School and village to use new computers

Port Isaac Community Primary School has been given funding to purchase a bank of twelve new computers plus all the software, printers and ancillary equipment needed to set up a fully equipped resources centre.

Sited in the school library, the computers will be used by the School during the day

and for the local community out of school hours.

Evening classes, including

'Computing for the Terrified' and 'Computing for the Not So Terrified' as well as an 'Internet' course will be provided by Adult Education. These will commence in the Autumn Term.

However, the computers should be installed in school next term ready for the children to use.

Local opinion sought in The Main debate

No decision will be taken regarding The Main at Port Gaverne before full consultation has taken place with the electorate of St Endellion Parish.

Mr Andrew Davey of the National Trust attended the Parish Council Meeting on March 27th. He explained that the National Trust would be prepared, in principle, to take over the Main if it came as a gift but it would not be prepared to buy it.

The NT would hope to be able to replace the footbridge which crosses the gully on the headland, repair handrails and undertake general maintenance. However, when the Quay, which currently provides access to the headland, was washed away or became totally unsafe to use, it would not be economically . able to replace it.

The Parish Council, which has owned The Main since it was bought by its predecessors in the 1920s on behalf of the local community, is

concerned at the mounting cost of maintenance, hence its approach to the National Trust.



Dear Trio

The following letter was sent to the Parish Council regarding the Main at Port Gaverne and the National Trust:-

'Although I should never presume to call myself a 'local', I have lived in Port Gaverne for 35 years. Does this allow me an opinion about the parish Council/The Main/the National Trust?

Some years ago when I was Chairman of the PC, the idea that the NT might one day take over The Main was discussed informally but no action was taken. It seemed to me then, as it does now, that for the PC to sell, or even give, The Main to the Trust would be the best action it could take.

If the Trust is willing to take over the Main it would at once relieve the Parish of an on-going financial burden and, above all, it would ensure that our successors would ever be able to enjoy an unspoilt area of great natural beauty and value to the community. I have never been able to understand local antipathy to the

National Trust.

Of course they have made mistakes – who hasn't – but much good work has been done unseen in Port Gaverne. Repairs to cob walls, repairs/renewals of slate roofs are just a small part of its endeavours here. I know that it does not allow parking on the beach but is that such a bad thing? As for charging to keep a boat on the beach or to launch from the beach – who can tell me of anywhere on either coast where this is not exactly the same? Unless of course you have wealthy friends with private frontage.

Finally, I should like to congratulate the Council with regard to the new railings on the quay and at Teague's Pit – excellent. But in view of the extortionate rise in community charge for this Parish I would have thought that they could at least have been gold plated!!

Dear Trio

Forty years or so ago, when I first came to Port Isaac, I was quite captivated by its charm and uniqueness (in the same way that many visitors are). The village still looks very much the same as it did then with relatively few changes to the buildings. This is partly due to the fact that the old part of the village was designated a Conservation Area and the majority of the houses in the bottom part of the village were listed as being of historical interest.

In the early eighties, a booklet was issued by the council detailing the architectural features of the village and recommending changes to

buildings that were in keeping with the place. Furthermore, any development within the conservation area has to be publicised and approved.

Unfortunately, there is still no legislation in place to enforce the good practice that will ensure that the historical features of the village are maintained. Over the years it has been quite a battle to prevent development that would have radically altered the place. Most householders care enough about the village to make changes and repairs that are in keeping with Port Isaac. Unfortunately, there are a number who make alterations - that are not always appropriate - and then apply for retrospective planning permission. The council rarely forces householders to restore the buildings to their original form and so, gradually, the village is changing.

Port Isaac is increasingly dependent on its' historic interest for economic survival. Apart from our tourist industry, look at the filming that has taken place here over the years. It is vitally important that we do not spoil the very things that make the village special. Even more importantly, I believe we hold the place in trust for our descendants and have a responsibility to look after it for the future.

