LIMITED ACCESS CAUSED BY ILLEGAL PARKING

(Copied from a letter to Peggy Richards from A.D.O. Marshall, reprinted with permission.)

Thank you for your recent call regarding access problems which emergency services may encounter at Port Isaac. The fact that any emergency vehicle may be delayed in attending an incident by the indiscriminate parking of others causes us great concern. Unfortunately the Fire Authority has no control over the enforcement of parking restrictions, and I would advise contacting the Devon & Cornwall Constabulary who are the enforcing body.

Port Isaac has seen its share of tragedy in recent years, and it would be a shame to see another, possibly caused by the delay of an attending emergency vehicle. I personally support any legal initiative to ensure the clear passage of vehicles through Port Isaac.

SEAQUEST S.W.

Seaquest S.W. is a new, joint venture bringing together researchers and members from the Cornwall and Devon Wildlife Trusts who have a particular interest in marine wildlife. Jeremy and Nicky Thomas attended the group's first meeting at the Cornwall Trust's HQ. The group is particularly interested in gathering more information on dolphins, porpoises, whales, seals, basking sharks and turtles around the S.W. peninsula. You'd be surprised at what's out there!

Regular seagoers and coastal walkers are asked to report sightings to the Seaquest group. Jeremy and Nicky have a supply of recording forms at 12 Tintagel Terrace (880383). The minimum information required is:

Type of animal (or a description of what you saw). Approximate Number. Location. Date and Time.

Fuller details, such as direction of travel, behaviour, sketches, photos, weather conditions etc., would be even more useful. Seaquest are also interested in reports of stranded animals as they can arrange for postmortems to be carried out by MAFF on dolphins, porpoises and whales. Seal postmortems are only carried out in the case of mass strandings. If you come across a badly decomposed carcass a tooth is apparently a very useful piece of evidence to cached!





The diagram above shows what could be the outcome when work is started.

So far, North Cornwall District Council planners have allowed the removal of enough of the hedge dividing the two fields to enable a full-size soccer pitch to be incorporated. The next step is to apply for a 'small' grant to enable a feasibility study to be carried out by professional surveyors and architects. After that, we shall have to apply for a large grant to carry out the project.




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
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LIFEBOAT

CREWMAN COMPLETES 200 SERVICES

On Tuesday 4th. April 1998 Senior Crewman Andy Walton completed his 200th. Service. The call was a relatively minor affair involving a search for a person in the water at Glebe Cliff, near Tintagel; it turned out that there had been no-one in the sea but a dog was rescued and returned to its owner! This call was not typical and is the culmination of many much more serious 'shouts'.

Andy moved to Port Isaac in August 1975 from the Wolverhampton area. He married



his wife, Lesley, in December 1976 and the two daughters, Emily and Jessica, Hellin the lifeboat on 22nd. January 1977 and wer on his first service call on 14th. July 19⁻⁻ then completed six services in his first vear On 14th. August 1978 he was one of the crewmen to save a young man in dangers ... and dramatic circumstances at Bossinev. E. this service he was awarded a vellum sertificate by the R.N.L.I.

Andy completed his 100th. service on the 1st. April 1991 - and now his 200th wonderful record involving many hours : selfless devotion. His fellow crew and frien were thrilled to welcome him ashore and 14th. August when he was thrown into the harbour and then given a champagne celebration. Andy is nearly at retiring age has completed 20 years service qualifying for a gold badge, awarded by the R.N.L.I : all who reach that milestone.

PLACE WON ON SAIL TRAINING SHIP

Port Isaac's youngest crew member David Fletcher, 17, has been lucky enough to win free trip on the topsail training schooner 5. Winston Churchill'.

Every year the Corporation of Trinity House (the organisation which maintains and run the Lighthouses around the coasts of England and Wales) has sponsored places training ships for young R.N.L.I. crew age: between 17 and 24 years.

David joined Port Isaa Lifeboat Crew as recently as 20th. Januar 1998. He follows his father Edward and in brother Andrew who both served in crew in recent years. Since joining he has been attended regularly at winter training sessions and has passed the examination gain his certificate for V.H.F. radio usag-He has yet to go on his first service but h completed several exercises afloat.

