PARISH COUNCIL

Meetings

The Parish Council normally holds its meetings on Monday evenings, commencing at 7.30pm. The regular monthly meetings take place on the second Monday each month. An interim meeting is sometimes necessary when plans have been received from the North Cornwall District Council Department of Planning and Development requiring a decision within two weeks. This month there is an exception, however. On Monday the 8th. there is a meeting with the District Council at St. Mabyn for all local parishes, meaning that the Parish Council meeting will have to be held a week later on the 15th. The majority of Parish Council meetings are held in the Church Rooms but, for the benefit of the people of Trelights, the February, June, and October meetings are held there in the Chapel Room.

Illegal Parking

There is a continual and continuing problem with parking, especially in the narrow streets of the 'old village'. Visitors to the village, and some locals, leave their cars in very awkward places. The refuse collection lorry had to make a detour from its normal route which was blocked at Christmas and the New Year by illegally parked cars at Minepit Corner and the bottom of Back Hill. The Delabole fire crew had to be advised of the problem in case of an emergency.

It has been suggested that a policeman or traffic warden might come to Port Isaac and advise members of the Parish Council where it was actually illegal to park so that offending cars could possibly be leafletted informing their owners of the problems they were causing and pointing out that they were parked illegally. It is hoped that a meeting can be arranged with the Police and Cornwall County Council Transportation and Estates to try and establish where parking is legal and where not.

Special Fire Exercise in Port Isaac

The special fire practice in Port Isaac will take place in the afternoon of Tuesday 2nd. March. Assistant Divisional Officer Marshall is to attend the next Parish Council meeting.

Victoria House

Victoria House has been recommended by the Parish Council to be considered under the Cornish Buildings Group 1998 Annual Award Scheme. The Clerk has liaised with Frank Gadman and sent off the form with appropriate 'before' and 'after' photographs.

Port Gaverne Quay

Warning signs 'Take care – uneven surface' are to be erected on the quay where the sea has badly eroded the path.

Port Gaverne Toilets

The National Trust has been invited to contribute towards the costs of running the toilets which are now one of the greatest items of expenditure the Parish Council has to fund.

Co-op Notice Board

The Parish Council is trying to obtain permission for a new board at the Co-operative Society forecourt. The present board is very small and as it is seen by many people when shopping it would make sense to have a much larger board there.

Safety of Playground Equipment

Repair work that has to be done in the near future has necessitated a further £1,500 to be added to the Parish Council precept for 1999/2000. Quotations for the repair of the equipment and provision of safety surfaces to the standard required by the Health & Safety Executive come to a total of approximately £11,500 A loan from the Public Works Loan Board might provide funds towards this.

Telecommunications Mast

A planning application no. 98/1162 for 'the erection of a 15m, pole type mast, installation of 3 no. antenna, two link transmission dishes, and the erection of accompanying equipment cabinets and associated works at Port Gaverne for Orange Personal Communications Services Limited' did not receive approval by the North Cornwall District Council Planning Committee and Orange have therefore lodged an appeal. Meanwhile a new application, no. 1999/0066, has been submitted for the same installation but modified in accordance with the suggestions made at a site meeting late last year. This would bring the mast to a less conspicuous position adjacent to the existing buildings.

Planning Matters

Mark Rowe's application for a car port in front of his house in Trewetha Lane has been approved by the North Cornwall District Council Department of Planning and Development.

The Victorian gardens at Longcross have a Certificate of Lawful Use as gardens open to the general public throughout the year.

Approval, with conditions, has been granted for the partial demolition and reconstruction with an extension to 'First and Last', Trewetha Lane, to form a dwelling.

The Parish Council has recommended for approval by the Department of Planning and Development, plans for 'six disabled and holiday lodges' at Trewetha Farm. These would provide facilities for the disabled, accommodation with its own car parking spaces –outside the village – and would also be available for the whole of the year.

