The worst aspect of the closure, apart from the absence of Mark Prout's super buses, was no longer being able to buy petrol in the village. Having to travel six miles to fill up is not funny. ## PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Councillors Harold Barriball, Richard Hambly, Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman) attended the monthly meeting at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 13th. January.

Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Mark Provis, and Jill O'Connor sent apologies for absence.

#### **Public Discussion**

Two members of the public were present, one of whom, Robin Penna, said he had noticed that Margaret's Lane was being well swept now and he asked the Parish Council to pass on his appreciation to whoever was responsible.

Bryan Nicho<sup>1</sup>ls asked permission to speak about Neighbourhood Watch as a member of the public but was advised by the Chairman that it would probably be better if he put the item on next month's agenda.

There were no Planning Applications.

#### **Financial Statement**

It was agreed that £600 should be transferred from the high interest account to the treasurer account in order to cover the monthly expenses of £742.33. There would then be a balance of £105.27 in the treasurer account and £6418.79 in the high interest account.

#### **Annual Audit of Accounts**

The District Auditor had made no comments other than that he thought perhaps the level of insurance should be increased now that the Council owned more land. The Treasurer had checked this with the insurance company and found that the existing cover was adequate.

#### **Circus at Playing Field**

John Lawson's Circus had made an application to use the playing field again in 1998. On their last visit in 1992 they had left the field in very good condition.Permission was granted.

#### **District Councillors Report**

Bill Dawe was absent but the Chairman said he knew that he was concerned about vegetation overhanging some of the narrow roads in Port Isaac. The matter would be discussed next month when the subject of Parish Warden would be on the agenda.

#### **Chairman's Report**

Henry Symons said that the application form had recently been received from the Millenium Commission. This had to be returned by 10th. January if funding for a scheme was to be considered. It had been necessary, therefore, to telephone all interested organisations and call a meeting at the Cornish Cafe for the purpose of getting the form filled in. This was achieved as well as was possible under the circumstances. Another meeting is lined up for Wednesday 12th. February when all local organisations will be invited, and any one else who has an interest in the project is also welcome to attend.

Malcoim Lee pointed out that a committee had been formed to provide a feasibility study into possible schemes for the development of the playing field, to provide details of expected capital and running costs – Port Gaverne toilets are already a heavy expenditure on the rates. He had been very concerned to first learn of the meeting when approached by a member of the public the following day and told that a decision had already been made. He wanted it entered in the minutes, therefore, that the Parish Council had made no decision on any project. The committee had no power to make decisions, no plans had been submitted to the Council, and a legal requirement had not been met in that no notices had been displayed to advise the general public about the meeting. In these matters it was better to comply with the law. He also reminded us that licensed premises should be avoided for public meetings. He had thought that 'Project 2000' was dead but as it apparently was not, the Parish Council should have been kept aware of its progress.

Henry Symons replied that there will still have to be a feasibility study and that so far there has been no commitment but the present application, without which there could be no millenium funding, only states what the Parish Council has in mind.

Malcolm Lee said that these were only comments. The fact remains that the Parish Council has not been asked and does not even know under what terms surveyors have already been called in to advise the committee. It must be minuted that the Parish Council is doing nothing, he said.

David Phelps asked why the public are acting as individuals and not joining the committee. The points raised by Malcolm Lee had already been raised at the meeting. Everything will be reported back to the Parish Council. The surveyors had been approved by the Council, as far as he could remember, about twelve months ago.

Henry Symons summed up by saying that everything that is being done is being done for the benefit of the public. He understood that a decision made about 15 months ago to display minutes of the meetings on the notice boards had not materialised. The Clerk pointed out that the notice boards were not large enough, and that the minutes would be a month out of date by the time they had been approved by the Council. It was therefore decided to review the matter next month.

#### **Playing Field Committee**

Bryan Nicholls said that although he was not on the committee, he would like to use the opportunity to point out that one of the goal post cross bars looked as if it had cracked and should be checked immediately in case it was dangerous. Members of the committee volunteered to check it the next day and take appropriate action.

The following items had not been specified on the agenda but were discussed under 'Clerk's Correspondence' and 'Journal'.

# Change of use of Old Telephone Exchange to Dwelling

The full planning application for this item had been discussed in December and approval recommended so a letter from a member of the public which had only just been received was no longer relevant.

#### Lorry Damage at Trelights

Complaints were received of damage done by a contractor's lorry entering the building site. The banks both sides of the road were left in a very bad state. The Council have no powers to intervene in a case of this sort which is a matter between the owners of the land and the contractors. They would, however, notify the Highways Department of the situation.

#### Footpath 32, Burrow Park

Anthony Hawkey of the Ramblers' Association was keen to hear what progress had been made in sorting out the problems of this path. Malcolm Lee said he would write to Mr. Hawkey and inform him that there was no change in the situation at present.

#### **Direction Sign at Tintagel Terrace**

David Phelps invited anyone to spend an hour watching the problems the inadequate sign was causing. He felt it would be better to take the

sign down than incur any more expense - there are perfectly good signs further along the road.

#### **Parish Survey**

In answer to a question by Bryan Richards, Malcolm Lee said that the Draft Survey had not been presented to the meeting as promised due to the difficulty in contacting several people over the Christmas period. This would not, however, affect the timing of the Survey and all councillors would see the draft before the next meeting.

#### Next Meeting

The next monthly Parish Council meeting was scheduled for Monday 3rd. February at 7.30pm. in the Chapel Room, Trelights, one week early.

## METEOROLOGICALS

The recent cold weather reminds me of our first winter in Cornwall. My wife and I and two children came to live and work in Port Isaac in November 1946 when, after a mild New Year, heavy snow fell on January 27th. followed by a blizzard and the worst weather for many years before and since.

Having been recording rainfall in the garden since 1984, I was surprised to find that, recently, Port Isaac and the North Cornwall coast have been among the drier parts of Cornwall.

In 1995, January and February were wetter than usual, but for all other months rainfall was below average so that by the end of the summer the reservoirs were nearly empty.


In 1996, January and February were wet as usual and although June, July, and September were drier, May and November were very wet, and the whole year was just below average.

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
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### TED ARNOLD

#### **Troubadours'** Visit


