The meeting of Monday 8th. March at Port Isaac.

During the 'Public Discussion', Sam Littlechild spoke to the Parish Council of plans by the village Millennium Committee to install a commemorative clock at Port Isaac fish cellars.

Alex Roads explained trouble taken to retain the old well at his property, Calenick, Trelights, while not jeopardising public safety. David Goodbourn produced photographs of the damage done by large lorries to the bank in Trewetha Lane, at the rear of his premises.

Planning

Plans for an extension to 2 Mayfield Road for Mr. and Mrs. Pattenden, were recommended for approval.

Standing Down

Malcolm Lee announced his resignation as Treasurer and stated that he did not intend to stand for re-election.

Dog Bins for Trelights

Harold Barriball announced on behalf of Bill Dawe that two dog bins will be installed at Trelights.

Seats Maintenance

Bryan Richards reported that it had not yet been possible to have a walk-round with Dave Dingle so the item was deferred until next month

South West Coast Path

A letter from Transportation and Estates was read stating that their responsibilities were confined to the footpath. Malcolm Lee said that if it is not a public highway then the Parish Council cannot spend public money on re-surfacing work. To this another member retorted that he 'would be glad to see the back of Malcolm Lee'! Next month the clerk will be asked to write to all property owners with frontages to the road and suggest that theirs is the responsibility for any re-surfacing.

Verge Near Chapel, Trelights

In a letter, Transportation and Estates said that they did not consider the verge requires

Bank in Trewetha Lane

Cornwall County Council Transportation and Estates says that the banks are the responsibility of private landowners but that 'top dressing' scheduled for April will strengthen the carriageway edges.

Memorial Seat For John Riddex.

It was proposed to accept the family's offer of a seat, with engraved plaque, which could be placed at an empty site on the coast path.

Progress of Plans for New Playing Field

A letter was received from Port Isaac Recreation Committee saying that plans are being made for changing rooms and for the removing and re-siting of hedges, and that funds are being sought.

Old Well At Calenick, Trelights

It was proposed that public access to the well be reclaimed but after discussion of whether there is public ownership of the well, and safety problems, the proposal was withdrawn.

New Attempt to Have Business Rates Reduced, Port Gaverne Toilets

The letter received last month from The National Trust was read again and Malcolm Lee offered to liaise with the clerk in drawing up a convincing argument.

B.3314, Western Junction - Trelights

The clerk has replied to suggestions, by Mr. J. Prouse of Trelights, that an alteration to the alignment of the road could eliminate a blind spot at the junction. The Parish Council feels that the idea is good in principle but that straightening the road would cause faster driving. A copy of Mr. Prouse's letter has been sent to Transportation and Estates.

Clerk's Correspondence and Report

A letter from Cornhill Insurance was mistakenly thought to be an advance warning of a claim arising from an alleged injury to a child on the see-saw but it is now realised that it was indeed a claim and the necessary form has duly been filled in and returned to Cornnhill.

North Cornwall Design Guide

The final version of the North Cornwall District Council's Design Guide has been published. Free copies have been circulated to all Parish and Town Councils, related national and local organisations, and L local architects, agents, and planning visers. PARISH COUNCILLOR 1995-1999

At the March meeting of the Parish Council I announced that I would not stand for reelection in the May elections. I thank Bryan Richards, and Bill Dawe, also Henry Symons, former chairman, for their kind words on hearing this. I also have to thank Bryan Nicholls whose offensive remark [see 'Parish Council'] won me a £10 bet.

You may be interested in my observation of the Council over the last four years, seen from the inside. It reveals the failure of louder members to (a) listen to anyone who does not share their views, (b) to listen to the views of the electorate, or (c) to do any work. They just talk and leave the work to others.

It is easy to listen to those who agree with you; far more difficult to listen to those who do not. Examples of these failures reached a peak in the disgraceful display which finally forced the resignation of our hard-working chairman, Henry Symons. I must, though, thank Henry Symons, David Philp, and Mark Provis, while they were members, and Harold Barriball, Bill Dawe, David Morgan, Andy Penny, Bryan Richards, and Peggy Richards, for showing they could do the difficult bit.