On Thursday 4th. March, in common with all lifeboat stations in the country, we shall celebrate the 175th. Anniversary of the founding of the R.N.L.1. by firing TWO WHITE FLARE to 10.05 in the morning.

SEALIFE RESCUE

Since the formation of the British Diver Marine Life Rescue Group at Port Isaac last August, firm relationships have been established with the Gweek Seal Sanctuary, the Newquay Sealife Centre, Plymouth National Marine Aquarium, and The Wildlife

Trust in Devon. Active rescue work has been carried out, with attendance to seven call-outs of which four were seal rescues successfully accomplished and the seals transported to Gweek for medical care and eventual re-habilitation. The Group will assist in this work. Some members have attended Gweek for more intense marine medic training and it is planned for this to continue throughout the year. A further B.D.M.L.R. course will take place at Plymouth on Sunday 28th. February in conjunction with Plymouth University, If anyone is interested in attending, contact S.W. Area B.D.M.L.R. Please note – if a marine mammal is found ashore, call the B.D.M.L.R. contact or Gweek Seal Sanctuary – (01326) 221790. Do not attempt to re-introduce the seal or dolphin back into the sea – this can prove to be fatal for the animal as indeed it proved to be on a recent call-out to a dolphin stranding at Golant, near Fowey. Before trained rescue arrived on the scene with proper equipment the injured animal had been manoeuvred back into a shallow, fast-running tide race and subsequently died through well meant action.

QUIZ NIGHT AT 'THE LION'



ST. KEW

'St. Kew - A Parish Album - One Hundred Years Through the Camera Lens'. Compiled by Burnard Hawken - (01208) 841205 - and Hilary Platten -(01208) 841649. Price £5.00 (including postage). 64 pages.

Our busy St. Kew neighbours have done it again. This is their fourth book on local history to appear in the last year or two. It is a pictorial record of their parish in the twentieth century, attractively presented, broadly based and seductively reminiscent of an almost lost and forgotten past. Its compilers have done a very good job. It is divided into four sections. 'People and Places' includes - among many other subjects - a Tipton Lane before Dutch Elm Disease, the old bridge at Chapel Amble (replaced in 1937), Ethel Dash and her 1902 pupils at Chapel Amble School (closed in 916), Jacob Stone, St. Kew School's neadmaster for 43 years (1868-1911), Emma Bessie (Granny) Vincent, landlady of the Red Lion Inn at St. Kew Highway for forty years, and her husband Joseph, the first signalman at the local railway station (St. Kew Highway).

NB. As printed and dedicated, this poem is for my grandchildren but if any readers want to borrow it for their own, they are welcome to use it. There is a brief pictorial history of Treharrock Manor, originally built for Francis Brown Hambly in 1812, passing on then to the families Bassett, Tom, Hawkey, and then back eventually to the Hamblys who, I think, still own it. All this and much, much more. This list-writer's mind boggles! So on to 'Out and About', featuring early bicycles and motor bikes, traps, and a jingle ('an Irish or Australian covered cart' says the Concise Oxford Dictionary - this one was designed and built locally by Garfield Hawkey so it was obviously a Cornish jingle!), motor cars (a 1914 Trumhull, a 1937 three-wheeled Morgan, and a ravishing Lagonda, occasionally used by its owner, Graham Toms, as a substitute tractor), steam trains, and snaps of St. Kew Highway station.

'Events and Leisure' encompasses fetes, wrestling in the meadow opposite the St. Kew Inn (now the pub car park), bell-ringing, the North Cornwall Hunt, and a Cornish bardic Gorsedd.

Finally, 'The Corn Harvest' reminds us of traditional farming with horsedrawn ploughs and corn hand-cut, bound, and stacked, perhaps the method still used even after the Second World War.

This journey into very recent history depicts a way of life still remembered by some in St. Kew and St. Endellion parishes and seems a very good way to mark the passing of the second millennium. As the book's compilers say in their introduction, 'this will bring back fond memories to older members of the parish and give the younger people an insight into, and pride in, their unique heritage.