Many towns and villages where the buildings are of historic interest are protected from radical change by an Article IV restriction. This I believe means that any alterations must have planning permission. This was refused here some years ago but I feel the time has come for it to be seriously discussed again in the interests of protecting the features that make Port Isaac so special.

Parish Council

Some Parish Council items taken from its recent meetings and kindly supplied to us by Robin Penna.

RESIGNATION OF COUNCILLORS

By the time this edition of Trio appears, Andy Penny will have been co-opted back onto the PC as no bye-election was requested. This follows his resignation and subsequent decision to return.

The Council has, however, now received David Morgan's notice of resignation and the same rules will now apply, ie if ten electors have not requested a bye-election before the date given on the notices on the PC notice boards then another member of the Parish will be asked to accept co-option.

PUBLIC DISCUSSION

Sam Littlechild asked if there was any news about the development of the new playing field and the future of the playground equipment. He also asked why the PC used the Church Rooms and not the Village Hall for meetings.

PLANNING

The PC has objected strongly to an application for listed building consent, involving work which is already completed, at The Brick House, 5 Rose Hill, involving the removal of the existing, defective, roof and its replacement with dark slates. The PC feels that there is very little point in the consultation process if applicants, particularly those who are the owners of listed buildings, are continually allowed to ask for development permissions after the work has been completed and sometimes, as in this case, unsympathetically.

David Phelps spoke of a problem where another development had taken place at a listed building, Boskensa (or Graemar), Back Hill, without an application for planning consent.

PORT GAVERNE TOILETS

The annual business rates for 2000/2001 will be £392.35. An appeal against the rate is to be lodged.

PORT ISAAC 2000 PROJECTS

Port Isaac 2000 is not seeking funding from the PC but wants it to be involved with the possible erection of a bus shelter in the Hartland Road area and the placing of mosaic slabs along the cliff path.

The meeting indicated support for the projects but the problems that were experienced when attempts were made to provide a bus shelter in 1979/81 were mentioned.

PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT

Bryan Richards is seeking possible sources of grant funding but with no success so far. The insurance company would like any defective equipment to be removed immediately.

The money needed for the play equipment to conform with the Mogford report is approximately £10,250 plus VAT. The PC is not in a position to do all this work immediately but can spend between £3000 and £3500. The Amenity Committee proposes that the work required at Trelights Playing Field be completed; the swings at Port Isaac be brought up to standard and resited; the existing maintenance on the Maribou at Port Isaac be carried out: and the Assault Course at Port Isaac be removed from service and replaced when the money is available.

THE MAIN, PORT GAVERNE

The National Trust is basically in favour of taking over the Main at Port Gaverne but it would have to be in the form of a gift and not a purchase and with a clear understanding that if the quay becomes impossible to repair it will not be replaced. No decision will be made without full consultation with the electors of the Parish.

VENUE OF MEETINGS

It was proposed that alternative, larger, premises should be sought for PC monthly meetings and it was suggested that the PC should try using the main Church Hall for twelve months.

FIRST AND LAST

The building is registered by NCDC Building Control as a Dangerous Building and is subject to regular inspection but the condition at present is said to pose no danger to the public.

The press and public were excluded from the meeting for these items of business on the grounds that it involves the likely disclosure of exempt information as defined in the identified Paragraphs of Part 1 of Schedule 12A of the Local Government Act 1972.





ooking back at Port Isaac signs

At the top of Church Hill at the junction of the St Endellion to Longcross road was a signpost which read, 'PORT ISAAC – Impractical for Motors'. It's a pity it's not there now as it would help to ease the traffic chaos at the bottom of Church Hill.

In the 1930s and 40s, at the top of Back Hill (opposite the bus shelter), was a cast iron direction sign which indicated 'TINTAGEL' on one side and 'TINTAGLE' on the reverse. It would appear that the Highways Department could not make up their minds even in those days!

When Leslie Hore Belisha introduced traffic signs in the mid 1930s, the speed limit signs at the top of Port Gaverne hill and in Church Hill were duly installed without cementing them in. The young lads of the day (me included) very soon found out that the signs could be moved round so that they read opposite to that intended.

