# 200 Trios on and still going strong

his is the 200<sup>th</sup> issue of Trio.

The first Trio was published in April 1982 under the name of News. It was published by the Village Hall Committee with the purpose of keeping everyone up-to-date with village activities.

Articles in Trio number one included: The Parish Council had been discussing the dangerous wall and steps at Port Gaverne and it was hoped that 'the National Trust may take care of the problem'.

Plans were received for a proposed wall along the coastal footpath at Overcliff and 'fears were expressed that the wall would reduce the width of the path but, since it was thought that the path was only used by hikers, it was not considered a serious problem'. Elsewhere it was reported that a holidaymaker's dog had to be put to sleep after being severely injured in a fall from Overcliff.

The Playgroup raised £172 from a jumble sale. Wine of the month was Dandelion and there was a recipe for Mackerel with Horseradish. Advance notice was given of

forthcoming comedy performances from the PIPs.

Issue 100 came out in May 1991 and this eight page issue included a miniature reprint of the first Trio. Other news included:

The St Breward Silver Band were due to start the summer concerts and Flora Dance on June 13<sup>th</sup> (ending on August 29<sup>th</sup>).

#### **Dear Trio**

We were sitting in the garden on a lovely June, Port Isaac afternoon and relaxing by reading the latest Trio, when we read the letter from Mr Bolton on the subject of second home owners paying full Council Tax rates. It somewhat spoiled our relaxation as we both found it rather patronising and insulting to many members of the community who are concerned that local services are being affected by the lack of funding. Does Mr Bolton have proof that these people are 'an ignorant minority'? I am sure that most people living in or visiting Port Isaac would be concerned that the Parish Council cannot afford to maintain safely the children's play equipment at the playing fields or the guay at Port Gaverne, both of which are used by locals and visitors alike.

Mr Bolton argues that second home owners have no need of Education Services or Social Services, but young, healthy people with no children could use the same argument to claim a reduction in their Council Tax payments! In a true community everyone makes a fair contribution. The local economy does depend on the goodwill and income of visitors, but is also distorted by the effects of second home ownership. We are both teachers and were fortunate to move to Port Isaac at a time when house prices had fallen. Our combined salaries are well above the average incomes for Cornwall. but we could no longer afford to buy a house in Port Isaac due to the increase in prices in recent years.

We have friends who own second homes in the village and we look forward to seeing them when they are visiting. We would not wish to put them off from coming to Port Isaac in any way or to have unjustified financial penalties imposed on them. However, we do believe that the children, elderly, disabled and all other sections of the community in Cornwall deserve to have services that are as good as the rest of the country and these have to be paid for somehow. Would Mr Bolton prefer a large increase in the full Council Tax for all of us, which is, of course, another alternative?

### Dear Trio

TO

Further to David Bolton's letter stating that 'visitors are the lifeblood of this community', I, like many other residents, completely disagree.

Firstly, the absentee houseowners and buyers continue to inflate house prices way beyond the range of most local people, driving out local people and young first time buyers.

The absentee houseowners and visitors come down to Port Isaac in their cars, loaded up with food from supermarkets up country. They seem to eat in most nights and spend the days on Polzeath beach. Some of them even send down their own builders and decorators to do their conversions and repairs. When the absentee houseowner rents out his second home the money goes up country and <u>if</u> they pay tax that goes in the national coffers.

Our electric, sewage, water, roads, refuse collection, national health, police, fire brigade, ambulance services etc all have to be geared up to those few weeks when the visitors come; these services don't just shut down and cost nothing when the visitors go home.

David mentioned education being the greatest single expense (38% only). Cornish children are entitled to as good an education as any other children in the country – perhaps this is the best reason for education and health costs coming out of the national taxation.

David suggested envy and spite were motives for raising this matter. I personally feel absolutely no envy

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towards the visitors. If all they say about the 'rat race' where they live is true, I feel sorry for them. But my pity does not extend to letting them off 50% of the Council Tax which we pay to make it possible for them to enjoy places like Port Isaac.

Like many of us, I feel it's nice to see them come down, but it's even better to see them go (and perhaps they could take their rubbish with them!).

