PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 8th. July. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes. Present were: Harold Barriball, Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Richard Hambly, Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, Jill O'Connor, David Philp, Mark Provis, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Apologies were received from: David Phelps. Sergeant Steve Hubber of Wadebridge Police Station spoke about managing with very small manpower which is not likely to improve so efficiency is very important. To improve 999 call response times, checked by the government to ensure no more than 15 minutes wait, three men have gone to Bodmin where they will not be tied up by paper work. This means, unfortunately, that the local men, involved with investigative work, now have more paper work.

Port Isaac is particularly quiet at present apart from vehicle tampering at the car park and an attempted burglary at the Old Drug Store.

Cars parked at isolated spots along the Camel Trail are increasingly vulnerable to thieves on bicycles. There is no manpower for 'the bobby on the beat' and fewer men are available when special crime squads are formed to investigate murders, child abuse, etc. The police get information about drug pushers from users but information fizzles out about suppliers higher up the hierarchy. 'Self-policing', as being tried at Polzeath, seems to be a waste of money.

There were no planning applications.

Public Discussion

Elsie Ferguson asked if it would not be better to have the public discussion at the end of the meeting to enable points to be raised about what had been discussed. Henry Symons suggested that it was better at the beginning as it gave the public an opportunity to make points about items on the agenda, whereas after the meeting, decisions would already have been made.

Peggy Richards said there was now a special van to collect from the dog bins. She thought some of the ideas for improving the Playing Fields gates were good but to lock one gate could cause problems for the fish lorry drivers who remove the centre post to enter the parking area. An extra refuse bin would be a good idea. She also said that the grass at Mayfield and Silvershell Road had been cut at last.

Bryan Nicholls, speaking as a member of the public, launched an angry invective against the Parish Council about St. Endellion churchyard – accepting a low tender meant accepting a low standard of work. He was also angry that a donation of £100 had been made to Trio.

Chairman Henry Symons was visibly upset by this attack and was sorry it had taken place. He pointed out that, as elected members, each councillor was entitled to speak on matters concerning their voters – during the meetings. It was unnecessary for them to make comments in public discussion.

Finance

Malcolm Lee reported a balance of £6,391.57 in the high interest account and £937.14 currently available. With monthly expenditure of £2,049 to meet, he was granted permission to transfer £1,200 from the high interest account. After making the payments, a balance of £87.90 would be left in the current account.

A quote of £263 + vat to repair the climbing frame at Trelights was rejected as scandalously, high. Cllr. Dawe will ask how much one of the fishermen would want to do the rope splicing. Village Hall

Village Hall

Henry Symons reported that a payment had been made but no fire insurance certificate could be found. A fire officer would have to inspect the hall if a public entertainment licence was needed. The Playgroup are not affected as they are not 'public entertainment'. The hall is owned by the Charity Commissioners and the Parish Council have the responsibility for it. If the Council decided to sell the hall, the money would go to the Charity Commissioners unless it could be used in the building of another hall. Nobody has come forward to form a new committee so far. David Philp pointed out that the former committee would have been prepared to continue if they had had some public support. He also agreed that there was apathy, but people worked very hard in the summer.

Playing Fields

Another rubbish bin will be asked for.

The climbing trame has been removed for repair by Bill Norris who has found the work to be more difficult than expected.

The wire fence will have to be replaced as it forms the boundary between the car park and the right of way over the Barron's land. David Philp has obtained quotations for this, to be discussed at the end of the meeting.

It would be possible to lock one of the gates as the fishermen have plenty of notice of the lorries' arrival in which to unlock it.

Notice Boards

A temporary improvement is to be made to the board at the Platt. A design and quotation was received for the five other boards which will be installed one at a time as funds are available. Bryan Nicholls offered to get a further quotation.

Extension at Car Park

Mark Provis said there was nowhere for people to sit and enjoy the view of Port Isaac Bay from the car park and the waste ground beyond the fence could gradually be built up with hardcore which could then be concreted over. The District Council will be approached with the idea.

District Councillor's Report

Bill Dawe said that the grass at Trewetha had finally been cut but the grass at Rock was cut regularly – why not at St. Endellion? There are about 2½ million unemployed of whom about *Continued on the next page.*

one million who were not prepared to work should be made to or forfeit their housing benefits, etc. The work done in the wrong place at Hartland Road was a waste of time -what were the officers doing? The Parish Council spends a lot of time trying to get things like a pedestrian crossing at the school but nothing happens. The dog bin in New Road has still not been moved.

Chairman's Report

Henry Symons spoke about a meeting of local Parish Council chairmen where Tony Philp, Chief Planning Officer, told them about the huge amount of time being taken up since 1991 to prepare the 'Structure Plan' which had been through many drafts and was only now reaching the appeal stage. The document when produced will be out of date by 2006.

In future, under government dictates, Planners will not be able to give Parishes much decision making. Lines being drawn around all villages – will allow no development in 'minor' villages and infilling only in 'major' villages.

Tarmac and Chippings

Mark Provis outlined refuse collection problems in the village. Previously a lorry came to the Platt and wheelie bins there were emptied directly into it. Now the large vehicle used can only get to within 150 yards of the bins which have to wheeled up and down Fore Street. This is very noisy early in the morning and a request has been made for later collections. The new lorry also compresses the rubbish and liquids run out of it down the street. If this had happened before, at least the liquids would have run down the slipway into the sea. A Sunday collection is also to be asked for because the area around the Platt and bottom of Church Hill is a carpet of rubbish by Monday.

Brian Nicholls said the bottle bank needed emptying more often and that a lot of broken glass was being left around.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. Sproulls', Solicitors, are to hold the Land Registry Certificate for the extra ground that has been purchased for the playing fields.

b. Amanda Martin of the Parish Paths Partnership scheme at Bodmin has finished her tour of duty and wished the Council well with the footpath schemes currently in operation.

c. Grants are available for the benefit of voluntary groups and the relevant information will be posted on the Council's notice boards.

Journal

Bryan Richards had asked the appointed contractor to call and discuss the fixing of the seat at the Playing Fields but had not received a visit and wondered if he should ask someone else to deal with it. The Council gave him the necessary permission.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 12th. August at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

DOGS AND THE LAW

From conversations with people who own dogs, it is clear that most of them are responsible for the behaviour of their animals. Others however, seem to be unaware of the law so we thought it might help to print excerpts from the 1990 Act. The Blackthorn Press has a complete copy.

From the

Environmental Protection Act 1990:

All dogs must wear a collar and clearly-displayed tag bearing the owner's name and address. Dogs must be kept under control at all times - on a lead anywhere near a road or where there are other animals. Dogs should be trained not to foul in public places. Dogs should never be taken into food shops - tie their leads to a post. Someone should care for dogs if owners go away and should know the local dog warden's telephone number. Dogs may be considered strays if no person seems to be in charge of them and a policeman or dog warden may seize and detain them. If they are not claimed within seven days the authority has the right to find them a new home or destroy them. Finders of strays should return them to their owners or take them to the local authority or nearest police station. Failure to do this is liable to a fine of £500. It is an offence to let any dog be dan-gerously out of control in a public place and the police have the power to seize any such dog. Local authorities must keep certain areas clear of dog faeces because of duty to keep roads clear. In certain circumstances barking can constitute a statutory nuisance. Dogs must never worry livestock and farmers are entitled to kill such dogs. Even letting a dog walk in the same field as farm animals may be considered as 'worrying'.
