MAN – WHALE – DOLPHIN

In the Green Door, Port Gaverne, on Friday 18th. October at 7.30pm. (doors and bar open at 7.00pm.), there will be a lecture and slide presentation by marine conservationist Dean Bernal, warden to the Marine Parks areas of the Turks and Caicos Islands, British West Indies, presenting his research into Dolphins in the wild and operation of a Whale rescue programme. 1996 has been a very special season for Port Isaac Cricket Club which has remained undefeated with 100% success rate (all right, so we've only played one match!). As with last year, Port Isaac beat London (well, the North Star Inn) in the Alan Gaunt Memorial Trophy contested at St. Minver. The day dawned with the most inauspicious meterological conditions prevailing (it was wet and windy), but thankfully for cricket lovers everywhere, at 2.40pm. the skies lifted and we began our 20-over thrash.

North Star batted first, swatting bowling of the utmost ineptitude to all corners of the ground, and making a total just in excess of 160. The Port Isaac fielding performance was illuminated by an astounding catch by the diminutive substitute fielder John 'sticky fingers' Riddex. Fielding at mid on, he held on to a rearing on-drive from the North Star batsman, catching it in the 'crocodile snap' fashion so favoured by fieldsmen on the Watusi Nomads Cricket Club of Central Africa. PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 9th. September.

For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, Jill O'Connor, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Apologies were received from: Harold Barriball, Richard Hambly, and Mark Provis.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards: Reports about parking problems in Fore Street, the turning area at Little Hill, and New Road - visitors asking 'Where can we park?' when asked to move on. A man (with an alsatian that snapped at a child) sitting at a table, at the Platt, selling raffle tickets 'for the lifeboat', and causing an obstruction. The police are less able to deal with traffic problems as they have more work to do now that there are less traffic wardens. Something must be done soon about the parking problem - before Easter which is early next year. She suggested a public meeting of all business people so that they could pool their ideas. The notice board by the school has been broken. Back Hill is 'a disgrace' and the steps are overgrown. The toilets close too early. What do people do who are desperate? [The clerk explained that the toilets close at 9.00pm. for insurance reasons.

Robin Penna: referring to agenda item no. 6, 'Proposal for a Village Warden', reminded the Council that only about two dozen of the buildings in the old village are permanently inhabited, the rest are holiday homes of one sort or another and empty for much of the time. The few residents are mostly occupied in the summer, and very few people from 'the top' visit the old village, so there is no population to care for this part of Port Isaac which is becoming shabby and neglected.

Perhaps a warden could be appointed and paid for by a slight increase in the Parish Council component of the council tax. A specification for the kind of work needed and the months during which it should be carried out could be drawn up and tenders invited from the village and/or the surrounding district. A further possibility might be to insist that absentee landlords should maintain their properties properly and to offer them the services of the village warden who would then recover from them the cost of this service.

There were no Planning Applications.

Finance

Malcolm Lee was granted leave to transfer $\pounds1,000$ from the High Interest account to cover $\pounds1383.11$ total expenditure for August. This would leave $\pounds102.72$ in the Treasurer Account and $\pounds3118.79$ in the High Interest account. There had also been a VAT rebate of $\pounds367.96$, and there would be a 75% refund on the $\pounds90$ spent cutting the grass on footpath no. 2.

Village Warden

Henry Symons started the discussion by saying that whereas the County Council and

District Council do certain work, it is not always done to local people's liking. Perhaps some of the money spent on local work by these authorities could be made available for ourselves to do the work instead.

Malcolm Lee said that there were lots of little maintenance jobs that needed doing – cutting grass, pulling weeds, etc. but it was always difficult to get anyone to do them. It would be necessary to define the work to be done by the beginning of next year.

The clerk pointed out that there could be insurance problems if the Council actually employed someone.

David Phelps said some sort of tidying up process is needed but thought it would be better to put the work out to tender than employ someone.

Bryan Nicholls said to forget the idea about part-time, it should be a full-time job.

Malcolm Lee understood that the County Council had previously offered reimbursement of work undertaken by the Parish Council.

