Frank's gift to Port Isaac RNLI, of an oil painting of a 1911 Port Isaac pulling boat rescue by the Richard & Sarah III, will also be exhibited.

At the time of going to press, we understand this presentation will be attended by Mrs Marguerite Lang, a great-great granddaughter of Charles Mitchell who was awarded two Silver medals for bravery in 1859 and 1870. Mrs Lang, who has inherited Charles Mitchell's original Vellum for his 1859 rescue, will also be presenting a framed copy of this historic document. A truly great launch for Frank's exhibition following his 27 years of support for the RNLI.

The Cornish Guardian says it would cost thousands of pounds to renew the footbridge. Poppycock! It was with much dismay that I read the letters from two families, who originate from outside our village, who seem to think that putting a new car park next to the children's playing field and opposite a housing estate with 27 children/ young people would be a splendid idea.

They have obviously not been in the area long enough to appreciate all the hard work put in over the years by many people, including not least Bryan Richards, to improve the safety of our children whilst using the playing field.

Admittedly, progress is slow - due wholly to the procrastinative nature

of one particular utility company who seem unable to tell us whether any of their cables run under our hedge or not. As soon as they can come up with a reasonable reply, the playing field will become as safe as anywhere. Until that is, 160 cars are encouraged to park next to it, thus increasing the traffic in the immediate area, conveying multitudes of people, with potentially dubious natures, right into our children's laps.

In reply to Mr Paton's letter, all I can say is that it is obvious that he has not been in the area long enough to fully understand how this village functions emotionally. Maybe his community is larger or more uncaring than ours, but can even he, with his four children to think of, honestly say that he could watch a child grow and develop from a lump under his mother's T-shirt to a happy, sunny toddler and finally to a confident, friendly five year old, only to see him knocked down outside the playing field, without feeling anything? If he had seen that little boy, bloody and barely conscious, literally dragging himself across the grass with his hands, too shocked to cry, I think even he may think twice about encouraging cars up at the playing field.

I'm sorry Mr Paton, but all the children born in this village are our children, not just the ones we are genetically responsible for.

What I would suggest is what is now happening in other parts of Cornwall, low price starter homes for local people or a self-build scheme. I'm sure there will be concerns about more ugly houses being built in our village but, as has



been shown in nearby St Teath, this doesn't have to be the case. These houses are far from an eyesore and, more importantly, these schemes give people like ourselves the opportunity to live where we want and in our own property.

THE VILLAGE HALL

Jon Cleave praised the results of the recent 'makeover' of the Village Hall with the BBC TV programme 'DIY SOS' and local people. 'The Hall looks brilliant' he said. The PC agreed to place a letter of thanks in *Trio* to all concerned (see centre pages).

AMENITY COMMITTEE

Seats

Two seats in the village have been vandalised. However, Dave Dingle has undertaken major repairs along with the painting and staining of all the other seats. The seat on Lobber has not been inspected and maintained because of the foot and mouth restrictions.

Playing Field

One of the goal posts is now broken beyond repair but the good news is that Ken Webster is to donate the old Port Isaac Football Club's metal goal posts to the PC.

Litter and tin cans have been left strewn over the playing field and the PC is trying to obtain a litterbin for the field from NCDC. An extract from the committee's report says, 'If NCDC turn us down, I think we shall have to seriously think about supplying some form of litter bin ourselves'.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Main

Bryan Richards reported the receipt of a letter from a group – 'The Friends of the Main' – requesting another Public Meeting prior to the completion of the transfer of The Main to The National Trust. Earlier in the meeting, during Public Discussion, Malcolm Lee had said, 'Locals had the opportunity to come to previous meetings regarding The Main but had chose not to attend'. He went on to suggest that, 'if people were really concerned about The Main and were offering their services to help maintain it, then he felt sure that The National Trust would welcome such offers of help'.

It was agreed that the matter would be put on next month's agenda but, in the meantime, an informal meeting between representatives of the PC and the Friends of the Main would be held.

Visibility at the Playing Field Various formalities and red tape, beyond the control of the PC, are still holding things up. More next month.

Undergrounding Cabling in the bottom of the village

Following a very constructive meeting with Eric Gill from NCDC, he has provided much funding information. The matter will be discussed at the next PC meeting.

