PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 13th. May. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Harold Barriball, Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Malcolm Lee, Bryan Nicholls, David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons.

Apologies were received from: Richard Hambly, Jill O'Connor, David Phelps, and Mark Provis.

Election of Officers

This was the Annual General Meeting and the following officers were elected by the Council: Chairman - Henry Symons, Treasurer - Malcolm Lee, Footpath Officer - Malcolm Lee, Representative to the Village Hall Committee -Bill Dawe, Trelights Village Representatives -Harold Barriball and Bill Dawe. The positions of Vice Chairman and Representative to the Cornwall Association for Town and Parish Councils (C.A.P.T.C.) were left till the next meeting as the nominees were absent.

The following committees were also elected: Playing Fields Advisory Working Party – David Philp and Bryan Richards. Seats – Harold Barriball, Bryan Nicholls, and Bryan Richards. The Roads Representative ('Tarmac and

Chippings') will be decided when the nominee is present.

Bill Norris continues in his post as Representative to the Board of Governors of Port Isaac School until August.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards reported that the dog bins were being filled with household rubbish so that people were having to leave bags of dog waste underneath them. She also queried whether the £3,000 allocated for emptying the bins was being misappropriated as the bins were not being emptied by the special vehicle and the waste matter was no longer being incinerated.

She continued that it would be utter madness to remove the gates at the Playing Fields. This would only encourage children to run across the road. There also had been a red van left in the car park for several days which had occasioned many telephone calls to herself from people wanting to know when it was going to be removed. Henry Symons explained that the police had taken no action as the car park was private ground and if the Parish Council towed the vehicle out of the car park it would have to be left where it would block the B.3267 road.

Elsie Ferguson asked for clarification of a point made last month when it was averred that this Parish Council was not bound by decisions made by a previous Council and therefore no need had been felt for a referendum concerning the addition to the Playing Fields. Henry Symons said that whereas any legal agreement, such as a loan, entered into by a Council was binding on future Councils, other decisions could not be as this could mean that an outgoing Council could, for instance, make decisions to frustrate the incoming one.

Robin Penna agreed with Peggy Richards about the Playing Fields gates and pointed out that these had originally been installed because of dumped vehicles, illegal parking, etc. He also pointed out that Dr. and Mrs. Barron own the land over which the Parish Council have a right of access (and for which they pay an annual wayleave), not the other way round as given in minute 176. He also asked if the dog bin at the junction of New Road and Trewetha Lane could be moved as it blocked the view to the left of car drivers joining the junction when coming up from Rose Hill, the Village Hall, etc.

Planning Applications

Amended plans for erection of a house and garage, with access to Trewetha Lane, for Mr. and Mrs. R. Carter, were accepted on provided that these plans, and the building regulations, were observed precisely.

The renewal of permission for the change of use of land for a cemetery extension at St. Endellion were acknowledged, without observation.

Financial Statement

Malcolm Lee presented the statement as at 6th. May showing receipt of the first half of the Annual Precept in the sum of £5,250. The statement also detailed monthly expenditure of £973.60. It was proposed, and carried, that £4,200 be transferred to the High Interest Account where the balance, (including £42.48 annual interest) is now £6,791.57. The balance left in the Treasurer Account being £187.76

A decision to make a donation to Young People, Cornwall, was deferred until next month as Youth Group leader Jill O'Connor was absent.

Signs on Church Hill

A letter from Ted Childs who owns Tremaine cottage at the bottom of the hill complained at the personal stress and financial expense they have suffered as the result of many unsuitable vehicles using the narrow street and seriously damaging the front of their building. There had been three more incidents since the last Parish Council meeting. One day there could be a brake failure with one of these large vehicles. A few simple signs could obviate all this trouble.

A letter from the Western National Bus Company also complained about the poor signs and reported that a driver on a summer Sunday route, where some of the drivers come from Newquay and Padstow, had mistakenly tried to drive through Port Isaac via Church Hill but had, fortunately, not damaged the bus.