#### Dear Trio

What a shame David Bolton of Port Gaverne has taken such a selfish view on the matter of Council Tax on second homes. As a permanent resident of Port Isaac I do not get any reduction in view of the fact that I do not have children, have never used the local library, have not, and probably never will use facilities such as leisure centres etc.

But one thing I do notice is that the cost of rubbish collections is higher than normal due to the amount of extra refuse during the holiday season and the fact that things like street cleaning only takes place during the holiday season to try and keep our lovely village clean after the careless disposal of rubbish, chip wrappers and the like left by our 'lifeblood second homeowners and visitors'.

I personally know a lot of second home owners and it seems that Mr Bolton is in a minority on this matter. Perhaps we 'locals' should campaign to have a 50% reduction on police and fire cover for those who want this reduction in council tax on second homes.

Council Tax is a fact of life whether we like it or not and if Mr Bolton were to do a little more research he would find that the full council tax is as much to second homeowners benefit as it is to the other permanent residents.

I am sure that Mr Bolton came to this area to enjoy its beauty and charm and its, so far, unspoilt nature. If it were not for the services provided by the local council the area would soon decline into the kind of place second homeowners are trying to escape from! Paul Pollington

# Rubbish!

A nyone who goes out into any of the streets of Port Isaac first thing on a Friday morning will know that we have a rubbish problem. It is a problem that is easily solved by putting out refuse in gull proof containers and not black bags which they rip open and strew the contents around the streets – not only unsightly but unhygienic too.

Of late the problem has got worse because rubbish is being put out at all times of the week and can sometimes be awaiting collection for six days. The problem seems to be particularly prevalent in the Rose Hill area which resulted in Bob Bulgin of Jessamine Cottage arranging a special meeting with representatives of North Cornwall District Council Technical Services Department, District Councillor Bill Dawe, Parish Council Chairman Bryan Richards and local residents to see the problem first hand.

Bob writes to Trio on the problem:

<sup>4</sup>Following Easter and now with the holiday season underway, the mounting problem of refuse storage and collection once again raises its ugly head.

Householders in the middle section of Rose Hill are frequently faced with the onerous task of cleaning up the litter and unmentionables that lay strewn down Rose Hill and in particular along the pathway between Chigago House and Jessamine Cottage leading to Middle Street. Plastic bagged rubbish starts to appear all week along the flank wall of Jessamine Cottage, often days before collection that now takes place on Fridays. Within hours these tempting targets to seagulls, cats, dogs and rats and any other passing predator are ripped open, the contents picked over and blown in all directions not only presenting an obscene litter problem both to residents and visitors but also a serious health hazard (one should see the contents - unbelievable!!).

Letters of complaint have been received by District Councillor Bill Dawe and the outcome of this was a meeting between executives of North Cornwall Public Cleansing Department, Councillor Dawe, Parish Council Chairman Bryan Richards and local residents on Tuesday morning, the 20<sup>th</sup> of June. At this meeting it was agreed there is a serious problem which must be addressed – not only at this location but elsewhere in the village and it is thought there is a case for <u>ALL</u> rubbish awaiting collection to be enclosed in a bin with a firmly fitting lid. <u>NO PLASTIC BAGS</u>. The NCDC will be circulating a letter to householders to this effect.

With regard to the refuse collection point in Rose Hill it was agreed this is to be a 'Restricted Point' at which 'named' refuse bins (no plastic bags) will be collected for Chicago House, Vine Cottage and Jessamine Cottage only. A suitable notice will be fixed to the wall at this point and action will be taken against future dumping of bags or fly tipping. It should be noted that the lower village refuse collection point is at the Harbour Slipway.

The NCDC officials were asked to review the possibility of refuse collection taking place on Tuesday instead of Friday which would help in clearing rubbish from holiday lets.

I am sure that we who live in Port Isaac are committed to maintaining its undoubted beauty and those who choose to come here on holiday, many from overseas, be it for a week, a day or an hour, come here to enjoy what is a unique living village. This is not enhanced by lack of thought in refuse storage and disposal which calls for responsible attention by all concerned.'

