter places were easily forgotten. David Phelps thought it a 'lot of rubbish' and was totally against it. The scheme was finally rejected by a vote of five to four.

Parish Paths Partnership

A proposed schedule of footpath work to be done on the Port Isaac Valley – Port Gaverne walk was approved. The cost would be covered by the PPP scheme.

REPORTS

District Councillor: Bill Dawe spoke of new litter baskets installed in the village and heard from Bryan Nicholls that the bins over the leat were not being washed out.

Chairman: On a visit to the Playgroup, Henry Symons had been very impressed by the children's good behaviour, and he saw that the Parish Council donation had been well spent on good quality, long-lasting equipment.

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For a FREE survey call: Bernie Corrigan (Retd. D & C Police) on 01208 (880188) Camelford Leisure Group: Jill O'Connor said that a new Fitness Studio would be in operation at Camelford by the end of October.

Playing Field: Malcolm Lee explained that Mr. Bell, surveyor, had been co-opted to the purchasing committee, as an unpaid volunteer, for the benefit of his wide knowledge. The committee is only concerned with the purchase of the field not the development.

Seats: David Phelps said all the seats had been painted and that Mr. Sweet had done a good job.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

a. Permission for an extension at the rear of no. 22 Tintagel Terrace had been refused by the Planning Authority.

b. Permission for some work on a building at Trefreock had been accepted.

c. Cornwall County Council apologised for the delay but said the direction signs at the top of Back Hill would be made and erected soon – but not this season.

d. The landowner is being consulted about overhanging brambles on the path at Trewetha Lane/Mayfield, while the District Council is thought to own the fence at the other side of Mayfield. This matter was referred to Bill Dawe.

e. A letter from Henry Stickland (Harbour Shop) suggested changing the 'Unsuitable for Caravans' signs to include the words 'and large caravanettes' as these vehicles get into difficulties in the village. The Council is to write to County Highways.

f. A copy of a letter from the Assistant Countryside Officer to the County Transportation Officer expressing delight at the more appropriate wooden finger post which has replaced the aluminium highway signs next to the Longcross stone.

g. A report, from Mrs. Barron, received while at the Heritage Coast Mobile Interpretation Centre, that footpath no. 17 – from Trewetha to Tresungers – has an unopenable gate, a field with an electric fence around it and an impassable stream crossing.

PLANS

No objections were raised to the following planning applications: Porch and Conservatory, Trecreege, Trelights. Renovation of Barn to Self-Catering Cottage, Trewetha. Demolition and Reconstruction of Second Floor at 22 Fore Street.

Are they afraid what a survey would reveal, that it may not fit in with their ideas or even plans! Having lived in a country years ago where THEY always knew best, the people suffered. Let us beware that this does not happen in our village, which I dearly love. Let us get the Parish Council to express OUR wishes. After all, they are supposed to represent US.