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PARISH COUNCIL

There was a full attendance of councillors at the last monthly meeting at Port Isaac on Monday 6th. April.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards spoke about parking problems in the village, in particular obstructions created at Minepit Corner and down Back Hill to Fore Street, and in New Road from Daisy Hick's Corner upwards – where a car parked near the blind corner had nearly been hit by another vehicle. There was also difficulty in getting through Tintagel Terrace where there cars are parked on both sides of the road, plus problems at the corner which is the junction with Hartland Road. A grant from the District Council plus money from local businesses has allowed extra policing in Polzeath – she would like to see a similar initiative enacted in Port Isaac.

While there is scaffolding in Fore Street, she said that, in the event of an emergency, the Fire Brigade have plans for a small rescue vehicle to be sent down Church Hill first, followed by a larger one using Fore Street.

She had received a letter from A.D.O. Marshall, Bodmin, [the contents of which are printed elsewhere in this issue of Trio].

Robin Penna said he would support any action taken by the Parish Council to alleviate problems caused by cars parked in New Road. He asked the Parish Council to remind landowners and occupiers of their responsibility to remove vegetation which obstructs roads and footpaths where the public has access, or blocks street lights.

Planning Applications

The following recommendations were made to the District Planning Committee:

a. Approval for the erection of an extension at the rear of Carlenice, Trewetha Lane, for Jeremy and Lis Brown.

b. Non-approval for a stainless steel chimney at Kernyk, Church Hill, for Mrs. A. C. M. Hopwood. In the Conservation Area, this should be surrounded by stonework.

Finance

Malcolm Lee was given permission to transfer £700 from the High Interest Account (leaving £3,496.36) to cover monthly expenditure of £794.06, The final balance in the Treasurer Account is £80.47.

Annual Parish Meeting

Guest speakers at the meeting on Thursday 23rd. April will be Divisional Surveyor Paul Allen from Cornwall County Estates and Transportation – who will answer questions formulated by the Parish Council, County Councillor Helen Richards, District Councillor Bill Dawe, and a representative from Devon and Cornwall Police Constabulary.

Election of Footpath Officer

Although this position has become vacant following the resignation of Malcolm Lee there were no volunteers to take over so that footpath management becomes a responsibility of the whole Council. To further this year's Management Scheme, work will be scheduled following the old priority system. The Clerk was given permission to advertise for footpath clearing tenders.

Grants for Sports Activities

Bryan Nicholls asked if any grants available for sports activities could be passed to the Playing Field Committee who might have better knowledge of how to use them. The Playing Field Committee are to be named tenants of the field so they will assume full responsibility for any grants with the full support of the Parish Council.

Fund Raising Event

The Friends of Port Isaac School were granted permission to use the Playing Field on Sunday 14th. June.

Dog Fouling

Information was received that the District Council propose to make an order under section 2 of The Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996, enabling powers to be known as the North Cornwall District Council (Fouling of Designated Land by Dogs) order 1998 or similar title. The Parish Council made no representations and supported the proposal.

Parking in New Road

David Phelps said that he had walked the entire village with County Councillor Helen Richards to enable her to see the problems for herself. She will now take the matter to County Council and report back later.

Millenium

It was decided to defer plans for a Book of Gratuities for sponsors of a scheme to plant daffodils along certain roads in celebration of the Millenium until the scheme itself had been decided at the next meeting.

Fire Brigade Report

A long-awaited report on the Fire Brigade's plans for dealing with any future outbreaks in the village will be presented by A.D.O. Marshall at the next meeting.

Street Light, Victoria House

Work is proceeding fast on rebuilding Victoria House and the Parish Council are to write to Mr. Trudgeon of Highways and ask for the light to be replaced as soon as it is possible to do so.

District Councillor's Report

Bill Dawe reported that the planning application for the radio mast had again been deferred but reiterated that he was totally against it in the intended position – between Mayfield and Silvershell roads.

Chairman's Report

David Phelps had sad news in announcing that Barbara Willmott, Clerk to the Council, had tendered her resignation. The position will be advertised in the Cornish Guardian and open to any one – not necessarily living in the parish. He also asked Councillors to lobby anyone they think might be suitable for the position.

Footpaths

Malcolm Lee said that, although he had retired as Footpath Officer, he would still honour an arrangement to walk with members of the Ramblers' Association along a section of the coast path just to the north of this parish on Sunday 21st. June.

