



RONNIE WISEMAN

Ronnie is no longer suffering the pain she so courageously battled against for three years. She was loved by a lot of people as was evident from the support at the crematorium. Bom in 1928, in Bombay, with an English mother and a French father who was running an international oil company based in India, Burma, and Ceylon. Her mother died when she was young and she travelled the world with her father. They arrived in England three days after the outbreak of war and she was educated in Surrey and Hampshire. She stayed in England and chose a career as mannequin with Harrods. In February 1948 she met a young man on demob leave and they married four months later. Later, the carpet trade gained a super salesman backed by an extremely meticulous, diligent, lady, acting as company hostess at trade shows, and John eventually became his firm's south of England sales manager. They lived in Guildford, Surrey – where they tragically lost their only daughter, Odette, in her teens through cancer – and holidayed in Cornwall every year for 19 years finally succumbing to Port Isaac's charm in 1976 when they came here to live.

Malcolm Lee produced copies of the monthly statement which showed that there was no need to transfer any funds from the high interest account to the treasurer account as reimbursement of grass cutting expenditure, together with the current balance, covered the month's expenses of $\pounds 618.99$.

Donation to British Legion

The Council heard that the wreath took £42 of the annual £50 donation, leaving a virtual donation of £8. It is the standard 'civic' wreath made by the British Legion and therefore some of the cost presumably goes towards Legion funds. A cheaper wreath would probably look unsuitable. It was proposed, and carried, that the donation be increased to £60.

Damage to Coastal Wall

Some children were reported to have been seen throwing pulling the loose stones out and throwing them over the cliff. These children should be identified, as should any one else damaging the wall, and made to pay for the damage.

The Parish Council will have to pay for repairs to the wall because an agreement was signed to that effect at the time of construction. The wall was built during the winter of 1982-83, under a Community Project penitential, scheme and cost the North Cornwall District Council £2,000, the Countryside Commission £1,000, and the Parish Council the equivalent of the cost of the materials -£900.

The wall was welcomed as previously a child had fallen over the cliff and there were fears for the safety of the public using the path. [It became evident, soon

after completion, that apparently some of the cement intended for the wall had been sold off on the black market and the concrete finally used was not up to the required standard. Ed.]

The Parish Council must now make the path safe and temporary fencing will be erected as quickly as possible. Meanwhile tenders would be sought for bringing the wall back to its proper condition using pointed stones on the top to prevent children from trying to run along the top of the wall.

Parish Warden

The Chairman asked for this matter to be deferred to the forthcoming 'planning' meeting on Monday 21st. October.

Climbing Frame at Trelights

Tenders are being sought for repairs to the ropework on the climbing frame. It is hoped that a local person may be able to do the relatively small job for less that the £263 quoted by the manufacturers

Neighbourhood Watch

Complaints against the organisation were raised on the grounds that specific crimes had been committed but Neighbourhood Watch had seemed to be doing nothing. One of the three cars broken into recently had its windows smashed, the tyres slashed, and £1,000 of equipment stolen. It was pointed out, however, that the scheme, run by volunteers who give up their spare time and work at their own cost, is not a vigilante type of organisation – that should be the work of the police. These volunteers would be de-pressed to hear that their efforts were considered to be not working. This is not a Parish Council matter, in any case, and it would be better if a person who felt so concerned would become a Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator and help the organisation.

It was suggested that a scheme, similar to that in operation by the pubs, where, for instance, anybody caught stealing could be banned by all the local shops. All of us should report any misdemeanours or suspicious behaviour to the police – during the summer they responded three times to such reports.

Millennium Project

A letter of thanks from Oliver Baines, Cornwall Rural Community Council, wishing the Council luck with the application which has been included on the register and about which information will be sent soon.

Fears were expressed that the Project (for a sports complex at the playing field) could delay the forma-tion of a new football pitch. This is, however, to proceed independently with a separate sub-committee, but cannot happen immediately as feasi-bility at the happen immediately as feasibility studies have to be completed and grants ob-tained before work can start. Meanwhile the ground has been let as winter grazing.

Road Sign at Foot of Tintagel Terrace

At least 50 cars a day have been observed turning up Tintagel Terrace looking for the road to Wadebridge and mislead by the new sign. In one case an articulated lorry needed three reverses to negotiate the turn and then three more when it was discovered that it was the wrong route. There are 30,000 cars in the car park annually. The Highways Department have warned that the cost of moving the sign would fall on the Parish Council but the feeling is that the sign

b. An appeal by Mr. Round against the planning decision concerning the dwelling at Port Gaverne was being reconsidered due to technical matters relating to the documents.

c. A suggestion was made that perhaps a path through Trecreege could be made available. Cornwall County Council have powers to create such rights of way. The matter will be dis-cussed after the 'planning' meeting on Monday 21st. October but after the exclusion of the public as there are certain sensitive issues at stake.

d. Amanda Martin, the former Parish Paths Partnership representative at North Cornwall District Council has left to take up responsibilities for the 'Community Plan to 2,000[°]. Her place has been taken by a new footpath officer – Neil Constable.


e. The District Council would like to know if there is any way that the method of publishing planning application information can be advanced.
