PARISH COUNCIL

Planning Matters

The council has received notification from the North Cornwall District Council Department of Planning and Development that the appeal against planning refusal for the Telecommunication Mast at Mayfield Road has been withdrawn.

Applications have been approved for the provision of a 1.4m high entrance gate and formation of a hard standing at Higher Barn, 27 Rose Hill; for erection of dwelling and garage at Godrevy, New Road; and for refurbishment of the public convenience at New Road.

British Legion Wreath

The donation towards the British Legion wreath has been increased from $\pounds 60$ to $\pounds 80$.

Bollards

There is a new black and gold bollard at the Pentus wall. Another one is also to be placed in the entrance to Temple Bar to replace the wooden one, but a further one at the Pentus is not likely to be provided.

Cornwall County Council Transportation and Estates have been reminded about the request for bollards, or some other form of traffic control, at the bottom of Back Hill.

Drainage in Temple bar

Bill Dawe has reported the matter of poor rain water drainage in Temple Bar to the authority responsible.

Public Meeting with Paul Tyler MP

This was run like an Annual Public Meeting and Mr. Tyler addressed the audience and replied to questions. Police Chief Inspector Elaine Marshall was also present and answered questions. (See pages 4 and 5)

Planning Consultation Paper

A paper concerning new thinking about 'Telecommunications Development Control' has been received from Paul Tyler MP. and is being made available for circulation to all members of the council.

Playing Field Entrance

A contractor has been asked to clear and improve the small entrance to allow prams to be pushed through.

Playing Field Gates

The Department of Education has been asked to ensure that the gates are closed by the grass cutting contractors when they leave. Other users seemed to be complying with the previous request by the Parish Council to keep the gates closed.

Notice Boards

The board on the fish cellar wall at the Platt, is not used by the Parish Council has been offered to Port Isaac and District Tourism Association.

It is also proposed, with the permission of the owner of the fence, to provide a new, larger board on the fence at the Cooperative Society and then to remove the board from the wall near the school and replace it with the board presently on the fence at the Co-op as soon as the new board is available.

Playground Equipment

A letter from the Health & Safety Executive -'Safety at Children's Playgrounds' indicates that much more strenuous inspection of the equipment will be necessary and Messrs. Tony Mogford Associates, Play Equipment and Playgrounds Safety Inspections, have been invited to carry out the first inspection. The equipment will then have to be checked on a regular basis throughout the year.

Footpaths

Acting on a letter from a visitor the council is considering the viability of installing a waymarker in the Port Isaac valley to indicate the position of the footbridge leading to Tresungers.

Cornwall County Council has been asked to clear mud from the steps on Lobber.

An enquiry is to be made about the footpath sign where Footpath 23 leaves Trevathan Lane.

Fireworks

The Police, Fire Brigade, and The National Trust were informed of the display to take place at Port Gaverne on the evening of Saturday 31st. October. The event is covered by the Parish Council public liability insurance with a maximum of $\pounds5,000,000$. The Fireworks Committee (Mr. Malcolm Lee, Mr. Ron Holmes, and Mr. Simon Barker) also supplied a list and map of the venue detailing the procedures to be included.

Cleaning Port Isaac Leat.

An agent of the Environment Agency at Bodmin has looked at the condition of the leat and will contact Housing and Environmental Services, North Cornwall District Council, to establish responsibility for any necessary work.

Port Gaverne Quay

The council proposes to write to Cornhill Insurance and query their attitude with regard to the responsibilities of the Parish Council for the condition of the quay and the cliffs behind it.

Eclipse Week

The Parish Council is interested in discovering what contingency plans are in hand at District and County level to cover problems arising from the increase in population during the eclipse week.

Signs and Hedges Port Isaac

Following a letter from Cornwall County Council Transportation and Estates to the effect that there is no money to renew the faded signs, the Parish Council has asked in a reply whether the signs in fact still have any legal status when they cannot be read.

Winter Road Salting

The Parish Council proposes to write to Cornwall County Council Transportation and Estates and request that the B3267 road, from Poltreworgey Hill to the Port Isaac garages, is included in the schedule when salting is carried out.

Parish Council Meetings

The meetings are held at 7.30pm. on the second Monday of each month, in January, March, April, May, July, August, September, November, and December at Port Isaac Church Rooms, and in February, June, and October at Trelights Chapel Room.