A sub-committee consisting of Bill Dawe, Malcolm Lee, David Phelps, and David Philp was formed to discuss the idea, in relation to the whole of the parish, and present definite proposals at a future meeting.

Car Parking

Henry Symons said that car parking for Port Isaac is a problem and will continue to be a problem. It is difficult to see where a car park could be formed within striking distance or to find a person to run a park-and ride system.

Bill Dawe said that the parking in New Road, with cars sometimes parked along the road as far as the playing fields, was a danger to children and an obstruction for buses, etc. David Philp pointed out that the problem lasted six weeks only and for the other 46 weeks a park and ride system would not pay. Bryan Nicholls suggested that at least 20 cars could be parked in the playing fields car park which is wasted at present. The entrance to Lundy Road is also getting blocked. David Phelps remembered car parking being discussed month after month by the former

Chamber of Commerce without result, and said it was time for a positive approach.

Malcolm Lee said that it could be seen by those in the mobile Heritage Coast Interpretation Centre in the main car park that there was only a problem in the peak weeks, except when it was sunny when everybody went to Polzeath and Daymer Bay. Park and ride systems don't work, people don't want to park far away from their destination – the park and ride car park at Rock sometimes only has three cars in it. With reference to parking in New Road and Trewetha Lane, there have to be yellow lines. If there are no yellow lines people park.

David Phelps asked for a proposal on the agenda next month 'That people be encouraged to use the playing field car park'.

Notice Boards

It was agreed that the next board to be replaced should be that at the main car park.

Millenium Project

A letter from Cornwall Rural Community Council detailed plans to help fund Parish Projects for the Millenium. Registration was required by November, and full proposals with feasibility plan by February. Schemes of less that $\pm 5,000$ would not be considered and the maximum grant would be $\pm 200,000$. It was proposed that a sub-committee be formed next month to consider making an application for a sports complex for the new playing fields.

District Councillor's Report

Bill Dawe expressed concern at the condition of the wall alongside the coastal path at Overcliff and suggested that Charlie David of the North Cornwall Heritage Coast and Countryside Service be asked for advice. It was a matter of some urgency as it would become a colossal job if left much longer. 9.00pm. was too early to close the toilets at Port Isaac on band nights and those at the car park were not being cleaned properly. The climbing frame at Trelights had still not been repaired but it was pointed out that the kind of rope required cost £60 a coil and that Taylor Made should be asked for a more detailed quotation to be discussed at next month's meeting in Trelights.

Chairman's Report

Henry Symons announced that a group of volunteers – Bess Coates, Chrissie Everett, Malcolm Lee, George Oxley, David Philp, and Bryan Richards – will try and form a committee to run the village hall.

At a recent Council for Parish and Town Councils [C.A.P.T.C.] it had been revealed that it might be necessary to raise more finance by charging member councils on a per capita basis which would throw a larger burden, possibly too large, on town councils.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. The County Council has no budget for kerbs for the grass verges at Trewetha but the item would be added to the list for next year. [David Phelps said that kerbs would be better than the post and rail fences proposed which would make it impossible for him to continue cutting the grass.]

b. The County Council said that if a majority of the residents of Coastguard Cottages wanted the road into Fore Street re-surfaced they could form a 'private works code' to raise funds. Relevant residents to be notified.

c. Information was received about 'RADICAL' a scheme for providing 'Information Technology' to primary schools, of which Port Isaac is one of six chosen, and to encourage contact between the school and local businesses to give the children a better understanding of the business world which would benefit them at secondary school. Malcolm Lee said that this would mean substantial facilities being available for Port Isaac School, which is lucky to be one of the chosen ones, and that the Parish Council must do what it can to support the scheme.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be Monday 14th. October at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Room, Trelights.





LIFEBOAT

August 1996 must go down as one of the quietest months in the recent history of Port Isaac Lifeboat Station, with only two launches to report.

Firstly, during the course of 'Lifeboat Larks' on the beach on Sunday 25th. August, the boat was called out to assist the Coast Guard team following a report of a person who had fallen over a cliff at Tintagel. The situation was quickly resolved and the ILB [Inshore Lifeboat] recalled to its station when halfway across Port Isaac Bay.

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

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
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