Port Isaac had a resident policeman until the early 1970s and his Station House was 16 Tintagel Terrace. A small office (the outhouse) was used at the back of the house. To refrain people from



Seals and dolphins

Two more young seals have been released back into the sea at Port Gaverne by local BDMLR members in conjunction with the Gweek Seal Sanctuary. This pair had tracking caps fitted which made them look a bit like circus seals! In addition to Port Isaac school children, classes from St Kew and Delabole watched the releases.

BDMLR members were also called out to a stranded dolphin at Godrevy Sands on March 20th. Local coastguard members guided the BDMLR to the stranding but unfortunately the dolphin died before help could be given.

Dozens of dead dolphins have been washed up on Cornish beaches recently and Dr Nick Tregenza, Cornwall Wildlife Trust Marine Expert thinks that the true number of dead dolphins on our coastline could run into hundreds. He said, 'It happens every winter and the numbers we have seen in Cornwall are just the tip of the ice berg as only about one per cent of the carcasses end up on the beach. Hundreds of common dolphins are being caught up in the huge midwater trawler nets around the west coasts of Europe.' He stressed that it was not local South Western fishermen who were at fault.

'Common dolphins have a brain as big as ours and great personalities' he added. 'Why should we say goodbye to this beautiful animal just because of commercial selfinterest?' He called on the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food and the European Commission to do more.





Easter treats

Posst lamb is traditionally served on Easter Sunday and, with Annew potatoes and spring vegetables, what could be more delicious? To start the meal, I suggest a little smoked salmon, served with crème fraiche and spring onion drop scones. Chocolate and rum mousse would make the perfect dessert.

Spring Onion Drop Scones

100g/4oz plain flour pinch salt level tsp bicarbonate soda 1½ level tsp bicarbonate soda 1½ level tsp bicarbonate soda 1½ level tsp cream of tartar legg 150ml/kpt milk 4 spring onions finely sliced corn or sunflower oil to fry

Method

Sieve all of the dry ingredients into a mixing bowl. Break the egg into the middle and with a wooden spoon mix in the milk. When well incorporated use a whisk and beat well until your batter is smooth. This process can be done in a food processor. Add the sliced onions. Allow to stand a while. Stir well before use.

Heat a solid frying pan well and wipe the surface with a small amount of oil. Drop a tablespoon of the mixture onto the hot pan, four or five at a time of the stirled processor with a spatula. Cook for about a minute on the other side then remove and keep warm in a tea towel. Repeat the process until all the mixture has been used. It is important that the next recipe is made with a good quality chocolate such as Bournville or similar. Chocolate substitutes will not give a good result.

Chocolate Mousse

200g/8oz plain chocolate 4 large eggs 25g/1oz castor sugar 150ml/kpt double cream 3tsp rum or brandy

Method

Break chocolate into a bowl over a saucepan of hot water (not boiling) and melt. Separate the whites from the egg yolks into separate bowls. Beat the yolks into the melted chocolate together with the sugar and half the cream. Beat over the hot water until thick. Remove from heat and fold in the remaining cream mixed with the rum. Whisk the egg whites until stiff. Fold a tablespoon of the egg white into the chocolate mixture with a metal spoon and when well incorporated fold in the restiusing figure of eight movements with your sp

Three opinions and a Village Hall and associated matters

The Village Hall and the Playing Fields - a personal view from George Steer

There were fourteen of us in the silage Hall for its AGM. The chairman (Steve Appleby) was delighted that, for once, noncommittee members outnumbered committee members. The discussion was wide-ranging but eventually came down to the fact that the Hall barely pays its way and could be running at a loss if even minor structural alterations have to be made.

For the prices that are charged, the Hall is subsidising the organisations using it. This may be a laudable aim but I would suggest that it should not apply across the board. Fouth activities could be differentiated from adult ones and ron-profit making from profit making. In my view these would only be short-term remedies.