Street Cleaning

Bryan Nicholls proposed that a letter of appreciation be sent to the District Council of the marvellous job the young lad is doing who cleans our streets. This will be put on next month's agenda.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

a. Notification of acceptance of the Council's planning application with regard to the new Playing Field.

b. A letter from MP Paul Tyler to say that he has written to Cornwall County Highways regarding the lack of salting of Port Isaac's roads and is awaiting their response.

A summary of published data on the parish is given, with figures on population, car ownership, second homes, and tourism, making the complete report a digest of knowledge on our parish.

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ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Chairman's Speech

David Phelps, expressed regret that Henry Symons had retired. David Philp, and Mark Provis left later; Henry Stickland, Andy Penny, and David Morgan replaced them but Henry Stickland is leaving the area.

St. Endellion traffic-calming is being sought, quay repairs at Port Gaverne would cost too much, parking and speed restrictions, and use of Probation Service manpower were mentioned. Planning approval had been received for the change of use of the new Playing Field. He also spoke about uncut vegetation overhanging roads, the Parish Survey (at next month's Parish Council meeting), and the retirement of clerk Barbara Willmott – a Parish Council is only as good as its Clerk.

County Councillor's Speech

Mrs. Helen Richards expressed thanks for her election but deplored the politically 'hung' Council but the atmosphere has improved since the by-elections. She is on the Planning, Community/Countryside, and Tourism committees.

A crisis threatens as landfill sites rapidly fill and new sites will have to be identified quickly, and re-cycling stepped up. Flashburn, smokeless incineration is an option.

About 2,000 tourism enquiries come in each year. Cornwall as a holiday area benefits the whole economy. Strategy is being evolved to manage crowds coming to see the eclipse next year. There will also be the Cutty Sark tall ships race at Falmouth, plus other water sport events. The local scenery of the film 'Amy Foster' will attract holiday bookings. Newquay airport is to be promoted. The road-rail partnership is to be stepped up miles of blocked roads deter future bookings. The Community/Countryside committee is bidding to create world-heritage sites in former mining areas.

She spoke of Camborne's losses – mining, manufacturing, and the college, of the BSE problems for farmers, and the current trials for Cornwall's fishermen.

The County budget was raised 5% just to stand still. The government insists money be spent on schools but Cornwall has already done so and should now spend elsewhere.

Bryan Nicholls asked about the uncut hedges and other signs of neglect which could deter visitors. Mrs. Richards said she sees weeds 6ft. high in St. Minver.

County Transportation and Estates,

Divisional Surveyor (North Cornwall) Paul Allen, outlined the manning of his area and showed how a budget of $\pounds 2,000,000$ was distributed among the different departments throughout 50 parishes and town councils. St. Endellion had regularly received more than the average share of the budget, but he would still like to be able to do more.

Henry Symons asked why 'rumble strips' were put down at St. Endellion where the existing rough surface made them ineffective. Mr. Allen replied that rumble strips were a new idea and still being tested.

Mick Shrapnell suggested a mirror to help hundreds of Music Festival visitors see if it was safe to cross from their car park to the church but Mr. Allen replied that mirrors on highways are illegal. Martin Bell thought that this problem ought to be addressed by the Music Festival.

Bryan Nicholls complained about the nonsalting of our roads and Mr. Allen replied that he has a long list of complaints which he will forward to County Hall.

District Councillor

Bill Dawe suggested ramps to reduce traffic speed through St. Endellion (Mr. Allen said that this is only done where there are street lights) and that roads must be salted in cold weather; asking what will happen when we get a *real* winter. He called for more police /warden cover for Port Isaac to alleviate the problem of parked cars blocking the narrow streets.

He hoped a lot of people would attend the village hall Annual Meeting and comments on the proposed improvement plans.

Bryan Nicholls said that work on the Village Hall is a waste of money – people know the hall will never make anything which is why they don't attend the meetings.

Bill Dawe said the committee give a lot of time but the public should come and tell the committee what they feel.

He does not support the proposed radio mast near homes at Mayfield. He called for a Sunday refuse collection at the Platt.

Public Discussion

Shirley Symons asked what did 'trial' rumble strips cost when multiplied over the whole county. Helen Richards will find this out.

Martin Bell spoke of the dangerous road entering Port Isaac and asked why the most vulnerable section of the community was put at the greatest risk.

