NO NEW VILLAGE HALL

A public meeting, well publicised on the front page of last month's Trio and by posters around the village, was attended by about thirty people – about 3% of the population.

Rather disappointingly, no plans for a new football and cricket pitch were available but a hastily scribbled diagram was passed around.

We heard a comprehensive report by Chrissie Everett, Village Hall Hon. Secretary, who had discovered the costs incurred by new halls in various parts of the country. The £1.50 per hour Port Isaac pays for the use of the hall, is very low, anywhere else, hourly rates range from £20 per hour. New halls are involved in health regulations, etc., and are expected to have permanent cleaning staff, to be properly heated, etc.

The parish council committee set up to investigate the possibility of a new hall had apparently not done any costings. Grants, etc. for the building of the hall had been discovered but day-to-day running costs had been overlooked.

We're a small organisation, supporting a small school, in a small community – but a huge success at only two years old!!

Annual General Meeting

This was held on 27th. February, and the Hon. Treasurer presented the accounts which clearly demonstrate how early success has been built upon, our efforts have been even more fruitful this year, and from 'birth' to now over £4,400 has been raised. This money goes directly for the benefit of the pupils, it is not used as a 'top up' for government funding but is carefully spent so that the childrens' experience of primary school is enhanced above and beyond the National Curriculum.

PARISH COUNCIL

No Axes to Grind?

At the Trelights meeting recently, not one member of the public was present. This is apparently because the Council never discusses anything of interest to Trelights. Does this mean there is nothing in the village for the Council to discuss or is nobody bringing anything forward?

Direction Sign at Tintagel Terrace

This sign is causing drivers to turn up Tintagel Terrace instead of following the main road. The sign at the top of Back Hill is quite adequate so there is no need for the newer one, which was actually not asked for in the original plans for directing visitors into the village and the Parish Council does not feel it should be asked to pay for alterations. The decision has been made, therefore, to remove the sign so avoiding further costs, and to replace it only if this action is not effective.

Parish Survey Questionnaire

All members of the Council have vetted copies of the questionnaire which was discussed in detail at a special meeting in February, and final approval of the scheme was given at the last meeting when the accompanying Chairman's letter was accepted. The questionnaires will be circulated to all members of the parish shortly.

Parish Warden

This matter was also discussed in detail at the special meeting. One of the warden's duties would be to keep grass cut in between cuts by County Highways so this will be discussed when the dates were known. A warden would of course have other duties as well.

Annual Parish Meeting

This will be held on Thursday 24th. April at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Cornwall Landscape Project 1996 -2000

The Planning Directorate at County Hall are seeking to encourage community projects for environmental enhancement work, tree planting (there are 400,000 trees available throughout the county), etc. There are 50% landscape conservation grants for schemes of up to £1,000. The information has been passed to the Playing Fields Committee.

Port Gaverne Toilets

The toilets will now be open at 9.30am. instead of 8.00am. Holidaymakers use the toilets as washing and changing rooms first thing in the morning and a queue of cars blocks the road every day as people come to have their early morning wash. The toilets were never intended to be used like this and opening them later in the morning will save £100 on water rates. An anonymous donation of £20 per annum, while it was appreciated, only helps slightly as it represents about 1% of the costs. Requests for tenders for the caretaking of the toilets have been displayed on Parish Council notice boards.

Light at Trewetha

People who visit Trewetha at night on foot run a considerable risk when walking between Dane Cottage and the grass verge opposite Trewetha Farm with traffic driving very fast where there is no footway. It is realised, however, that the County Council have already refused to install a street light because there is no 30mph speed limit in Trewetha and economic strictures mean that street lights are not being installed anywhere. The Parish Council could certainly not afford the installation and running costs. It was suggested that residents could put up their own lights.

Light at Old Coastguard Station

A request for better illumination at the entrance to the courtyard will be followed up on the grounds of safety for vehicular traffic. The road in question, however, is privately owned by the Fortescue family apparently, and it is doubtful if-the Highways Department will grant any funds.

Footpaths

Under the Parish Paths Partnership which is 100% funded by the Countryside Commission, work will be carried out on the foopath linking St. Endellion with Chapel Amble at Trevathan. A small footbridge over a stream will be built plus new stiles, etc. Volunteers for the work should contact Malcolm Lee. The owner of the farmyard at Trevathan has agreed to dedicate a right of way across the yard to connect paths nos. 24 and 25.

Tenders are to be sought for the annual cutting of allocated paths in the Parish. This work is 75% funded by the County Council.

