Chairman's Message

M Bartlett and the address was given by the Revd. Alan Wainwright, a friend of Jack's for many years. The lesson was read by Wendy, Jack's daughter, and the organist was Mr. Charles Honey. Jack's favourite hynns were sung including 'The Old Rugged Cross'. Interment was at St. Endellion. Donations in lieu of flowers were for the requirements of the Port Isaac Surgery. We express our sincere sympathy to Daisy and her family in their bereavement.

The family of the late Jack Hicks would like to thank everyone who helped when he was ill. Also the doctors and nurses of the Port Isaac Surgery and to the many friends who visited him. Thanks also for the many cards and donations (for The Surgery). Thanks to Undertaker Ian Honey, to Father Michael and Father Wainwright for taking the funeral service.

PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Chapel Room, Trelights, on Monday 19th. February. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Harold Barriball, Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, Jill O'Connor, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, and Bryan Richards.

Apologies were received from: Richard Hambly, Mark Provis, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

The chair was taken by David Phelps, in the absence of Henry Symons.

Public Discussion

Robin Penna asked again about information for visitors on refuse collections – especially at bank holidays. He had produced a photographic display of the parish notice boards.

Plans

The Council recommended outline plans by Mr. G. M. May to demolish the old Tregaverne farmhouse and erect a new one nearer the road.

Finance

The balance of £91.82 from last month is insufficient for this month's £569.12. payments so Malcolm Lee proposed a transfer of £600 from the high interest account. This was carried, and leaves £1996.34 in the high interest account and £122.91 in the treasurer account.

The total expenditure to date, £8124.27 is equivalent to 96% of the annual precept.

A one-off payment of £15 was made to Kenny Webster for volunteered help moving seats, and a morning's use of his tractor and trailer.

St. Endellion Churchyard

Revd. Prebendary Michael Bartlett was asked to speak about the maintenance costs for St. Endellion churchyard. Revd. Michael said it was getting difficult to maintain the standard of grass cutting and clearing, and felt it unfair that the church should bear 'the lion's share' of the costs of a community facility. The average annual income was a little more than £1,600: about £1,000 from burials and £100 from strewing ashes, and including the £400 Parish Council grant. Voluntary work is done and use of machinery is given without charge, nevertheless the annual cutting cost is £1,400, and clearing shale, litter collection, and tree trimming is about £400 – a total of about £1,800. There is £350 income from six tombs.

When the churchyard is full in about ten years time, it will be closed and the new churchyard, recently purchased by the Parish Council, will come into use. The church will still maintain the old churchyard but the new one will be the responsibility of the Parish or District Council.

Councillor Dawe said it would be better not to involve the District Council because they might uproot the old gravestones and put them around the edge of the ground to facilitate maintenance. Bryan Richards felt that if the church costs were less, the Parish Council would be more willing to help. Revd. Michael said single cuts as and when needed, worked out more expensive.

David Phelps felt the church should accept the lowest tender, as the Parish Council had to do. Malcolm Lee queried the announcement that the Parish Council would have to bear the cost of running the new graveyard when it opens.

Notice Boards

The photographic display was commended as it showed exactly the condition of the boards. No

provision has been made in next year's budget for renovating all the boards so it was proposed that they be dealt with one per year, priority to be given to the board at the Platt where the wood is too hard for drawing pins. Councillor Dawe suggested a board of softer wood fixed to the existing frame. Work on the board will take place within six months – the others will be painted. Duchy Woodlands and the Forestry Commission will be asked for new board prices.

Footpath New Road

Mr. Dingle had asked that ashes should not be put on the path, but agreed that the problem was not serious and the item was not discussed.

District Councillor's Report

Councillor Dawe was concerned that Compass Services (N.C.D.C.) were to only collect refuse from Tuesday to Friday, so that rubbish put out on Fridays or Saturdays by visitors would hang around until Tuesday. The Council suggested that he should urge N.C.D.C. to print leaflets advising holidaymakers of the arrangements. Malcolm Lee said it would help if notices were printed in the Cornish Guardian, especially at bank holidays when the collections took place on different days.

Councillor Dawe reported success in having the proposed dwelling in Trewetha Lane reduced to a single storey and sited lower. His pressure to have the pavements in Hartland Road repaired seemed to be in vain and he did not know when they would be done. A drain near the former post office in Trelights, which had been sunk by a heavy vehicle, was to be replaced.