During the meeting NCDC was invited to use Trio as a vehicle to get their message across. The Technical Services Department has issued this statement,

'There has been an increasing amount of problems associated with the refuse collection in Port Isaac. Therefore, I would request your co-operation in the following:-

- The collection day is Friday and no refuse should be out prior to the night before collection.
- Please place the refuse in the containers provided on the Harbour Quay.
- Would holiday homeowners please make arrangements to ensure refuse from their property is put out on the correct day <u>ONLY</u> and in the correct place?
- If you have a kerbside collection and refuse is placed out early, please ensure the

container is suitable and will withstand attacks from animals and birds, thus preventing litter problems.

Failure to comply with these guidelines could lead to the Council taking legal proceedings against offenders under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, the maximum fine being £1000.

I do appreciate that the majority of residents act in a responsible manner and will take the necessary preventative measures in order to maintain the appearance and cleanliness of Port Isaac.'

In addition NCDC has written to all households in the worst hit areas outlining the problems and requesting that rubbish is not put out earlier than the night before collection and ideally in a suitable container with a secure lid to prevent animals and birds gaining access to the contents. It also asks that this container be removed from the highway as soon as possible after it has been emptied.



Summer seems to have finally arrived and if you look at the diary dates on the back page you will see that there's masses of events planned over the next couple of months.

And talking of diary dates, as soon as you have set a date for any event, do let us know. It can then go in the diary page and hopefully save the problem of two events clashing on the same day.

As you will see from the letters page the debate over council tax for second home owners continues. Also this month, rubbish rears its ugly head again.

Please keep your letters and articles coming in – all age groups, we would love to have some input from the younger members of the village. Remember, it is your newsletter.

# PC proposes road safety improvements

Parish Council members recently met on the playing field for a special meeting to discuss road safety improvements. This follows a road accident when a local child ran out of the playing field and straight into the road to get to an ice cream van that was parked on the other side in Hillson Close. Luckily he was not badly hurt and suffered only minor injuries and bruising and this was no doubt because the driver of the car was travelling well below the 30mph speed limit.

A similar meeting, attended by Paul Tyler MP, was held about five years ago but it achieved little. Representatives from the County Council are to be invited to the next PC meeting to discuss possible calming measures and road safety improvements. The PC is proposing that the car park gates be moved about 12 metres to the north, that the hedge is removed and replaced with a post and rail fence and a pavement provided. Hopefully, this time some action will be taken.

Still on the subject of the playing fields, the PC seems to have worked miracles and new swings are now up and swinging with the required safety surface underneath. In addition the maribou has been repaired and is in use again. Considering that a few months ago it looked as if there would be no children's play equipment this is really good news. Continuing on an optimistic note, Bryan Richards tells us that he is hopeful that, by the end of the summer the entire play area should be back as it was, if not better, and meeting all safety requirements. Obviously money is required and there will be some fundraising needed to accompany the grant aid applied for.

# George's ramblins.....

After the euphoria that surrounded the Village Hall meeting, the Recreational Group held a meeting in the Penhaligon Room. Less than a dozen turned up and we decided that we would give it one more try before the group folds. ### Port Isaac Chorale

The Port Isaac Chorale has gone into its summer recession after two concerts in one week. It's safe to say that the people of Camelford were much more interested in the fate of the England football team than they were in the Chorale or the fate of St Julitta's Church at Lanteglos. They stayed away in droves. Probably England's subsequent demise was a direct result of our pravers being answered.

The other concert was at St Gennys Church. There were many more people in the audience and we sang much worse - much much worse. lanet's face is like a barometer on these occasions and this time it represented a heavy squall with maybe thunder mixed in.

### Things hystorical

Pursuing this religious theme, if you happen to be in Truro with an hour to spare then pop into the Museum. Not only are the usual displays worth a look but 'Christianity in Cornwall' is well worth a visit even to an old agnostic (with strong Methodist leanings) like me. We even have a section on Churches and Chapels in the Parish in our exhibition on the 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> of July in the Church Rooms this time, starting each day at 10.30am and going on until teatime or until we're tired of talking - probably about midnight!

Did you know, for instance, that John Wesley came to Cornwall first in 1743 when he was 40, and in all visited 36 times. He came to Port Isaac on more than half of those visits, the first time in 1747 and the last in 1789.

He didn't stay long in 1747, the natives were none too happy and when Quaker Scantlebury saw a mob converging on the beach and the skittle alley he quickly lost interest in John Wesley at his door.

