

VILLAGE HALL

Annual General Meeting

In spite of intensive advertising, there was no public support for the Hall at the Annual General Meeting on Thursday 13th. June. In the absence of the Chairman, the meeting was chaired by David Phelps, Vice Chairman. We were pleased that the meeting was also attended by Councillor Bill Dawe, and Henry Symons, Chairman of the Parish Council. The other three remaining members of the Management Committee, George Oxley Hon. Treasurer, Lynn Prescott Hon. Secretary, and Robin Penna, felt that running the hall has become a pointless exercise and decided to hand over to the Custodian Trustees of the Charity - St. Endellion Parish Council.

The keys, diary, accounts, minutes, and correspondence were therefore handed to Henry Symons.

Improvements

The last eighteen years has seen a great deal of activity at the Hall and many improvements have been made to the building by successive committees, especially under the chairmanship of John Powell, during which time public grants were obtained, the new toilets constructed, a kitchen extension added at the rear, and dressing room facilities provided. Much money has also been expended on continuous upgrading of the safety arrangements as required from time to time by the authorities to accord with the provisions of the public entertainments licence.

RITA COWLING

The village has lost its oldest resident by the death in hospital of Mrs. Rita Cowling at the age of 95 years. She had lived in Trelights for the greater part of her life, apart from the war years when she served as a nurse in Plymouth during the heavy air raids there. She later came back home and was for a long period closely connected with the Trelights Methodist Church holding a number of offices including that of organist. She was the post lady up to her retirement, delivering the mail (on foot) to the many outlying farms in the parish. She and her late husband George were both valued members of the Wadebridge Old Cornwall Society. The funeral on Saturday June 1st. was held at the Collegiate Parish Church of St. Endellion, and was attended by a large congregation. The service was conducted by the Methodist minister from Wadebridge, the Revd. Glyn Lister, who also officiated at the interment in the Churchvard.

The relatives of the late Mrs. Rita Cowling of 'Llanbrydn', Trelights, would like to thank all who attended the funeral service, the Revd. Glyn Lister, the doctors and staff of the Port Isaac Surgery, the staff of the Warleggan Ward, Bodmin. A special thanks to Miss Violet Baker for all her great help and kindness over such a long period, also to Ron and David Bray for making the funeral arrangements. Also for donations in lieu of flowers which were for the funds of the British Red Cross Society.

Mr. R. M. NORTH

We regret to record the sudden death of Robin North at his home in Putney, London, on April 4th. Mr. North was 85 years of age. With his wife, Emsie, who died in 1994, Robin bought, what is now no. 3 Fore Street, as a holiday home in 1948. He was a well known figure around the village, and in the Golden Lion, until the early 1980's, when Emsie's poor health tied them to London. 3 Fore Street is still owned by his daughter and son-in-law, Elizabeth and Peter Wormald. We extend our sympathy to his relatives.

No Longer Needed

But the days of the Port Isaac Players are, sadly, past, and no longer is the Hall needed, apparently, for the jumble sales, discos, etc. which were its mainstay. The lack of car parking space at the hall and the need to climb steps are cited as the main reasons for not using the Hall. This is indeed a great shame as it is probably one of the finest structures of its kind to be found anywhere having been built in a period of great optimism. Not many villages can afford a hall of this size with such a high ceiling and with such solid walls. Those who attended the Port Isaac Chorale concert recently will be able to testify to the acoustics - and no microphones were used other than those for the recordings.

The Future

It will be seen what the future holds for the building, there is much talk of 'Project 2000' -David Phelps and Henry Symons were able to tell us much about this – with plans for a multi-purpose hall at the playing fields, a much better site than Trewetha Lane. Meanwhile, however, those that need the old hall, such as the main users – Port Isaac Playgroup – may find that it will still have a role to play for some time yet.

Memories

I can remember the hall when it was still 'The Temperance Hall' - in the 1940's and 1950's with weekly film shows, barn dances, concerts, The Port Isaac Drama Group - who put on real plays on a regular basis for the visitors during the summer, not to mention the winter pantomimes, and I am very sad that the hall seems no longer to be really needed by the Port Isaac community.