The reaction to the 1995 proposals for a Parish Survey is the most damning evidence of failure to listen to community views. I was shocked to hear of the pre-Parish Council meeting in the Cornish Cafe, where apoplectic councillors ranted that the survey had to be stopped. At the following Parish Council meeting this contingent voted against it enbloc – demonstrating their true contempt for your views.

The survey, nevertheless, went ahead in 1997. At the Annual Parish Meeting, John Brown asked what priority would the Parish Council give to views expressed in the survey. The infamous reply by Bryan Nicholls was 'none whatsoever'. Somewhere in the sixty-page survey even the loud members could have found public support. Since publication, no action has been taken on your concerns; your views have been ignored.

The worst failure is doing no work. One member said that he is not on the Council to work! Talk is the easiest thing in the world. Taking action is the difficult part. No work means no achievement. Talk is not work, and in itself achieves nothing.

The playing field project is the single biggest failure. In May 1995, I was appointed secretary to the Council field-purchase committee; our paid clerk had 'many other commitments'. After lengthy meetings, it was obvious that no one wanted to help with the work. I devised a

test. I claimed 'many other commitments' and need of assistance to prepare the grant applications. Reassuring murmurs of help were heard, and the grant forms were distributed for completion. At the next meeting I pointed out that delay might result in loss of the field, and suggested a loan. They said 'we will be getting grants, interest free loans, donations, raising funds ... but just to be on the safe side please look into the possibility of a Public Works Loan'. By January 1996, I was assured that the committee would know how much had been raised, and the Parish Council would know how much to borrow. Those forms remain uncompleted to this day. Not one penny was raised. It was just talk, and the ratepayers ended up funding a loan for 100% of the field cost. Why had it taken around 100 man hours of committee time to end up in this position?

After the purchase of the field, another six months inactivity then yet another committee was proposed, to look into what could be done. I claimed 'many other commitments' and kept out of it. After several more meetings, Mrs Everett was asked to do the work. The committee had one function: to report on what could be done, not to decide what to do. Its failure led me to produce a financial feasibility study. Unknown to me, Mrs Everett was also producing her own study. Both of these showed a significant shortfall in the income needed to meet annual running costs (business rates, water rates, electricity, insurance, cleaning, repairs and re-decoration, grass cutting, statutory safety inspections, etc.). Even if the building cost could be obtained by grants, and other costs were reduced by voluntary work, most would have to be met from revenue income. Use by the Football Club and possibly the Cricket Club might raise a maximum of £400 per annum to meet the bills, but could not be guaranteed. The study set out the problems, and the work needed to overcome them. If those to benefit from the facilities were prepared to start this work, progress might be possible. A further burden on the ratepayers could not be acceptable

After another month of waffle and no work, the Parish Council passed the proposal 'at this time nothing can be done'. Of course, anyone could still put together a feasible project for later consideration but it is easier to say 'we were stopped', or 'they are against it', than face the work to be done. When Henry Symons tried to explain the essential work needed, he was shouted down by those who wanted neither to listen, nor to do the work. It was clear that to move forward the project had to get off the Parish Council and in autumn 1997, it did, but I was saddened by $3\frac{1}{2}$ years talk and inactivity. If you are thinking of standing in next month's elections, do you expect to simply turn up for

90 minutes a month to say 'we should do this' but actually mean 'someone else should do this'? If you are prepared to work, are you prepared to be constantly shouted down by lazy people when you do not concur with their views? If you are the latter, you may be what the Parish Council needs.

When I stood for election four years ago, I promised that I would undertake a survey of your views. This was achieved, despite noisy opposition. I promised that what needs to be said on behalf of the community would be said, regardless of the vested interests of a few. This too was done, despite offensive remarks from members with those vested interests who did not like me pointing it out. I believe these achievements are honourable, and, though small, I hope they are significant. It has been a privilege to serve the community.