After the disruption of 1835, when the Methodists split into various factions, a Wesleyan Superintendent, came to the village and one kindly lady of the opposite faction suggested that 'they should go to hear him in a spirit of





peace and pull'n from the pulpit!' On another occasion, the Rev Aquila Barber was hooted down by a mob of sailors, fishermen, pilots and strumpets. Who said that religion is boring? All the Methodist factions came together in 1932 but my memory is of armed neutrality until well after that.

Here are just a selection the the receipts in the book:

To prevent the formation of crust upon the inside of tea-kettles - put into the tea-kettle a flat oyster shell, and keep in constantly there, it will attract the stony particles that are in the water to itself, and prevent their forming upon the tea-kettle.

**Coffee** - The infusion or decoction of the roasted seeds of the coffee-berry, when not too strong, is a wholesome, exhilarating, and strengthening beverage; and when mixed with a large proportion of milk is a proper article of diet for literary and sedentary people. # **The Free Spirit Trust**

The magnificent sum of £515 (with more to come) was raised at the 'Free Spirit' Table Top sale and coffee morning, organised by Sandie Bulgin, on Saturday July  $1^{st}$ .

The following extracts from 'Anna's Story' explain just what the Free Spirit Trust is all about and how the money raised will be spent.

### Anna's Story

'On November 3<sup>rd</sup> 1994, my 15<sup>th</sup> birthday, I was diagnosed with having a rare form of cancer. I had been feeling very tired and I had lost my appetite. I thought this was due to the after-effects of appendicitis, so it came as a big shock to discover I had a life-threatening illness. It all seemed to be happening to someone else, not to me. Before I had time to think, I was in hospital having major surgery, followed by six gruelling months of chemotherapy. The drugs knocked out my immune system, so I was prone to infection. Throughout the winter we rushed into hospital, at a moment's notice, for antibiotic treatment as well as for chemotherapy. I even spent Christmas in hospital. Although everyone rallied round to help it was hard to communicate. People seemed not to see me anymore – they just saw the cancer.

During this time I lost track of school and many of my friends. At last the treatment came to an end and, thinking positively that cancer was out of my life for good, I had a fabulous summer. Then in September, I discovered that the cancer was back. I felt very angry, as if my body had betrayed me. I then realised that I was not immortal and that death could happen at any time – it is not just something that happens to old people.

When I was first diagnosed, my family and I were swept into an adrenaline world of hospital tests, specialists and treatments. We were in a state of shock. During the following year I had lots of things done to me and suggested to me. Sometimes I wanted to scream. It took a year before I started to rebel and fight back. Yes, I had cancer, but it was MY life and MY body and I wanted to decide how to live my life.

After thinking things through, I decided to go ahead and have the second surgery just after my 16<sup>th</sup> birthday and a year after the first operation. I began to feel much stronger about making decisions, even if my life depended on them. No, I didn't want to have radiotherapy - the risks outweighed the possibility of it being a success. No, I didn't want to try further chemotherapy when the chances of it working seemed so poor. I would rather use the time I had in other ways. Now, six months later, I don't know what the future holds for me but I do know that, if I spend each day worrying about tomorrow, I will never be able to live for today. Instead I am packing my life with enjoyable things and living life to the full. During the eighteen months of my illness, apart from conventional treatment, I tried many different therapies. Some of these helped to build up my energy and confidence again. I wanted to be part of the normal world but I often felt very different. I never met any people of my own age who had been ill. Every year around 800 teenagers get cancer. There are plenty of support groups and activities for adults with cancer and help for children and their families but there is very little just for teenagers.

While lying in my hospital bed, I used to imagine myself on a Caribbean island beach, watching dolphins swimming in the wild. It seemed to help me through the treatment. After my second operation I heard about an organisation called the Make-A-Wish Foundation. They arranged for my wish to go to the Caribbean to come true.'

On April 10<sup>th</sup> 1996, Anna flew across the world to fulfil her life's dream. During her stay Dean Bernal from the JoJo Dolphin Whale and Wildlife Project (you may remember he gave a talk here in the village a few years ago) was Anna's guide and friend. Anna saw JoJo on her first boat trip but then, later in her holiday, while snorkelling just offshore, she met JoJo face to face - it was a "magical day".