Criticisms have been voiced about the brambles, etc., growing out of the banks on Church Hill, Back Hill, and elsewhere making it difficult for pedestrians to avoid cars.

Crime and Harassment

After they had given information to the police concerning the whereabouts of a stolen dog, a couple of Port Isaac pensioners have been subjected to harassment – and received, unsolicited, delivery of a skip, enquiries about a dead horse, and a load of Readymix concrete. Fortunately they were at home on each occasion and able to refuse the deliveries. This is, apparently, only one example of criminal activity in Port Isaac and it was said that Neighbourhood Watch should report to the public more of what is going on. St. Kew community policeman puts an article in the local newsletter.

Chairman's Report

The Chairman reported on the Devon and Cornwall Police Liaison Meeting where they heard of a £500,000 shortfall in police funds, also that 83% of police expenditure was wages, leaving only 17% of the budget for the rest. Getting protesters out of tunnels at Fairmile, on the proposed A30 road site, had been a very expensive exercise.

Cable Undergrounding?

Two men with clip boards, purportedly South West Electricity Board workmen, have been examining the old village. They had no evidence of identification but claimed to be surveying for the undergrounding of all the electricity cables very soon.

If the streets are to be dug up for this purpose it was thought that it would be better to have the telephone wires buried at the same time but British Telecom's response is that if the village wants their wires buried, they will have to organise the funding! [Checking. with S.W.E.B., however, reveals that they only intend to finish undergrounding work already started in higher Fore Street. Further work is only likely if there is a strong demand from villagers.]

Millenium Fund

The Parish Council's application for funds has not reached the initial stage as no recognisable scheme has been presented.

Removal of Noticeboard at Car Park

Port Isaac and District Tourism Association enquired about the removal of this board which they had helped pay for. Apparently the board has become difficult to use and is being moditied. It will be resited at the Pea Pod shop.

Display of Minutes

In accordance with a decision made formerly, copies of minutes of meetings after they have been approved by the Council, will be displayed on the notice boards at the Liberal Club, the Co-op and at Trelights.

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Playing Fields

The Council drew 4:4 on a vote to take no further action at this time on any project of the new playing fields and the matter will be discussed again at the next meeting. Feasibility plans drawn up by the committee appear to show that the costs of running a new village hall, for instance, would be far beyond the reach of this village.

A suggestion was welcomed that a running track could be provided around the perimeter of both fields if enough people showed an interest and funds could be raised.

Cub Scouts

The Cubs are seeking funds and the Council granted a donation of £150 to the pack. Permission was also given for a parade in the village on Saturday 19th. April.

Planning Applications

Recommended for approval by the Parish Council: Alterations to bungalow on Tolraggott Farin drive, conversion of the old telephone exchange to dwelling (subsequently refused by the District Planning Committee), renewal of permisssion to demolish sub-standard dwelling at Trewetha Farm and replace with new dwelling, single storey dwelling and garage at Furze Park, Trelights, an aquarium and information centre in the fish cellars, extension to garage at-junction of Rose Hill and Trewetha Lane.

No observations were made on applications for an agricultural building at Treswarrow or for a dwelling and double garage at Plot 2, St. Endellion Lane, Trelights.

New Division

St. Endellion, along with neighbouring parishes, is to be transferred from the Bodmin Division of the District Council to the Launceston Division under North East Division Surveyor Paul Allen.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 14th. April at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Inland 'Cruise'

The boat went on a slightly unusual 'shout' on Saturday 15th. February. To celebrate 30 years in service, the crew, boat, and quad [4-wheel drive tractor] made the rounds of local villages in order to raise awareness. It was a successful day and people were supportive and interested. The crew entourage visited St. Teath, Camelford, Boscastle, Tintagel, and Delabole, where they chatted to people and gave out leaflets.

Thanks to each of the local pubs which supported the exercise with refreshments, and to the locals who gave a great welcome. Thanks also to the crew who gave up their day. £91.00 was raised.

The day went smoothly except for one hiccup as the boat started off when there was trouble with one of the wheel bearings but thanks to Dennis Knight and a friendly visitor from Gweek the convoy was soon on its way, albeit a little late. The longest trip the trolley makes usually is a launch at a low spring tide.

