

VILLAGE HALL

The management committee feels that Port Isaac still needs a public hall with a large multi-purpose room — which the current Village Hall provides.

When the hall was built, one hundred years ago, most lived in the 'old' village and the hall was nearby. Now that people live in the newer buildings the hall is seen as 'down below' — not among the community.

If only we could move the old building to a more central location, it would solve this perception! To have a new building would certainly be admirable, but is likely to cost more money than Port Isaac could raise, and with our existing halls remaining, a new hall would provide yet another building to spread the present use by our clubs and associations even more thinly than now.

The village hall is already good, spacious, and suitable for almost anything for which it is likely to be needed. It is possible to do something with the hall – eg. the steps can be made more welcoming, easier to use, and other facilities, like a better kitchen, can be put in place to make the hall more 'user-friendly', and comfortable. Grant aid can be obtained to meet the bulk of the cost of these improvements.

There will be an 'Open Day' at the hall on Saturday 14th. February 10.30am. to 2.30pm. Please come along for free coffee and biscuits, look at the hall, and informally discuss the proposals with committee members.

We have got the basis of a very good hall indeed and it can be improved greatly by spending on it the fraction of the cost of a new, and probably not so splendid, hall.

Alan Wainwright blessed the Crib, presided at the eucharist, preached, and led intercessions.

Christmas Family Eucharist

The church was filled with families on Christmas morning for the traditional family sung eucharist. The Rector welcomed everyone and helped six year old server Thomas Gill to light all the candles on the Advent wreath. The Rector presided and encouraged the children to come to the Crib where they sang 'Away in a Manger' led by Martin and Gemma Kirby, grandchildren of Mrs. Margaret Cann, Port Isaac. Before the final hymn the children were invited to search for balloons hidden in the church and each child was given one.

Bells Ring In New Year

At midnight on New Year's Eve, the church bells rang out the Old Year and rang in the New and afterwards the event was celebrated by a champagne toast. Earlier in the evening, an excellent dinner for the ringers was held at Bodannon farm, Trewetha, the home of tower captain and churchwarden, Mr. Roger Richards and Mrs. Pam Richards.

Annual Pilgrimage

The Revd. Paul Rose, who for the past 30 years has made an annual pilgrimage to St. Endellion with a choir from his own parish, returned last week with a large party who led the singing at the sung eucharist on the

Second Sunday after Christmas and provided Evensong with carols in the afternoon.

Despite the hurricane force winds which blew down a large fir tree during the morning service, many people attended the sung eucharist. The Rector presided and led intercessions and the Revd. Paul Rose preached and assisted with the administration of the chalice. In the afternoon, Sung Evensong with carols around the crib took place. The Rector sang the office. Epiphany Celebrated

The Feast of the Epiphany was celebrated with a sung eucharist and procession at which the Rector presided, vested in the St. Endellion cope. During the service, thanksgiving to God was expressed, by the Rector, for the life of Miss Elspeth Coe, former sacristan at the church and a faithful member of the worshipping congregation who had died that day, her 93rd birthday. Epiphany commemorates the showing forth of Christ to the nations, symbolised by the visit, with their gifts, of the three kings, so the figures of the kings were carried in procession to the Crib by Mrs. Tren Rush, St. Kew, Mr. Roger Richards, and Mr. Tom Warne, churchwardens of St. Endellion.

Worship by Candlelight

The regular monthly evening service of worship with Taizé music by candlelight took place in the church on the first Sunday of Epiphany. The service was arranged and led by the Curate who read parts of Brother Roger's 1998 'Letter from Taizé.' Readings were also given by Mrs. Pamela Nash and Mrs. Maida Davy and the psalm was read by the Rector. The singing of Taizé chants was accompanied by Mrs. Liz Rowe, harp and Mrs. Angela Williams, guitar.

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PARISH COUNCIL

The monthly meeting of St. Endellion Parish Council held in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 12th. January was attended by all eleven councillors.

David Phelps, Chair, who was not present at the last meeting, took this opportunity to welcome Henry Stickland to the Council.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards spoke about an apparent apathy among the public who did not turn up for the meeting with the Fire Brigade. There have been two fires in the village since that meeting - it seems as if people do not want to learn. She hoped that at least people had now bought smoke detectors. She had also received a report that the coastal path was dirty and disgusting, and was full of rubbish and dog mess. She then referred to cars that park on pavements, making it very difficult for mothers pushing prams and who had to go out into the road to get past. There is apparently a £1,000 fine for the parking offence. Finally she established that it will be possible to ask questions of Paul Tyler MP when he attends a future Parish Council meeting.