The Hall is over 100 years old. It is not architecturally very beautiful and I think that its shelf life is long gone. If nostalgia is set aside then the Hall could be sold (Charity Commissioners being agreeable) and the proceeds put towards building an up-to-date community that on the playing fields with thanging rooms, a kitchen which is trygienic and a moderate sized hall/the pom which is comfortable and marm.

one fell swoop it would deal with the problems experienced by the Wage Hall and the Playing Fields Committees, the major problem seing apathy.

The Village Hall - a personal view from Dee Randell

As I see it there are two options for the Village Hall. One is that it is sold and the money is put into a static fund to be invested in a community charity project in the future. The second is that we realise just what an asset we've got and make the most of it.

Built in 1895 as the Temperance Hall, the Village Hall is situated probably just about central for everyone. It could not be described as a beautiful building but it has its charm and a view to die for. It is the only venue in the village with an entertainments licence and is the ideal, and well used, venue for dances, discos, parties, concerts etc. It is also the home for the village Youth Club and the 'Mums and Monsters' group.

A new hall as part of the proposed playing fields complex at the top of the village sounds wonderful. But what happens while the money is raised to build it? Do the village children and young people just get put on hold – by the time it all gets done they could have children of their own.

Another major grouse about the Village Hall is the lack of parking - but it is on a par with most of Port Isaac. At the very most the Hall is just ten minutes walk from anywhere in the village.

The steps are treacherous – I agree. But with some money and a lot of goodwill they could be changed. Let's face it, adequate lighting and rails would help as an interim measure.

The kitchen - it's been condemned. But again, a few fundraising events to raise the money to buy units and materials etc and some willing volunteers and in a weekend there could be a new kitchen. A new and useable kitchen would also encourage more usage of the Hall. A review of the rental rates and it could be well on the way to being a viable proposition, well used and part of village life again.

If that could happen the plans drawn up some time ago for the complete refurbishment of the hall – involving the small sum of £50,000 – could be brought out again, dusted down, tweaked where necessary and matched funding sought to put them into action.

If you are interested then go along to the Public Extraordinary General Meeting on May 18th. Make your views heard.

The Village Hall or a Hall for all - a personal view from Jon Cleave

Reading the Cornish Guardian on March 30th was very distressing for anyone with any regard for Port Isaac. Three news stories had been published about the village. Without exception they alluded to the closure, proposed closure or otherwise dispensing of facets of our communities amenities, ie the Main at Port Gaverne, the Village Hall and the playing field equipment.

Whilst I fully appreciate that there are sound reasons as to why these situations have developed, anyone reading those articles would be put under the immediate impression that we are a community in terminal decline.

You and I know that this is far from the case. We have a vibrant, caring community that is forever engaged in activities involving all age groups. I can tell you from my own experience that many visitors are quite astonished at the level of community based activities that happen here and who bemoan the lack of similar opportunities in their home towns. Far from being in decline, I would contend that as far as these things are concerned we are in the ascendancy.

Let me list some of the activities and organisations currently active in

Instead, take advantage of the dry days and do some maintenance. Paint the shed – after tidying it out! Sweep out the greenhouse. Paint any wrought iron with rust resistant paint. When I next write I am sure spring really will be here!

this village (population around 1000!): the lifeboat, football club, cricket club, gig club, Golden Circle, Sunday School, Historical Society, Mums & Monsters, Youth Club, Port Isaac 2000, Port Isaac Chorale, Carn Awn Singers, Déià Blues Band and the fabulous Fisherman's Friends. Add to those the many I've probably forgotten and the ones we used to have that may one day be resurrected (the PIP's?) and any others that one of you out there has a mind to start. Then add all the quizzes, concerts and other one-off occurrences in which we indulge. See what I mean?

Thus, we seem to have a great disparity. On the one hand, all these marvellous community based things. Yet, on the other hand, nowhere quite suitable in the community to provide a focal point for them when the need arises.