Robin Penna.

A meeting of the Parish Council at the Village Hall on Monday 24th. June.

Six members of the public attended. Robin Penna, pointed out that the committee had been discouraged by the lack of village interest.

Henry Symons (chairman) said The contractor had been asked to stop painting the outside for the time being - but there was no shortage of money. Malcolm Lee said he felt it was wrong to ask a contractor to stop his work when an agreement had already been honoured. The decision was reversed.

Henry Symons explained Parish Council responsibility for maintaining the Hall, in the absence of a committee, which work is better done by a management committee therefore the public will be asked to form one by September. Bryan Richards asked where this committee will come from given that there was so little public interest at the A.G.M. and at this meeting. David Phelps said the A.G.M. was thoroughly advertised, 'tonight' was even added to the posters. Henry Symons understands that some people are prepared to come forward.

The Raft Race will take place as usual as those who organise it are willing to do so again.

Uncertainty about who is presently holding the Fire Certificate will need to be clarified.

Mark Provis expressed considerable anxiety that Parish Council money might be spent on the Hall but was assured that with about £2,000 cash in hand, there is no immediate problem. Jill O'Connor said the Hall is useful for Discos

which are not allowed at the Church Hall.

PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Chapel Room, Trelights, on Monday 10th. June. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Harold Barriball, Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Richard Hambly, Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, Jill O'Connor, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Apologies were received from: Mark Provis.

Election of Officers

David Phelps was re-elected as Vice Chairman, and representative to the Cornwall Association of Town and Parish Councils. Bryan Richards was appointed as 'back up' to the latter position. Mark Provis had previously signified his willingness to carry on as 'Roads' Officer (or 'Tarmac and Chippings' as it is usually described) and was appointed in his absence.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards expressed disgust at the condition of the grass around the telephone box at Mayfield. She also felt that public opinion was against the idea of locking the playing field gates, firstly, because children will climb a locked gate and jump off the top into the road, and, secondly, because in an emergency the key might not be immediately available for the air or land ambulance to gain access. A better gate with an easier method of fastening was needed. She also reported that, in future, the police will furnish her with a monthly report which she can hand to the clerk to be read out.

Mrs. Brown complained about traffic which was still travelling at speed past The Villas, in spite of the signs. The problem was especially bad during the Music Festival at St. Endellion. She also expressed anxiety at plans to cut some trees at Marshall Way and hoped that this would only be done with official consent and supervision. Henry Symons informed her that official planning permission, detailing what could be done, had been given.

Robin Penna asked again for the dog litter bin, which presently blocks the visibility at a very difficult corner, to be moved from the junction of Trewetha Lane and New Road. He also asked why the notice board at The Platt had not been improved as had been decided [in February].

Planning Applications

A. Listed Building consent for the enlargement of retail fish shop by extending into internal storage area previously commenced without consent. Listed building, 1 Fore Street. Mr. D. B. Knight. The Council were pleased with the improvement Dennis Knight had made and thought the application should be approved.

B. Erection of extension, full planning, Agar Cottage, Trelights. Mr. C. M. St. John O'Grady. The Council would prefer a pitched roof instead of a flat one.

C. Information only (application approved by Chairman) concerning reduction in roof height by 570mm of dwelling in Trewetha Lane, for Mr. and Mrs. R. Carter.

D. Information only. Appeal by Mr. and Mrs. R. Carey concerning site at Trelights.

Financial Statement

A. Malcolm Lee received approval to transfer \pounds 400 to the current account, leaving a balance of \pounds 6,791 in the High Interest account. Total accounts for payment were \pounds 443.05 of which \pounds 222.90 was in connection with the Parish Paths Project and would be reimbursed 100%.

B. Jill O'Connor felt that a donation to 'Young People, Cornwall' would not be appropriate.

C. It was decided to make the same donation as previously, £425, towards the upkeep of St. Endellion Churchyard but possibly to increase this later after accounts had been received.