Plans

The Council recommended approval to the District Council of these plans:—

- 1. Change of use of disused workshop and erection of an extension at The Workshop, Trelights, for Mr. T. St. John O'Grady.
- 2. Installation of air conditioning condenser units Co-operative Retail Services Ltd.
- 3. Erection of 3-bedroomed bungalow, plot 7, Furze Park, Trelights, for Mr. D. J. and Mrs. J. Wiles.

Controversy was caused by plans for a 20-metre steel lattice telecommunications mast to replace the existing wooden pole at 24 Mayfield Road, for Castle Transmission Int. Ltd. It was felt that the mast would have a detrimental visual impact, and was too close to houses where young people lived who might be affected by alleged radiations. The steel mast would be twice the height of the existing wooden pole and would carry two dishes. What use would it be, would it improve reception for mobile telephones, fire brigade telephones, etc.? While it was agreed that the village does need better communications, the question was asked would the benefits, which were unfortunately not detailed, outweigh its effect as backdrop to the finest conservation area in Cornwall. No recommendation could be made to the District Council until more details were available, therefore immediate representation would be made to the planning authority and further information urgently requested.

Finance

The Treasurer requested a transfer of £200 from the High Interest Account to the Treasurer Account to cover the monthly expenditure of £714.57. This was agreed and brought the final balances to £122.34 in the Treasurer Account and £5869.67 in the High Interest Account.

Request for Donation towards Cost of Road Improvement

St. Minver Parish Council requested financial help with their project to improve the B3314 road at Tredower. The intention is to replace the hedge with post and rail fencing to improve visibility at the lowest cost possible. St. Endellion Council felt that in the first place the work should be funded by County Highways and that private funding was setting a dangerous precedent. It was, however, agreed that this is a dangerous stretch of road but there were doubts that the project would make it any safer. Also it was felt that removing a hedge - 'the very essence of Cornwall' - was not a good thing. The Council is therefore not prepared to make a financial contribution.

District Councillor's Report

Bill Dawe deplored the fact that the vegetation at the sides of Church Hill still had not been cut.

He was also anxious about requests from a resident in Trelights, whose property had been built too close to a chestnut tree and who now wanted to cut the tree.

County Councillor's Report

County Councillor Helen Richards had attended the meeting and was invited to speak at this juncture.

She said that in order to have roundels on the road at St. Endellion a speed limit would have to be applied for. This was to be added to the lists for the County.

Regarding the vegetation on Church Hill, she said that land ownership lists were awaited in order that the necessary action could be taken.

She announced that she would hold a surgery at the church rooms on Saturday 14th. February.

She was asked why Delabole had received full attention from gritting vehicles after the recent snow fall while Port Isaac had had none, also why the salt bin on Poltreworgey Hill is still empty. The Clerk intervened to advise the Council that the B3267 had been taken off the gritting list which is why the salt bins were installed.

Chairman's Report

David Phelps said that he had walked the coast path recently and had never seen it looking so clean, but it was very important that it should be kept clean. The wall

will be on the agenda next month as it is in a very bad state. The Treasurer pointed out that £1,000 was already allocated per year for gradual repairs.

The Chairman commended the Seats Committee on an excellent job and said that the seats on the coastal path had been well sited but would need varnishing. The seat on the end of the Main, however, was too high and should be lowered.

Clerk's Correspondence

- 1. A request for a donation towards the expenses of the Allen Valley Singers will be considered at the next meeting.
- 2. The public conveniences at the car park, New Road, will be refurbished in the autumn but will be painted in the meantime. Bill Dawe enquired whether the all-night, vandal-proof, facilites asked for were to be implemented.

Journal

Bryan Richards asked whether any action was being taken with regard to car parking in the village. There were cars parked from Daisy Hicks's corner to the Co-op and also down Back Hill by Dugald Sproull's. He was advised that it was less than six months since the last decision was taken and that this is still being considered by Cornwall County Council. If a fire engine or ambulance had tried to get down Back Hill it would have been blocked. The situation in New Road is very dangerous especially when approaching the brow of the hill with the sun in your eyes and on the wrong side of the road. At Christmas the roads were choc-a-bloc with parked cards but the car park (which is free during the winter) was empty. The Council will ask for 'Free Car Park' signs to be put up in the winter.