Robin Penna suggested that the 30mph signs should be moved so that drivers can see them before rounding the corner.

Penny Manders suggested, *as a long-term project*, that funds should be raised to provide a footbridge.

Malcolm Lee said the Parish Survey showed most people thought the corner at the top of Back Hill, and the entrance to the village, were the most dangerous places, but at the same time five out of six were satisfied with the standard of our roads.

David Phelps expressed concern that the trees planted at places along the B3267 were suffering from a lack of care. He ended by saying that our visitors say Cornwall has far better roads than other parts of the country. He thanked all three speakers for attending.




Dear Trio,

1997 Parish Survey

This is a summary of the main findings of the report. The principal analysis was for the answers given by those in Port Isaac and Trelights communities except for those relating to sport, social, and entertainment where the analysis was between answers given by those with children and those without children in their households.

Footpaths:

Port Isaac uses paths more than twice as much as Trelights. (68 walks per year to 28). One person in three doesn't know where paths are. Almost one in four has problems following them: poor waymarking, lack of signs, mud, and overgrowth. Over three in four had no suggestion for improvements. Others in Port Isaac want Port Gaverne valley path improved; in Trelights, the path to Port Isaac. 90% want maps of the paths displayed.

Litter

Three in four people in Port Isaac think we have a problem, only just over a half in Trelights. More or better placed bins and more cleaning were main suggestions.

Our Environment

Over three quarters of the parish think there are features in need of protection, old parts of our villages being top priority; protection of the countryside the second priority (especially in Trelights). Two thirds think parts of the parish have been badly developed.

Shopping

Over half Trelights residents think shopping facilities poor (no shop there), less than a fifth in Port Isaac think so. Residents shop in the parish mainly to support shops, for last minute items, or for social contact. Shopping outside the parish is mainly for better choice than cheaper goods. Main centre is Wadebridge, 25% use Bodmin, 12% Truro. Plymouth and Launceston are also used.

Social Sport & Entertainment

All our parish rooms get low use. Almost three quarters of those with children use the Village Hall occasionally, just over half use the church rooms. Almost three quarters with children use Wadebridge leisure centre occasionally. Only a fifth without children use it. Camelford and Bodmin are used less. Four fifths with children use Wadebridge cinema – only a half by those without children.

Over all, less than a third, and even for those with children, only a half, had any suggestions for clubs, The formation of a Youth Club was the only significant suggestion, but principally by those without children.

Sporting/social activities covered such a wide variety, few suggestions got more than a handful of votes. Over half think facilities for children are poor. Four out of five agree facilities for young adults are poor. A third think facilities for pensioners are poor. Over two thirds of the parish think our village halls are adequate. Those who think them inadequate, modernisation, improved access, and parking are the main suggestions. Less than a fifth who think them inadequate feel that a new hall would be the answer.

Roads

Only a sixth of residents are dissatisfied with the state of our roads. Major danger spots in

Port Isaac are the entrance to the village and Hick's Corner; in Trelights, the junction by St. Endellion Church.

Local Government

Almost a half don't know how the parish council spends their rates. Only 1% are totally satisfied with how they are spent. 85% find out about Parish Council decisions in Trio, others attend meetings, as councillors or public. Only 1 in 12 does not know about council activities. Most people in Port Isaac want more information on Parish Council activities, just over a half in Trelights. Most claim to know more than half the councillors.

If suggestions in the survey require money, slightly less than half would accept modest rate rises, principal other suggestions were fundraising 61% and sponsorship 4 %. Over two thirds would like a public meeting to discuss the survey findings.

Other Data

The 1991 census shows 25% of our homes don't have access to a car, and rely on friends or public transport. Most are pensioners living alone – a vulnerable sector of our community buses are reduced. Port Isaac has about the highest proportion of second homes in Cornwall, almost five times the county average (conservation area almost eight times). Our total population more than doubles in the peak weeks (all Cornwall 59% increase), and we have almost 250,000 day visitors. Visitors staying here and day visitors spend over £5,000,000 while here.

Conclusions

The survey highlights ratepayer concerns and provides an objective basis for decision making. There was a clear sense from Trelights residents that their part of the Parish is ignored and it is Port Isaac which gets the lion's share of any resources. The separation of data for the two communities can help redeem this perceived imbalance.