D. A donation of £150 was granted to Port Isaac Playgroup.

E. A request from the Fireworks Committee led by Ron Holmes has led to the realisation that if the Parish Council runs the event it would be covered by the existing insurance, subject to possible policy changes in September. VAT would also be recoverable on the cost of fireworks purchased for the Committee by the Parish Council, resulting in an extra £100 to spend. It was stressed, however, that the Council would not actually spend any money on fireworks. Malcolm Lee was seconded onto the Fireworks Committee as Parish Council representative.

F. A donation of £150 to Trio Newsletter.

Port Isaac Village Hall

The Clerk read out an invitation to attend the Annual General Meeting which stressed the importance of the outcome of this meeting in the future continuation of the hall.

Pedestrian Walkway

A letter from Mr. Dunford of Silvershell Road suggested that a footpath could be created inside the hedge of the new playing field to allow pedestrians to avoid walking on the road at this dangerous point. Any decision on this matter was deferred until the plans for the new playing field are considered.

Playing Field Gates

The decision taken at the last meeting – to padlock the gates – was found to be invalid as the proposal had not been on the published agenda. After a discussion in which various ideas were discussed, namely, a kissing gate to allow people into the playing field when the gates were locked, a quotation for the proper repair enabling this work to be carried out so that the gates would no longer be practically impossible to shut, and warning signs 'car park – at your own risk', it was finally decided that the gates would not be locked. Richard Hambly said that even if the gates were locked it would be little impediment to the ambulance and air ambulance crews who quite often had to pass stretchers over four- and five-foot walls.

Pedestrian Crossing in Wadebridge

Henry Symons received the full backing of the Council to send a letter of support for a pedestrian crossing in Wadebridge.

District Councillor's Report

Bill Dawe said that the badly sited dog bin at the junction of Trewetha Lane and New Road had been reported to Mr. Magee. He also said that whoever was in charge of works at Hartland Road didn't seem to know what they were doing.

Chairman's Report

Henry Symons noted that there had been a complaint from the residents of 'Garrick' about balls from the playing fields being retrieved from their garden. It was thought that the problem might be alleviated when the playing fields were re-planned as the goal mouth would probably no longer be next to the fence. It was also pointed out that the Parish Council did not own the land adjacent to the fence in question.

[The same problem was discussed thoroughly by an earlier Parish Council in 1986/87. See Trio issues 51, 52, 56, and 57.]

Playing Field Committee

David Philp reported that a lot of rubbish, bottles, tin cans, and – gravel from the car park, had been picked up off the field. He asked for the fencing of the car park area to be put on next month's agenda. He also pointed out that there was a large hole in the fence of 'Garrick'.

Clerk's Correspondence

A. The signs for Church Hill have been altered and a site meeting will be arranged before they are put up.

B. A letter from Dennis Knight deplored the condition of the verges in Port Isaac and Trelights. David Phelps said that the District Council should be consulted to discover when they would cut the grass. Meanwhile the work should be put out to tender. He invited councillors to walk around the village with him to take notes and report back to the next meeting. 'We want Port Isaac to be the best looking village in Cornwall,' he said.

C. There will be no traffic-calming scheme for the main road into Port Isaac – there are far too many applications but no resources to fund most of them. Neither of the schemes applied for locally is to be considered.

Journal

Bryan Nicholls reported that the person in charge of works being carried out at Hartland Road had laid a tarmac path through Tommy Sherratt's garden but done nothing about the path outside Elaine Found's house. Tarmac had been laid on other paths which had not been prepared first so that they were already breaking up and weeds were coming through. 'It is the Council Tax payers who are paying for these mistakes,' he said.

Bryan Richards inquired about the seat at the playing fields which had not been fixed. He was given authority to liaise directly with John Sweet about the correct position of the seat and a better method of clamping it down. He also pointed out that at the last two meetings he had asked for quotations for repairing the playing field gates.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 8th. July at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

The exhibition of old photographs of the village with previous choirs and singers also caused a lot of interest for young and old alike.


The concert has been recorded and tapes will be available soon from choir members. A donation from each tape sold will go to the Mermaid Appeal. Liz Rowe.


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North Cornwall

Where hearts can ever be At peace, at rest and oh, so free. Where this mystic place will always be A bliss. A joy. A sanctity.