The Seat Committee replying to an enquiry said memorial plaques were not normally put on existing seats, only those which had been donated. Seats now cost between $\pounds 250 - \pounds 350$ each depending on the fixing. No budget has been provided for seat replacements.

Mr. Barriball said that the seat adjacent to Trelights chapel had not yet been moved but could be done with some assistance.

Bryan Richards, a member of the seat committee – expressed exasperation at not being notified of activities. He also wanted to know why the numbering of the seats had not yet taken place. He was informed that the contractor had obtained the numbers and the work would be done as soon as possible.

Journal

Bryan Nicholls asked about items 'Ambulance Response Times', 'Police Response', and 'Drug Problems' – all serious matters the Parish Council should try and do something about. He also asked about Port Gaverne Hill. Barbara Willmott, Clerk, said Police Liaison meetings were held for people to make comments about police topics. Other answers would come up in 'Clerk's Correspondence' and in future this will precede the 'Journal' item.

Questions about the Harbour Commissioners proposed intention to close the beach car park were raised. There is a need for the public to know what's happening and if there has been a change of mind this should be announced. A letter is to be sent to the Chairman, Dugald Sproull. It was felt that there should be a Parish Council representative on the committee of the Harbour Commissioners as the harbour was an important part of the village.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. A letter about ambulance response times from West Country Ambulance Services NHS Trust, Plymouth stated that Devon and Cornwall are a 'Rural Area' where a response to an incident is required within 19 minutes on 95%, and 8 minutes on 50% of occasions. Patients should be in hospital no more than 15 minutes later than times recommended by a doctor on 95% of occasions. However, more detailed information is needed about the 30, 40, and 50 minute incidents reported by the Parish Council – there are 230,000 records on the ambulance computer.

The West Country Ambulance Services Trust, with Cornwall and Isles of Scilly District and Family Health Services Authorities, is reviewing ambulance service provision throughout Cornwall and a report is expected in June.

b. A letter from the Highway Authority and another from the Traffic Management Group pointed out the large number of applications for road alterations so there was very little chance of a one-way system in Trewetha Lane especially with presently available financial resources but the request will be added to the list.

c. A letter from Harvey Lander said that part of Hartland Road was not considered to need resurfacing and therefore was not been included in recent work. Weeds will, however, be removed.

d. The light has been installed in Rose Hill at the bottom of Margaret's Lane.

e. Mr. and Mrs. McCrohon's plans for a car port in Rose Hill have been refused on conservation area grounds and they are going to appeal.

f. A letter from Paul Tyler MP gave details about a vigil: 'Saving Lives at Kennards House' to be held on Saturday 9th. March (tomorrow) at the notorious road junction and turn-off point for North Cornwall. Notices are to be put up.

g. All members of the Council are invited to the Port Isaac and District Tourism Association Annual General Meeting at the Old School Hotel at 7.30pm. on Thursday 21st. March.

h. A questionnaire on 'Flooding Problems', from the National Rivers Authority, will be completed and returned.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 11th. March at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Plans

David Phelps abstained from voting on signs to Tregellist Farm on B3314 and at junction with road to Trevinnick, as he felt that signs were proliferating at an alarming rate. Cllr. Dawe, while seconding the motion for approval of the signs agreed in principle with David's comment and said he would urge the District Council to generally have signs grouped on one post where possible. The application was recommended for approval with no other observations.

Plans for the change of use of Demelza's Gift Shop, Rose Hill, to a dwelling, had the full recommendation of the Council.

Purchase of Playing Fields

In order to make sure the situation was quite clear, Malcolm Lee first asked for and obtained the agreement of the Council to the vendor's new terms which no longer include, in the sale, the patch of scrub land down the side of Port Gaverne Valley.

The total cost of the purchase will now be $\pounds 14, 124$, including costs of about $\pounds 2,000$, but he proposed that the full approved loan of $\pounds 16,000$ be maintained to provide money for the necessary fencing. Fixed rate repayments to the Public Works Loans Board will be $\pounds 1,650$ per annum for the next twenty years – about 8%.

The public were excluded from the last item -Review of Clerk's Salary - under the provisions of the Local Government Act of 1972, on the grounds that it involved the likely disclosure of exempt information.