After the holiday Anna wrote, 'This holiday has given me so much. Physically, I am stronger and fitter. I feel more relaxed too as if some of my



worries about life and cancer were washed away by the sea. I regained confidence and discovered new strengths. The holiday was a time away from the pressures of home and school and the difficulty of trying to fit in when I feel so uncertain about the future. The cancer seemed insignificant. Although the doctors told me it is incurable, I became really strong and clear inside. At one time the thought of my illness overwhelmed me like a monster. Now I feel much stronger in spirit. Instead of being an enemy, the cancer is helping me to understand what is most important in life.

To wake up each morning in a place where the air is fresh, the sea is turquoise and pure and the sun is warm, really lifts the spirit. While we were away an idea started to grow. It would be wonderful for a group of other teenagers who have been ill to travel to Providenciales together for the experience of a lifetime.

My illness came at a time when I wanted to go out and enjoy myself with friends and start to find my own way in life. This was taken away. It was hard to find my own voice and spirit. The trip, the wonderful people I met and the workshops I have done have helped me to grow up and make something really positive out of the experience of being ill. Life can have meaning and purpose even though it may be short. It need not be a tragedy to die young. I hope the Caribbean project will make it easier for other teenagers to discover their real-life adventure as well.'

On Anna's return to Britain The Free Spirit Trust was founded to help other teenagers with lifethreatening illnesses. It provides a fabulous Caribbean adventure for groups of teenagers backed up with a creative support programme in the UK.

# **あ**IlWays with summer vegetablesIIあ

This month I am suggesting a flan made with olive oil pastry instead of the traditional fat. It is moulded with the fingers and there is no need to use a rolling pin – great! Spinach is excellent at the moment and the recipe is suitable for vegetarians.

My second recipe is suitable as a vegetarian main course although I am inclined to use to accompany a meat dish. It is an extremely useful dish to serve when feeding meat eaters and vegetarians at the same time.

### **Cashew & Spinach Quiche**

Olive Oil pastry 150gm/6oz plain flour 1 tsp salt 5 tblsp water 2 crushed garlic cloves



Heat all the ingredients, except for the flour, in a saucepan to a bubble and then add the flour and beat until smooth. Line a 20cm/8" flan dish with this pastry, moulding it with your fingers. Bake the pastry case blind by putting a layer of tin foil onto the pastry and cook for 15mins at 190°C/375'F/gas mark 5.

Remove from the oven and reduce the oven heat to 180°C/350°F/gas mark 4.

### Filling

75gm/3oz butter Small chopped onion Clove of garlic, chopped 450gm/11b cooked spinach 110gm/4oz roasted cashew nuts finely grated nutmeg salt 3 eggs 200ml/7floz milk 75gm/3oz grated cheddar cheese



Melt butter and add the onions and garlic and cook until soft. Add the cashew nuts, spinach, nutmeg and salt. Sauté for 5 minutes. Drain off any excess liquid and add this spinach mixture to the pastry case. Whisk the eggs and milk with a pinch of salt. Pour over the spinach in the pastry case. Add the grated cheese and bake for 35mins or until golden and set.

Courgettes with Roseman

- 450gm/1lb courgettes, sliced 1 small tin tomatoes
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 clove of garlic, crushed
- 3 tblsp olive oil 2 level tblsp tomato puree
- 1 tsp sugar
- 25gm/loz fresh breadcrumbs

25gm/1oz grated parmesan cheere 1 sprig rosemary or 1tsp dried salt and black pepper *Sauce* 275ml/half pint milk 25gm/1oz butter 1 tblsp flour

salt & pepper

1 onion ring, 1 bay leaf, sliver c<sup>2</sup> carrot, parsley stalk

Heat oven to 170°C/325°F/gas3. Bring milk to the boil with bay leaf onion, carrot and parsley. Fry the onion and garlic in oil until transparent. Add the courgettes and fry for a couple of minutes. Add the tin of tomatoes, the tomat puree and the sugar. Add the chopped rosemary and seasoning and simmer for 10 mins. Make the sauce: Melt the butter a saucepan. Add the flour and cook, stirring all the time, for a minute. Slowly add the strained milk mixing well all the time. Keep stirring until the sauce boils and thickens. Season.

Put the courgettes in an ovenprod dish. Pour the sauce over the tot Sprinkle with the breadcrumbs ar a parmesan and cook for 20 minute or until golden.