Show of Hands Concert

The former chapel in Roscarrock Hill, now the home of Billy and Barbara Hawkins' Port Isaac Pottery, had probably not seen such a large 'congregation' for many years. Both the hall and gallery were full for the concert given by 'Show of Hands' on behalf of the R.N.L.I. in February. Looking like two bearded choristers with (acoustic) guitars and a lute, they enter-tained us with up-to-the minute 'country' blues and songs wittily and penetratingly dealing with many aspects of present day life.

The R.N.L.I. flag draped over the front of the 'pulpit' gave the finishing touch to the eccle-siastical effect, resembling to all intents and purpose an altar cloth.

Tuneful and with clearly enunciated lyrics, the songs were both amusing and offered a pertinent commentary on our times. They were linked by endless repartee, often involving audience participation, from the two performers, Steve Knightley and Phil Beer, who certainly gave more than good value for money.

Interesting, also, is that there were many unfamiliar faces in the audience which shows that if Port Isaac puts on good entertainment, people will come from afar to enjoy it. We could do with more concerts like this in the village.



There are three Port Isaac properties for sale at an estate agents in Wadebridge. The respective brochures offer this information:

Brochure a, 'The village is served by a wide range of shops with the wider amenities of Wadebridge found approximately 9 miles away.' Brochure b, 'For a wider range of shops and facilities, the market town of Wadebridge is approximately 10 miles away.' 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BOOK REVIEW

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THE PLEASING TREES OF ST. KEW by Jim Castling. Published by the author. Price £3.50 from Wadebridge Bookshop or St. Kew Inn. Profits in aid of the Parish Church of St. James the Great, St. Kew.

There is now a substantial collection of local history, geography, and natural history books about the area and this is a valuable addition.

This is a fascinating book, engagingly written, and richly illustrated with no fewer than fifty-two photographs of Mr. Castling's favourite trees in the parish. The author, who is now the St. Kew tree warden, has combined what began as a register, with a highly personal set of journeys of light-hearted exploration and learned commentary. It may well be the world's most concentrated and local travel book!

The cover shows a rare surviving elm tree in full colour. In front of it is an elegant two horse-drawn phaeton which, as Mr. Castling says 'happened to pass as I took the picture as if to underline the nostalgic quality of the scene'. It is a book of sheer delight for any 'tree-nut' (as the writer describes himself) and many of the trees are easily accessible to energetic walkers.

I hope Port Isaac tree lovers will buy it, go and see for themselves, and perhaps even make a pre-emptive bid for Jim Castling (or someone even nearer!) to perform the same service for St. Endellion Parish. It would be hard labour – but a labour of love.

VILLAGE HALL

From 1st April, a revised system of hire charges will apply, with special low rates for parish clubs and associations. They will pay £3.00 for up to 2 hours, £6.00 for up to 4 hours and £12.00 for up to 8 hours. Other users (eg private, business and non-parish clubs and associations) will pay double these rates. Further discounts are available to regular users (booking 10 or more sessions) paying in advance, who will get a third discount off these prices.

In order to encourage more use of the hall for entertainments (plays, concerts etc.), these are charged at $\pounds 6.00$ a performance. If rehearsals are required, these are charged at $\pounds 1.00$ per rehearsal (up to 4 hours). To receive these special rates, rehearsals must be booked in advance when booking the hall for the performance.

Cub Scouts

The Cub Scouts will be new users of the Hall. They attended a recent committee meeting to ask if a few items could be arranged such as their own notice board, storage space, etc. They intend to use the Hall every Tuesday night.

Feed Back

There is no dialogue with some of the organisations using the hall regularly. In order that any problems can be sorted out, the committee must have feedback from Hall users, indeed it is part of the responsibility of groups who use the hall to send a representative to committee meetings.

Electrical Work

Difficulties are being experienced in actually getting an electrical contractor with the right qualifications to do the required work for the needs of a Drama and Entertainment Licence. This licence has to be held by any venue where members of the public attend any kind of performance.

Feasibility Study

A grant is to be sought to finance professional advice about making possible improvements to the hall; better access, more storage capacity, improved kitchen facilities, curtains for the windows, etc. Armed with this advice a feasibility plan could be drawn up to present to

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possible sponsors of grants that could help pay for the work.

Conditions for Hiring

It has been decided that a copy of the Standard Conditions for hiring the hall will be displayed in a prominent position and that for this purpose the Hall's own notice board may be re-sited in the room, behind the stage, which every hirer passes through when entering the hall.

Annual General Meeting

The Village Hall Annual Public Meeting will be held at the Hall on Wednesday 23rd. April at 8.00pm. Please attend this meeting and tell the new committee what you think should be done.


