PARISH COUNCIL

Planning

Approval has been recommended for the erection of an extension to a garage and the provision of a shed for Mr. and Revd. Pollinger, Marshalls Way, Trelights. Also an outline planning application for the erection of dwelling and garage, at Godrevy, New Road for Mrs. L. R. Sweet.

Notices received from North Cornwall District Council Planning Department have advised that an application for the formation of a parking bay at 14 Trewetha Lane has been refused, and one for the replacement of a garage at 3 Trewetha Lane has received approval.

Listed Building Consent for the removal of cement rich pointing, rendering and cement wash, repointing with lime mortar and application of lime wash, venting redundant chimney flues and rebuilding two chimney stacks, removal of internal dry lining and replastering. at Poltreworgey Farmhouse for the County Farms Committee was regarded with approval. A letter stating Parish Council approval for the continued use the Victorian Garden open to the public at Long Cross, Mr. D. J. Crawford, has been sent to the North Cornwall District Council-Department-of Planning and Development.

Fireworks Donation

A donation of £100 as before was proposed, seconded and carried by the meeting

District Councillor's Report

Bill Dawe reported improvements to the surface water drains on the B3314 road towards Pendoggett which should prevent the flooding that has happened there on many occasions in the past. He also spoke about the warden service and emergency services in Mayfield Close which have been improved.

Chairman's Report

David Phelps said that he had complained to South Western Electricity about a pole that had been 'dumped' and left lying on a grass verge for several days.

Seats

Painting and oiling is in progress, seats are being repaired and the grass cleared away where necessary The annual survey will take place in February and a report prepared for the March Parish Council meeting when a request for a definite policy on the time for painting will be included in tenders. One suggestion made was that perhaps the work should be completed before Whitsun. The nameplate on one seat has to be corrected: the name 'Colwill' will be changed to 'Colwell'.

Playing Field

The playing equipment is reported to be in good order but areas of the ground around the football goals are badly eroded and needed filling in and re-turfing. This urgent work will be carried out immediately.

The small entrance is in need of clearing and tarmacking and proposals will be made at another meeting.

The suggestion that a strongly-worded letter is sent to all car park users asking them to close the gates will also be discussed.

State of Hedges in the Village

After a tour of inspection by some members of the Council it was reported that the hedges in Port Isaac had all been cut. Trelights hedges to be added to next month's agenda. A number of road signs are, however, obscured by overgrowth and a list is to be sent to Transportation and Estates and North Cornwall District Council.

St. Endellion Recreation Committee

The Council was told that Mrs. Liz Rowe is now chair of the committee.

The committee will continue with money-raising to fund a £6,000 feasibility plan although it had failed to attract a Lottery Grant. The Parish Council passed a vote of confidence in the Committee and have also given written confirmation of their intention to lease the fields when a feasible plan is produced.

Police, Traffic Warden and Parking Problems

Peggy Richards expressed dissatisfaction at a letter from Chief Inspector Denton advising the Council that a local officer would be in contact and will raise the matter at the meeting with Paul Tyler.

Meeting with Paul Tyler MP

The date of the meeting is to be confirmed as 7.30pm. Friday 30th. October when 'Problems of Telecommunications Masts, Difficulties of communication with the Police, Parking problems in Port Isaac, and the Community Charge for Second Home Owners' will be on the agenda. There will also be time for public discussion.

Clearing Ragwort

Both Cornwall County Council Transportation and Estates, and North

Cornwall District Council asked for specific locations of Ragwort in the Parish to be reported. As it is now rather late to take any action, the subject will be put on the agenda for future May meetings to ensure that the ragwort is cleared annually. The Main has already been cleared.

Notice Boards

The board at the Platt may be refurbished and made available as a board for use by the public. The board on the wall near the school may be removed and replaced with the board presently on the fence at the Co-op forecourt where a new, larger board may be installed.

Possible Creation of Right-of-way

Formalities are commencing for the possible creation of a new right-ofway from the stile near the bridge in the lane south of Trevathan, across the bottom of the field and connect with the stile on the course of Foot-

path no. 25 which runs to the parish boundary and connects with the path to Chapel Amble in St. Minver Parish.

Footpath 'Co-ordinator'

The Clerk has accepted this office as an 'ex officio' (unpaid) position. These duties will not form part of the customary Clerk's work so will not be imposed on any future clerk as an automatic unpaid task.

Cleaning the Leat

The Council is making contact with relevant authorities about possible danger from flooding which could be caused by a raised water level due to debris in the Leat.

Wall Damaged at Coronation Park

Mr. Barriball reported that about onmetre of the wall had been damaged. possibly by a vehicle, late in the afternoon of Wednesday 19th. August. A temporary repair has been made.



Planning Information Meeting

There will be a meeting between the District and Parish Councils regarding Planning at St. Mabyn on Monday 8th. February 1999. The date of the February Parish Council meeting may be deferred so that members can attend.

Old Slate Quay Port Gaverne

The Cornwall Association of Town and Parish Councils has been contacted to discover what progress is being made concerning a letter and photographs sent to them last November, asking for advice about the erosion of the quay.

A letter was received from a regular visitor and some of his suggestions are to be discussed at another meeting.


GARDEN SHOW 1998

Talk on Bishop

The life and work of a pioneer missionary who eventually became a bishop in British Columbia in the earlier part of this century was recounted and illustrated with slides by his nephew at an open meeting of the United Benefice branch of the Mothers' Union in the church hall in September. Mr. Russell Pollinger, a member of the branch, spoke about his uncle, the Rt, Revd. Samuel Pollinger who became Bishop of Cariboo in 1942, after years of ministry in the country first as a lay reader, then deacon, priest, archdeacon, and finally a bishop. Mr. Pollinger was thanked by Mrs. Sandra Warne, as was Mr. Peter Coster who had been projectionist for the slides. The meeting began with a short service led by the Revd. Preb. Michael Bartlett, Rector, and Deanery and Diocesan Chaplain and afterwards tea was served and a business meeting was chaired by Mrs. Pam Richards, Branch and Deanery Chairman.