PARISH COUNCIL

An independent report of the monthly meeting of Monday 11th. May held in the Church Rooms. NB. The Parish Council reports in Trio are necessarily kept as short as possible. For fuller information refer to the official Parish Council minutes or better still attend the meetings as a member of the public. Everyone may attend but can only speak during 'Public Discussion'.

Councillors David Phelps, Bryan Richards, Malcolm Lee, Bryan Nicholls, David Morgan, Andy Penny, and Harold Barriball were present. Apologies for absence were received from District Councillor Bill Dawe, and Councillors Richard Hambly and Jill O'Connor. Henry Stickland's resignation was accepted (he has moved to Bridgewater in Somerest to be near his family). The vacancy will be advertised, and if there are no applicants the position will be filled by co-option.

Fire Brigade Presentation

Five members of the local Fire Brigade led by Area Commander Kevin Marshall mounted a presentation of the new plans for tackling fires in Port Isaac. The village is now divided into two sections: 'high quarter' and 'low quarter'. A fire in the 'high quarter' will be treated as a normal domestic fire, but with one in the 'low quarter' the first appliance attending can immediately summon further appliances, first from Wadebridge with Land Rover type vehicles approaching via Church Hill, then if more water and pumps are needed two appliances from Bodmin. The main rendezvous is near the School in Mayfield Road.

South West Water Authority will be mobilised automatically but, in case of problems with water pressure, the appliances will carry thousands of litres of water plus pumps that can be carried by four men, which can be used to pump sea water – in a rough sea if necessary.

Radio communication will be maintained by relaying messages from vehicle to vehicle until they can be relayed out.

The houses in the 'low quarter' are old and dry and have common roof voids so the prevention of rapid fire spread is a priority. Also recognised is the fact that many of the people there will be visitors, unfamiliar with their surroundings.

Mr. Marshall also spoke of changes where there will no longer be automatic annual visits to business premises, etc., and more responsibility for safety will lie in the hands of proprietors. The manpower freed from these duties will be available to educate the general public in their responsibilities in preventing fires. The first priority for everyone, however, is to install a smoke alarm and make sure it is in working order.

Indiscriminate parking is a problem but the appliances will get past by one means or another – the public must learn to obey parking regulations.

Chairman David Phelps thanked the Brigade for the presentation.

Election of Officers for 1998/99

David Phelps stood down while the Clerk called for nominations for Chairman. David

Phelps was re-elected with no opposition. It was decided to re-elect the rest of the officers en-bloc.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards reported a strong complaint from a resident about the condition of the coastal footpath.

Planning Applications

Approval was recommended for the removal of banks and creation of a parking bay at nos. 14 and 15 Trewetha Lane for Mark Rowe and Jeremy Brown, erection of bungalows at Trelights for Mr. R. Haines and B. E. Goodright, and an extension at 14 Tintagel Terrace for Elaine Brown.

Finance

Treasurer Malcolm Lee reported that $\pounds 6,250$, the first half of the annual precept, had been received. He was granted permission to transfer $\pounds 5,400$ from the high interest account to the current account to cover monthly expenditure. The balances left were current account: $\pounds 137.49$, high interest: $\pounds 8,896.36$. He also announced that local fund-raising had achieved $\pounds 250$ for a Spike Jones memorial seat. He pointed out that St. Endellion is the highest rated rural parish in North Cornwall.

Junction of Back Hill and Fore Street

A letter was read from Sam Littlechild of the 'Secrets' shop. Danger is created both by vehicles and large delivery vehicles parked on the opposite side of the road, and by drivers failing to stop at the junction. He suggested an arc of bollards and/or an unbroken white line and 'stop' signs. David Phelps said that the situation had been examined during his recent walk round the village with County Councillor Helen Richards and District Councillor Bill Dawe.

Millennium Daffodils

It was decided that money for this project should be obtained by fund-raising instead of from ratepayers' money but that the public should be canvassed about the possibility of raising money by subscription. David Phelps and Harold Barriball are to investigate suitable types of bulbs and their cost,

Trelights Notice Board

Harold Barriball reported that the board is in a bad state of repair and local craftsmen are to be asked for prices for replacing it.

Road Sweeper

A letter of appreciation is to be sent to the employers of the daily road sweeper commending his efficiency.