Foot and Mouth Restrictions

Although the restrictions are still in operation around Port Isaac, reports are still coming in of people ignoring them and walking over restricted land. Unless the offenders are caught red handed there is nothing the PC can do.

New Computer

The PC's new computer is due to be delivered any day.

CAR PARKS

An anonymous offer to purchase the field next to the Playing Field, via solicitors Merrick Kelleher, has been received by the PC. It was unanimously agreed that the field was not for sale. Earlier, during Public Discussion, Malcolm Lee had said that he was 'horrified at the suggestion'. 'This amenity should be for the children of the village and future generations', he continued. 'This impertinent letter should be given no consideration at all'

Extension to existing Car Park

A site meeting with NCDC is planned. The PC feels that if any extra car parking is to be created it should be instigated by NCDC as it would be responsible for the charges and maintenance.

RUBBISH

The PC agreed to arrange a further meeting with NCDC to discuss the rubbish problem.

CHAPMAN'S

n the left hand side of Fore Street, just down from Little Hill, Chapman's grocery shop, a remote branch establishment of a Wadebridge based purveyor, occupied the ground floor of an austere looking three-storey building.

A sign, "L. Chapman & Sons", jutted slightly out from the building at the first floor level. It was a long sign, the letters running in vertical sequence from top to bottom. Two plate glass windows of passable size on the ground floor shed light onto the activity within the shop, when there was any.

A long marble topped counter stood on each side of Chapman's shop, one to the left and one to the right as you entered. There were at least five shop assistants; three devoted to dispensing the perishables on the left, and the others handling the dried and tinned goods on the right.

A large red trimmed bacon slicer stood erect in the centre of the left-hand counter for pending use when there was bacon to cut. My mother was much given to using the expression, "If we had some bacon, we could have some bacon and eggs - if we had some eggs!" Yes, Chapman's had no bananas.

Chapman's sometimes did have fresh eggs for sale but, in their general absence, blue wrapped packages of a yellowish powder known as "dried eggs" could be obtained and made a not acceptable scrambled egg dish. Gulls eggs were a better substitute in season and moorhen's eggs were better yet. However, Chapman's did not sell any of those.

Adjacent to the bacon slicer sometimes stood an enormous cheese with a big block of butter and another of margarine from which tiny portions, exactly equivalent to the amount prescribed as the standard ration, were cut upon presentation of a valid ration book.

In front of the right hand counter, a row of open tins of biscuits leered at hopeful customers. There were "Cream Crackers", "Marie", "Nice",

"Rich Tea" and "Digestive" varieties to name a few, and a few is more or less all that they were. The biscuits were sold by the pound in largish paper bags of the kind that made such a satisfying explosion when blown up and burst with a clap of the hands.

Broken biscuits cost less than the intact variety. It therefore paid to take your own measure of biscuits from the open tins and break some of them while doing so. A half a biscuit dipped in your tea was just as satisfying as a whole one – and actually soaked up the tea more efficiently.

Jack Provis worked behind the left hand counter, tall and sleek in his dustcoat, the gloss on his hair rivalling the gleam on the static disc blade of the bacon slicer. lack, a splendid pianist, had worked for a while for the NAAFI, where his great talent had been in huge, popular demand. He became a master organist at St Peter's Church after the war and played regularly at services for many years. It was worth going to Church just to hear his renditions of "Jesu, joy of man's desiring" or "I know that my Redeemer liveth".

However, Jack's "tour de force" on the organ was the "Trumpet Voluntary". I doubt that this classic was ever played anywhere more stirringly, more triumphantly, or with more raise-the-roof power than it was by Jack Provis in his prime.

Chapman's was managed by a gentleman named Mr Hillman who was nothing if not an unabashed extrovert. He lived on Trewetha Lane, a few houses up from the **Temperance** Hall. Mr Hillman certainly had a Christian name but I never heard it invoked. He was most dapper in his craftily cut

suit or blazer, with slick hair on which the comb strokes lav like plough lines across a well-trimmed lawn. He evinced a graceful economy of movement and had an insistent manner of speaking in a mildly off-cockney accent that tended to get under your fingernails and which might have placed him dangerously close to being typed as a spiv in a more sophisticated part of the country. You could see him in Arthur English's famous radio persona, the "Prince of the Wide Boys", although on reflection there was also a leavening of Uriah Heep in his character.