Malcolm Lee pointed out that it was now five months since County Highways had agreed to improve matters but are presently ignoring the situation. He proposed that a strong letter be sent asking for an immediate consultation.

Gates at the Playing Fields

This item had been put on the agenda by David Phelps who was reported as being anxious about the possible cost of repairing the existing gates and wanting them removed temporarily to see what difference this would make. In the

opinion of a Police Accident Officer who had been consulted, the absence of gates would encourage young people riding bicycles down the hill at Hillson Close to shoot straight across the main road into the Playing Fields car park. David Philp reminded the Council of their earlier attempts to get a pedestrian crossing and asked why they now wanted to get rid of the gates and increase the danger. He said he would not want to be a Parish Councillor if one child were to be killed as a result of Council action. Malcolm Lee said that he wanted to have nothing to do with an 'experiment' that could jeopardise the safety of our children. Bill Dawe proposed that no action be taken as the matter was too serious to play around with. This was carried.

Bryan Richards asked what the cost of rehanging the gates would be and was told that Taylormade Ltd. are to provide a quotation.

Bryan Nicholls said that the gates should be kept locked and that anyone who used the Playing Fields should have a key. There should also be a key kept at the Doctors' Surgery for use by the Air Ambulance.

Pavement in Hartland Road

Bill Dawe said he had visited Hartland Road and noted that the work, including the pavement in New Road, had not been done yet in spite of promises by the District Council and County Highways that it would be completed by the end of April. If someone should fall on the rough pavement, however, it is possible that the Council might be held liable.

Discussion of Minor Plans

A proposal by David Phelps to discuss, at the Chairman's discretion, minor planning applications received after publication of the agenda. Henry Symons underlined the legal requirement that the agenda must specify the business to be discussed and that the Parish Council was not in a position to take the action proposed. It was also not possible to ask for an extension to the time limit given for the Parish Council observations to be made because the submission of



plans for Parish Council inspection was a courtesy extended by the District Planning Department, and not a statutory requirement. North Cornwall was one of the few councils which still extended this courtesy to its Parish Councils. It will still be necessary, therefore, to call interim meetings for the purpose of discussing all planning applications received.

Sewage in Port Isaac Harbour.

A letter from a visitor, Mr. Terry, Leighon-Sea, complained that human waste and tissue paper had been seen emanating from a pipe jutting out of the cliffs just below Northcliff. The Parish Council will write to the Environmental Agency and South West Water Authority and a reply is to be sent to Mr. Terry.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. The Highway Authority stated, in a letter, that the direction sign in New Road opposite Penreal Estates had been erected in a different position from that originally decided after a householder complained, it was, nevertheless perfectly adequate and fully visible at the point from which it would be read at the correct speed for the road.

b. A letter from Amanada Martin, Footpath Officer, thanking all who took part in the Parish Paths Partnership scheme at Port Isaac Millpool.

c. The redundant electricity pole opposite the Cornish Cafe has been removed.

d. A request from the Dog Warden for advice on where to put up new notices. Also to advise the Parish Council that there would soon be more powers for Councils to prosecute people for breaches of the dog laws.

e. A request from Trelights Village Green Committee to use Trelights Green for a Coffee Morning on Tuesday 4th. June and for a Barbecue on Wednesday 15th. August. The Playgroup had also requested permission to hold a 'Family Fun' Day in the Playing Fields on Sunday 28th. July

Bryan Nicholls asked about Police surveillance in view of the fact that there had been several car break-ins recently. The Chief Inspector will be asked to come and speak to the Parish

Bryan Richards reported that the seats had now all been numbered. He also queried whether a seat at the Playing Field had been fixed down properly, as requested by the Council, and who had given authority for it to be moved over to a completely new position.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 10th. June at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Rooms, Trelights.



Binoculars