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Open Afternoon



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LIFEBOAT NEWS

There are two services to report this month:

Slippery Slopes

On Thursday 28th. May, the Inshore Life Boat launched at 3.30pm. to go to Barra Nose, just north of Tintagel Head where four adults and an infant were reportedly trapped on a cliff; a dog was also with the people. Upon arrival, it was found that the 'infant' was a rather large 14-year old and all five had become stuck some way up a bank which had become very slippery due to rain which had wet the surface after the group had climbed down to go fishing. By now it was also too slippery and dangerous for any lifeboat crew to climb up to assist the group. The I.L.B. therefore stood by until a helicopter arrived and the people were winched up to safety. Meanwhile, the dog had climbed back up to the top of the cliff on its own.

Capsize

On Monday 22nd. June, we launched following a report that a person was seen clinging to an upturned boat or surfboard off Trebarwith. The I.L.B. picked up Mr. Charlie Rowe, a wellknown professional fisherman of Port Isaac. His boat had been swamped by waves whilst he had been sorting out a tangle of lobster pots; the boat had quickly capsized but, fortunately, remained afloat and Mr. Rowe's waving had been observed from the shore. He was brought back to Port Isaac and his boat was later recovered by his brother Bruce and towed back to Port Isaac.

Lifeboat Service

The annual Lifeboat Service was held on the Platt at 12.15pm., when a large crowd gathered to hear the St. Breward

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Band, and to join in the service conducted by Revd. Preb. Michael Bartlett, Honorary Chaplain to Port Isaac Lifeboat Station. Donations collected for service sheets came to approximately £150. Many thanks to all who attended. Our gratitude also goes to Mr. Micky Hunt and the band members, and to Revd. Bartlett. This happy occasion was blessed with fine, if slightly windy weather and the Platt looked suitably festive with flags and bunting. Our thanks go to the Commissioners of Port Isaac Harbour for the facility of the Platt, and to Mr. Byron Buse for his kind help over car parking for the band.

LIFEBOAT AGM

A brief summary of the Lifeboat Annual General Meeting held on the 14th. of May 1998.

Miss Annie Price opened the meeting and welcomed everyone present. Annie went on to report on the previous year and to thank everyone concerned for their support, and particularly, their fund raising efforts. In the absence of Cliff Gaunt, Annie also summarised the financial year. Station Honorary Secretary, Mr. Ted Childs, then reported on operational matters. A most important change is that the Port Isaac Lifeboat is now an all year station as opposed to summer only. This not only provides greater cover but allows the crew to exercise throughout the winter.

Saturday 13th. of September 1997 saw the naming and dedication of the new Lifeboat. Members of the Royal Logistics Corps, who raised the funds for the boat, attended the ceremonies.

Ted thanked all the crew and officers involved with the Lifeboat and also Dr. Jim Lunny, Honorary Medical Advisor, for all his work.

Andy, who completed 200 services during his time with Port Isaac Boat, has just retired as a crew member after more than 20 years, many of them as senior Helmsman. He now plans to use his knowledge and experience to assist in the training of other crew members.

SEAQUEST

Port Isaac Hosts First Seaquest Visit

Port Isaac Primary School had two visits from Stephen Westcott, of Seaquest S.W., on Friday 9th October. Stephen is hoping to visit as many coastal communities in the south west as possible to create a network of 'Coastal Rangers' helping to monitor the local marine environment. Port Isaac was the first village to host such a visit.

In the morning Stephen spoke to the children at the Primary School about grey seals and other large marine animals around Devon and Cornwall. Many of the children were so fascinated that they came back with their parents to the evening talk, where Stephen explained a little more about Seaquest S.W. He appealed for help from coastal communities in monitoring the movements of animals such as bottlenose dolphins, grey seals and basking sharks. More exotic creatures, such as Leatherback Turtles, are also often seen around our coastline and the presence of swarms of jellyfish is an important indicator that these larger animals may be around.

There was obviously a lot of local interest in Seaquest and John Brown, owner of Port Isaac Aquarium, suggested that a log book be kept in the Aquarium for fishermen, coastal walkers etc. to record their observations. Plans are also underway for the schoolchildren to record any reports of large marine animals seen locally and also for them to link up with other coastal schools in Cornwall to exchange information.

RETURN OF AN OLD LADY


She is a lady of strong character and strength. Her main aim in life was to help people in severe conditions. She used to reside on the Platt, and in her day could turn a few heads.