Council House Path

The District Council is to be advised, with a copy letter to Bill Dawe, that the footpath from New Road to Tintagel Terrace, behind the Hartland Road council houses, is in bad condition.

Wall at Village Green, Trelights

Remedial work is needed for the wall – earth for the plants and some of the stone is missing – and local craftsmen will be asked to quote for the work.

1997 St. Endellion Parish Survey

Malcolm Lee summarised the results of his detailed and interesting survey (see separate report). The Clerk thanked him, on behalf of the Council, for his efforts.

Seats and Maintenance

The Seats Committee reported that there are 36 seats, 18 of which require oiling, 11 need repairing, 8 need painting, and 2 need replacing altogether including one at Little Hill. The Clerk is to initiate the work required.

Playing Field


Thanks to Daisy Hicks once again for her marvellous support and may I take this opportunity to thank all the people who support her locally in her efforts.

I have had a chat with the staff and we have decided that the best use for the money would be in helping to refurbish two bedrooms that are in desperate need.




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JOHN ARMSTRONG

A well-known and much respected member of the village passed away at the East Cornwall Hospital after a long illness. Ruth will be greatly missed by many of her friends, She was a valued member of the Golden Circle. The funeral was held at the Glynn Valley Crematorium on Thursday 28th. May. A number of close friends were present.

Ruth was born in Plymouth but we are not allowed to disclose the year. She later went to live in Newquay where her father, the well-know marine artist Douglas Pinder, kept a shop. It was here that she met Ted Robinson – a commercial traveller from Bury in Lancashire – to whom she got married. Later, probably in the 1930's, they came to Port Isaac where Ted first ran the Wheelhouse, then the Harbour Cafe – with the cafe upstairs, seating 40 persons. It was hard in those years, and, indeed even until the 1950's, Ruth cooked all the meals on a domestic electric stove plus Primus paraffir stoves for heating water, etc. There were not frozen goods, there was not even a refrigerator! Both Ruth and Ted were artists and the shop below the cafe sold their paintings and many other artefacts. They had one son Tony, who died at the age of sixteen ca. 1955 This was a terrible blow to them and afterwards they left the cafe. Ted carried on with a studio (Harbour Studio) until his death in June 1990. Some will still remember them however, for their ballroom dancing where Ted excelled and Ruth was an ideal partner

This was a successful and productive evening with a small, interested attendance of local business people, held in the pleasant surroundings of the Trevathan Strawberry Fields restaurant on Thursday evening 15th. May. Thank you to Shirley, Henry, and Sarah Symons for the hospitality and refreshments.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chris Harris said that, P.I.D.T.A. had paid for a notice board at the car park but North Cornwall District Council's terms restricted it to non-commercial notices only.

Advertising There are advertisements in the North Cornwall Guide and the 'Coastlines' newspaper as usual.

Coastal Footpath The path around the cliffs from the car park to the village was in bad condition with weeds. A letter was sent to the Countryside Commission which apparently resulted in an improvement.

The Guide 8,500 copies of the 1997 Guide had been printed and distributed. This year, 10,000 had been printed, and a better village map had been included. Many of the Guides had already been distributed to Information Centres throughout the area.

HON. TREASURER'S REPORT

Phil Slack presented his Income and Expenditure account. He was glad to be able to report a healthy bank balance of \pounds 589.75 and a membership of 65.

1999 GUIDE

There was general assent that the P.I.D.T.A. Guide was a good publication and should continue. Chris Harris presented a Projected Expenses/Income account detailing charges that it would be necessary to make to cover costs for 1998/99. The Guide's page will be divided into eighteen units - a 2-unit ad. will cost £30.00, 3 units £45.00, 4 units £60.00, and 5 units £75.00. The two inside covers will be divided to make eight quarter-page advertisements at a special rate of £85.00 each. Businesses that want to be included on the village map but didn't want advertisements will be asked to subscribe £5.00, private members will also be asked to subscribe £5.00. 10,000 copies will be printed.

Some members offered to distribute copies of the Guide. Application forms for the new Guide will be sent out as soon as possible and copy will be asked for by the end of July. Some late alterations may be possible in September and the Guide will be ready before Christmas. A new colour photograph will be needed for the cover (see below).

PUBLIC DISCUSSION