I know that for many of you the Village Hall holds a great sentimental and often nostalgic attraction. The Cornish Guardian printed the opinion that with four other halls and commercial premises available it was underused. The basic premise of this argument is false. The Village Hall is underused because it is: * in disrepair. Anyone who has the responsibility for the maintenance of an old building knows the costs of keeping them in good repair, internally and externally. The Village Hall committee can only effect repairs if they have the finance available. If it is not used there is no finance. No finance, no repairs. And just remember, we are talking repairs, not refurbishment which is an entirely different

* dangerous. Apart from the

obvious problem with the steps, there are numerous examples within theHall itself of accidents waiting to happen. It is lethal, certainly to children and old people. * inflexible. A committee meeting requires a small, intimate space. A concert requires a much larger one. Playgroups or Sunday Schools need smaller more confined areas. There is no scope whatsoever to adapt the interior of the Hall to suit whatever function is being undertaken.

I hope the present Village Hall committee does not take offence at these remarks as they are in no way aimed at you. I have no doubt that without your efforts it would have folded long ago.

Sadly, I feel that the evidence suggests that the usability of this Hall and others like it has passed us by but happily there is enough 'going on' here to justify renewed efforts for a multifunctional building which would cater for the broad range of activities going on in the village.

Now, I recall from several issues of Trio ago that the Church seems to be in a similar position to the Village Hall, ie pivotal in the community and possessing real estate, but underused and underfunded. Is it impertinent of me to wonder whether the twain can meet? I don't think it is. I would suggest that a purpose built hall, funded by the sale of the current Village Hall (in today's sky high market) and built (dare I say it? Yes, I dare) on the site of St Peter's Church Rooms. It would be a joint venture of Church and community and usable by everyone and I'm sure satisfy many, many more than the current set up. There, I've said it and I'm sure it's going to annoy a lot of you. But it's not meant to

You will recall that all males over 18 who signed had to "promise, vow and protest to maintain and defend the true Reformed Protestant Church against all Popery and Popish things within this realm". Just one piece of the fight between Parliamentarians (Roundheads) and Charles I (Royalists).

Thomas Roscarrock was a Royalist through and through and was one of Sir Richard Grenville's trusted aides in the Civil War.

In Elizabeth 1's reign, Nicholas was a Catholic Recusant - that is he refused to attend the Church of England when it was legally compulsory. He was accused of this dastardly deed in 1577 at Launceston Assizes, imprisoned in the Tower from 1580-1586 and racked in 1581.

I think I would have gone to church and kept my fingers crossed behind my back!

Back to Kilmarth

When I mentioned in the last edition of Trio that Henry Symons didn't know where Kilmarth (mentioned in the Doomsday Book) was, I was doing him an injustice. He is not certain as to its whereabouts. There is a difference. He'll come up with the goods dreckly, I'm sure.

Taxes

Finally, after Gordon Brown's budget, I was thinking of taxes and how to avoid them. Taxes have been with us for yonks and even income tax has been around for 200 years. It was temporary - to help us beat Napoleon. Politicians were always weasly with words. One of the old taxes was the Hearth Tax of 1662. You were exempt if you were on poor relief, if you didn't pay Parish rates or if your house was worth less than £1 per annum. The tax was 2/- (10p) per hearth, payable in two instalments at Lady Day and Michaelmas. People were blocking up their fireplaces in droves to escape the tax. An interesting point was that, in St Endellion parish, Dorothy Grenville had a house (manor, mansion) with 22 hearths. There were only a dozen places in the whole of Cornwall with more and they were owned by people who were seriously rich. I haven't seen Richard Sloman since I read about the tax, but I wouldn't mind betting (10p) that Roscarrock was owned by said Dorothy Grenville.

My head's aching with all this thinking and it's nearly time for the Boat Race. Cheers!

And he'll carry on till his hardest hit. Struggling to keep his pace fast, He jumps in his hole, he's home at last.





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


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