Irrespective of a tendency to unctuousness, Mr Hillman was a dynamic organiser whose agreeable manner and community spirit were always absolutely to the fore. His most celebrated role was that of a regular public performance MC, at which he truly excelled. Mr Hillman's compering of talent contests and charity concerts, in both the Temperance Hall and the Church Rooms, were masterpieces of the man rising above the quality of the material.

Mr Hillman's party piece was to divide his invariably capacity audiences into two groups. separated by the aisle. The group on one side of the aisle would be charged with singing "It's a long way to Tipperary", while their counterparts had to sing "Pack up your troubles in your old kit bag". The winning side drowned out the loser with the power of its choral might. It sometimes made for better entertainment than did the competing talent, about which the kindest thing to be said was that it was a fortunate thing that misrepresentation was not a crime.

Holidays - Peace of mind while you're away

There is one worry however and that is what is happening to your unoccupied home. It seems that four out of five burglaries occur when a dwelling is unoccupied. The effects of a good holiday are cancelled out by the realisation that someone has invaded your property.

What can you do?

- Do not announce to everyone that you are going away and leaving your home unoccupied.
- Let a neighbour know and if possible provide them with a key so that they can remove post from your hallway.
- If someone is given your key make sure it does not have a label attached showing your name and house details (in case the key is lost).
- Ask the key holder to draw the

- curtains in the morning and evening.
- If you are away for some time, perhaps a neighbour or friend would cut the lawn.
- Ask a neighbour if they will park their car in your drive and make it look as though someone is in residence.
- Cancel the newspapers and milk delivery.
- Put some internal lights on timers set to come on and off at varying times during the day/ night.
- Postcode your valuables and display the red and yellow sticker on your window to advertise the fact that you have done so.
- If your home is within a Neighbourhood Watch area let the co-ordinator know you are going away.
- Lock your garage and shed, making sure ladders are put inside first.
- Lock your doors and windows



and set the burglar alarm.

 Remember not to write your home address on luggage labels on your outward journey.

Follow this advice and 'Have a Happy Holiday'.



Spanish Specials

Thave recently stayed with friends in Spain. The wife is Spanish and her husband is English.

He does the cooking, which has a strong Spanish influence, and the dishes he produced were delicious. Spanish vegetable dishes are often served as a complete course and we had the bean recipe for supper. My friend didn't measure the ingredients but tasted and added as he went along. I have worked out quantities and ingredients that are more available in the English market. I hope you enjoy the result.

Broad Beans with Chorizo Sausage

900g/2lb broad beans (weight when podded or use frozen) * 2 tblsp olive oil * 3 fat cloves garlic 1 Spanish onion * 275ml/½ pint chicken stock * 2 glasses dry white wine 225g/8oz Chorizo sausage (skinned and cut into 1cm/½ inch pieces) * seasoning

METHOD

Finely dice the onion and garlic and gently sauté in a large deep frying pan until soft but not coloured. Add the stock, wine and beans, bring to the boil and simmer gently with a lid on for ¾ hour. Add the sausage and allow to stand for ½ hr in order that the flavours instil. Season to taste. Serve in shallow soup bowls with warm crusty bread.

The next recipe comes from a Spanish cookery book I have used for years. It comes from the Hotel San Lorenzo.

Chicken stew with mixed vegetables

4 chicken joints (of your choice) * oil for frying * 1 cup podded fresh peas 12 small new potatoes * 12 asparagus tips * 50g/2oz chopped ham 2 carrots sliced * 2 tblsp flour * ½ tumbler dry white wine * salt and pepper

METHOD

Gently fry the chicken joints to seal the juices. Add the vegetables, cover with a lid and 'sweat' for ½ hour over a very low heat. Stir in the flour, allow to colour slightly, then add the wine and stock, then add seasoning, stirring until smooth. Cover with a lid and continue to cook over a low heat for a further ½ hour or until the chicken is very tender.

For those who know her, rest assured that Trudie Tummons' hen night was celebrated in true Scillonian style with an Abba solo atop a Mermaid bar table.


